3. Key findings on the KI questionnaire

Rationale

- Philippine Shelter Cluster conducted a vulnerability analysis in January 2022 across the country shortly after the typhoon, using secondary data from DROMIC (damage data) and OCHA (pre crisis vulnerability data), as well as partner reporting information through 4W.
- The analysis identified a series of priority vulnerable municipalities, mainly 33 which have a high score in both damage and vulnerability.
- Need for information to triangulate findings from the vulnerability analysis and provide deeper understanding of the level of severity of Shelter needs in the identified priority municipalities
- In turn, further inform the Shelter response

Assessment methodology

- Qualitative methods (findings are indicative and not representative)
- 103 Key informant interviews conducted in 46 municipalities, data collected by Shelter Cluster partners
- KI interviews (ideally 3 per municipality for triangulation) with:
 - Community representatives or organizations providing humanitarian support
 - Government Provincial Disaster risk Reduction Management Office
 - Local authorities

Limitations:

- Findings are indicative: they should be interpreted with caution and further triangulated with knowledge of the context and other sources of information:
 - Many of the questions were asking KI to provide estimates
 - Key informants had different functions, resulting in possible bias
- In some municipalities, it was not possible to do triangulation (less than 3 surveys were conducted)
- Not all municipalities initially identified as priority during the initial vulnerability analysis were included in the assessment

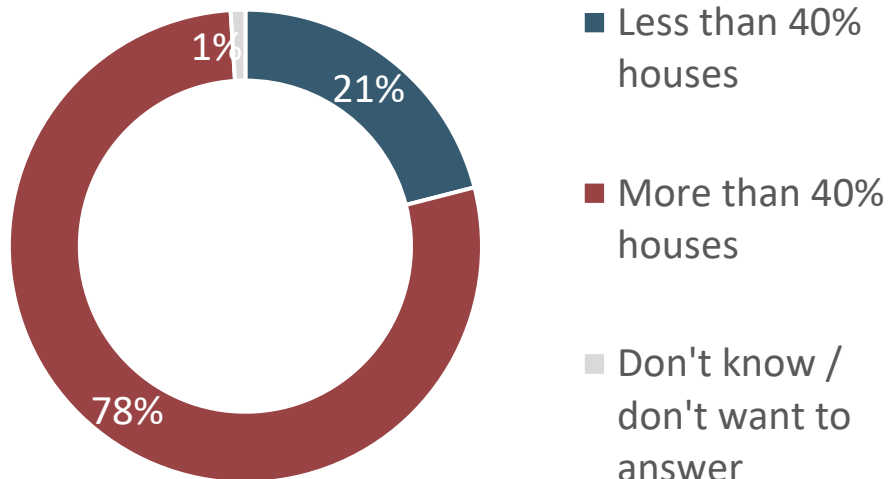
Research questions:

- To what extent do affected populations have **access to adequate Shelter** (type of shelter, damage to shelter, inhabitable housing) ?
- What type of **Shelter-related needs**, if any, are **currently a priority**?
- What is the current level of **recovery** in affected municipalities?
- To what extent have **affected populations received Shelter assistance** since the typhoon, what challenges have they encountered?

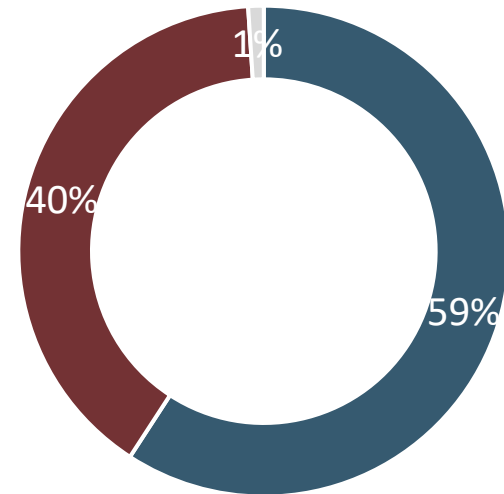
Key findings on the KI questionnaire

Damage to Shelter

% of KI by estimated proportion of houses that were damaged right after the typhoon (January)

