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- In **WD**, **606 HH** affected by **fire** incidents were supported with **shelter and NFI kits** by cluster partners (**IOM, SORR-UNHCR**) at **409 HH** Geneina Salah Eldeen IDPs in Gathering site, **124 HH** Kereinik Locality Morni, **51 HH** from Geneina, **17 HH** Sirba Swanei Wirjkei, **5 HH** Kulbus Hajar Toir.
- **1,050 HH** in Jabal Moon locality were supported with NFI kits by Cluster partners (**IOM**); **820 HH** returnees; Haskanita, **427 HH** Umdrisaya, **96 HH**, Krokro, **224 HH**, Gozaya **42 HH**, Gergigergi **31 HH**; **230 HH** vulnerable nomad host community; Umlaota **40 HH**, Umjanah **50 HH**, Gebishat **30 HH**, Umsiala **40 HH**, Albasham **30 HH**, Mastriha **40 HH**.
- The WD shelter NFIs partner participated in an **ICCG inter-cluster assessment** at **Krinding** Geneina locality to assess the situation of services available for the preparedness of the Geneina IDP's return-relocation.
- Through the **SHF RfE** allocation, **SORR** has secured **\$2M** to support the rehabilitation and construction of **semi-permanent** shelter response for the most vulnerable **returnees** in Geneina locality (Krinding) and Kereinik locality.
- In **CD 927 HH** supported with NFI kits and WASH kits by cluster partners (**IOM**) at Brindisi **427 HH**, Mukjar **500 HH**.
- Through **CBI**s in **CD 1,542HH**, were supported with **CfS** in **992HH** at Wadi Salih/ Um Khair final installment and **550 HH** (**238 HH** Azum and **312HH** Bedisi) received the first installment.

