DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT

At the root of everything, TINL (The Internet Never Lies) Is a horror movie like many other horror movies - there's no wild new tropes, no terrifying new monster. But It's a horror movie made with heart – with the desire, not to shock the masses, but to truly scare them like so few films seek to do. TINL is a movie that comes from a place of love for horror movies – love for the feeling of the hairs on the back of your neck standing up, love of chills that run down your spine and the instinctual need to pull whoever's closest to you that much closer. TINL is a film that I have to make to prove a point – that you film that wants to prove that the real horror of a movie is when the people who watch it are alone at home for weeks afterwards, jumping at the slightest noise, just in case.

I want to bring people back to the times when a horror film meant that you'd be peeking around corners at night, when the shadows could be anything after spending time in front of those screens. I want to be someone who can bring horror movies back to the golden ages of fear – when the desire came to make something that stuck with people, rather than something that they forgot about after leaving the cinema.

Dread feels like such a forgotten art in most movies - the sense of something coming, of something being there, the feeling that, at this very moment, you could be seconds away from the end of your life. I want to bring dread back to theatres.

When I was a lot younger than I am, now, I manged to stay up late one night to watch a screening of the classic, Alien. For weeks after that point, I was scared of every bump in the night, every shadow around a corner - there were no screaming ghosts or murdering psychopaths in that film. > When I sat down to write TINL, I wanted to evoke those feelings. There's no monster in TINL. No marketable face, no terrifying killer that's stalking down the actors - there's just what's hiding in the shadows, waiting to strike, and I hope that I can scare the life out of people in the same way that Alien scared me - slowly. Carefully.

Jen is a young, 21 year old college student with a fascination for the Macabre and Supernatural, and an even stronger desire to disprove it – she doesn't believe in ghosts, zombies, or legends, and takes enjoyment in disproving them live on Camera. To some, she's a killjoy, who, takes pleasure in ruining things for everyone, but her genuine passion for investigation and desire to find out more about anything that catches her interest reveals that her inquisitive nature comes from love and curiosity rather than a desire to ruin the fun of others.
