1 Winterization strategy

- SCC noted that the Winterization TWiG has reviewed the draft winterization strategy and integrated all the inputs from partners. On Thursday, 16th June at 10:00 am the meeting will map partners' plans, targeted areas and other details for the winterization response. There will also be updates from the Ministry and donors as part of the strategy alignment process.
- Other cluster have contributed inputs on their modalities for the winterization appeal and a final draft will be shared next week.

2 Logistics cluster updates related to winterization

- Logistics Cluster update: The cluster is reaching out to partners, particularly SC partners on what their plans for winterization in relation to logistics capacity, e.g. storage.

3 Shelter strategy

- The strategy has been finalized and is available on this ([link](#)). The strategy will be reviewed at the end of the year.
- Changes in SC activity matrix are highlighted in the presentation. There are revisions to several annexes to the strategy which will be shared once finalized.
- SCC noted that there is a SC SAG that has a term of three months after which a new SAG will be elected by next week. Partners were encouraged to register their interest to join the SAG by contacting the SCC.

- 550,919 persons assisted by the SNFI cluster partners since 25 February 2022.
- 158,121 assisted people with NFI kits in collective centers
- 242,463 assisted people with NFI kits at household level
- 76,530 assisted people with shelter kits
- 7,148 received winterization support (approx.)
- 48K assisted persons/week as reported

5 Partner updates

- There are currently 26 partners working in the field out of the 45 cluster members.
- Partners who did not submit their 3Ws in the past week were requested to contact the SC IM team if they are facing challenges in completing the 3W matrix.
- **SCC** asked partners who did not report to provide an update on challenges and how the cluster can assist.
- Intersos noted that their report was shared but not reflected in the operational presence map. Intersos is targeting Lviv and some areas in the East of the country, Odessa, Dnipro and Poltava focusing on NFI assistance.
- **Solidarites** has started distributions of emergency shelter kits in Kyiv oblast and will soon start in Odessa oblast. The process of assessing houses for light and medium repairs in Kiev and Kharkiv oblasts. Collective centres identified for refurbishment and work will soon start in Vynitsia, Poltava and other oblasts.
- **Lidia (UNHCR)** Government programme update on assessments: The programme was introduced to provide support to families hosting IDPs. Approximately sixty dollars is provided for a family of four people who stayed for a full month. The amount provided by government is the same as that provided by humanitarian agencies. The programme is available only to those who host registered IDPs. Government

reserved \$7.5 million for the programme for 2022. There are 3 organizations involved in this programme together with the Ministry of Regional Development namely UNHCR, National Red Cross Society and NRC. Oblasts to be covered by each organization as well as lists of people to be assisted have been identified. Government expects about 500K IDPs to be hosted per month. Lidia (UNHCR) noted that the compensation is provided because hosted families will be staying without paying rent. SCC noted that there is currently no regulatory framework for Cash programmes but discussions are under way.

- **Andrew Ryan (IMC)** noted that IMC has been doing Cash and NFI distributions in Bucha, Chernihiv, Odesa, Stryi, Nikolaiv among other areas. IMC rehabilitation efforts are mostly at health facilities. SCC urged IMC to share 3W reports and to liaise with SC IM for the reporting tool.
- **SCC** urged partners to contribute to mapping of capacity and report weekly stock and pipeline supplies. A request of more than 30K people to be assisted was received on Friday 9th June and there is need to start discussions about contingency plans.

6 AOB

- **R2P** assessment results from 664 collective centres: ([link to presentation](#)). SCC noted that everything related to WASH in the findings should be addressed to the WASH cluster. CCM cluster is developing a database of collective centres as part of the winterization strategy and as part of decongestion of learning facilities.
- **Countrywide contingency stock planning** is only possible if partners reports their stock pipeline weekly.
- **Sviatoslav Savchuk (SNCC-Vinnytsia hub)** – A number of IDPs are expected to arrive at one of the Raions. The sub-national cluster was approached by the authorities and Deputy Governor for support as local capacity is not sufficient. They appointed focal points for each of the Raions inside the oblasts and are ready to accommodate the first wave of an estimated 5,000 IDPs. A coordination mechanism was developed. A list of essential items to be given to the incoming IDPs was also shared with the sub national cluster. Up to 50 facilities will be availed for the IDPs. The overall planning figure is 33,500 IDPs to come. SNCC has started coordinating partners for the supplies.