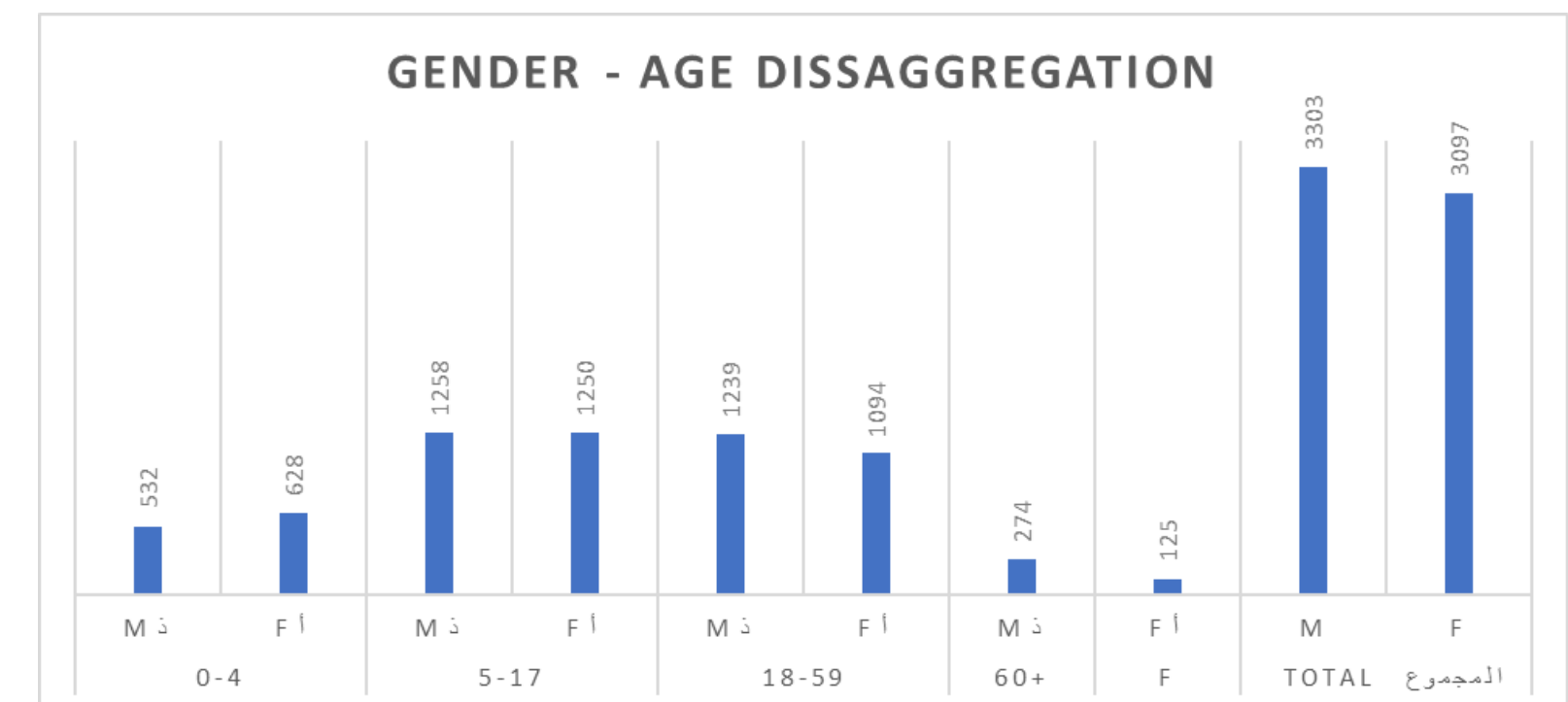
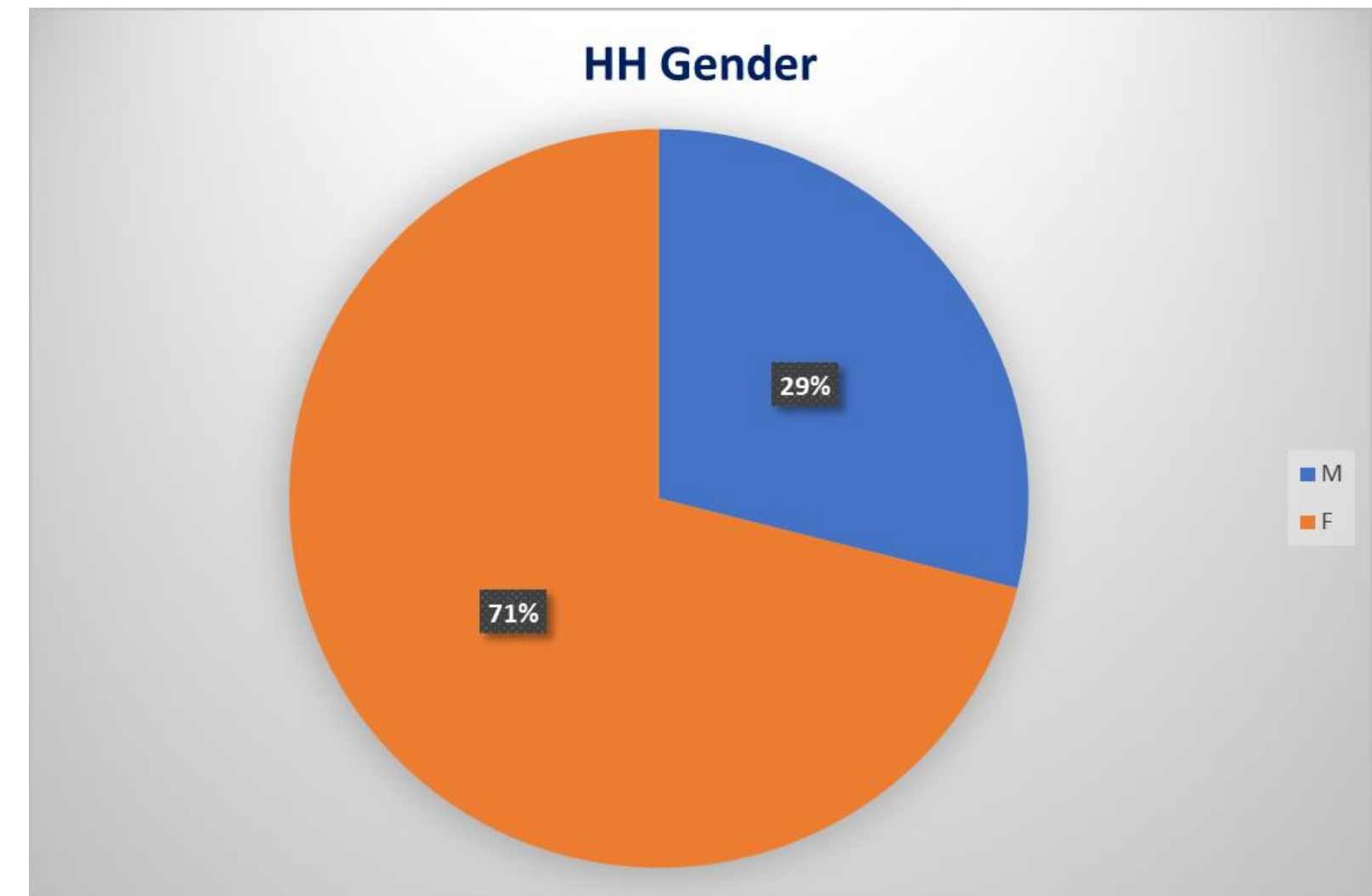
- SNFI Partner **SCI** has prepositioned **700** pieces of **plastic sheeting** for emergency. **100 NFI kits** are at the procurement stage in Khartoum. SCI also conducted the **PDM** for the **500 HH** support with NFI items at Tuktoka.
- **Fire incidents** are on the increase, accidental at the household level and through arson attacks.
- **Lack of harmonized NFI kits** across partners affects standardized response for the affected communities.
- **Shortage of resources and capacity** to respond to emerging and current needs as partners reported funding gaps for 2023.
- **Crime** in the state towns has been on the increase.
- **Insecurity has affected access** for prepositioning NFIs for the response to conflict-affected communities in Central Darfur.
- **Politically-related constraints** and continuities were affecting the provision of assistance to Geneina gathering sites causing delays.
- **The lack of storage facilities** in central Darfur has affected the prepositioning of NFIs and subsequently affected the timely response.





