HEADLICE are running riot in school at the moment. Children are most commonly affected so school is an ideal breeding ground. Having head lice, also called nits, doesn't mean you're dirty. **PLEASE, PLEASE, PLEASE CHECK YOUR CHILD EVERY WEEK!** The most common places for head lice to lurk are in the hair behind the ears and at the nape of the neck. Even if you still can't spot any lice, comb the child's hair with a special 'nit comb'. These are available from most chemists. If head lice are present, you need to treat your child. They are tough - they can't be killed by washing with normal shampoo or normal combing, because they reproduce so quickly, you've got to kill them before they spread. If your child has head lice, check everyone in the family. You'll need to treat everyone affected to get rid of them. You can treat head lice by using medicated lotions or sprays available over the counter at pharmacies with a special "nit" comb. Ideally, always a treatment ready in the bathroom cabinet so you're ready for action at first sight Please speak to the school nurse or Julie Beever, our Parent Support Advisor if you would like help or further tips for treating the little pests.



We cannot authorise full day absence to treat nits – if you discover the little critters first thing in the morning, get treating immediately and phone school to report that your child will be an hour late.
