2. Update from the Shelter Cluster on the CCCM working group		Action	Responsible
<p>On the morning of 27th of June there was a coordination meeting organised by CCCM, at WFP in Chimoio to discuss the resettlement sites. The Shelter Cluster Roaming Coordinator and Technical Coordinator both attended the meeting with coordinators from CCCM and WASH cluster. Representatives from WFP were present along with some other partners like LWF and GVC.</p> <p>The main goal of the meeting was twofold. First, to understand the presence of partners of the different clusters in the official resettlement sites, in order to better understand potential needs and gaps. Second, where the demarcation of plots has started. These meetings will likely happen on Thursday mornings.</p> <p>During this meeting, the Shelter Cluster provided an update as per the latest information of activities that had been shared by partners during the last Shelter Cluster meeting.</p>		Partners are welcome to attend the CCCM meetings. Concerns regarding food shortage			
<p>As mentioned previously, all partners have raised concerns regarding food shortage in some communities/resettlement site. This was also raised during the CCCM working group meeting in WFP. According to WFP representatives they did 3 food distributions in all resettlement areas. From now on there will have two programs:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Food for work • Nutritional rehabilitation – focused on children 6 to 59 months; pregnant and breast feeding (up to 6 months) women - entails an assessment and only children and women that are considered to be malnourished will be part of the program. <p>Food Security Cluster partners present during the meeting at WFP, said that the number of people in the community lists of some resettlement areas changed and that is what is causing confusing/problems. SDPI advised that this is mainly due to people that have lost their <i>machambas</i> in the vicinities of these sites and try to get food through the distributions.</p>		
4. Clarifications from the government regarding land titles and permits		
Regarding DUAT and titles		
<p>For the resettlement sites there is an urban plan (defining areas like schools, markets, recreation facilities etc). Although this plan is initiated and developed by the district, it has to be approved by the Governor. Meaning that the habitational/residential plan is approved by the Governor. Once it is approved, the District Administrator is responsible for assigning the plots.</p> <p>Once there is demarcation of the sites, SDPI (District Planning and Infrastructure Services), in coordination with DPTADER (Provincial Directorate of Land Environment and Rural Development) can facilitate property titles but not the DUAT since this is given by the Geographical and Cadastral services through a specific DUAT team. So, SDPI does not give the DUAT, they can give property titles which fall under the responsibility of the Administrator.</p>		
SDPI and SDAE		
<p>According to the District Administrator, at a District Level there are two services that give different titles:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • SDPI (District Planning and Infrastructure Services) which gives the titles in urban areas, namely property titles. • SDAE (District Service of Economic Activities) which gives the DUAT for <i>machambas</i>. 		
Land tenure of resettlement sites		
<p>For the 26 resettlement sites a joint team of DPTADER and SDPI cross mapped and confirmed that no individuals have DUAT for those lands; it is all from the government and therefore they will be able to give DUAT and titles to the families.</p> <p>According to SDPI, at the moment Muwawa is the only site in which DUAT are being given through a government team working on site. They are giving DUAT for <i>machambas</i>.</p>		
<p>According to SDPI the property title is permanent because it is already an urbanised area, therefore destined to be residential. For <i>machamba</i>, it is given for predefined periods of time – if people fail to comply with the use, they can lose it. In the resettlement areas, since they are considered urbanised areas, they cannot give DUAT for <i>machamba</i>.</p>		
5. Families that do not want to move to the resettlement site		
<p>During the meeting with CCCM, it was raised that there some resettlement sites to which people are not keen to move in. They have moved from their original sites to accommodation sites (likely informal) and now the District wants to move them the official resettlement sites but the population would prefer to stay where they are at the moment. GVC say that in the case of Magaro and Macacoe this happens because they are further way from their <i>machambas</i>.</p> <p>According to SDPI, some families do not want to move. They prefer to be isolated in an area they think it is secure and where they can raise their animals. According to SDPI, in Javela (for example) of 29 families, 13 do not want to resettle. For GRC, they are not able to help the families that decide to move on their own.</p> <p>Families that move to the resettlement sites will receive the title; the ones that do not move will not. However, SDPI say that this is a process and they will try to listen to people’s concerns and understand if they can come with a different solution.</p>	<p>This can be an issue for shelter partners that want to support these communities.</p> <p>Shelter Cluster partners to be aware of this, discuss with Shelter Cluster to then liaise with SDPI</p>	<p>All partners</p>
<p>For communities like Mechisso, in which partners like Save the Children want to support the reconstruction, could they be included on any list in order to have access to support?</p> <p>SDPI can go to the site, meet with the community and identify the area where the community wants to stay. If everyone agrees, SDPI say it is possible to do demarcation in that area.</p>	<p>Save the Children to connect directly with SDPI to organise it.</p> <p>Partners in similar situations to contact SDPI.</p>	<p>Save the Children and SDPI</p>
<p>At the moment the only support that the district government can give is the demarcation and the attribution of plots. The families will have to rebuild for themselves or with the support of the Shelter partners.</p> <p>This is the same case for other clusters. Regarding construction requirements and minimal standards, those are given by SDPI and DPOPHRH. Mikhail, the new technical coordinator will follow-up on the information that the Shelter Cluster already has available (guidelines for new dwellings) and will be linking with government to support and provide guidance to shelter partners in relation to this matter. Availability of CSEB machine		
<p>SDPI informed that in the district they have a manual machine to build compressed stabilised earth bricks (clay + sand + cement). At the moment the machine is not in use. Also they already have people that have received training in the district to use the machine. The district can also facilitate the list of skilled workers.</p> <p>Since more than one partner might wish to use the machine, there might be a need to produce a schedule. However, DPOPHRH advised that other districts also have machines. Partners suggest if there is the potential for the province to do an assessment of where they have machines that are not in use in other districts and understand if these could be used in the districts with more need.</p> <p>In face of this, more partners seem to be willing to engage in recovery projects. 7. Updates from partners		
LWF finalised distributions in Muchai, Guzda and Machaquare of tarpaulins, toolkits and NFIs.		
Caritas received green light to build 100 permanent shelters. They have another potential donor interested in support more permanent shelters to start in August. They will do the initial 100 shelters in Muwawa, prioritising the most vulnerable. The Shelter Cluster requested for this criteria to be passed to them. In Muoco they will start building their transitional shelters.		
Save the Children will start distribution in Mechisso on the 5 th of July. They have also engaged with the WASH colleagues from GVC that have been working on the 7 communities that have been previously identified has not having shelter support, to organise distribution. They are still waiting for the shelter items to be delivered in Manica by CARE.
