## Access to HE Students at St Mary's University, Twickenham

We welcome and celebrate a diverse student community at St Mary's University, Twickenham ("St Mary's"). This is why we set up a progression agreement with the OCN London<sup>1</sup> to say that we formally recognise all OCN Access to HE Diplomas, across all of our Academic Departments. Inclusiveness is one of the University's core values and we are committed to widening participation as demonstrated by our [contextualised approach to admissions](#). In addition to our admissions approach, this progression agreement sets out how we facilitate entry to our undergraduate courses for all Access to HE students. In this agreement, you may see slightly lower entry requirements than those usually asked for, the offer of support for UCAS applications, information about our open days, the offer of visits to St Mary's for taster days or masterclasses, and information about the support available when you are at the University. ## About St Mary's University

We are smaller than many universities, focusing on quality rather than quantity. The University's efforts to provide a great experience for its students, and its inspiring and supportive teaching, have been recognised in the *Times Good University Guide 2023* placing St Mary's within the top ten universities nationally, and in the top two universities in London, for both teaching quality, and the wider student experience. Our small size and our diverse, vibrant campus give St Mary's a wonderful community atmosphere. We pride ourselves on the excellent career prospects of our students, with 93%<sup>2</sup> of graduates in employment and /or further study

within 15 months of graduation. Established in 1850 and with a deep heritage in education, St Mary's has a strong reputation for teaching excellence and a student-centred approach.

The main campus is on Waldegrave Road in Twickenham within the grounds of Strawberry Hill House. There are a number of options for [accommodation](#) and there are halls of residence on campus. The main sports fields are located on the Teddington Lock campus in Broom Road, Teddington, and a sports track and more sports fields are located on the main campus.

Strawberry Hill House, seen below, is one of Britain's finest examples of Gothic revival architecture. Built by Horace Walpole in 1747, it is accompanied by many heritage sites that sit along this stretch of the Thames. St Mary's has strong collaborative partnerships with many of the historical and cultural organisations in Richmond and Twickenham. For example, students studying Humanities or Liberal Arts subjects will have the opportunity to not only visit these sites but work with them too.

Our Access and Participation Plan, which is approved and monitored by our regulator, the Office for Students, sets out our targets and commitments for reducing and eliminating any existing inequalities for students at St Mary's and addressing any barriers that might prevent anyone who chooses to study here from achieving their potential.

## About the Access to HE Diploma

The Diploma prepares adults (aged 19 and over) who do not necessarily have the qualifications required to enter university. Studying for an Access to HE qualification offers a solid introduction to key areas of subject knowledge

and a broad range of study skills required to go on to study at university level.

To gain the Diploma students must achieve 60 credits overall. 45 credits are made up of subject specific units at Level 3 and these units can be achieved at Pass, Merit or Distinction. The remaining 15 credits are made up of study skills ungraded units at Level 2 or Level 3. The study skills units must be achieved to gain the Diploma.

The Access to HE Diploma is included in the UCAS Tariff system. For example, a Diploma with 45 graded credits achieved at a Pass is worth 48 tariff points (the same number of tariff points as EEE at A Level) and a Diploma achieved with 45 credits at Distinction is worth 144 Tariff Points (the same number of points as AAA at A Level). The UCAS Tariff is based on 45 credits from graded level 3 units. All applications to universities are made via UCAS together with a personal statement. The units taken as part of a Diploma are included in all UCAS applications and universities receive the results in the first week of August.

## English Language

Non-native speakers of English must achieve a score of either 6.0 overall or not less than 5.5 in any section of the IELTS test of English language proficiency (or equivalent).

## GCSE equivalencies

Some careers, such as teaching, require GCSE Maths and English, the University can arrange for GCSE equivalent qualifications if you have not met the GCSE requirements.

## Open days and Experience Days

Throughout the academic year, St Mary's holds a series of open events. Open days take place between June and November. They are aimed at students who are considering which universities to apply to. Experience days run between February and April and are designed for applicants who have applied to study a course at St Mary's.

Open days and experience days are structured slightly differently from each other. However, both provide visitors with the opportunity to explore the University campus, meet current students and academics, and gain a greater insight into what student life at St Mary's is like.

All open events consist of information sessions, academic subject talks, and campus and accommodation tours.
