Students at an Upminster school are leading a campaign to get more girls cycling.

The group are Youth Travel Ambassadors for Coopers' Company and Coborn School and have won the Princess Diana award for encouraging classmates to ride to lessons.

One of the ambassadors, Kayleigh Locke, 13, said: "I started cycling because it's a faster way to get to school and you get a lie-in because it's quicker to get in.

The award comes after activities including Beauty and the Bike from Havering Council to persuade more girls to get into cycling.