- **Fire** incident reported the **March 2** in Saraf Umra locality in **ND**, 271 km from El Fasher. The fire was started by an unknown gunmen driving a motorcycle. A total of **727 HH** were affected (4,362 individuals), out of which nearly **15% are children under five**. A total of **64 homes** were **completely burned** and **74** were **looted**.
- The needs remain high for NFIs, water supply, latrines, and health services in the area.
- **Plan International** has provided **64 HH** with NFI kits, and **IOM** provided a total of **250 blankets**. **IOM** and **UNHCR** have assisted **104 HH** with kitchen sets.

- **Fire Incident:** On **14 March 2023**, a **fire incident** was reported in **Gereida IDP camp** of Gereida locality, South Darfur. Reportedly, **87 houses** were **completely burnt down** due to the fire.
- On **2 March**, an unattended fire in **Donkey Dereis village** caused **fire** outbreak that killed **five children** and **injured four**. The fire caused extensive damage to houses and property including food stocks, cash crops, livestock while the traders in the market lost commercial goods.
- Community Leaders provide the population estimate that **9,369** persons were affected out of which **6,694** out of which are children.
- Damage of estimated 20,000 sacks of millet, 519,000 sacks of unshelled groundnuts, 27 grinding mills, 40 cows/goats, 100 donkey carts, unspecified quantities of seeds/ agricultural tools, **2,031 household shelter/ shops** (Tukuls, Rakubas, etc.) completely burnt belonging to estimated **9,369** people (**1,220 households**) out of which **6,694** out of which are children.
- Currently, people are living together in **15 groups** of population at **big shelters** constructed from **local material** while others staying at **open areas** and some **under trees** without proper safeguards for family members.
- The affected families lost household assets including blankets, jerry cans, sleeping mats and kitchen set.
- **Freedom of Movement:** affected people reported their free and safe movement in and out of the village at all times as no restriction.



Main Priorities:

- Overall priorities include emergency shelter and NFI, WASH: hygiene, sanitation and latrines, agricultural inputs, and education. IOM to conduct rapid verification and registration for the affected population.
- **Shelter:** high need for Emergency Shelter and NFI. Shelter and WASH sectors need to coordinate on the installation of tents and latrines.
- **WASH:** Replacement of the broken solar panels to resume pumping. To coordinate with SWC to operate the station plus the construction of additional water points.
- **FSL:** Currently there is no need for emergency food assistance, however due to the loss of crops, there is an anticipated need for agricultural inputs.
- **Protection:** Provision of hygiene kits, especially for women such as dignity kits. Targeting approximately 1300 women under productive age as individual (according to the final verification), founding and training of Women Care givers on topics such as traditional customs such as FGM and early marriage and domestic violence, establishment of case reporting and compliant mechanisms, train women on Disaster and Risk Reduction including topics on fire prevention, flood prevention and management.





- On **March 23**, a **fire** broke out in **Al-Serdabeh village** of **Al Khiwai** locality, West Kordofan. IOM Field teams report that **22 houses** were **destroyed** by the fire, and a **school** was **partially damaged**.
- Households Report that **all personal belongings** have been **lost** in the fire, and there is a need for NFI support.
- All affected households have been **displaced** and are currently seeking shelter with their **relatives** in the **same village**.
- On **March 25**, a fire broke out in **Jalli village** in **An Nuhud** locality, West Kordofan. Field teams report that **60 houses** were **completely burnt down**, and **four houses** were **partially damaged** during the incident.
- More information is to be obtained as an interagency assessment is currently being planned to gauge the needs. An OCHA meeting is set to be held this coming week to discuss the needs

