<ul style="list-style-type: none"> All implementing partners should share their distribution plans with the local administration before implementing them. The lack of coordination with local authorities caused confusion among beneficiaries recently as two activities in different sectors were carried out in one community at the same day. The local administration wishes implementing organizations of all sectors to present their recovery programs as soon as possible. 2. Follow-up: shelter relief distributions – resettlement sites	Action	Responsible
<p>IOM (not in the meeting) confirmed in mid-August to cover persisting shelter relief needs in the altogether 11 resettlement sites in the district of Buzi.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> UNHCR confirmed they distributed tents in Guara Guara (Maxquiri 1 Maxquiri 2, Mussocosa) but there are still persisting needs. <p>Update: Care is willing to donate 300 family tents to CVM Buzi. IOM and SC recommend to distribute them in Maxquiri 1 Maxquiri 2 as tents are the items that have been distributed there before. CVM will also discuss with to the local administration.</p> <p>SC has reached out to organizations to ask for logistics support for the transport of the tents from Beira to Buzi.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Distributions in Grudja will start once demarcation has been finished. 4. Coverage with Shelter relief in the district of Buzi	Action	Responsible
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The resettlement sites as well as most of the areas defined as priorities are either covered with shelter relief or will be covered in the upcoming weeks. • According to INGC/DTM data in August, the total number of HHs affected in Buzi outside the resettlement sites is 50.855; out of this 77% said they have received shelter kits. A significant number of distributions has taken place since August; the percentage in the upcoming September data is therefore expected to be higher. • CARE flagged that one of the results of a multi-sectoral assessment they carried out in the district recently is, that less than 5% of the population of Buzi see the distribution of tarpaulins as a priority. <p>Conclusion: Most of the priority areas flagged in July are or will be covered in the upcoming weeks.
