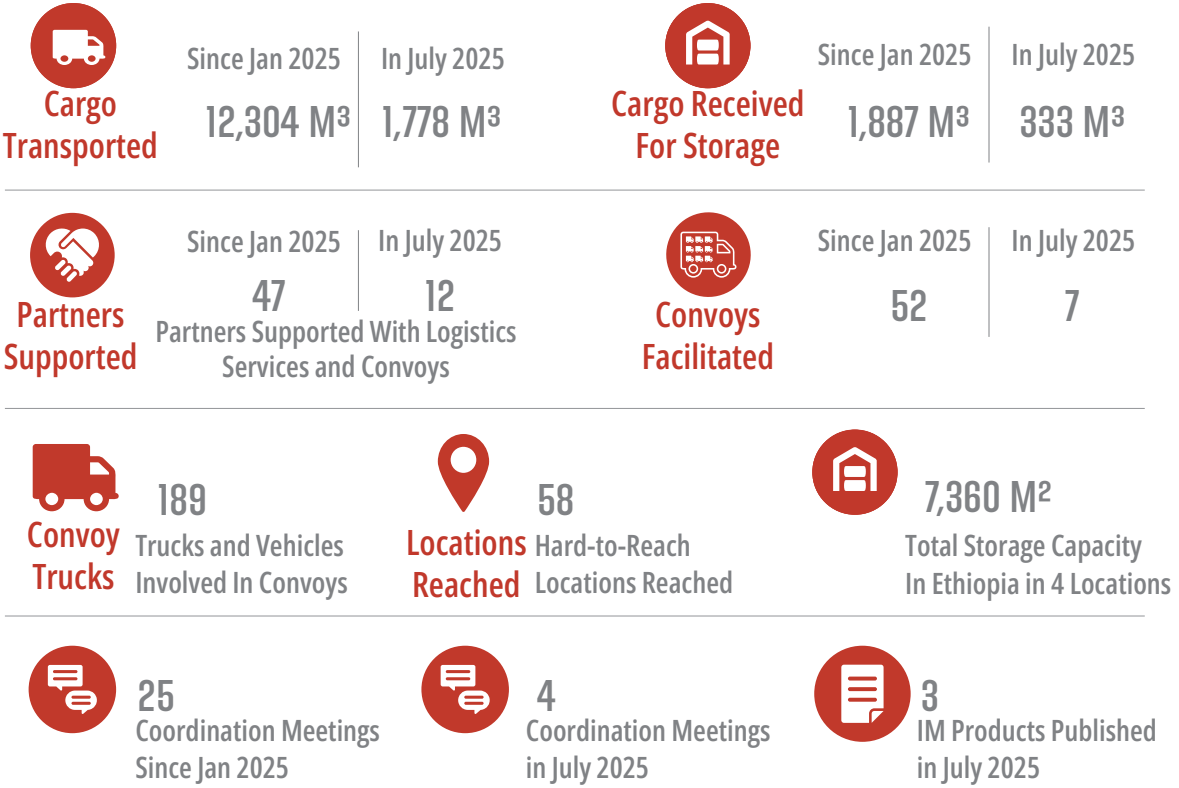


OVERVIEW

In July 2025, the Logistics Cluster continued to enable the humanitarian community to maintain operational continuity amid Ethiopia’s complex and evolving humanitarian context. During the reporting period, the Cluster facilitated transport services on behalf of 12 partners, dispatching 1,778 m³ of humanitarian relief items to affected populations. This brings the cumulative volume of cargo transported since the start of the year to 12,304 m³, reaching seven regions.

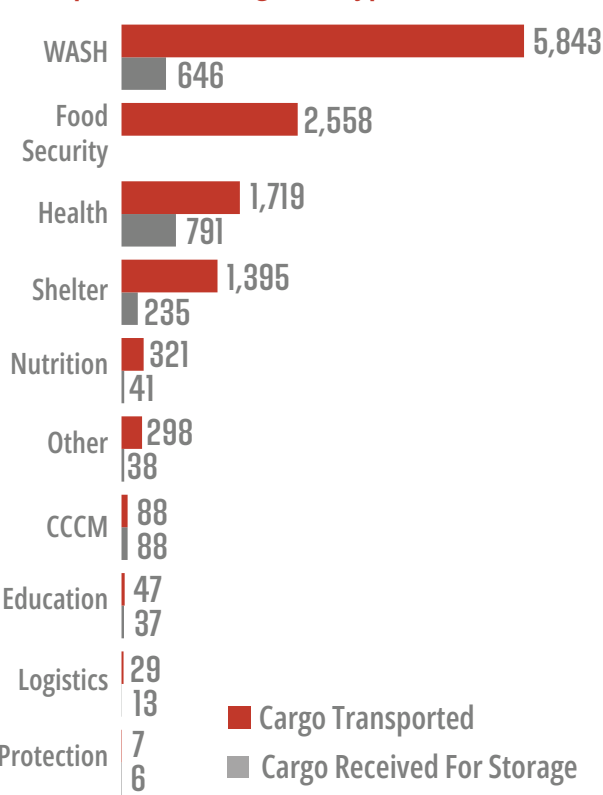
In the Amhara Region, the Cluster coordinated seven convoy movements, comprising 16 trucks, supplemented by partner-owned light vehicles and trucks integrated into convoy operations. Through this coordination, the Cluster enhanced delivery timelines, maximised available transport capacity, and enabled partners to implement planned programme activities in hard-to-reach locations.