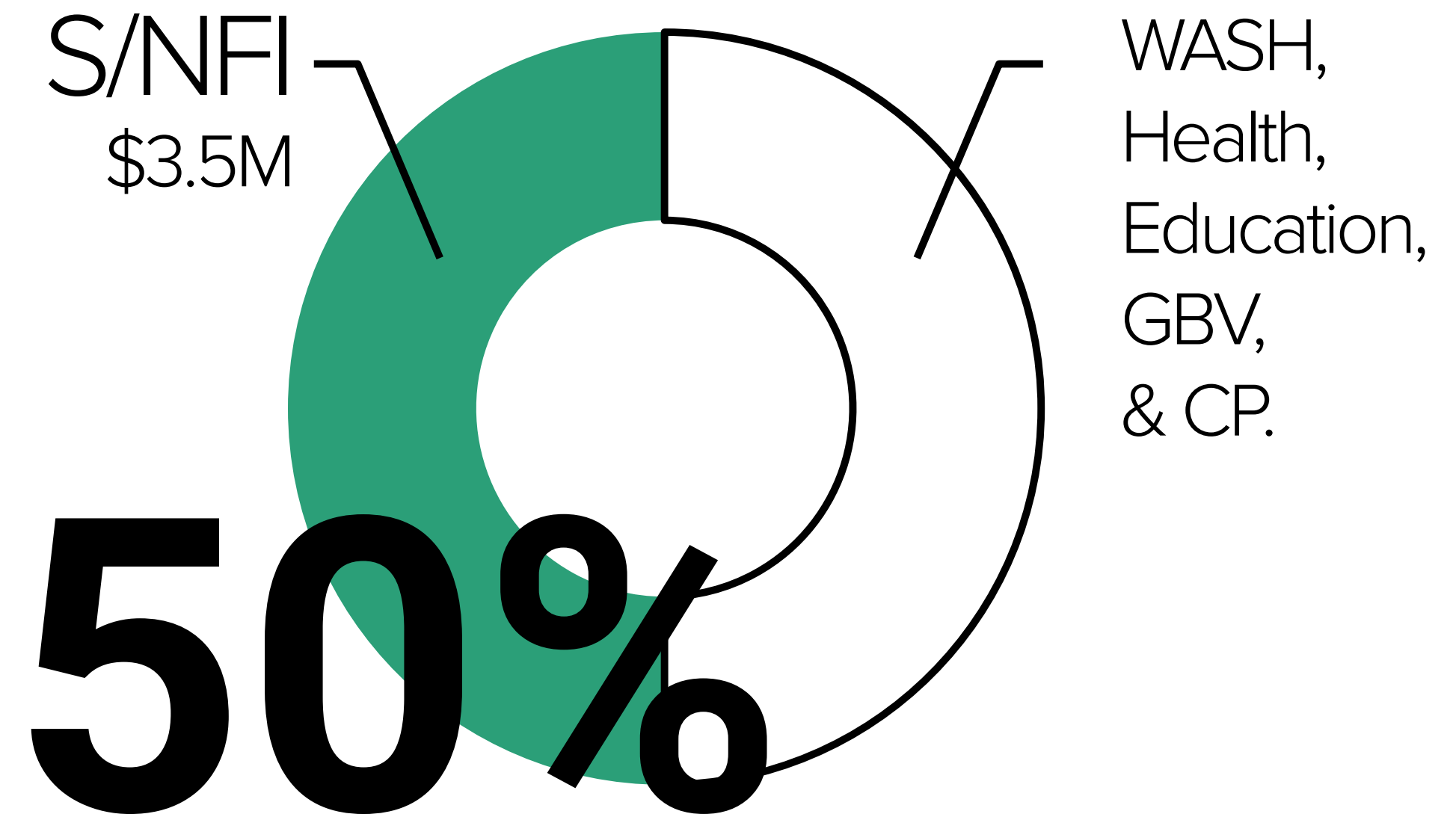
Based on the Allocation Strategy – so still not final but pretty certain.

Several emergencies from 2022 – SHF has provide initial support through ERRM mechanisms, however now **protracted support** is required, or where support is required for **return**.

- **West Darfur: SORR** – **2M** for more durable shelter for Kenrick and (Krinding?) returnees + support for Genina town – *25,538 people*.
 - **East & South Darfur: Alight** – **1M** for the fire in Elneem IDP camp in ED and fire in Donkey Draiss in SD – *15,000 people*.
 - **KRT: COOPI** – **0.5M** for the Al Takamol fire-affected refugees – *1,850 people*.
- + **UNHCR 2M** for the Prepositioning of the Stock – *57,500 people* so **5.5M altogether**.

The **Standard Allocation** will provide additional funding to these areas, where needed, taken into consideration this allocation by identifying additional longer-term needs.

