# Qualification Overview

The OCNLR Entry Level Qualifications in Industrial Textiles Skills have been developed to provide learners with a foundation in practical textile production skills, enabling them to engage safely and effectively in industrial work environments. These qualifications are designed to support progression into further learning or employment by building confidence, discipline, and essential knowledge relevant to textile manufacturing processes.

The OCNLR Entry Level Qualifications in Industrial Textiles Skills are regulated by Ofqual, the qualifications regulator for England, and are registered on the Regulated Qualifications Framework (RQF). It is not a licence to practise.

#### Purpose of the qualifications

The purpose of the OCNLR Entry Level Qualifications in Industrial Textiles Skills is to introduce learners to basic industrial textiles skills, focusing on safe working practices, familiarity with materials, and developing confidence in a production environment.



# Who the qualifications are for

The OCNLR Entry Level Qualifications in Industrial Textiles Skills are suitable for individuals who are new to learning or have limited formal educational experience. They are particularly appropriate for learners who need to develop confidence, basic practical skills, and an understanding of working safely in a textile production environment. The qualifications are ideal for those engaging in vocational training for the first time, including learners in secure settings or those preparing to re-enter education or employment.

# Entry guidance

There is no formal minimum age restriction for the OCNLR Industrial Textiles Skills qualifications at Entry Level 3. However, the qualifications are designed primarily for:

- Post-16 learners in adult or vocational learning environments
- Adults in secure settings such as prisons
- Individuals aged 16 and over who are undertaking reskilling, rehabilitation, or preparing for employment

Due to the practical nature of the qualifications—including the use of industrial equipment and workshop environments—centres must ensure learners are suitably mature and capable of engaging safely with the content and assessment methods.

# Progression and related qualifications

Learners who achieve the **OCNLR Entry Level 3 Qualifications in Industrial Textiles Skills** may progress to:

- OCNLR Level 1 Qualifications in Industrial Textiles Skills
- Other Entry Level or Level 1 vocational qualifications in related areas, such as Retail, Warehousing, or Health and Safety
- Supported employment, volunteering, or further engagement in structured workshop programmes

This qualification provides an accessible foundation for individuals with limited prior experience and supports personal development and increased confidence in a vocational setting.

#### Guidance on delivering the qualifications

The OCNLR Entry Level 3 Qualifications in Industrial Textiles Skills should be delivered by practitioners who can create a supportive, confidence-building environment for learners who may be new to formal learning or workshop-based skills.

#### Tutors and Trainers should:

- Hold or be working towards a recognised teaching qualification (e.g. Level 3 Award in Education and Training), and/or
- Have relevant experience in textiles, sewing, or production-related activities
- Be capable of delivering learning in an inclusive, differentiated way to meet varied learner needs



 Understand the needs of learners with barriers to education, including those in secure settings

#### Assessors should:

- Have occupational competence in basic textile production or related fields
- Be familiar with informal, observational, and practical assessment methods
- Hold or be working towards an assessor qualification, or undertake OCN London assessor training

# **Resources and Equipment Requirements**

Centres must have access to appropriate facilities, tools, and materials to support the safe and effective delivery and assessment of the Industrial Textiles Skills qualifications. These should reflect the standards and practices of a real or simulated textile production environment.

#### Workshop/Delivery Space

- A well-ventilated, clean, and organised workshop space
- Adequate workstations or sewing stations for learners
- Clear health and safety signage and access to first aid

## **Essential Equipment**

- Domestic or industrial sewing machines, appropriate to the level of delivery (e.g. basic models at Entry Level, industrial flatbed or overlock machines at Level 2)
- Irons and ironing boards (for pressing seams and finishing products)
- Tables for cutting and assembling textiles
- Storage for tools, materials, and learners' work

#### **Tools and Accessories**

- Fabric scissors and snips
- Seam rippers
- Measuring tapes and rulers
- Fabric markers
- Needles, bobbins, and thread cones

#### **Materials**

- A selection of fabrics (e.g. calico, cotton, polycotton, canvas)
- Threads suitable for machine use
- Fastenings such as zips, buttons, Velcro (as needed per unit)
- Pattern pieces or templates (if applicable)



