1. Updates from the cluster team

a. Rapid Needs Assessment – REACH

The first snapshots of the rapid needs assessment conducted by REACH both complete affected areas and the areas receiving the displaced population.

In the western oblast settlements interviewed during the assessment, difficulties in access to shelter and accommodation or the IDP population were the most frequently cited (51% of assessed settlements). This concern was followed by difficulties in access to food (44%), acquiring or restoring personal documentation (33%) and no concerns (33%). Access to basic services such as health care, WASH and education were not cited as primary concerns in the majority of assessed settlements, which is testament to the absorption capacity of existing state services in the face of rapid population increase.

In the eastern oblast settlements concerns about security were reported in all assessed settlements. It was reported in 75% of assessed settlements that there had been damage to homes and in 88% of assessed settlements that damage to critical infrastructure such as school, industrial facilities, and health facilities was a concern. Respondents in half of the settlements reported that emergency shelters were only somewhat accessible (56%). Further displacement was expected by 94% of assessed settlements.

Quick updates

- **Hosting families support coordination**

The Ukrainian government has adopted a resolution - 333. That concerns provision of cash assistance to family to households hosting IDP's free of charge. This compensation it's approximately 15 UAH per day per person.

The resolution does not specify any vulnerability criteria or housing conditions. The government approached the SC for completing their programme and a coordination has started to define the way the SC partners can implement directly their projects in a harmonized approach (using the same money allocation than the government), with a focus on vulnerable population, checking the minimum shelter conditions and stablishing and with a basic agreement among the 2 parties to protect both sides' rights.

More coordination is planned to tackle the data sharing side of this activity and see how can SC partners be assisted accessing the information they need.

- **Initial steps of the assessment strategy**

The initial steps for the development of a SC assessment strategy have been taken and will have a strong focus on the damaged buildings assessment. The first step was checking how feasible and to apply the same methodology it was followed before in the Donbass, to this new scope that we have now in the whole country. It doesn't seem applicable and other models are under consideration, such as the example from the damaged building assessment after the Beirut blast.

At least, there would be 3 different levels of assessments: settlement, building and apartment levels.

The cluster is in discussions with a series of global actors in utilization of satellite imagery and remote sensing to look at the overall damage on a city-by-city basis. Ideally, SC will have first a mapping of different levels of residential building damages. Second step would be to agree on a same approach for the physical assessment of the apartments and classification of the damage. Here the intention is we'll agree all the SC partners on a system to follow by all of us, so the results of the assessments could be compatible.

TWiGs

- **Current TWiG:**
- **Refurbishment of buildings for collective centers**

The TwiG agreed on the bill of quantities and on the estimation of what is pending in this technical working group is the revision of the cost of based on the.

- **Protection and Shelter clusters: HLP**

The TWiG is shared with protection cluster, there are a few topics that needs to be discussed in this TWiG

- **NFI kits**

There is an urgent need to hold a TWiG in the revision of the content of the NFI kits, especially the household level NFI kits and the finalization of the Kit for bomb shelters.

2. Partners update

UNHCR – There is a worrying situation in the procurement of non-asbestos roofing slates. Partners operating there are not able to find this material anymore in the NCGA.

IOM - Started to through our IP to send the emergency shelter kits to the east and have a flow of NFI materials through Slovakia border and so the delivery of NFI is ongoing in many places in country. With regards to refurbishment of building IOM has teams established on ground in Zakarpatska oblast and are preparing for Vinnytsia.

2. Communal settings tool presentation to SC partners

There is a dashboard that is a quick checklist by the three clusters protection, shelter and CCCM, it was rolled out in the first week of the emergency or second week and what we tried to capture with it was basically if anyone is visiting any type of collective center or reception center that you can quickly fill out the survey that takes up a maximum 10 to 15 minutes to fill.

The CCCM has reached 900 sites and majority of the sites were visited by physical visit. However, 40% of the sites were called by telephone, but that doesn't mean that there was no access. It basically was just a faster way of collecting the data.

Those sites are mainly in educational facilities schools, nurseries, universities, colleges, etc.

The data cannot be shared due to sensitivities of such a granular data to be shared publicly. However, for protection reasons the cluster up a quick flow chart or basically a data request protocol. If partners want to request the data, they send an email to the CCSM cluster. If it's an agency, for example an NGO or an INGO, the cluster check if it's a CCCM partner or not. If it's not the CCCM partner, they send several questions asking for which optimized why you need the data for which type of response, etc. And then they copy the relevant cluster.

It was mentioned that this assessment is to quickly gather information on general conditions. for more detailed information, the idea is to have the areas where the needs are the highest in the shelter and

the idea is to go and then go with the needs assessment and check what is the situation and considering also technical aspect that the other partners that are populating this database.

The dataset for the assessment can be share with the cluster as a follow-up and for the cluster to look at the data even deeper.
