



Methodology: Shelter severity is broken down in three categories: (1) the severity of needs for an enclosed living space (shelter) is assessed based on whether or not there is lighting inside shelters, the average number of people living in the shelter, if shelters are heated, if there is access to electricity and the type of shelter; (2) the severity of needs for domestic living are assessed based on whether households are able to eat, cook, and sleep and are in need of clothing items; (3) the severity of needs for community living includes security of tenure (e.g. are people likely to be evicted) and whether there is community lighting. The severity for the three separate categories is the average of the indicators. These three indicators determine the overall shelter severity, where the most weight is assigned to the living space, followed by the domestic life.