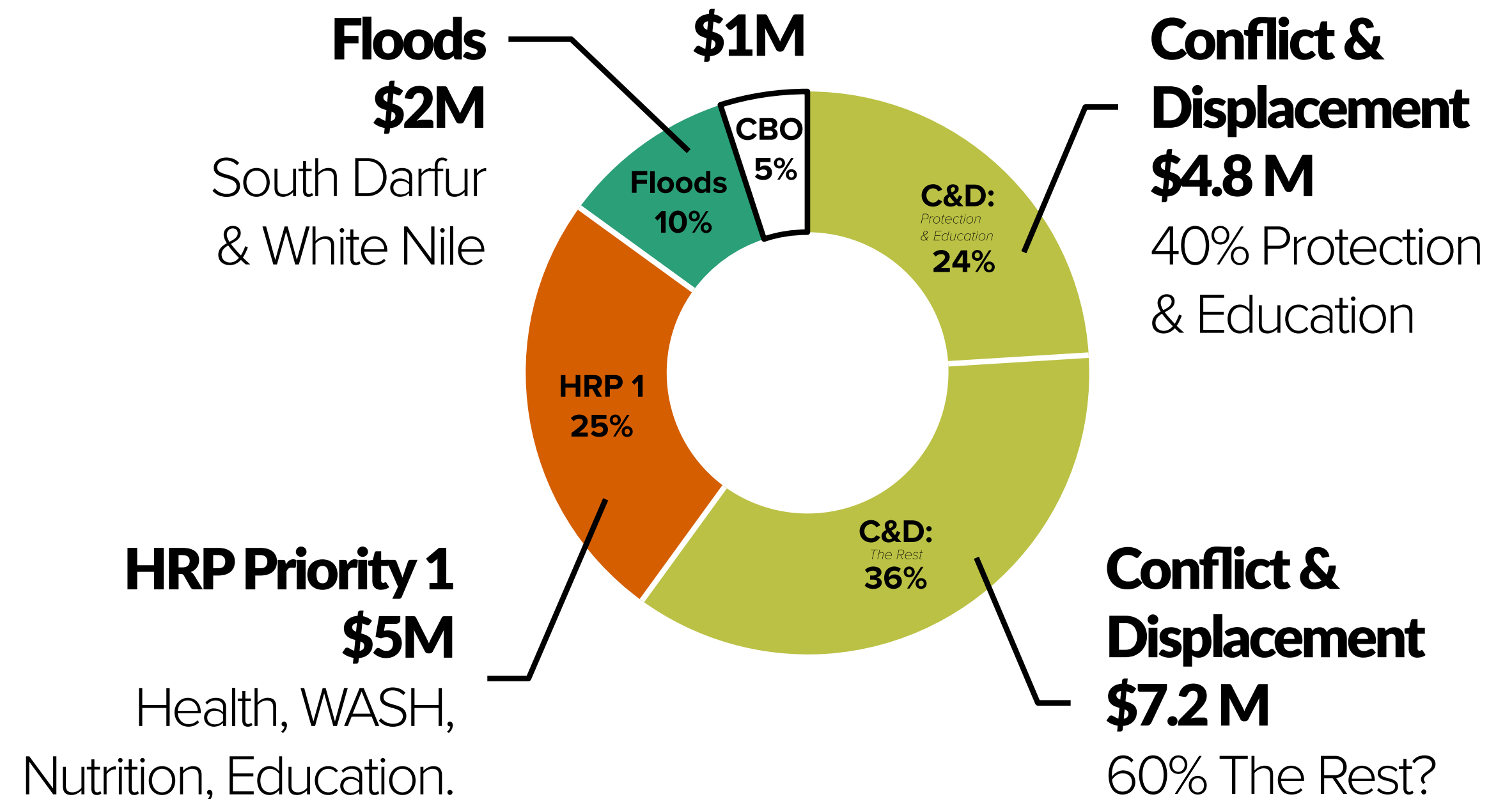
RfE Allocation - \$7M

- Please note that the below are the very first concepts of the allocations and might still change.
- The leading thought is to focus the \$20M Standard Allocation even more to **emergency shocks**, by focusing on the **post-violence/crisis needs**.
- SHF's standard allocation 2023 **might have 4 components**.
- The **KfW \$100** million programme that runs over the next four years and targets six localities in 3 Darfur states: Beliel, El Fasher, Tawila in terms of localities matching SHF/HRP priorities.
- Proposals should be **multi-sectoral** with a strong focus on needs for **recently displaced** or **returnees**.

Standard Allocation - \$20M




➤ Strategic Advisory Group (SAG)




The SAG is a smaller strategic forum tasked with agile decision-making with following key responsibilities:

- Setting the strategic direction of the cluster, including drafting of relevant strategic documents, ToRs, guidance notes, etc.
- Facilitating the HRP process – MSNA, PiN & Severity, HNO, funding requirement calculation, HRP chapter, review of proposals, etc.
- Review pooled-fund parameters and strategies
- Acting as SRC when needed (e.g., to review SHF SA proposals)
- Advocacy/ Communications & Resource Mobilization strategies

- The Cluster Coordinator or his Co-Chair calls for the meetings based on needs, but at least. Ad-hoc meetings may be called by the chairperson or at the request of a SAG member, as appropriate.
- The meetings of the SAG will be held in Khartoum. If necessary, decision-making and endorsement can be taken virtually or through emails.
- A Call for Expression of Interest will be launched for the duration of two weeks, outlining the list of organizations that have the right to apply (only those with the proven track record with the cluster)
- During this time organizations will be able to register their interest through a brief online questionnaire. Each interested organization will need to nominate one focal point and one alternate.
- If more organizations apply than the SAG composition allows, the decision will be made by a majority vote across all cluster partners. The coordinator gets only one vote, while the broader coordination team will not participate. In case of a tie, the coordinator makes the final decision.

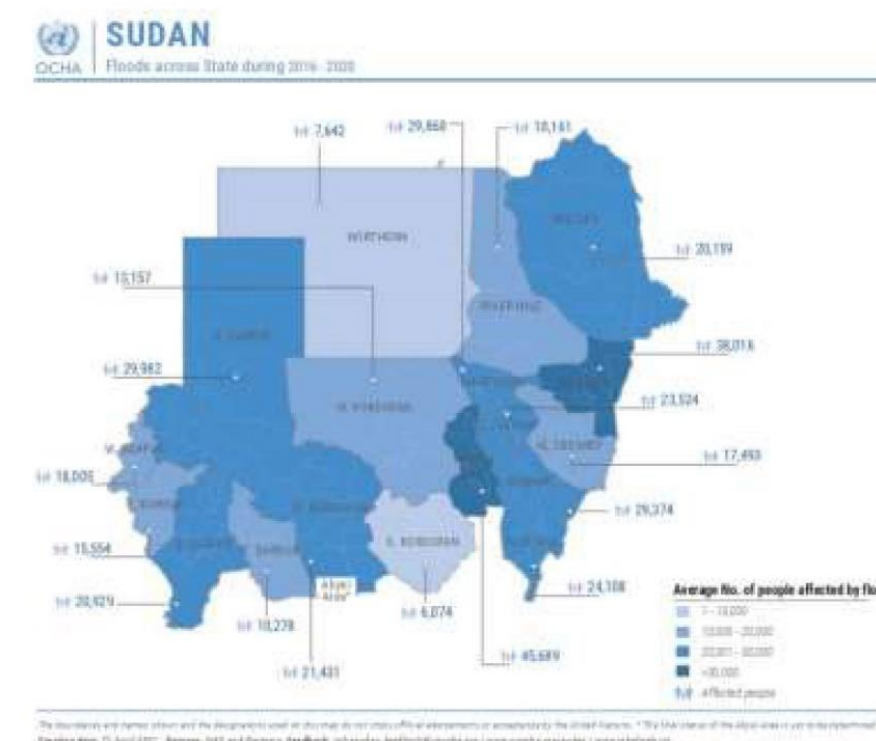
- Define **people affected** as assumption for 2023 based on historic data.

