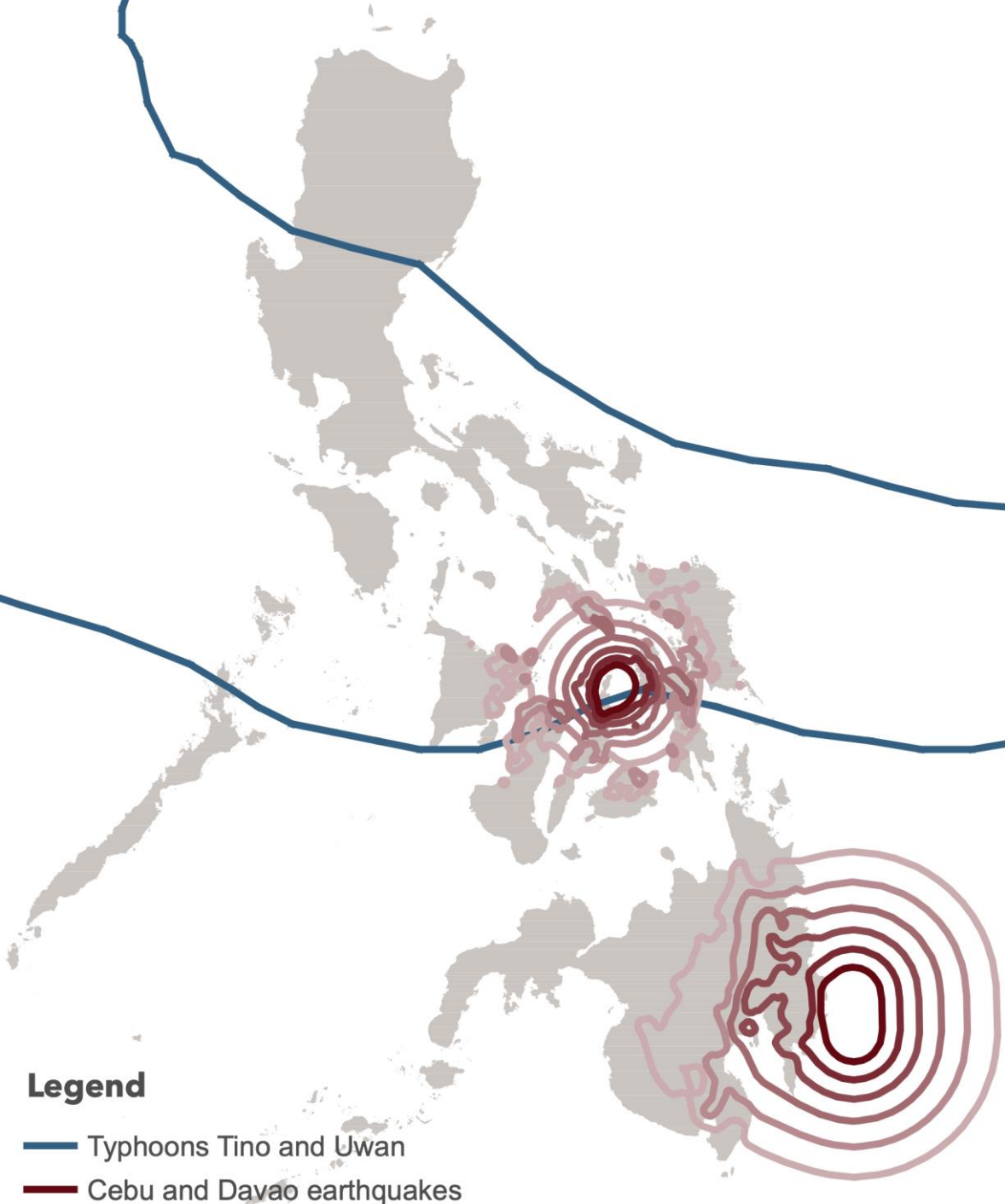

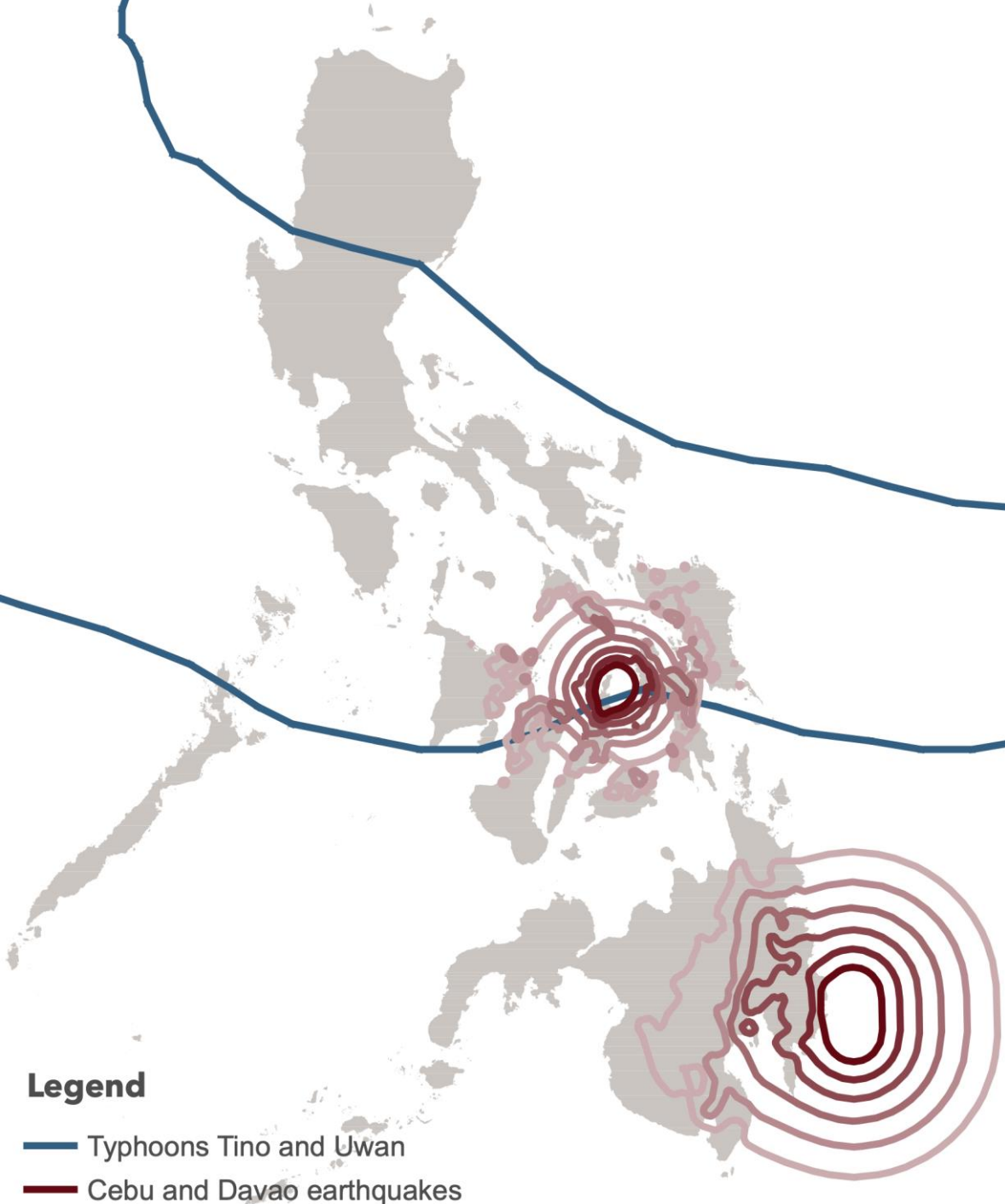

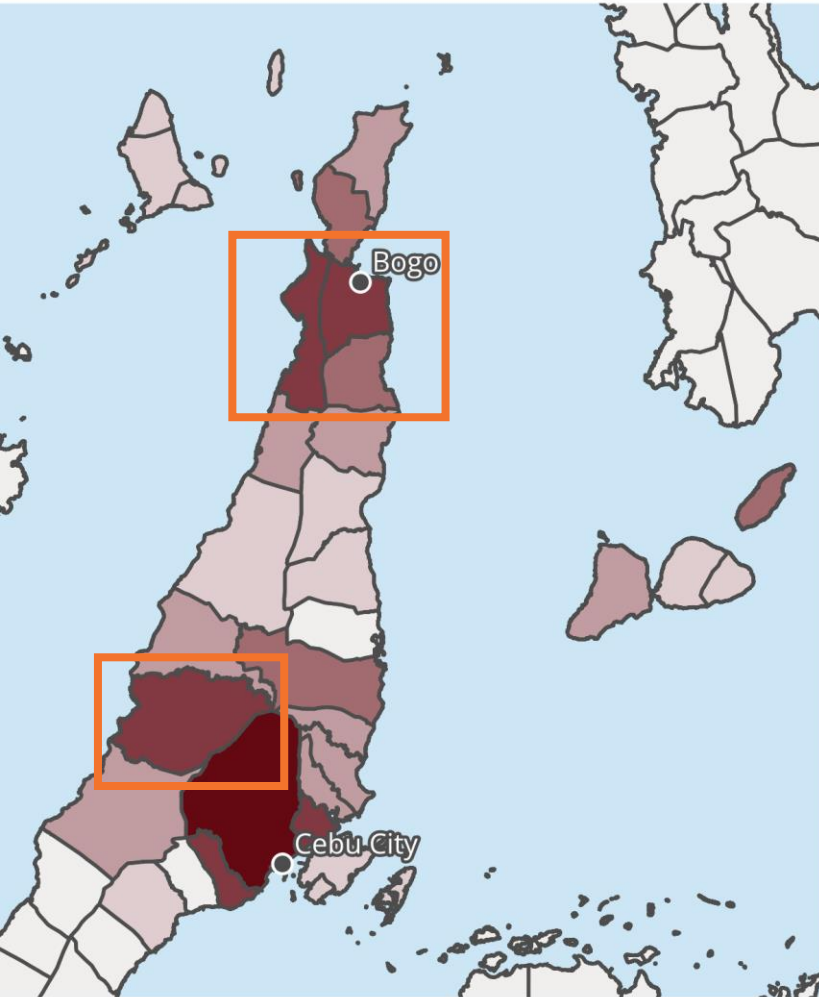

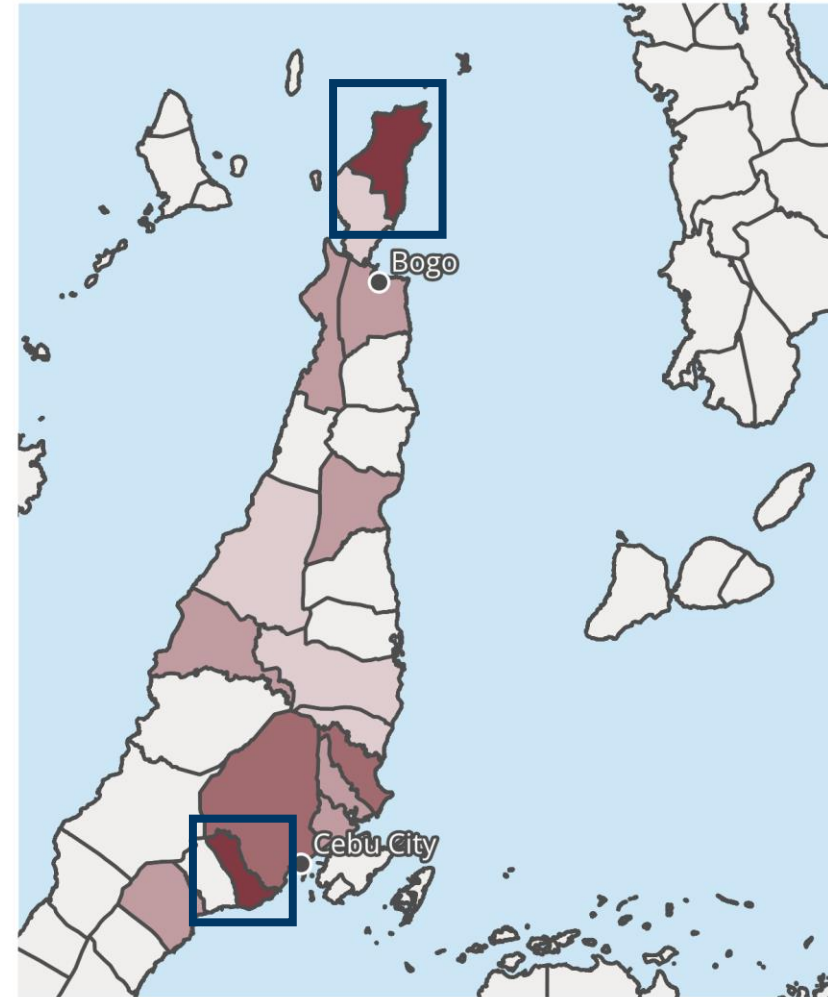