#### **Health and Safety Resources**

- Personal protective equipment (PPE) such as aprons and closed footwear
- Risk assessments for machinery use
- Instructional posters or manuals for machinery
- Safety switches or emergency stop mechanisms on machines

# **Teaching and Assessment Materials**

- Tutor-developed task sheets and instructional guides
- Examples of completed textile products
- Observation checklists and feedback templates
- Cameras or digital devices for recording learner evidence (where feasible)

#### **Additional Guidance**

- Centres must ensure all equipment is suitable for the level of the qualification and that learners are adequately supervised during practical activities.
- Routine maintenance and safety checks must be carried out on all machines and equipment.
- Where possible, centres are encouraged to create a realistic production workflow to replicate industry conditions (e.g. roles for cutting, stitching, quality checking).

# Rules of combination for achievement

The OCNLR Entry Level Award in Industrial Textiles Skills (Entry 3) qualification comprises optional units only. Learners must achieve 6 credits in total.

The OCNLR Entry Level Certificate in Industrial Textiles Skills (Entry 3) qualification comprises optional units only. Learners must achieve 15 credits in total.

# Assessment and Moderation

## Assessment process

The assessment process for these qualifications are as follows:

- The learners are assessed through activities that are internally set by tutor assessors;
- The activities must be designed to enable learners to meet the assessment criteria of the unit;
- Learners' portfolios of assessed evidence must be internally moderated at the Centre;
- The portfolios of assessed evidence will be externally moderated by an OCN London External Moderator.

There is no additional external assessment for these qualifications.

## Devising assessments

Each unit has a supplementary page with information on the types of assessment activities that can (indicated as 'Optional' or 'O') and/or must (indicated as 'Prescribed' or 'P') be used to assess learners against the unit. Tutor assessors must always refer to this page before devising assessment tasks.

Centre devised assessments should be scrutinised by the Internal Moderator before use to ensure that they are fit for purpose. Centre devised assessments will be scrutinised by the External Moderator to ensure reliability and validity of assessment.

#### Marking assessment activities

Each activity must be marked against the identified assessment criteria in the unit and judged to be either achieved or not achieved.

Assessors need to ensure that the work in a learner's portfolio is:

- Authentic it is the result of the learner's own performance or activity;
- Sufficient enabling the assessor to make a consistent and reliable judgement;
- Adequate appropriate to the level.

Where a series of activities are set, learners must demonstrate the achievement of the required standard identified in the assessment criteria in all activities. All of the assessment criteria in a unit must be met before the unit is deemed achieved.

The unit achievement is not graded. Units are either achieved or not achieved.

#### Standardisation

Standardisation is a process that promotes consistency in the understanding and application of standards in relation to assessment. It:



- compares assessment judgements from different tutor/assessors;
- promotes consistent judgements by different tutor/assessors;
- identifies good practice in assessment;
- promotes the sharing of good practice in assessment between centre staff.

Standardisation events should be held periodically within centres to ensure consistent and effective assessment practice. Standardisation events may also be held by OCN London and it is a requirement that each Centre offering units from these qualifications must contribute assessment materials and learners' evidence for standardisation, if requested.

OCN London will notify Centres of the required sample for standardisation purposes and assessment materials, learners' evidence and tutor feedback may be collected by External Moderators.

#### Learners with particular requirements

If learners have particular requirements the Centre should refer to the 'Access to Fair Assessment Policy and Procedure' which can be found on our website at: Access to Fair Assessment Policy and Procedure and gives clear guidance on the reasonable adjustments and arrangements that can be made to take account of disability or learning difficulty, without compromising the achievement of the assessment criteria.

## Requirements for tutor/assessors

Assessors of these qualifications are expected to have occupational competence in basic textile production or related fields; be familiar with informal, observational, and practical assessment methods; hold or be working towards an assessor qualification, or undertake OCN London assessor training.

#### To be sufficiently competent

In addition to being qualified to make assessment decisions, each assessor must be capable of carrying out the full requirements within the competency of the units they are assessing. This competence should be maintained annually through clearly demonstrable continuing learning and professional development.

Expert witnesses can be used where they have suitable expertise for specialist areas. The use of expert witnesses should be determined and agreed by the assessor.

#### To be sufficiently knowledgeable

Each assessor should possess relevant knowledge and understanding of the subject and so be able to make robust and reliable assessment decisions in relation to the subject.
