1. Overall Updates

- As of 14 November, Erez West (Zikim) crossing resumed operations after two months of closure, which will be open for offload on alternate days to Kissufim. As indicated by Israeli authorities, up to 150 trucks will be authorised to offload at the crossing on open days.



- For Ashdod route, the Israeli authorities have committed to scan 600 containers per week (previously approximately 25 to 30 per day) which should positively impact the processing of the existing backlog. Authorisation has also been granted for aid to be kept in the bonded storage facilities, ahead of dispatch to Gaza.
- While the West Bank crossing authorisation has been increased to 40 trucks or above per day, this constitutes a minimum number for the convoy to be authorised. Consolidation efforts are ongoing to increase the amount of trucks to reach the requested quota.
- **Gaza updates:**
 - Since 26 October, Salah Ad Din (SAD) road remains inaccessible to humanitarian movements.
 - The Logistics Cluster has expanded its common storage capacity with an additional warehouse in the Middle Area, thus increasing the current capacity to 4,800 square metres. Additional storage facilities are in the process of being identified.
 - The Logistics Cluster has increased its common transport capacity to 50 trucks per day, with plans to mobilise up to 80 trucks on Fridays and Saturdays due to reduced private sector activity.
 - As of 8 November, a new 72-hour planning requirement for all cargo movements across the Gaza Strip has been introduced:
 - The process requires organisations to submit movement details 72 hours in advance, Israeli authorities then revert to provide the proposed route at 48 hours, and a final go/no-go decision with approved routes at the 24 hours mark.
 - It is an additional coordination mechanism and does not replace the standard movement clearance request procedure.
 - Humanitarian organisations that wish to plan and coordinate their movements are to contact OCHA Access at ocha-hnlt@un.org.
 - All cargo transportation facilitated by the Logistics Cluster does not require partners' action, as the movement clearance request will be coordinated as part of the transport service
- **Jordan updates:**
 - Between 5 and 11 November, four Back-to-Back (B2B) convoys were facilitated by the Logistics Cluster from Jordan with a total of 61 trucks.
 - Crossing capacity remains limited to 15 trucks per day; partners are reminded to plan their manifest closely with the Logistics Cluster team to avoid truck congestion.
 - To support ongoing winterization efforts, the Logistics Cluster plans to facilitate cargo collection from Aqaba, for pre-approved and customs-cleared cargo both in Jordan and Israel, to be dispatched through the B2B modality.
 - The Government-to-Government modality remains on hold since 18 September.
- **Egypt updates:**
 - Since 9 November Israeli authorities have reduced the number of UN/INGO trucks authorised to be scanned through Nitzana from 100 to 40 trucks per day. Trucks dispatched directly to Kerem Shalom/Karem Abu Salem (KS/KAS), are facing high rates of returns.
 - Between 5 and 10 November, 324 trucks were manifested for Nitzana of which 236 offloaded (73 percent), while 275 trucks were manifested for KS/KAS of which 38 offloaded (14 percent).



- In addition to the requirement for pre-clearance through the UN2720 Mechanism and Israeli customs clearance for aid entering Gaza from Egypt, partners are still required to follow the Egyptian Red Crescent (ERC) [Standard Operating Procedures](#) and notify ERC of cargo movement through the [15-day](#) or [48-hour](#) forms.

2. Gaza Common Services Overview

- Between 1 and 11 November 2025, 5,122 pallets (mostly shelter items) were loaded and transported through Logistics Cluster-facilitated services on behalf of six partners.
- Depending on access and security conditions on the ground, the Logistics Cluster continues to facilitate both transport and storage services. Organisations accessing common logistics services are required to submit a [Service Request Form](#) (SRF) and ensure the SRF QR code is printed and placed on all four sides of the pallets.

3. Gaza Fuel Update - UNOPS

- In the north, UNOPS has reopened the Hamada fuel station and secured an additional location. Another fuel station is operational in the south.
- Since 9 July, fuel distributions have been done on a cost-recovery basis, with the exception of the period between 12 and 31 October benefitting from the receipt of a fuel donation. Discussions with donors are ongoing to secure funding for upcoming fuel deliveries.
- Fuel planning is based on cluster needs and partner requirements rather than fixed target. Historical demand was 1.8 million litres per week.
- Partners are kindly encouraged to submit weekly fuel requests for both operational and programmatic needs through their respective clusters, in addition to planned expansions of activities, so these can be factored into procurement and reflected in the distribution plan.

4. Inter-Agency Pipeline

- As of 10 November and based on data from 28 humanitarian organisations, the total expected pipeline for the next three months is just over 758,500 cubic metres (equivalent to approximately 421,000 pallets), with 35 percent of the pipeline reported through Egypt, 29 percent through Ashdod, 30 percent through Jordan, two percent through Israel, two percent through West Bank, and the remaining two percent not yet allocated to a route.

5. AOB