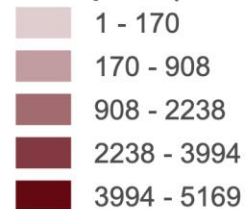
Needs vs humanitarian reach in Cebu province

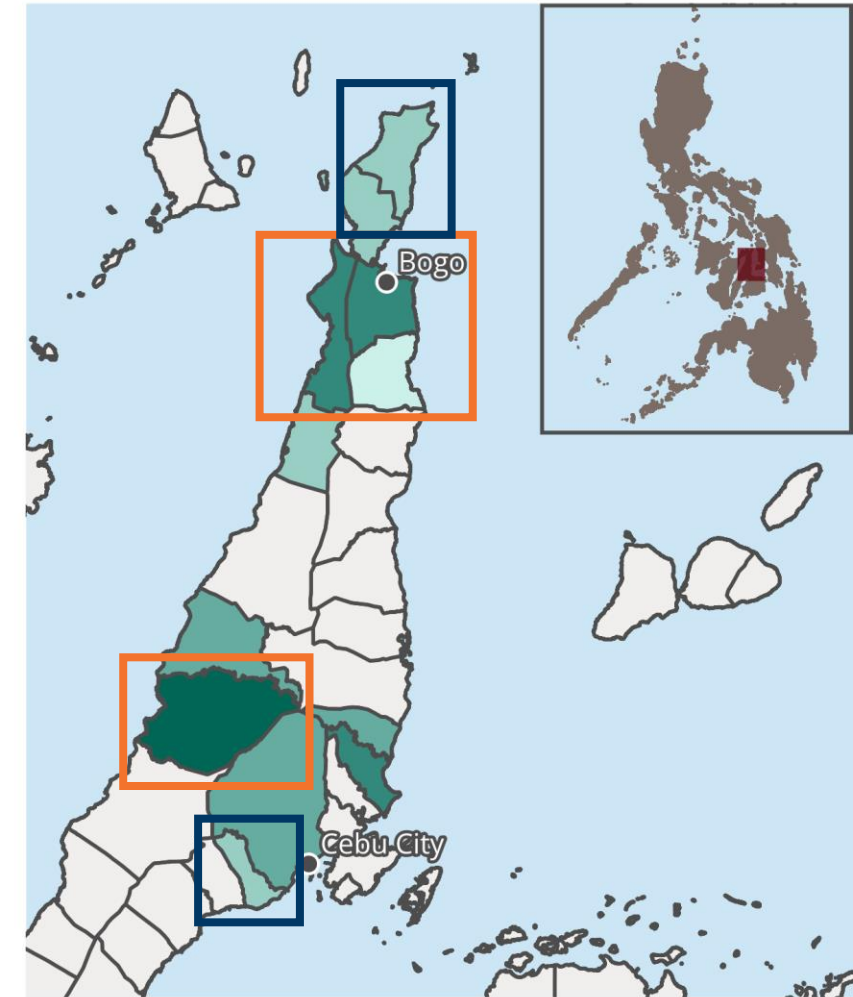
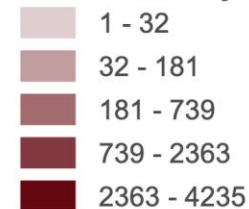

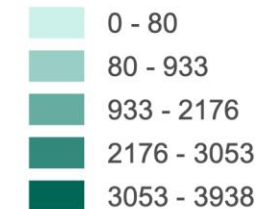
Number of houses totally damaged by typhoon and earthquake (DROMIC)