Operational challenges persisted, impacting humanitarian cargo movement and convoy scheduling. Heightened insecurity continues to disrupt access along key humanitarian corridors, including Gondar – Genda Wuha – Metema, Gondar – Debark, and Lalibela – Sekota, limiting the predictability of transport operations. Furthermore, the recent imposition of a 300-litre fuel cap per truck in the Amhara Region has significantly constrained fleet range and operational flexibility, further compounding logistical constraints in the region.

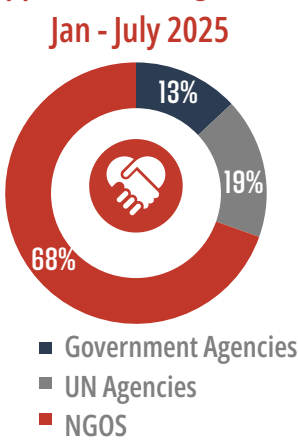

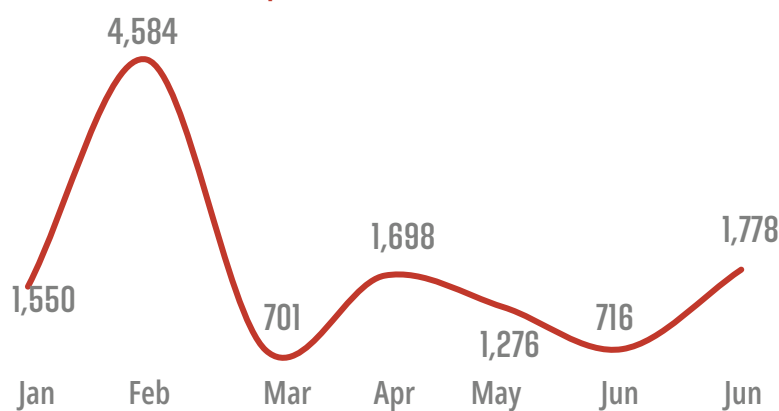
Transport and Storage Per Type of Item (M³)



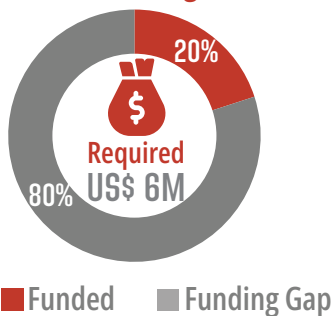
Partners Supported Per Organisation Type



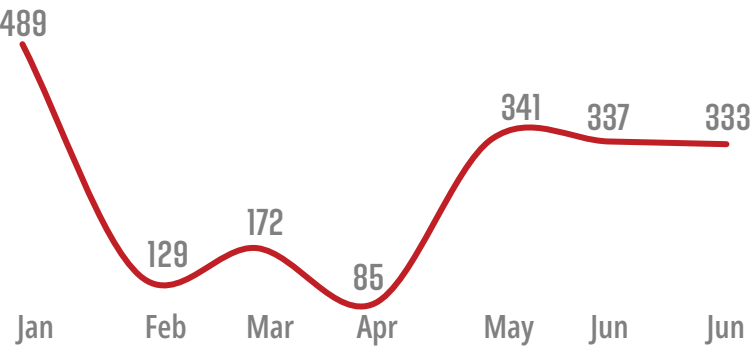
Annual Trend - Transport (M³)