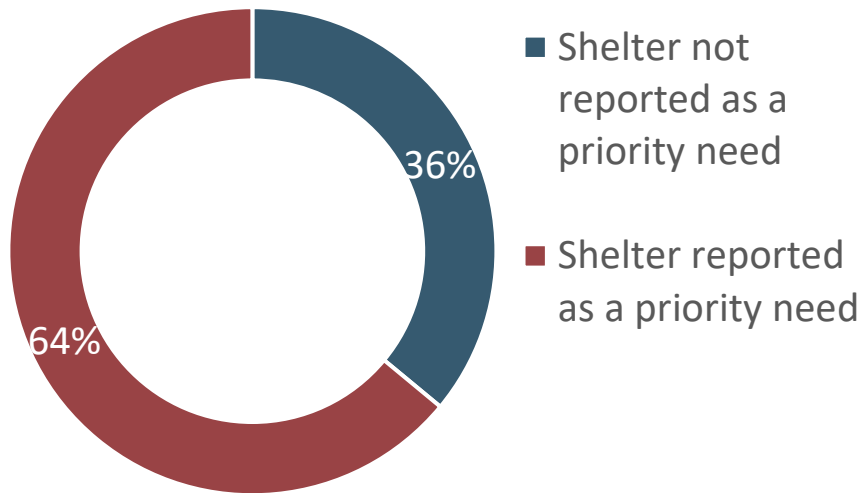


% of KI by estimated proportion of houses that were still inhabitable at the time of data collection (March)

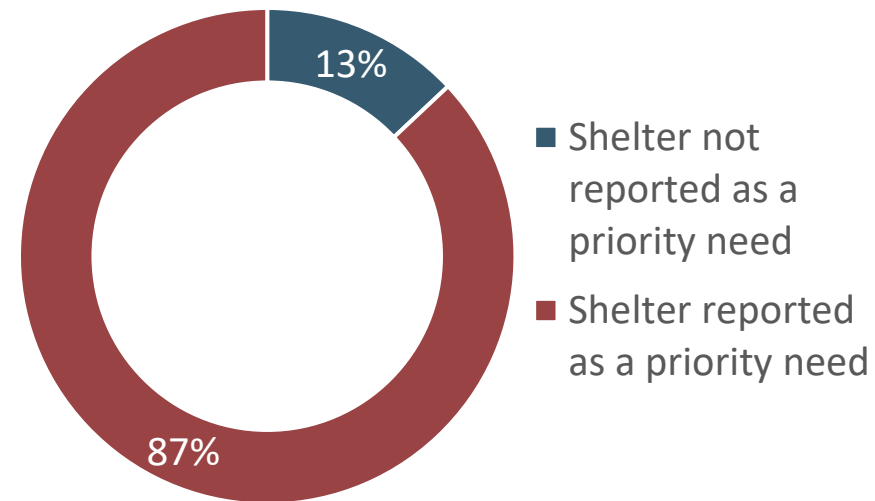


Shelter as priority need

% of KI reporting that Shelter was a priority need in their municipality right after the typhoon