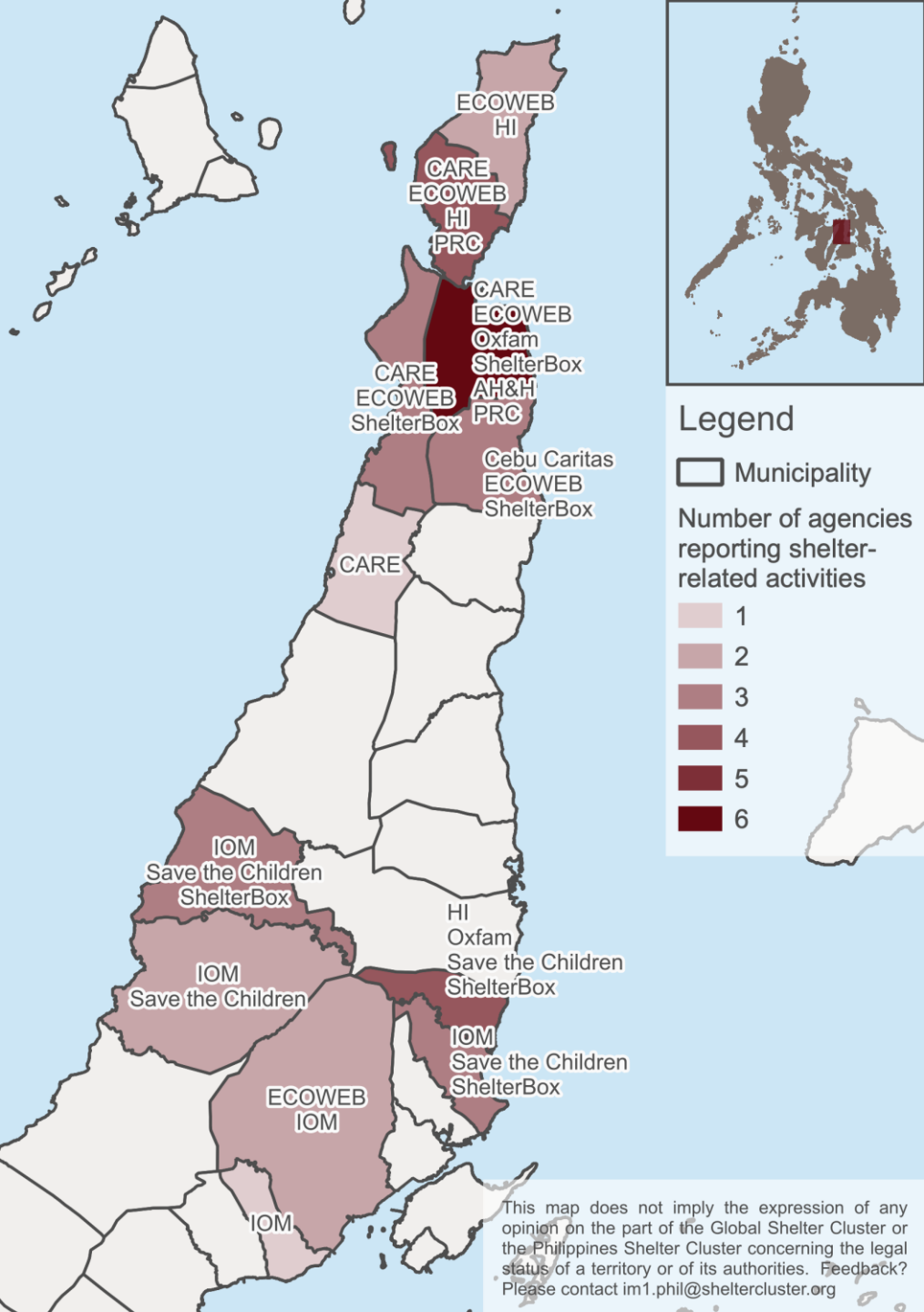


Number of families who remain displaced as of 26 January 2026 (DROMIC)



Number of households reached with shelter-related humanitarian assistance (5Ws)