Flood Preparedness Response Plan

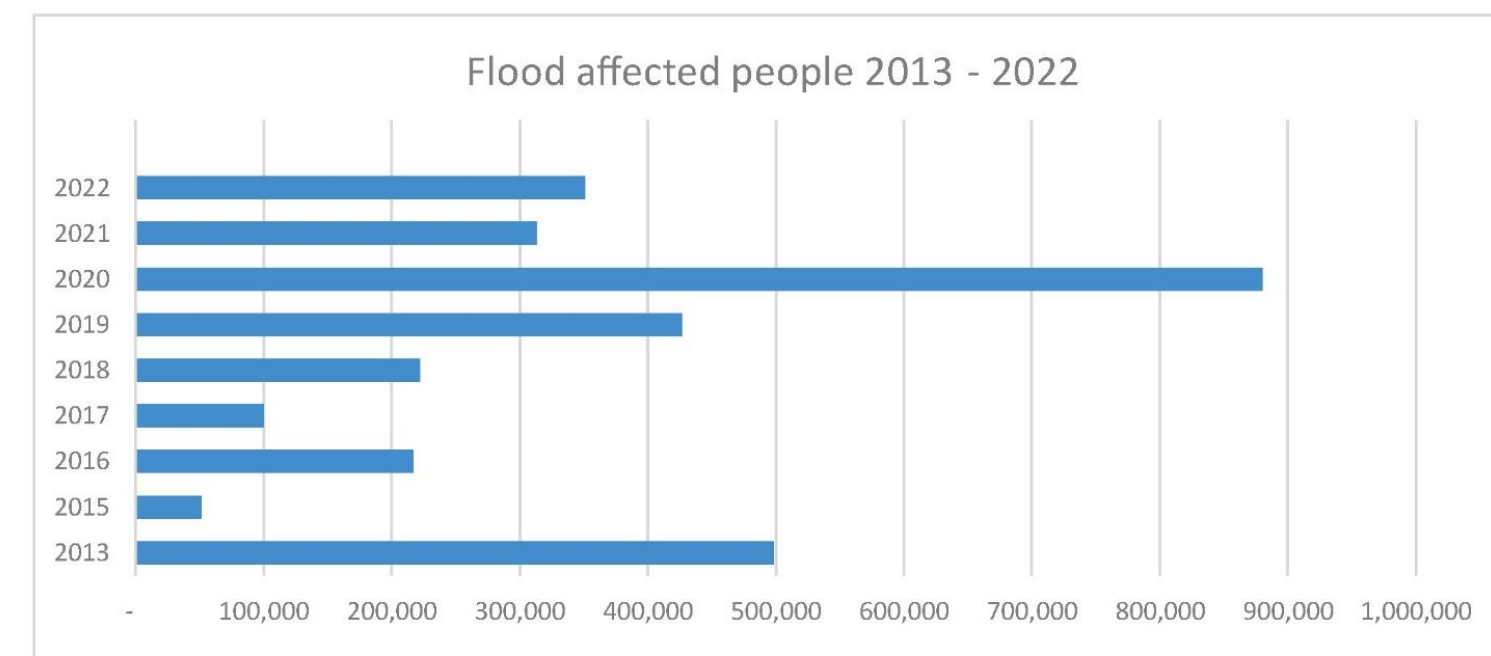
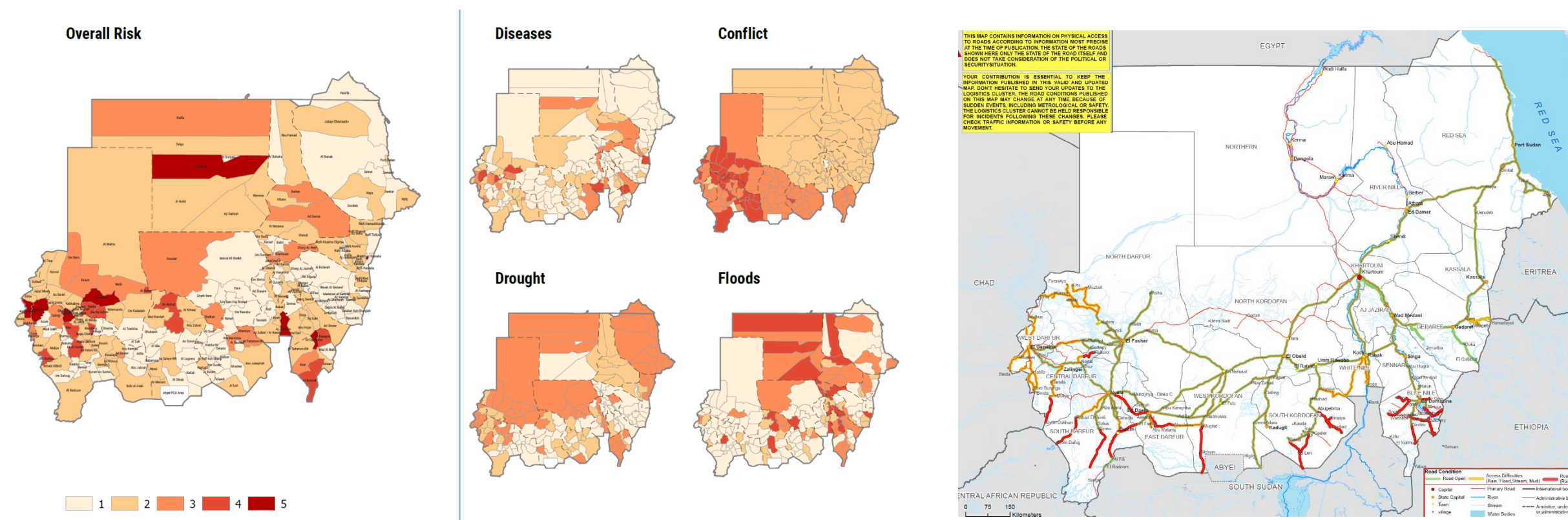
Background

