There's no formal check-in as such, instead circular pod reception points sit in front of lavish velvet blue curtains.

CREATIVE VISION

Brought to life by the concept of performing onstage and offstage, Lancemore Crossley St. takes advantage of its location set within Melbourne's key arts and cultural hotspot, surrounded by the Theatre District, the Paris end of Bourke Street and the many restaurants of Chinatown.






ART AND DESIGN

Each Lancemore property draws a focus on sensory engagement and uniting people with place.

The location of Lancemore Crossley St is in a lively precinct of the Melbourne CBD, surrounded by the theatre/arts, urban laneways of graffiti art, at the doorstep of Chinatown, and then there are the gastronomic delights of famous restaurants, bars and bistros.



THE INVERSION WATER, STAINLESS STEEL, ACRYLIC, LED LIGHT

Located on the rooftop terrace you will find Laura Woodward's the Inversion. Comprising a central vessel supported on three legs, the work reflects Woodward's continued explorations into the potential of water as both a motive force within systems and as a lens. In daylight hours, sunlight filters through the water, occasionally refracting and dancing on nearby surfaces, whilst in darker hours the water functions as a lens to cast light as a perfect circle onto the ground. In this capacity as a light focusing tool, the water becomes a means of shifting perception and understanding. Though at first encounter the sculpture may seem unexpected and other-worldly, it speaks to and captures its surrounds; as guests spend more time with it, they may notice the way in which the water acts as a lens, capturing, bending and sometimes inverting the city skyline within the sphere's curve. At closer inspection, guests may even see themselves reflected in the water, intermingled with the distorted cityscape



ROYNAE MAYES - FEDERICI AUDIO VISUAL FILM

Located in our Lifts you will find Roynae Mayes's Federici 2022 audio visual film. The video piece by Roynae Mayes featured in the two lift cars is an allusion to the ghost story of base baritone opera singer Frederick Federici who died playing demonic Mephistopheles in the final act of Goethe's opera Faust at the nearby Princess Theatre. Watching through the dressing room mirror, we see Federici prepare his character on opening night. Despite strain from a heart condition, Federici resolves the show must go on and uses the power and strength in his character to perform his best and final work. The piece is an allegory about our everyday characters that must arise to the occasion despite personal circumstances.



ANDRÉ PINTO DONADIO

Located throughout various rooms in the hotel.

I always go from one extreme to another in the subjects of my works. Sometimes I'm emerged trying to capture the reality throughout some documentary photography, in other phases of my life I try to abstract this reality through the surreal concept. The artwork done exclusively for Lancemore Crossley Street Hotel is a sum of the experiences I have been gravitating towards in my photography and artistic experience. All of the artworks are based on my dreams and adapted and dressed with the "normality".

TRISTAN KERR BIOGRAPHY

Tristan Kerr (born Melbourne, 1985) is an artist and typographer whose work reflects on cultural diversity, consumerism and advertising, and the tensions between subjects who exist within these worlds, as he combines fragments of street signage, mark making, graffiti and abstraction through his works.

Through his practice, Kerr interrogates the ever-changing face of the city and its typographic ephemera, portraying the disregarded surfaces of urban life in his paintings, sculptures and large-scale installations. His fixation with fleeting urban street views was fuelled by the several years he spent working and exhibiting in Paris—as he noticed the disregarded shopfronts with fading hand-lettered signage, the sprawling graffiti and the torn metro posters that adorn the cities walls, forming part of its cultural archive.

Kerr's works encourage people to stop, look and question their surroundings, considering other possibilities for what public space.