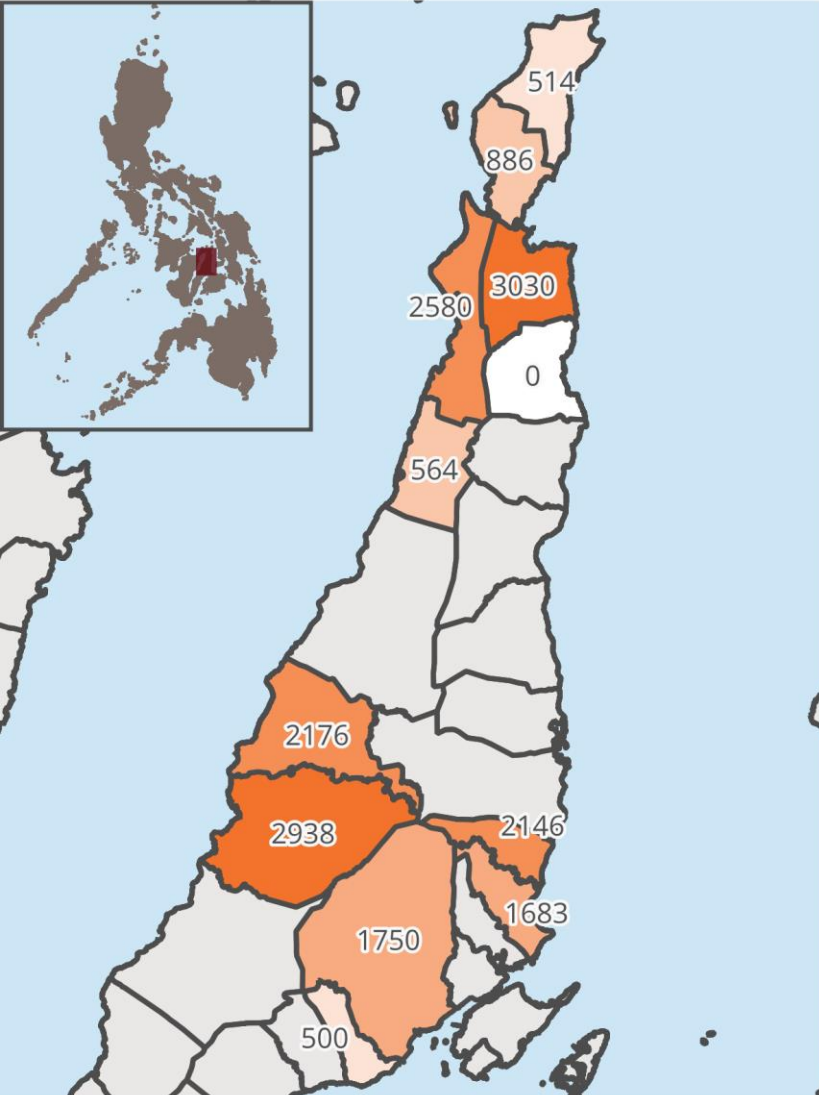

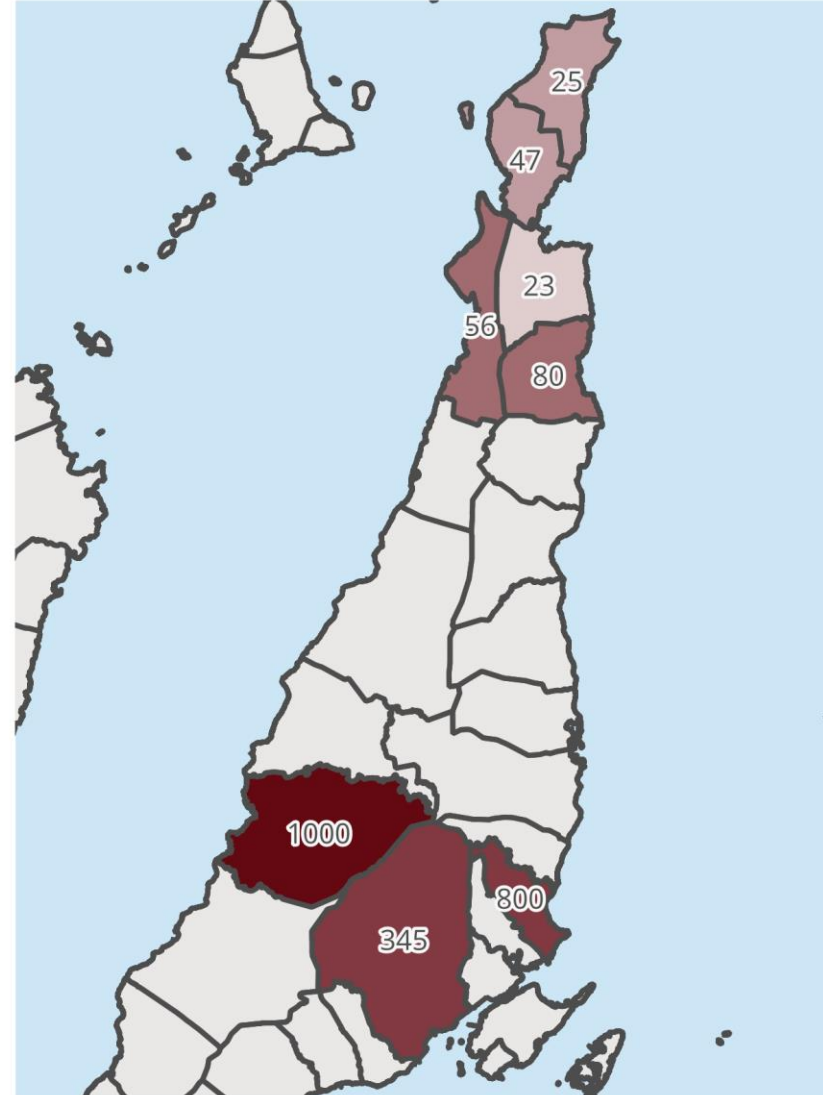

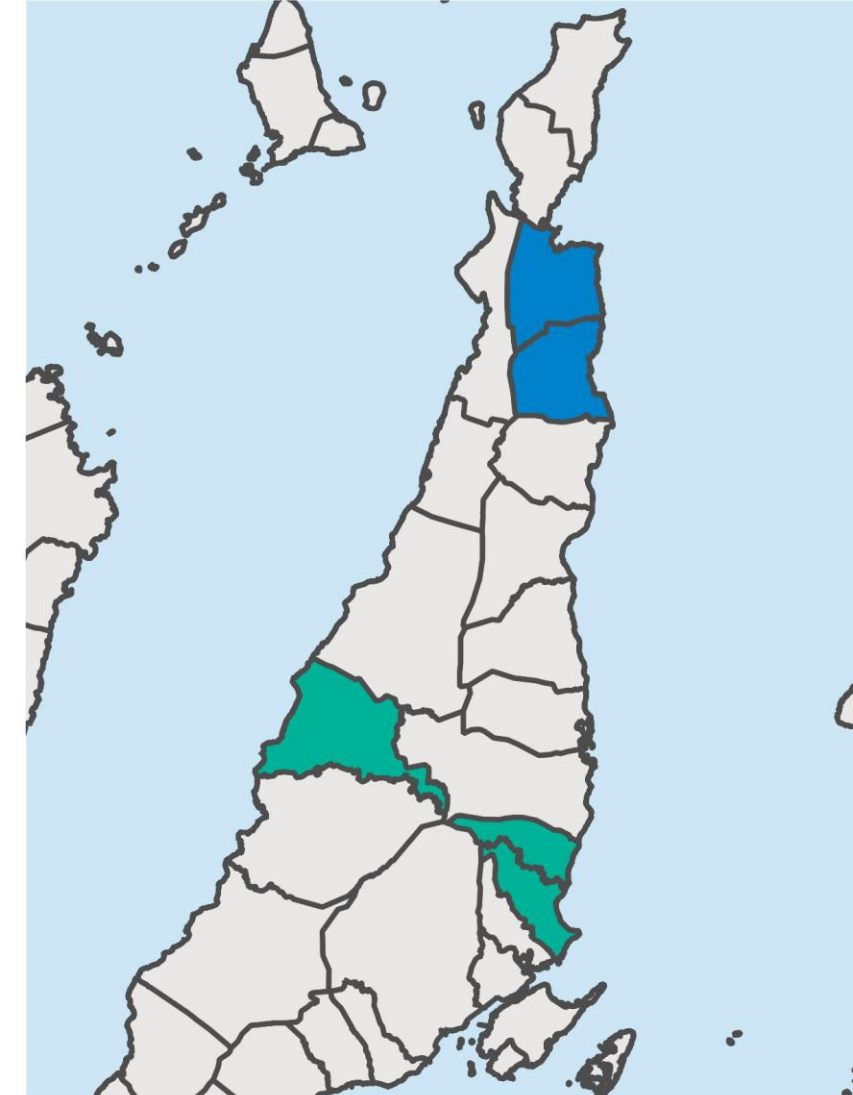