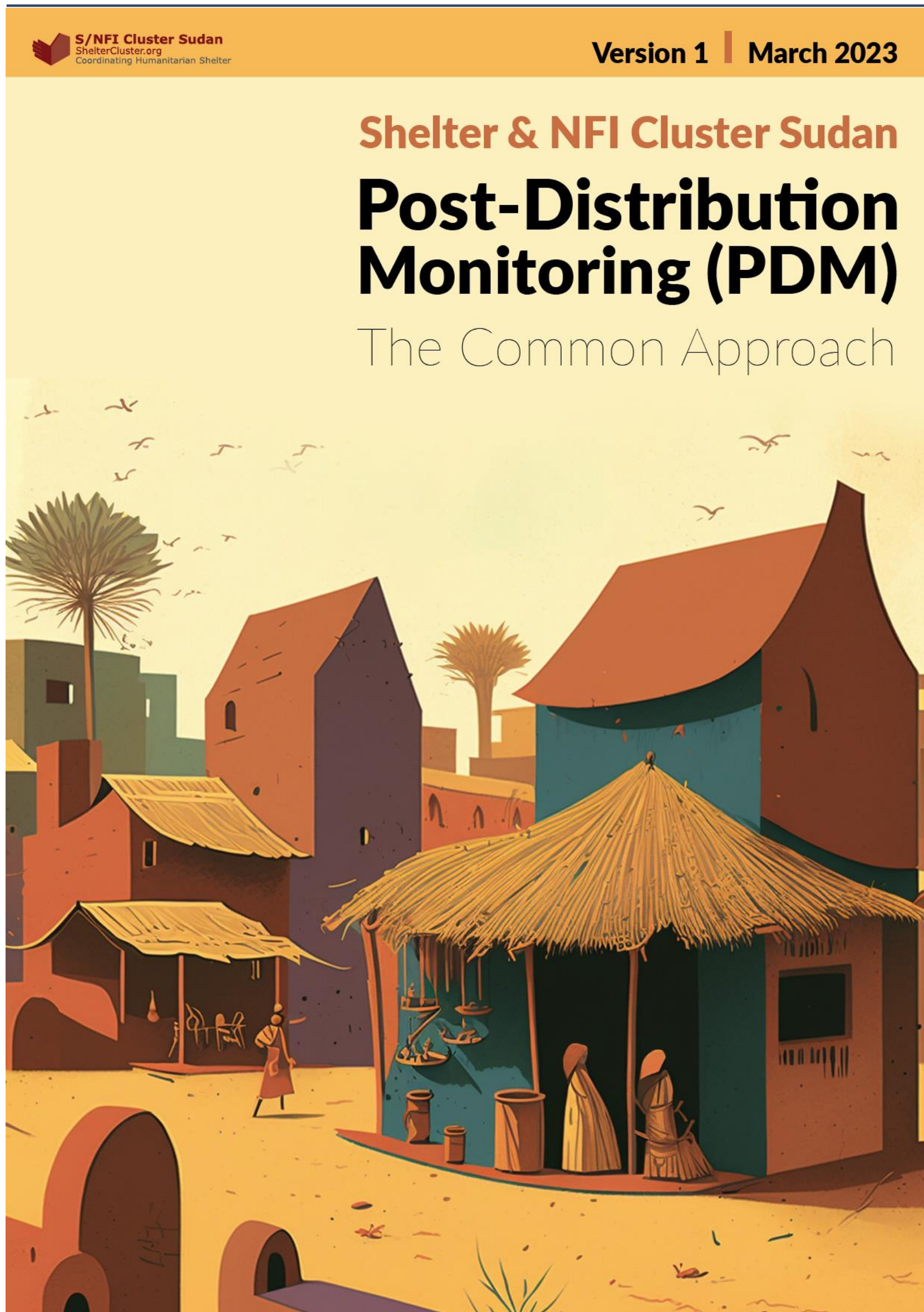
In support of the country wide 2021 Flood Preparedness and Response efforts, the SNFI Sector has developed the SNFI flood preparedness and response plan as reference to all stakeholders.

