We are a group of parents from all three schools who meet to, not only raise much needed funds for the extras that make our childrens time at school more enjoyable and rewarding, but also to discuss and help shape decisions that affect our children and schools such as Homework policies and lunches.

Whether you have 10 mins a week to be part of our email group or more time available to attend our half termly Parent Council meeting and to volunteer to help at events – every second counts.

I have listed below just some of the topics that we have discussed this year and the difference that we “hope” we have made to our childrens education.

Short Heath Library – We helped to arrange the books in the library after a refurb! It meant that staff can concentrate on what they do best!

School lunches – We worked closely with Shires and added the option of sandwiches for children who are entitled to a free school meal and we also added Subs to the menu at Short Heath.

Parking & Road Safety – This is an ongoing issue and we have worked with Councillor Ian Shires and the Council to try and make the roads around our schools safer for our children. We need parents/carers to take responsibility and park and drive safely near our schools until we find a solution.

New Federation Website – Parent Council have worked closely with school, giving feedback at every stage of developing our new Federation website.

Fundraising – We have listened to your feedback and are focusing on two fundraisers a year – Summer Fayre and Christmas Fayre.

Volunteering – We support schools with functions such as the Christmas Discos and refreshments at Sports Days. This leaves teachers free to look after our children and ensure they have as much fun as possible at these events.

Parent council meetings are normally held once a half term at either Short Heath or Lane Head. The dates are on the notice boards of all schools.

It would be lovely to see some new faces – Especially Nursery/Reception and Year 2/3 parents/carers/grand parents!! We take minutes at all meetings and work through an agenda. However, they are run informally and we respect everyone’s views and opinions.