People reached with cash and microgrants to community groups

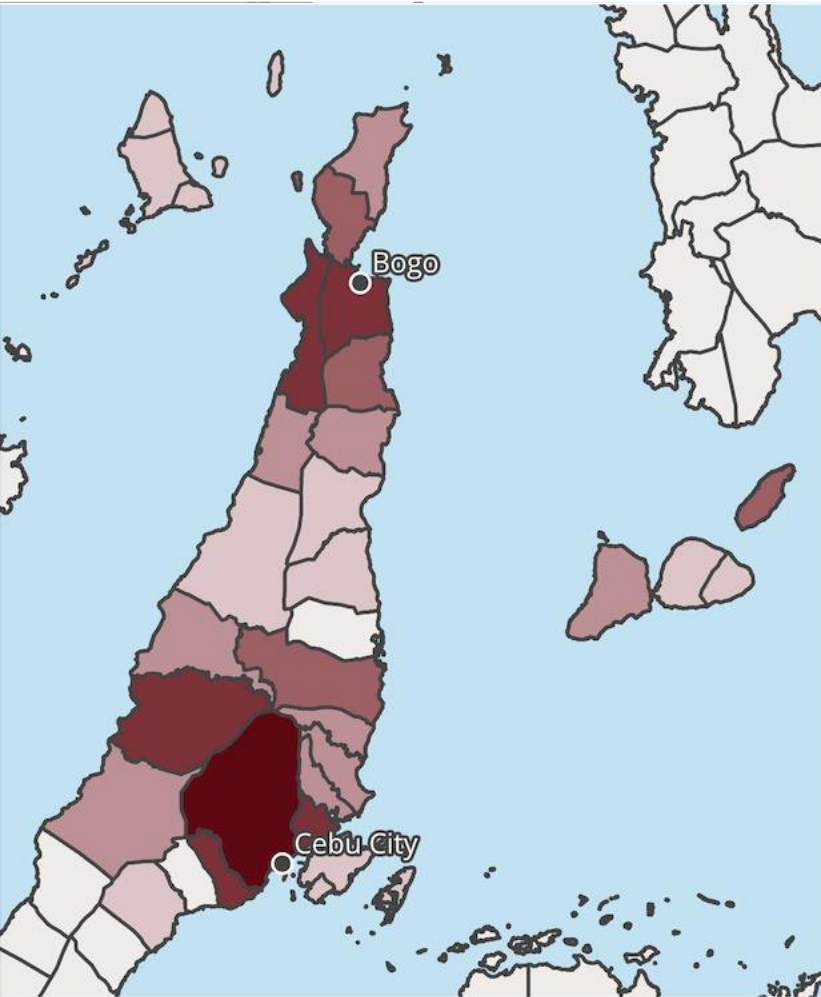

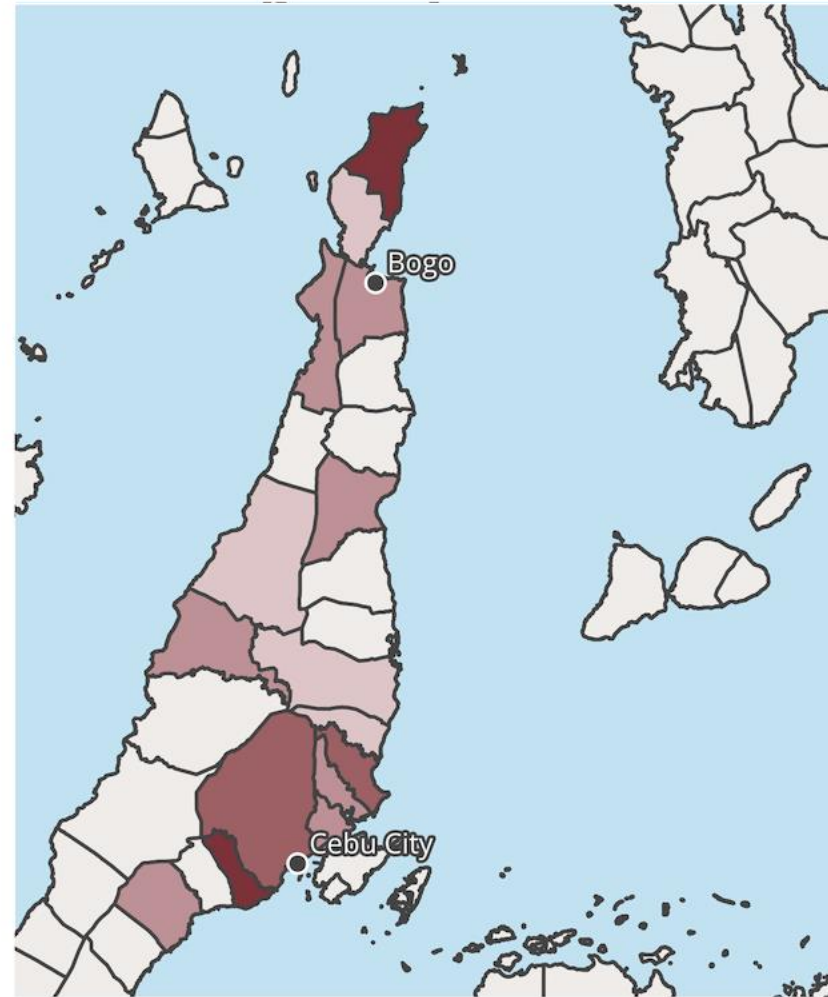