Heavy flooding recurs seasonally in Sudan, peaking from June to September. The northern part of the country which extends from Khartoum onwards has a rainfall of about 200 mm per annum, while the rainfall exceeds 700 mm per annum in the southern part of the country. In 2020, the country was affected by the worst flooding since 1988 with 16 states reaching water levels not seen for nearly a century. By October 2020, close to 900,000 people were affected in all 18 states, with more than 170,000 houses either destroyed or damaged. Early indications from the JJA and NOAA show that rainfall will be above-average from June to September 2021.



Given the high river levels and residual floodwaters after the 2020 floods, another consecutive year of flooding is likely in Sudan. Consequently, the number of the population at crisis levels of food insecurity is likely to increase during the flooding period, which also overlaps with the peak of the lean season.





- This document takes a **two-fold approach** to systematizing Post Distribution Monitoring (PDM) in the Shelter and NFI Cluster in Sudan.
- Firstly, it presents a **standardized framework** and emphasizes benefits of utilizing **shared digital tools** to consolidate PDM efforts at cluster level and unlock the potential for **collective learning**.
- Secondly, it offers **technical advice** and **practical guidance** for successfully **conducting PDM exercises** across the five key stages of the process.

Kobo-Stock mapping

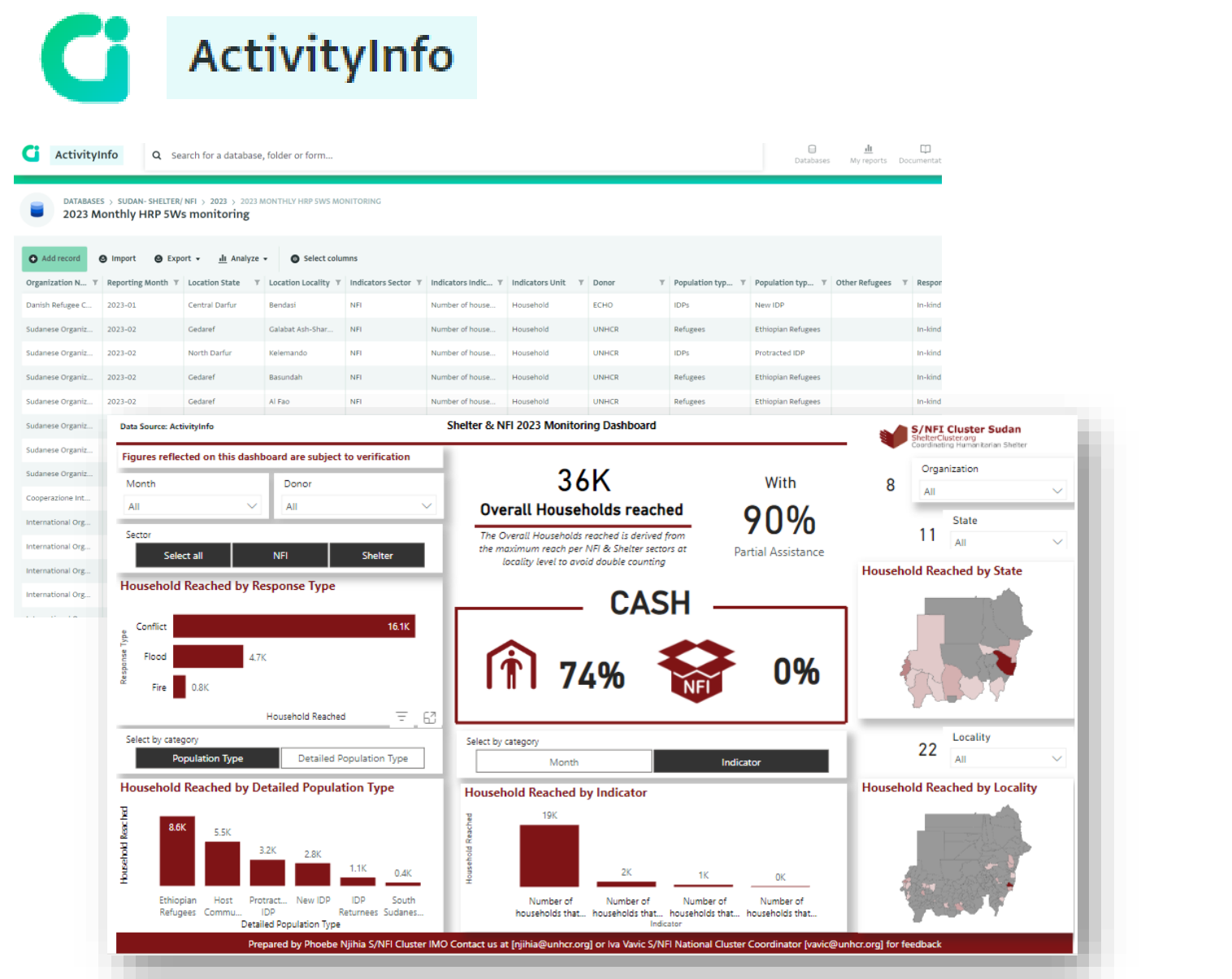
- There is an existing draft kobo stock mapping tool.
