What is the Talent Pool and how does it work?

From this recruitment drive we are looking to develop our first Registered Nurse Talent Pool. Instead of advertising each of our Nursing jobs individually, we will be continually looking for great candidates to join our Talent Pool. It means you only need to apply once and we will look for jobs that fit your experience. By applying to the Talent Pool you are agreeing to be put forward for any nursing vacancies you may be suitable for. We appreciate that not every role will be quite what you're looking for, you will not be obliged to accept any interview you are invited to.

What will we do with your information?

When nursing vacancies arise, we will assign you to a job to be shortlisted based on your experience and employment history before the vacancy is advertised. We are happy to accept applications from individuals wishing to work either full or part time.

By applying to the Talent Pool you are consenting for OHR to put you forward for any nursing vacancy you may be suitable for based on your experience and employment history.

You will be notified when we have assigned your application to a specific vacancy for shortlisting.

How do I opt out?

You can opt out of the nursing talent pool at any time by emailing TalentAcquisitionService.OHR@gov.im or withdrawing your application on Jobtrain. Once you have notified us you would like to opt out your application will be removed from the talent pool and you no longer be contacted about any vacancies.

How long will we keep your information for?

We will keep your application in the talent pool until you have been appointed to one of our vacancies or until you have requested to opt out. After 1 year of being in the Talent Pool we will contact you to provide us with an updated copy of your CV.

Community Nursing

We provide invaluable nursing care, support and advice to people living in their own homes or residential homes.

Community and District nurses are an integral part of Manx Care allowing the people of the Isle of Man to have high quality care in a place they choose.

The service accepts referrals for patients aged 16 and above who require nursing assessment, care planning and care delivery in support of patients who are acutely, chronically or terminally ill including:

- Long term partnerships with and support of patients with chronic disease, and chronic degenerative disease, their families and carers
- Promotion of self care through education and empowerment of individuals and their carers Promotion of continence and assessment of incontinence
- Health promotion, advice and support and more

The Community Nursing Team consists of District Nurses, Senior Registered Nurses, Registered Nurses and Senior Health Care Assistants.

As a district nurse you would lead and support a Community Nursing Team to deliver care in a variety of community settings including the Patients' homes, Residential Homes, Sheltered accommodation, GP Surgeries, Community Clinics.





We have a fantastic team of people who are passionate about their work and strive to deliver the best possible

care. Working across the island allows our nurses to embrace what island life has to offer. The District Nursing Service has 5 teams spread across the island providing a 365 day service. Mental Health Nursing

The Mental Health Service provides a range of services for people of all ages in the Isle of Man who are experiencing mental health problems.

The Mental Health Service aims to ensure that people are provided with services in the right place, at the right time with the right results.

We embrace a holistic approach to wellness, with the principles and values of the recovery approach at the very heart of our services. We aim to support people's recovery from mental health problems and to promote wellbeing in the community we serve. We encourage and promote the involvement of service users and carers in the planning and delivery of care and anyone being cared by us or working with us will be treated with respect and integrity.

It is important to us that we provide high quality services that focus on the needs of the people using them.

Manx Care has a mix of community and in-patient Mental Health roles giving you the opportunity to develop your knowledge and skills and have a varied career across the whole Island.

Your main duties would be to build effective relationships with your patients and also with their relatives and carers. You might help one person to take their medication correctly while advising another about relevant therapies or social activities within the hospital one of our community health centres or in someone's home.

Read Tara Duddy's story about why she loves her role within the Integrated Mental Health Services and what the Isle of Man could offer you. After living in England for six years, during which she studied at university then qualified as a mental health nurse, Tara was missing home, her family and the 'chilled-out' lifestyle of the Isle of Man. We spoke to Tara to find out more about her career and lifestyle on the Isle of Man.

My mum's Manx and I first moved to the island when I was seven. Later I went to England after completing my "A" levels to pursue my career in mental health.

I spent six great years in England but in August 2020 I decided to come home. By that time I was ready for the more relaxed, slower pace of life the Isle of Man offers. It's a great place to live and to work; to me, the island's like a little hidden treasure that over time really captivates you.