Cluster Funding Status

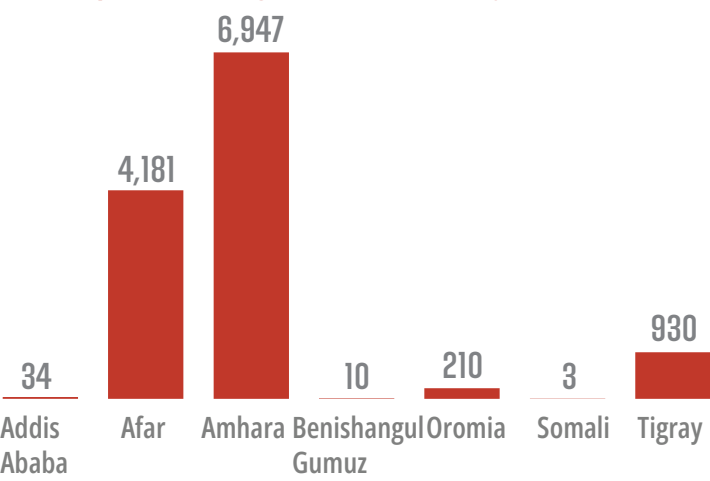


Annual Trend - Cargo Received For Storage (M³)

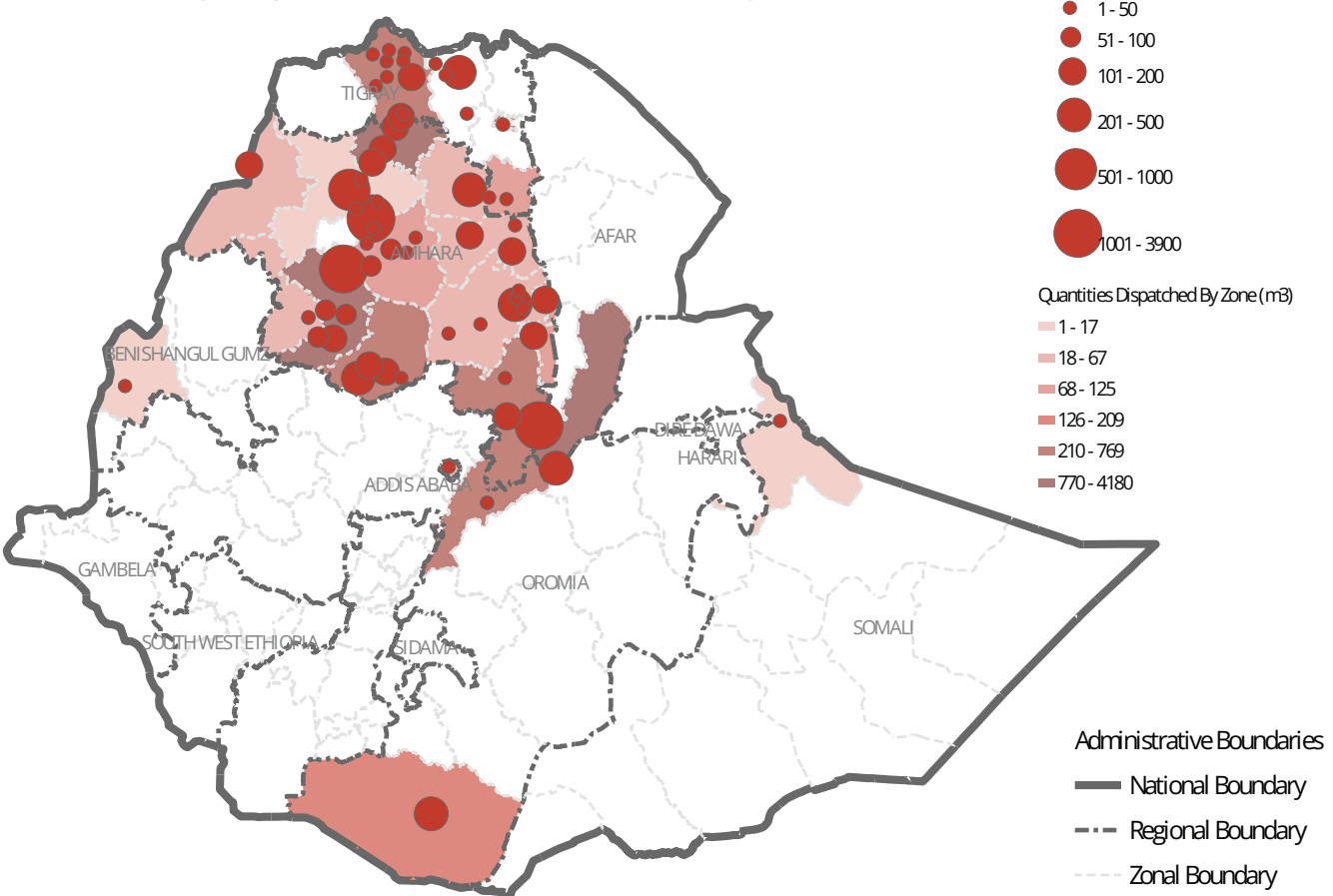
