HIGHLIGHTS

- Humanitarian Response Plan [HRP] 2024:** The SNFI sectors received 79 project proposals and approved 73 for implementation under HRP 2024. The HRP projects aim to support 1.4M individuals with Shelter and 1.9M with NFI interventions, constituting 21% and 31% of those in need, respectively. Financially, it estimates a requirement of US\$240M for shelter, US\$141M for core NFIs, and US\$121M for winter NFIs.
- The HRP targets closely correspond to the activity-based targets and costs estimated by the sector. In 2024, the sector secured \$139.4 million, which represents approximately 28% of the total required funding. Of this amount, \$81.5 million (34%) for shelter, \$36.5 million (26%) for core NFI and \$21.3 million (13%) for winter NFI.
- Due to recent developments in Syria and following the Strategic Steering Group's agreement, the 2024 Humanitarian Response Plan has been extended to address urgent humanitarian needs for the first quarter of 2025. The Shelter sector is targeting 242,000 people, with an estimated budget of US\$27.7M, and the NFI sector is targeting 1.42 M people, with an estimated budget of US\$76.9 million, covering January to March 2025.
- Summary of Response:** In 2024, SNFI sector partners in Syria have provided shelter for 725,680 people, core NFI support for 301,179, and winter NFI support for 674,689 people, reaching 52%, 15.6%, and 2732% of the target populations respectively. These efforts address needs intensified by the Lebanon influx and end-of-year developments.

RESPONSE

- Coordination:** The Whole of Syria SNFI cluster organized a three-day workshop in Amman in the first week of December. This event brought together coordinators and Information Management Officers from the three hubs, along with the focal point from the Global Shelter Cluster. The workshop aimed to tackle coordination challenges, enhance response harmonization, and develop the humanitarian response plan 2025 for the Whole of Syria.

GAPS / CHALLENGES

- Economic decline** and fluctuating prices have limited shelter initiatives while decreasing coping capacities of internally displaced persons (IDPs) and host communities, and scarce financial resources are raising the demand for shelter assistance.
- Recent Developments:** by 31 December, over 664,000 people had been newly displaced in one month. After peaking at 1.1 million on 12 December, nearly 486,000 had returned by 27 December. Primary needs are related to NFI, shelter repair, and reconstruction.
- Harsh winter** conditions in Syria pose a challenge, with many shelters lacking proper insulation or heating facilities and families lacking winter clothes.
- Critical funding gap:** Vulnerable people may continue to adopt negative coping mechanisms unless additional resources are made available to sector partners to enable the provision of critical Shelter and NFI assistance.

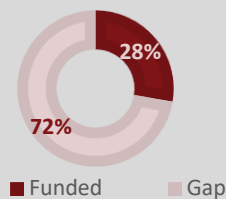

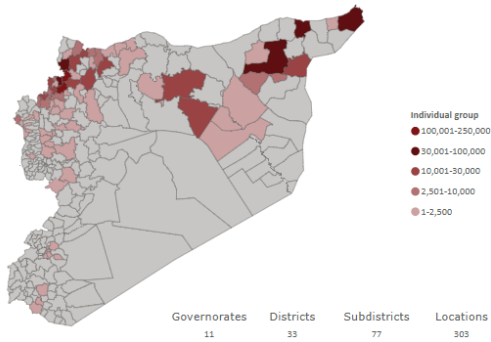

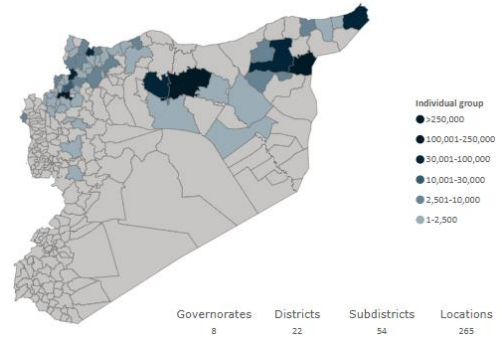
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Individuals reached with shelter activities, by subdistrict

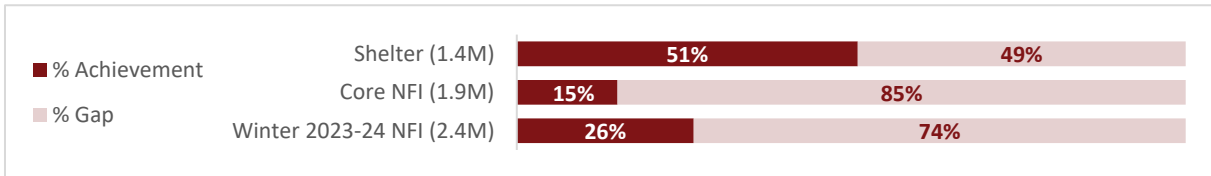


Individuals reached with core NFI activities, by subdistrict



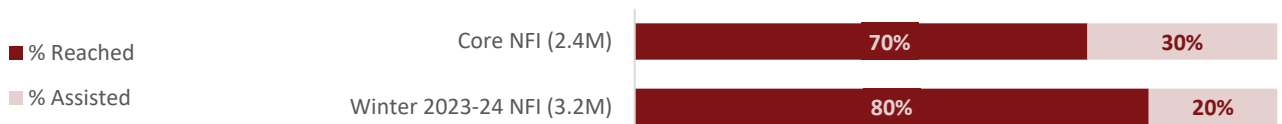
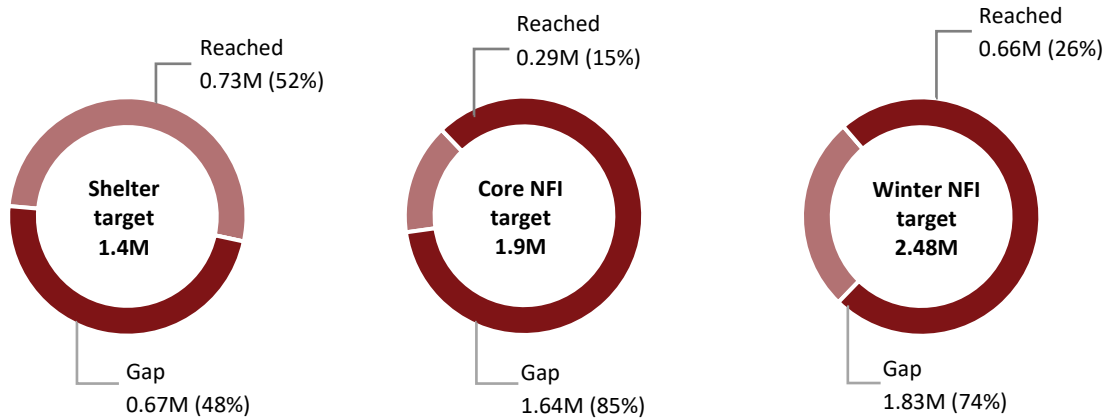
COVERAGE AGAINST HRP 2024 TARGETS* (% INDIVIDUALS REACHED)