I'm part of the community mental health team and really enjoy travelling around the island to visit our service users. There's such a variety to the work and I see clients either in their homes or out in the community.

Every day's different; we might go for a walk, or for a coffee and that gives us an opportunity to really connect with our service users and also to get to know their families, friends and carers. It's so rewarding to have that personal connection and to be part of their recovery journey.

There are no speciality teams in the island, such as early intervention or eating disorders teams, so that type of care falls under the community mental health service for adults. Because of this, you have the opportunity to develop your skills and knowledge with Manx Care in areas that wouldn't otherwise be open to you.

If you were to ask me to recommend the Isle of Man to people looking to relocate I wouldn't know where to start. Everyone here is so friendly and welcoming and always willing to offer help and advice, whether it's about jobs or what activities are on offer.



Nursing at Nobles Hospital

Noble's Hospital opened in July 2003 on a green-field site is situated at the Strang, just outside Douglas, the capital of the Island. It is furnished and equipped to the very highest standards with approximately 240 in-patient beds, of which 60 are paediatric and obstetric beds and the remaining 184 include medical, surgical and a 6-bedded ITU/HDU facility.

There are 2 hospitals on the Isle of Man, in the north of the Island is a small "cottage hospital" facility which incorporates a 27-bed step-down facility and a nurse-led Minor Injuries Unit.

Nobles Hospital is a busy and fast paced environment where you will see a variety of patients each day. There are many opportunities to work on all kinds of wards such as:

- Emergency Department
- Surgical/Acute Surgical wars
- Oncology/Haematology
- Intensive Care Unit
- Paediatric Services
- Orthopaedic/Trauma Ward and many more.

Manx Care is currently undertaking a root and branch review of the hospital, its services and its pathways in keeping with its 5-year clinical strategy. This promises to be a truly exciting time for the hospital.

We spoke to Crystal to find out more about her career and lifestyle on the Isle of Man.

Working in Nobles ED has given me the opportunity to implement service improvement projects that I am passionate about and because of this I was shortlisted for the Rising Star Nursing Times award in 2019.

As a small yet diverse and supportive nursing team there are many opportunities for development such as ATLS, APLS, ALS, trauma training as well as link roles - bringing your topics of interest to ED.

With emphasis on teaching and development of individuals, the Isle of Man is known to produce inspiring individuals which is evident across different fields including sporting opportunities.

The island offers gorgeous scenic walks and outdoor activities. When kayaking in Port Erin bay, you could think you were in the Canaries.

The island also has dark sky status where you can see the northern lights but if you are looking for a city break, it's quick and convenient to hop on the plane or boat to the UK or Ireland. Above all, the people of the Isle of Man are like none other. For example, it's a place where the general public go the extra mile to reunite people with lost belongings and pets.

The Unit thrives on the nursing staff who work there. We believe in, and invest, in staff. To experienced staff who come, it gives them an opportunity to exercise their experience and skills and to have a direct input into how the Unit functions. To those less experienced, we can provide an environment which gives exposure and experience for them to enhance and develop.

The unpredictable nature of our workload and the opportunities to experience other aspects such as the In Flight Nursing means that life here is very interesting and more exciting than you might think at first glance. Working on our wards will provide you with plenty of variety! We work with both male and female trauma and elective patients, so you will have lots of opportunities to really develop your skills and experience in both of these areas of care.

Whether you have experience working within this specialty already, or are a newly qualified nurse, you'll find we really care about development and that you'll be supported to achieve your aspirations.

We're a big team here, with lots of experience and knowledge so there'll be plenty of help to get you settled into the team.

If this is your first step into this area of nursing, you'll be able to work through the competency framework, whether this be towards part of a degree or for practical experience. In addition, if you're interested in becoming a link practitioner, we have opportunities to do so, as we have active link roles with infection control, nutrition and diabetes to name a few.

Working in the Isle of Man will also provide you with the opportunity to gain practical nursing experience of major traumas, as the Isle of Man is home to the TT races and Festival of Motorcycling.

During these events, several major traumas can be admitted each day, with many of these patients then requiring care on our wards.

We also really value having a real multi-disciplinary approach to our patient care here, and we have strong links with both our Physiotherapy and Occupational Therapy teams.
