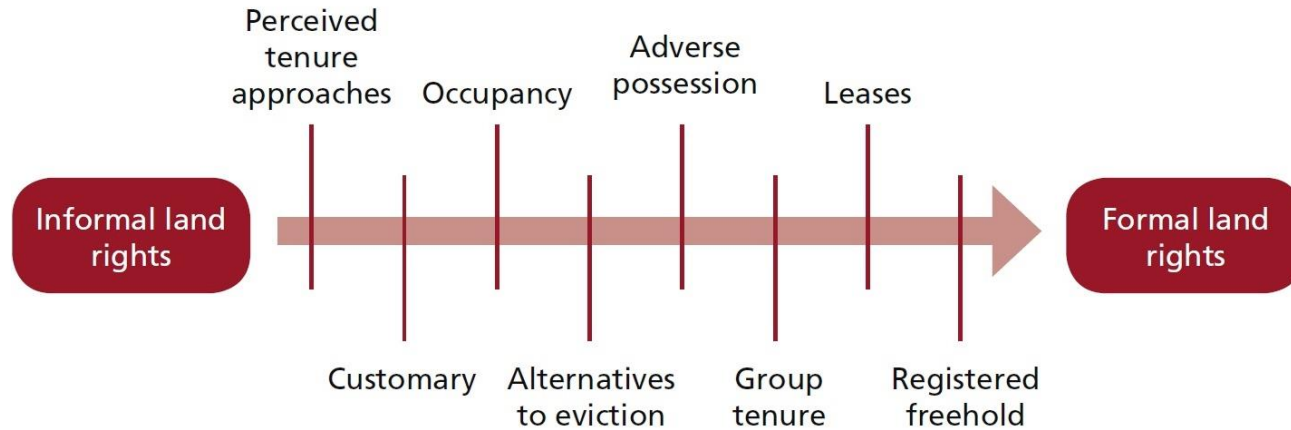
Security of Tenure

- **Security of tenure:** refers to the certainty that a person's rights to HLP will be protected
- It guarantees legal protection against forced eviction, harassment and other threats
- It is one of the core contents of the “right to adequate housing”

How Security of Tenure is Achieved

- The state's legal system and regulation of land titles or lease rights (statutory tenure)
- Recognition of one's HLP rights by the community (customary tenure)
- Political recognition of informal settlements

Security of Tenure and Shelter Projects

1. Establishment of ownership
 - Ownership
 - HLP SC Mapping of Alternate Proofs of Ownership
 - UN-Habitat model: Social Tenure Domain Model
2. Rental agreements

Preliminary results of HLP SC Mapping of Alternate Proofs of Ownership

- Different Approaches by Organization and sometimes within the same Organization based on governorate
- In general, Power of Attorney being used where owner is not reachable or is reachable, but out of the country
- Some organizations require a title deed, others apply a lesser burden (utility bill + mukhtar support letter)
- Where real estate departments are functioning, local council or local mukhtars provide supporting information to court; order to real estate department to issue deed
- Where owner not reachable for more than 3 years, official letter from local council or local council and local governorate sufficient

Protection Mainstreaming in Shelter Interventions

Elements of Protection Mainstreaming

1. Prioritize safety & dignity; avoid causing harm
2. Ensure meaningful access
3. Accountability
4. Participation and Empowerment

Priority Needs

Needs prioritised for this allocation

- Targeted Shelter & NFI support for IDPs not in camps
- Targeted Shelter & NFI support for Returnees, Stayees, and Hosts
- Emergency site / camp upgrades in Anbar / Hawiga
- Support to hard-to-reach / underserved areas

Why?

