1. Information Management - Achievements

Cluster achievements from ActivityInfo (1st Jan. – 31st August 2018)

People in Need	Target	Reached with NFI	Reached with Shelter
3.82 M	1.9 M	872,764 (46% of target)	139,599 (7% of target)

55% of the total people reached with **NFI distributions** are **in Camps**, and 45% in **out of Camps settings**;
While 87% of total people reached with **Shelter interventions** are in **out of camps settings**, and just 13% **in Camps**;

37 partners have contributed to above achievements of which
35 are operating in Centre and South governorates and 11 in KR-I
9 are operating in both KR-I and C&S

2. Key Issues – Winter Response Planning

Needs analysis

Need analysis conducted based on:

- ❖ Population groups
- ❖ Settlement and shelter typology with conditions not offering enough protection from cold and rain.
- ❖ Data of previous years' distributions, including lack of access to winter items and replenishment needs.
- ❖ Data from IOM DTM Round 99, MCNA VI and RASP (August 2018)

Last year's winter response including lessons learnt will be taken into account

2. Winter Response Planning

Targeting

The Shelter Cluster SAG took the following decisions in terms of targeting the winter response 2018/2019:

Agreement to balance interventions towards IDPs rather than returnees although the needs of returnees should continue to be recognised.

The following groups are prioritised:

- ❖ Camps
- ❖ New arrivals, newly accessible areas and those which did not receive in previous years and are still in need.
- ❖ Vulnerable families in critical shelter including informal settlements (IS), unfinished and/or abandoned buildings (UAB), war damaged shelter (WDS) and substandard residential shelter
- ❖ Altitude is a way of prioritising, rather than a priority i.e. the above three groups at altitude should be assisted first, then the rest of the above priorities. If funding is available after the needs of the above groups have been met, it could be allocated to vulnerable households at altitude, finally vulnerable households not at altitude could be assisted.

HNO HRP process/timeline

- Based on MCNA VI, Secondary data review of partner assessments, SC UNHABITAT webportal
- ICCG Joint analysis workshop Monday, 17.09.
- MCNA analysis ongoing for more in-depth understanding
- HNO planned to be finalized beginning/mid of October

- HRP process follows with the aim to finalize the HRP 2019 end of this year
- SC currently working with the SAG on the strategy which will influence the HRP strategy

2. Key Issues – HNO HRP 2019

MCNA VI main findings: Nationwide

NFI

Average basic NFI needs by pop group: IDP OoC: 16%, Returnees: 9%, IDP in camps: 7%, Non displaced: 2%

Highest NFI needs by pop group & geographical area: IDP OoC Shirqat: 50%, returnees Haditha: 45%, IDP in camps Falluja: 39%, IDP camps Mosul: 36%, IDP OoC Koisanjaq: 33%

Top 3 by item: bedding, mattresses, blankets

Clothing need: overall average 18%

Shelter

Overall shelter needs countrywide: returnees Samarra 46%, returnees Baiji 43%, IDP camps Daquq 42%, IDP camps Shirqat 42%, returnees Khalis 42%

Indicators: roof leaking, opening in the walls, broken windows, improved safety/security, protection from climate conditions, improved infrastructure (contamination, isolation, risk of eviction)

MCNA VI main findings: Centre and South

NFI

In camps IDP

- almost 40% IDP reporting needs in Falluja Camps (AAF, Bez Bez, HTC and AK): replenishment of Basic NFI
- 29% in Baghda 24% in Kerbala, 30% in Tikrit
- Summer needs are higher than winter need esp. in Baghdad and Anbar (+ Mahmoudiya for summer assistance)

Out of camps IDP

- In Falluja, Ramadi and Salah a Din more than 20% of IDP out of camps are in need of Basic NFI
- Highest seasonal support need in Baghdad (Abu Ghraib) and Salah al Din

Returnees

- Highest % in Haditha
- Winter need in Qaim

MCNA VI main findings: Centre and South Shelter

In camps IDP

- Tent replacement (7.000 – 10.000 tents in need of replacement before winter)
- Main needs reported from Ramadi, Kerbala, Najaf

! Shelter upgrades to repair leaking roofs, fencing of shelters, fire risk, privacy i.e. separation of living rooms

Out of camps IDP

- while risk of eviction is affecting a minor portion of the population especially in Tikrit, shelter issues are major across Anbar, Babylon, Baghdad, Salah a Din (e.g. 40% in Falluja reported at least one Shelter issue)
- ! Mahmoudiya, Baghdad high needs (50%) – pre-ISIL conflict effected

Returnees

- Critical areas: Anbar (Heet, Ramadi), Baghdad, Diyala

	Khadhraa Camp	Sep-9	Camp Closed- 77 HHs, 14 HHs went to Al Ahel Camp. 24 rented in Baghdad. 29 to Anbar (13 facilitated)	Could Shelters be re-located? Potential enrolment in out-of-camp response/rental subsidy
	Jameea Camp	Aug-12	Camp Closed- 45 HHs evicted, 4 to Anbar rest to Mosul.	Shelter-Follow up. Relocation of caravans possible?
SAD	Al Alam	Sep-19	GRC discussion on moving HHs from Sector-3 (MoMD tents) to Sectors 1& 2 (UNHCR tents).
