1. Overall Updates

- Zikim has resumed operations since November 14, alternating with Kissufim. While no official schedule has been shared, the Israeli authorities indicated possible openings on Sunday, Tuesday, and Thursday, alongside Kerem Shalom/Karem Abu Salem (KS/KAS), and dual-use inspections on Mondays and Wednesdays only.



- Israeli customs authorities committed to scan up to 600 containers weekly at Ashdod. The current throughput is between 75 and 80 containers four times a week, with limited operations half day on Fridays.
- From the West Bank, a minimum convoy size has been set to 40 trucks per day, for it to be assigned a security escort by the Israeli authorities. The Logistics Cluster aims at manifesting two convoys per week, in close coordination with partners. Some shipments include dual-use items, so advance coordination is required.

Gaza updates

- Discussions are underway for Logistics Cluster staff to be present at the KS/KAS platform alongside UN2720 monitors during UN and INGO cargo collections. This aims to strengthen visibility of logistics operations, truck loading, and cargo tracking. An ad hoc mission to KS/KAS is scheduled for Saturday 29 November, to conduct a platform inventory.
- Salah Ad Din Road remains closed, with no indication available of when it may be reopened for humanitarian movements.
- The Logistics Cluster warehouse capacity inside Gaza has been expanded, with an additional facility in the Middle Area. This total common warehouses to three for a total of 4,800 square metres (two in the Middle Area 3, 000 square metres and one in the north 1,800 square metres). Assessments continue to further increase the common storage capacity and support partners' needs.
- The Logistics Cluster plans to coordinate 50 truck collections daily from KS/KAS, with the possibility to scale up capacity as needed. The Cluster can also facilitate collection from Erez West (Zikim) and provide access to storage the common warehouse in the north.

Jordan updates

- The Logistics Cluster is planning to facilitate a convoy from Aqaba directly to Sheikh Hussein Bridge (SHB) and onward to KS/KAS.
- Advocacy efforts are ongoing to increase the truck quota through the Back-to-Back (B2B) modality, and to allow aid trucks through Allenby crossing – as it has a larger capacity.
- Between 12 and 18 November, four B2B convoys were facilitated from Jordan for a total of 34 trucks offloaded at KS/KAS.

Egypt updates

- Capacity via Nitzana continues to be limited to 40 trucks per day. Offload rates remain high through this route (97 percent last week), while a high rate of returns (69 percent) continues through KS/KAS.
- In addition to the requirements for pre-clearance through the UN2720 Mechanism and Israeli customs clearance for aid entering Gaza from Egypt, partners are still required to follow the Egyptian Red Crescent (ERC) [Standard Operating Procedures](#) and notify ERC of cargo movement through the [15-day](#) or [48-hour](#) forms.

2. Gaza Common Services Overview

- Between 1 and 16 November 2025, 7,331 pallets (mostly shelter items) were loaded and transported through Logistics Cluster-facilitated services on behalf of seven partners.
- Depending on access and security conditions on the ground, the Logistics Cluster continues to facilitate both transport and storage services. Organisations accessing common logistics services are required to submit a [Service Request Form](#) (SRF) and ensure the SRF QR code is printed and placed on all four sides of the pallets.



3. Inter-Agency Pipeline

- As of 17 November and based on data from 28 humanitarian organisations, the total expected pipeline for the next three months is just over 750,000 cubic metres (equivalent to approximately 400,000 pallets), with 37 percent of the pipeline reported through Egypt, 28 percent through Jordan, 27 percent through Ashdod, four percent through Israel, two percent through West Bank, and the remaining two percent not yet allocated to a route.
- The next deadline for partners to input their pipeline data is 24 November COB. Partners may reach out to the Logistics Cluster team for any questions at Palestine.logcluster@wfp.org.

4. AOB