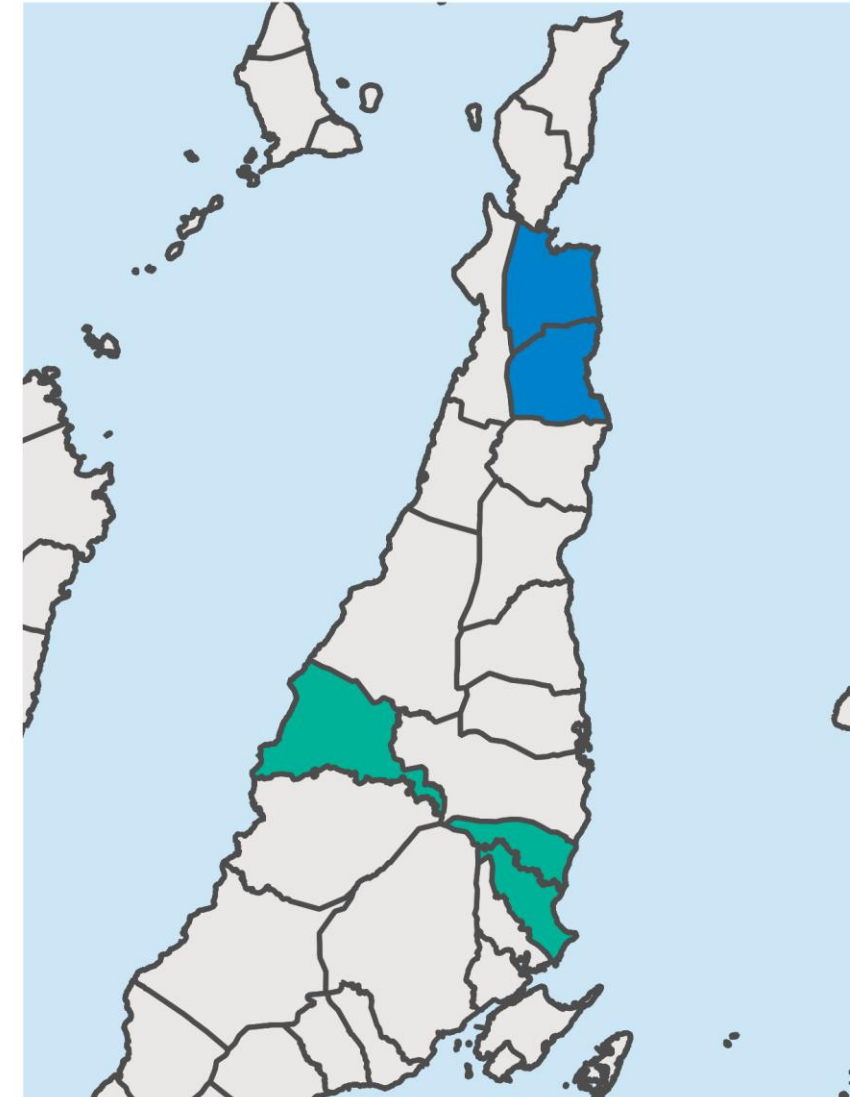
Number of houses totally damaged by typhoon and earthquake (DROMIC)

