- **928 disaster affected HH** (flood and fire) supported in Saraf Omra, Kelemando and Al Lait localities of **ND**.
- Newly displaced **SS refugees – 450 HH** supported with **NFIs** and **288 fire-affected HH** supported in **ND**.
- More than **4,000 conflict-affected IDPs** assisted in December and January in **WD**.
- Ongoing conflict in SLA-controlled **Jabal Marra** region (**CD**) – inaccessible, hence, clear displacement figures are unavailable. **SCI** can support **500 HH** while **DRC** has **370 NFI kits**.
- **54%** of the massive flood-affected caseload in **SD** with some **12,000 NFI kits** and ES. The response is still ongoing. Challenges include verification, prioritization and sustainability.

- ADRA provided assistance to **70HH** affected in **El Genina (WD) gathering sites**. Fire incidents continue in WD with HAC reporting **78 incidents** in **Habila and Morni**.



Situation:

- More than 16 villages have been burned (partially or totally) after an armed inter communal conflict between members of the Dajo and Rezeigat tribes in the Beleil locality of South Darfur. (3644 HHs).

Current Challenges:

- Verification of the real HHs. (distinguishing them from host IDP camps.)
- Lack of resources to cover the total caseload.
- Protection of resources after the distribution.
- Collaborating with WASH in order to have an impactful response.
- Cold winter nights.

Previous missions/Emergencies:

- Communal shelters for women and Children. (UPO, GFO and SRCS)
- Registration and psychosocial support.
- NFI Distribution to around 900 HHs. (Mainly blankets from GFO, SRCS, PHF)
- Assessment mission to Host IDP camps.
- Assessment mission to the burned villages.

Stock Capacity:

- Qatar charity, UNHCR, Alight will respond with 1470 family tents.
- IOM, SAO, HOPE, Alight will respond with 1855 NFI kits.

Future missions:

- Verification of the HHs.
- Distribution of tents in Fajalhalal.

Gaps:

- Durable shelter solutions.
- ES/NFI
- Operational cost for distribution and secondary assessments



- Lack of cluster **partner interest/engagement** affecting response planning.
- **Politically-related constraints** affecting assistance provision e.g., assistance delay to fire-affected communities at Genina gathering sites due to political agendas.
- **Insecurity affecting access** in Jabal Marra conflict-affected areas & delaying the response.
- **Lack of coordination from HAC**, exaggerated figures affecting/delaying the response.
- **Land issues** continue to be the main driver of intercommunal conflict, affecting the transitional or more substantial interventions.
- **Numbers** of beneficiaries and **needs continue to rise** due to conflict and natural disasters.
- **Lack of resources** limits emergency preparedness (prepositioning) and overall response capacity.
- **Effective S/NFI sub-national coordination** needed, supported by all cluster partners.
- **Harmonization and standardization** remain a key challenge, and still BoQs vary.
- **Innovation needed** in Shelter/NFI interventions considering supply/procurement issues.

- Fire in **Al Takamol Open Area, Sharg-an-Neel**, Khartoum.
- Tuesday evening, **17 January**.
- **Cause unknown**, presumed unattended cooking fire.
- **386 HH / 1,979 persons** affected.
- **One death**, 65-year-old male; **8 minor injuries** reported.
- **Nearly entire over-congested settlement destroyed**, as informal shelters burned rapidly.
- **Fourth and most extreme fire** in six years at location.



Response:

- Comprehensive **NFI distribution** to all 386 affected **HH**.
- **Hot meals** for three days, **water trucking**.
- Increased **health services, dignity kits**.
- In-kind **food** donation for SSD embassy, refugee and host communities.
- **UNHCR, COR Khartoum, COOPI, NRC, WHO/MOH**.

Gaps:

- Food, CBI, shelter materials*, school kits, and protection responses.



Long term response plan/s:

- **Intention survey and engagement with authorities** on long term solutions.
- **Limited space** at current location **does not allow for reconstruction in line with standards** for similar numbers.
- **Local/government resistance** to continued presence of refugee community, **pressure for relocation**.
- If it comes to **voluntary relocation**, provided a **suitable site** is identified and **sufficient resources allocated, shelter and settlement situation of SS refugees may improve significantly**.
- **BUT**, there are still a lot of **IFs** and the **feasibility** as well as **implications** of this approach **still remain unclear**.