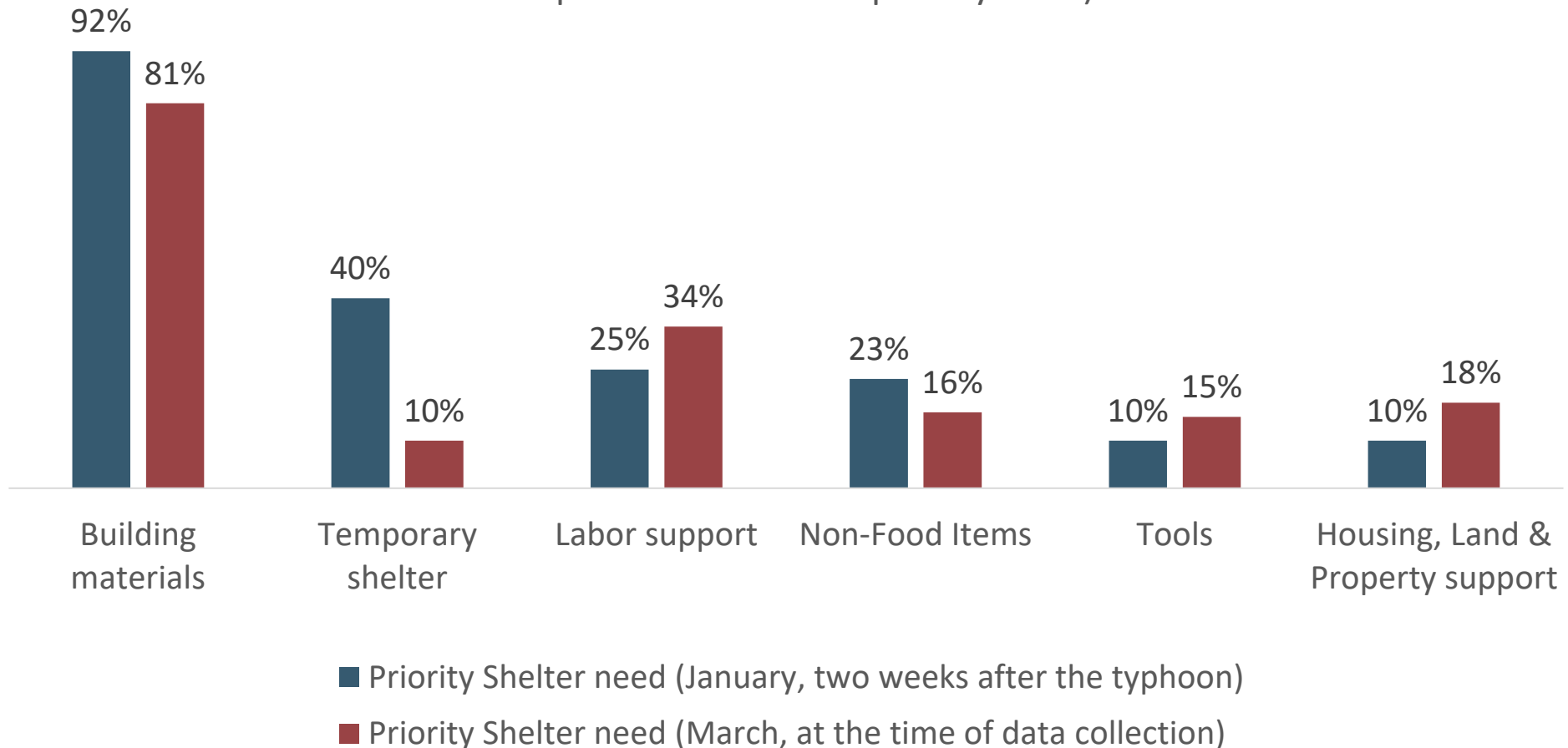


% of KI reporting that Shelter was a priority need in their municipality (at the time of data collection)