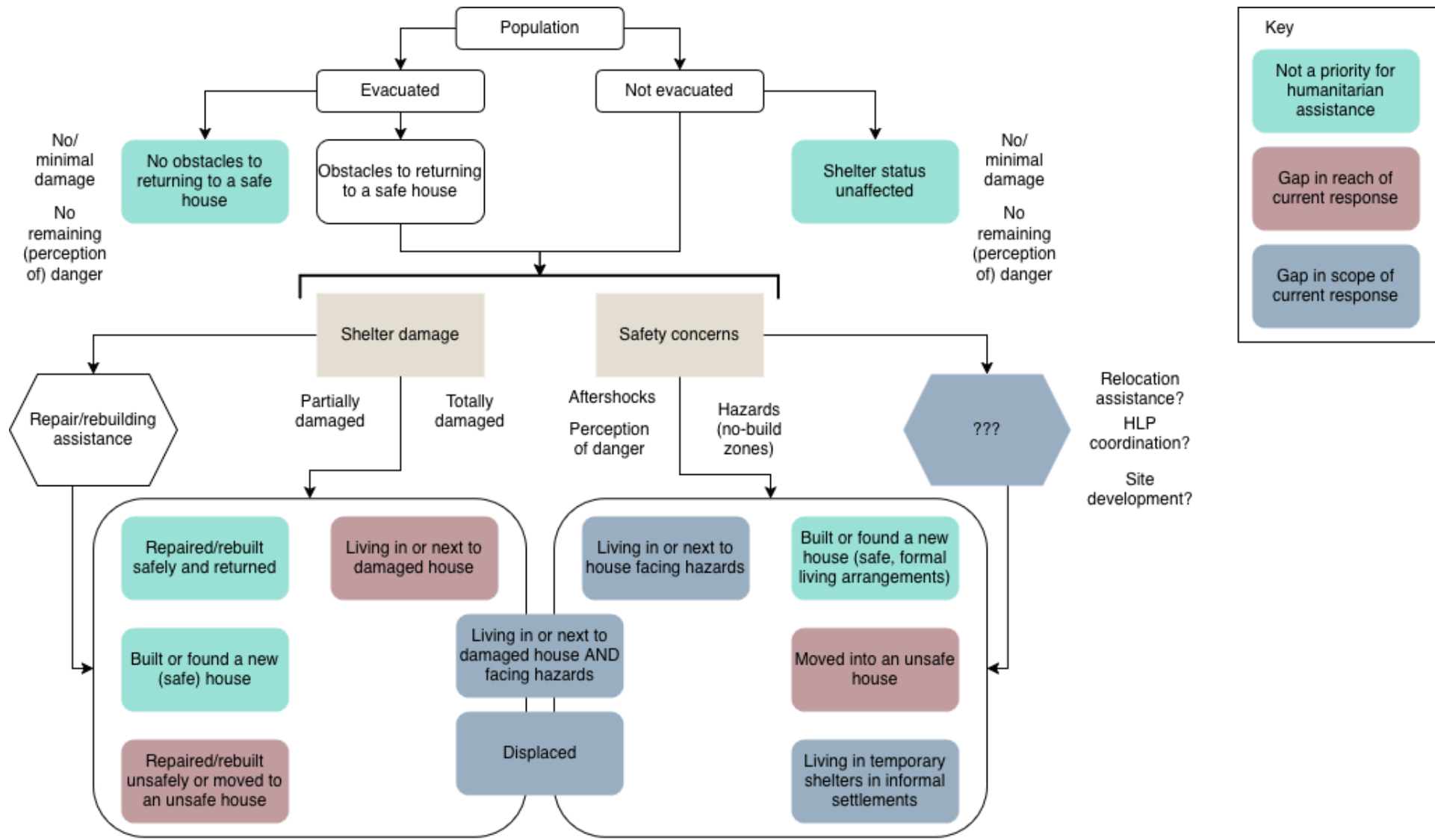

04. Recovery Shelter efforts

How to better guide and capture ongoing and planned assistance?

- **Revisit the 5W's reporting and mapping process** to capture the different shelter intervention types, to include outstanding **emergency relief assistance, temporary shelter assistance options, and long-term shelter assistance solutions**, in line with the national framework for shelter recovery and the humanitarian shelter guidelines for recovery – **PSC** coordination team and **OCHA**
- Finalise the **development of guidance on concrete and masonry construction techniques for house repair and reconstruction**, including IEC materials to fit within the "8 key Messages for BBS" - **TWiG** co-led by **IOM and Care**

04. Recovery Shelter efforts

How to better guide shelter programming for planned assistance?

- **Build on and further contextualise** the [Philippines Shelter Cluster's Recovery Shelter Guidelines](#), to provide a concrete menu of options to help humanitarian partners in targeting, planning, and delivering the most adequate shelter assistance interventions to address specific needs
- **Work hand in hand with DHSUD** to operationalise the national [Post-Disaster-Shelter Recovery Policy Framework](#), in articulation with existing humanitarian guidelines, to build a responsive system to support resilient and equitable recovery in the Philippines

04. Recovery Shelter efforts

How to better measure impact and guide priority assistance?

- Further development of the **Shelter Severity Classification (SSC) mapping tool** for the Philippines context, to better represent **pre-existing housing vulnerabilities, post-disaster house damage impact, and resulting shelter needs, and progress and impact of shelter interventions**
- Finalise the “**House Damage Definition**” process to provide a **tangible and unified metric for house damage assessment** and for planning required assistance interventions – **TWiG** led by **DHSUD** with the support of the **PSC**

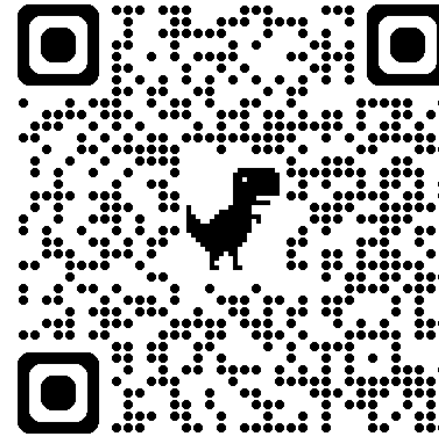