- On 17 November, fighting erupted between armed forces in Fashoda County, Upper Nile State, displacing thousands of civilians in multiple locations.
- The armed conflict in South Sudan Upper Nile State forced South Sudanese nationals to flee their homes to cross border to Sudan. The new arrivals were entered Kordofan through Al Amira reception center in El Leri and through Gedeid, Gerid and Al Serajia Abu Jubayhah.



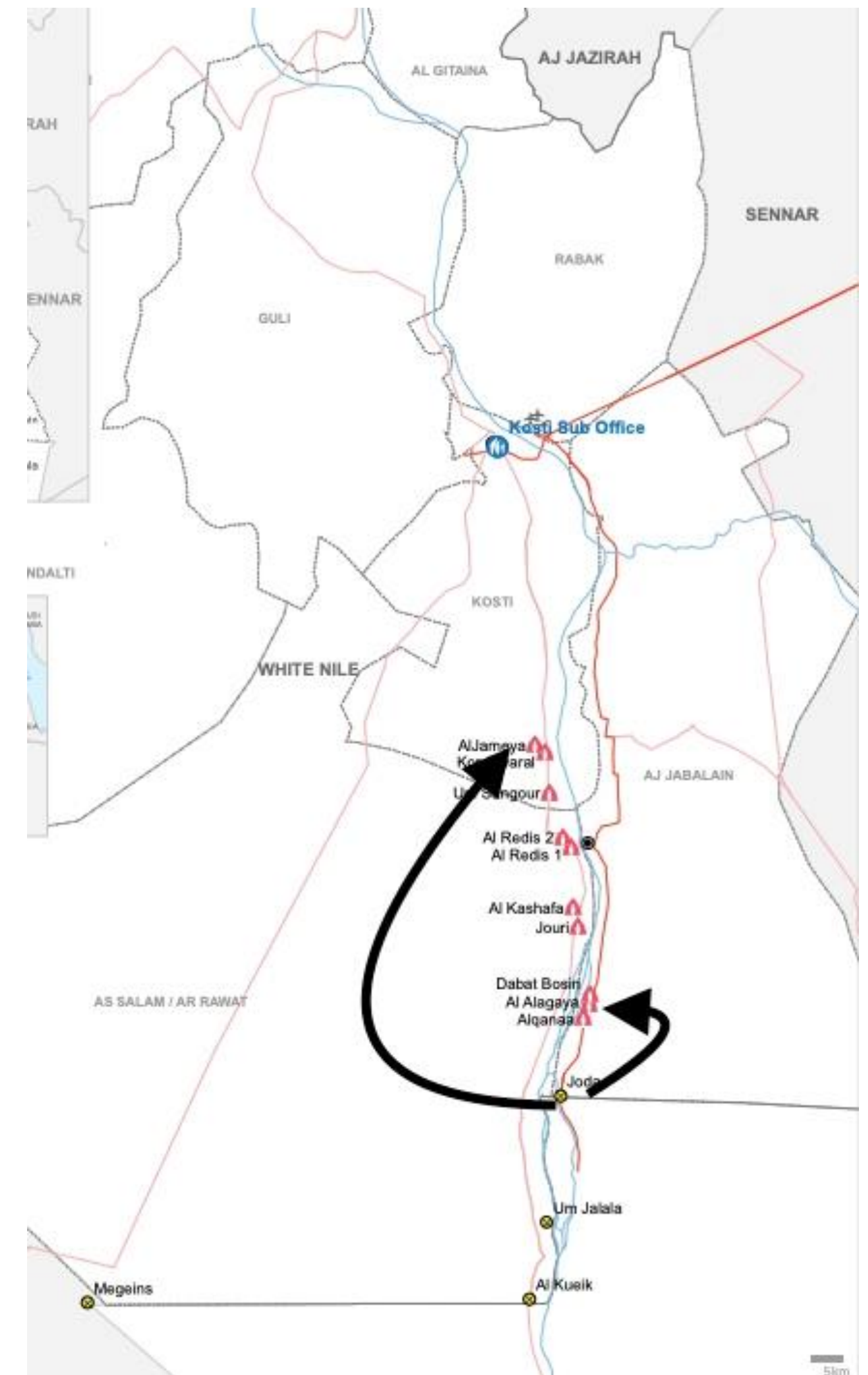

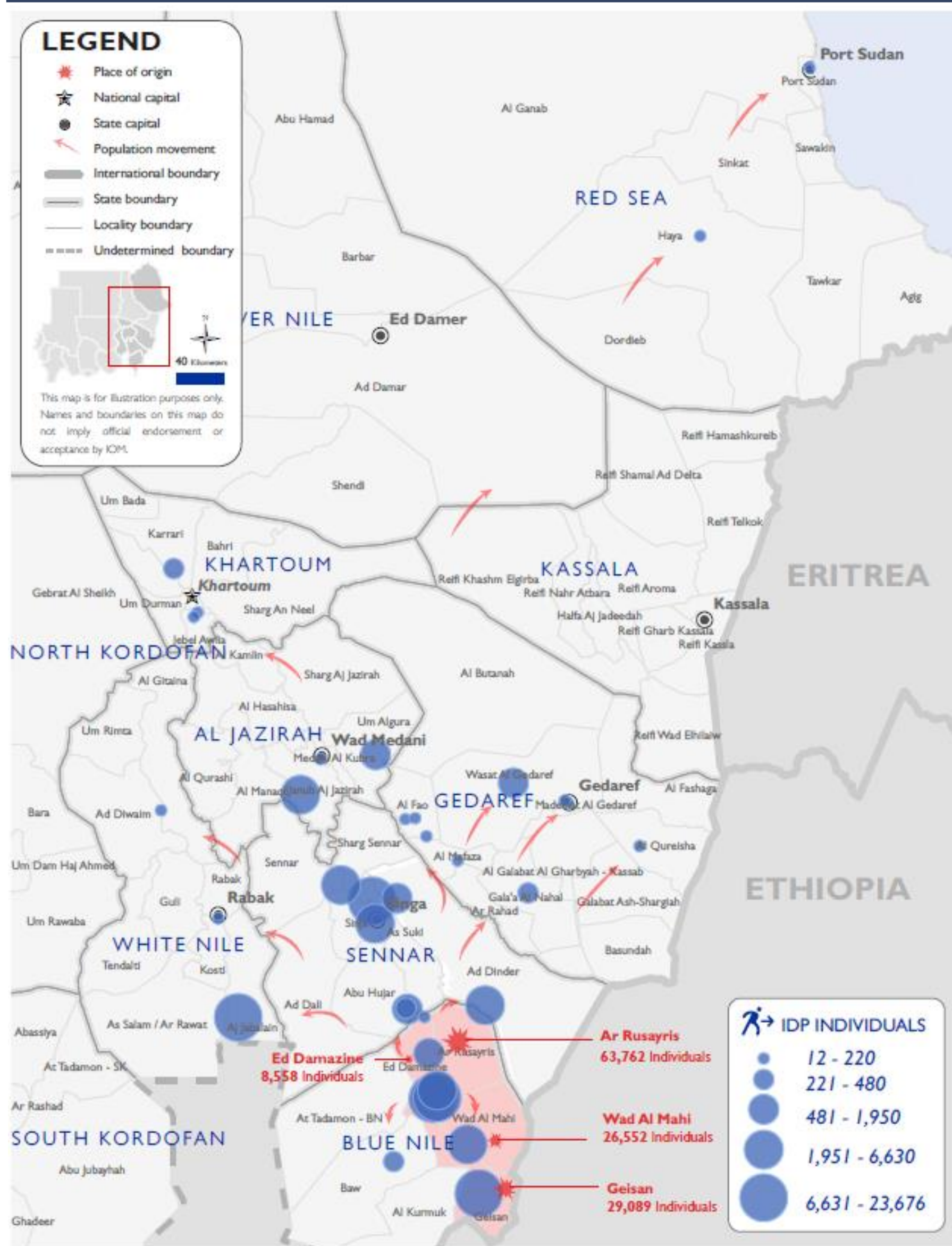
- Total of **678** households new arrivals with total **1741 individuals** biometrically registered jointly by UNHCR and COR from 10 to 26 Dec 2022. All the new arrivals in Al Ieri covered by biometric registration, 29 new arrivals have only been covered by level 1 registration.
- UNHCR Save the children distributed NFIs for **518 HH** new arrivals refugees' families in Al Ieri during December 2022.
- On 6 December 2022, the humanitarian actors working in the eastern corridor of South Kordofan State led by UNHCR Abu Jubayhah Office conducted joint rapid needs assessment for the new arrival's refugees in Gedeid and Gerid .
- NRC under their repaid response mechanism (RRM) fund conducted rapid needs assessment for the new arrivals in Al Ieri from 15 – 18th of Dec, 2022. Based on the findings of the assessment cash assistance was distributed to **696 HH** and a total of **1661 HH** new arrivals in Al Ieri in the period 14 to 16 Jan 2023.
- On 22 Dec 2022 NRC distributed NFIs for **200 HH** new arrivals refugees' families in Gedeid
- Save the children in close coordination with the UNHCR and COR distributed shelter materials to **400 PSNs** within the old refugee population in the eastern corridor (150 families in Abu Jubayhah, 100 hhn Al Serajia, 75 families in Gedeid and 75 families in Gerid).
- From 21 – 26 Dec 2022 UNHCR through Save the Children International distributed NFIs for **1174 households** most vulnerable old refugees families at Darbatti refugees' settlement in Al Ieri with total of **5,870 individuals**.