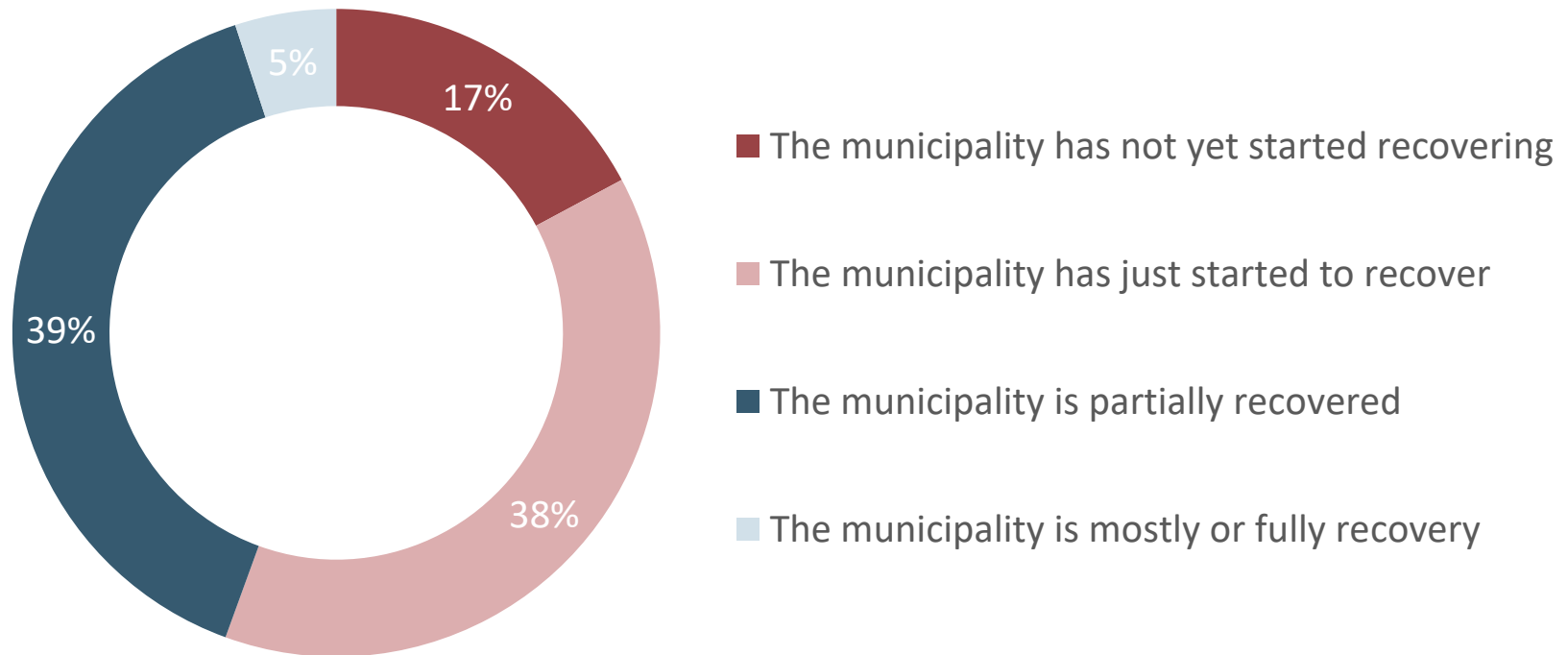
Type of Shelter priority need

Status of recovery, reported by KI for their municipality



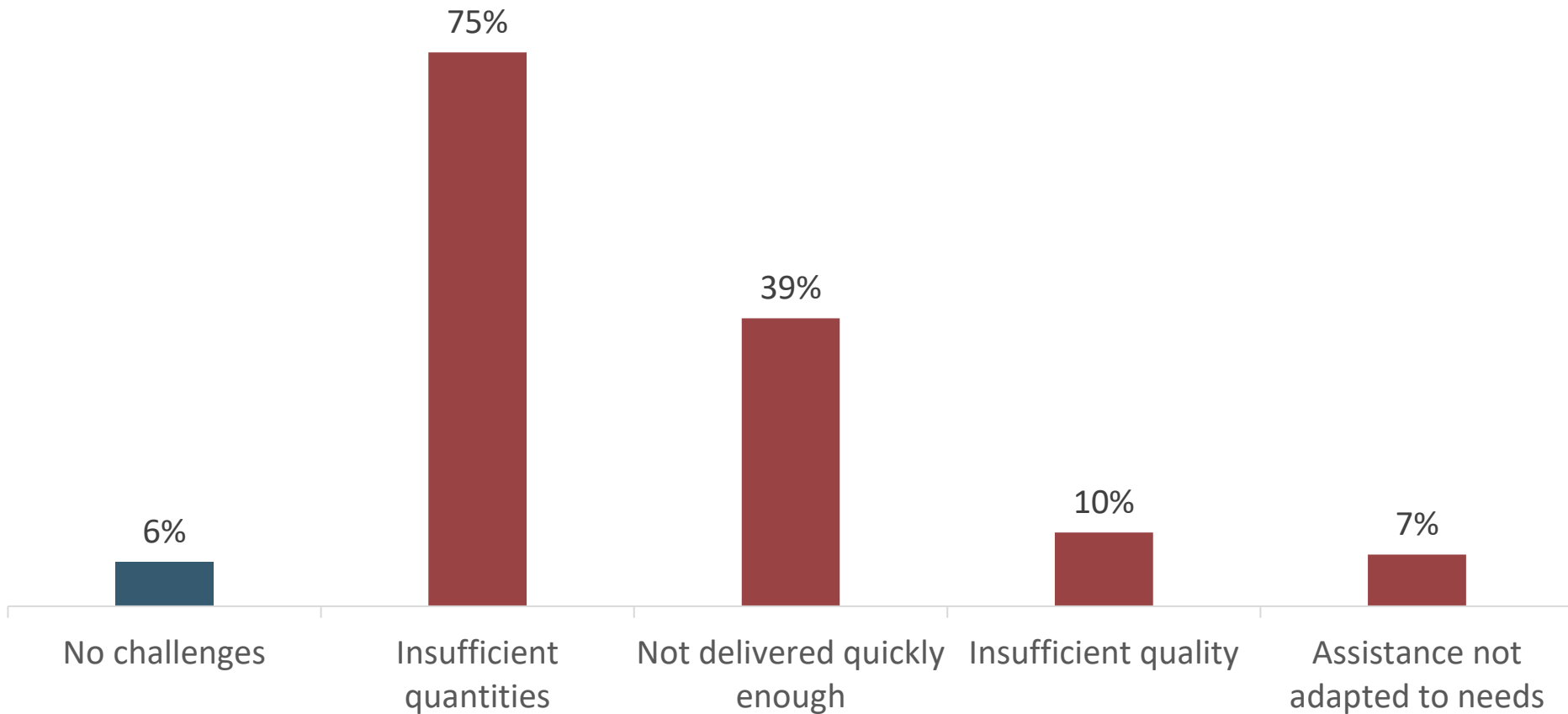
- Recovery is a vague and complex concept that should be interpreted with caution, as it relied on KI perceptions
- More than two-thirds of KI reported that they perceived their municipality as either partially recovered or that it had just started to recover

Shelter Assistance

85% of KI reported that their municipality
has received Shelter assistance

6. Roll-out of Philippines Access Monitoring and Reporting Framework

The Humanitarian Country Team has endorsed the Access Monitoring and Reporting Framework (AMRF), a tool to collect and analyze data on the impact of access constraints on the ongoing and future humanitarian responses in the Philippines. The data gathered and analyzed from reports of agencies will enable OCHA to:

- Obtain evidence and analysis of access challenges experienced by humanitarian agencies.
- Notify the HCT, Inter-Cluster Coordination Group, and field units on the trends and frequency of incidents to better inform preparedness, response planning and decision-making.
- Support negotiations and advocacy to address humanitarian access impediments.
- Provide practical advice to humanitarian agencies on solving access impediments based on good practices learned from the analysis of outcomes reported.

6. Roll-out of Philippines Access Monitoring and Reporting Framework