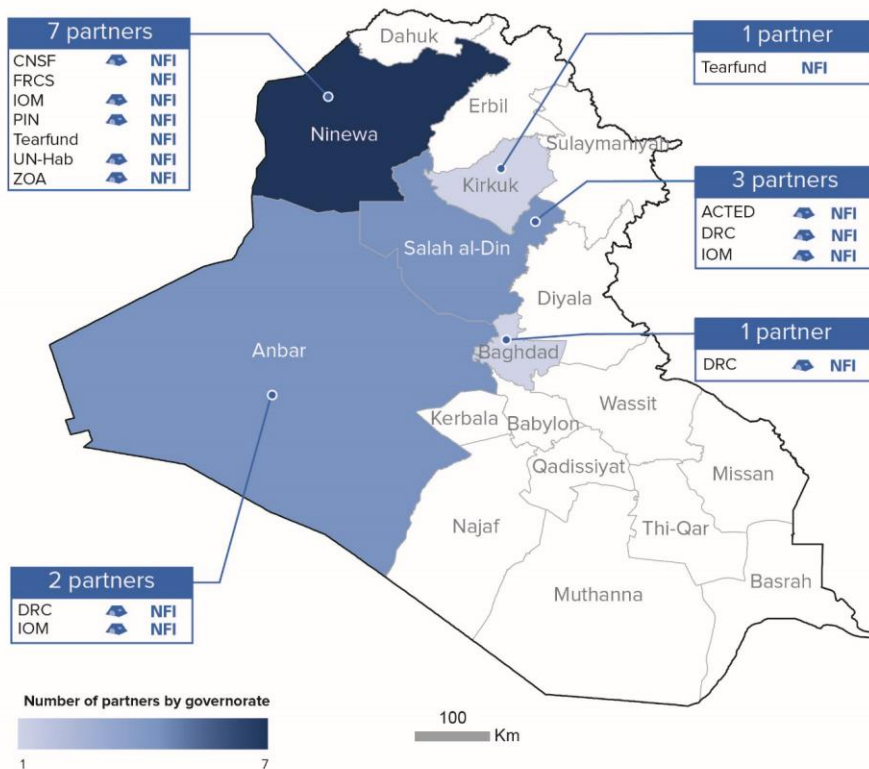
- Blanket distributions / support no longer feasible
- Out-of camp support has been limited – e.g East Mosul
- Expecting new displacement from W. Mosul, Hawiga, Telafar, and Anbar
- Increased returns during the summer months

Response

Prioritised activity types

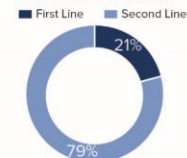
- Limited to First and Second line activities
- Targeted, fast, low-cost/high-impact shelter support using:
 - Sealing-Off Kits for IDPs
 - Basic shelter repair - doors, blockwork offering more durable assistance for hosts / stayees / returnees
 - Community driven shelter repairs / self-employed tradesman
- Conditional cash / vouchers for Shelter and NFI wherever markets are functional (but closely coordinated with other cash actors)
- Shelter / NFI support in hard to reach / underserved areas

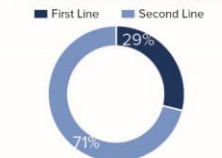

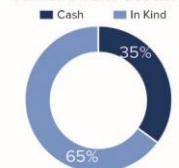
PERCENTAGE OF BUDGET



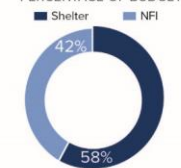
PERCENTAGE OF BENEFICIARIES



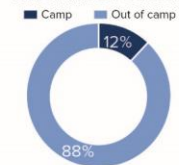
PERCENTAGE OF BUDGET

Response

What key results are expected?

- The most vulnerable IDPs have access to shelter and NFI support including those in harder to reach areas,
- Prioritising locally owned businesses and putting local skilled labour force back to work
- Support for hosts, stayees and returnees with more durable shelter repairs,

Programme Quality:

Inclusion of NNGOs and Protection issues

- One NNGO included with increased budget
- Five national partners included in UN / INGO projects (4 NNGOs, IRCS)
- Projects emphasise vulnerability based targeting
- Projects emphasise close coordination with S/NFI partners, CWG, FSC, and other clusters
- Projects integrate some WASH activities and support FS directly

Value for money

- Average of less than **US \$50 per beneficiary**
- Support cost is less than 14% of portfolio and this includes more expensive hard-to-reach areas as well as Cash and Shelter projects that are more difficult to implement than NFI distributions

Other important information/message for the Advisory Board:

- All projects included are in line with the IHPF S/NFI guidance
- Need to work with partners more closely prior to project submission (especially local NGOs)
- Therefore it is recommend to allow longer IHPF lead times for agencies to develop proposals and engage with the cluster