- White Nile State has witnessed an increase in the influx of refugees coming from South Sudan in the past three months entering from Jouda.
- There have been **6143** individuals have arrived to WNS from South Sudan.
- **2847 individuals (632 HH)** have been transported by UNHCR and located in Al-Jameya Camp in Alsalam locality.
- Remaining populations have self located , mainly to Al-Jameya camp. Most of them live with relatives/friends currently residing in those camps.
- UNHCR has provided through partners 500 family kits.
- Biometric registration started on the 23rd of Jan, this will allow for the provision of assistance to the new households (mainly food).
- 30-40 HH from Al-Nuer tribe were located to the Eastern Camps in Aljabaleen.







- Since mid-July, at least 127,961 people have reportedly been displaced. Security situation has generally improved though with sporadic minor clashes
- On 13-14 January 2023 in Wad Al Mahi locality clashes broke out between Funj communities and security forces resulting in 4 deaths including one from Sudanese Armed Forces
- In Blue Nile state, out of 4,047 HH of IDPs assessed during October 2022 IRNA, 1,779 HH in Nusaiba school and Abu Elfayed center are still pending NFI distribution from IOM/DOSHA (2,000 kits in final stage of dispatch from their national pipeline). Recommended items are blankets, sleeping mats, mosquito nets and jerrycans
- In Sennar state, 738 HH in Um Shuka, Mayrno, Galdi, Al Dindil and Sharqi Sinnar are pending NFI distribution from the UNHCR Khartoum decentralized stock.



- On **20 December 2022**, torrential rains and flash floods invaded Port Sudan Town, inundating vast parts of the town, destroying or damaging houses, cutting off the main roads and power supply, and leading to the closing of the schools for two days.
- An intersectoral assessment 26 - 27 December 2022
- 19 Sector and Programme staff from United Nations Agencies, Fund and Programmes (UNAFPs), NGOs and government institutions



- **Key findings**

- Flash flooding and heavy rains have affected about 1,416 houses in Port Sudan (Eastern , Southern and Central segment of Port Sudan) town of which, 1,171 houses were partially damaged and 245 others have completely collapsed, leaving about 1,143 families (about 5,715 people) without proper shelter, in about 42 residential neighborhoods.
- The three main markets in the central segment were completely flooded, as well as houses around the market.
- Unofficial reports (unverified) indicated that at least four people including one child died during the flooding while the official report revealed the death of one child.
- Some of the affected families particularly in eastern segment were reported having left their homes to more safer places including joining their relatives in the nearby neighborhoods. A big number of houses in Salalab (Block 6 & 8) and Daim Alnour neighborhoods were observed apt to falling.
- In effect, most of the areas affected by the flooding initially lack the minimum basic services and proper shelter; their living conditions have been complicated more due to the recent flooding crisis.

- **Update, response and gaps in terms of S/NFI**

- **Recommendation**

The assessment team recommended prioritizing targeting 1,143 families whose houses either partially damaged or completely collapsed, in about 42 residential neighborhoods in Port Sudan Town.

Distribution of full Emergency Shelter/Non-Food Items (ES/NFI) packages including kitchen; restocking (goats, and sheep);

- **Response**

IOM Khartoum committed 1,400 ES/NF kits (blankets, mosquito nets and plastic sheet)

- **Gaps**

Head count verification.

Provision of ES/NFI (remaining NFI kits). Cooking sets are highly needed

Number of people still in need: to be confirmed after the head count that will be conducted by IOM
