2. Update on humanitarian developments and cluster response activities, stock & pipeline and geographical presence

Overall Response:

Among the latest cluster figures updated on the 23rd March 2018 from January 2017 - support has been mobilized as follows:

- 98,348 full ES/NFI kits have been distributed

- 1,560 full ES/NFI are being currently distributed or are planned for this coming month in Oromia and Somali, both distribution being for conflict affected HH by Concern and Save the Children.
- 17,360 cash grants have been distributed
- 9,500 cash grants are currently being planned to be distributed through EHF and IOM
- A total of 31,067 ES/NFI kits and are in stocks and pipeline
- 17,214 HH were fully supported since January 2018

Durable Solutions for Shelter

- New SNFI partners have identified and mobilized to support more durable shelter programs :-
 - CRS is beginning a pilot project to introduce transitional shelters. The funding is confirmed and the locations are being discussed with the Cluster at present. CRS presented an update on the project: The Construction is taking place in Millenium Camp in Dire Dawa for 5 pilot shelters and a request to build a total of 20 has been made. The request also includes reducing the size of the current emergency shelter from 24m2. The project aim to build a total of
 - Habitat for Humanity is also looking at designs of durable shelters and is looking at ways to support the most vulnerable HH in line with government relocation plans.

Funding Updates

- CERF allocation submitted to support 15,000 HH with both emergency and transitional shelter solutions by IOM. CRS, Save and NRC are partners that will provide their own internal funding to the distribute the ESNFI kits procured by IOM
- EHF Allocation for 2018 TBA next week as per the latest information from OCHA

Capacity Building

- 3 Regional SNFI Trainings planned from the end of March to April in Somali Region to build capacity of partners and local authorities. Gode training completed last week
- The 2nd phase of Technical Flood Assessment will take place in Gambella next week and Technical Workshop to take place from the 11th to the 13th April 2018. Invitations will be sent out next week for interested partners that want to focus on Pillar 1 activities of the HDRP.

Increased Conflict Displacement in Other Regions

- Support has been mobilized for displacement in Gambella by NRC and Tigray by IOM, NRC, ERCS and NDRMC over the last weeks.

3. HRPD Launch and Priorities for 2018

The official launch of the HDRP Ethiopia Humanitarian and Disaster Resilience Plan (HDRP) took place on the March 13th 2018. The HDRP seeks US\$1.66 billion to reach 7.88 million people with emergency food or cash and non-food assistance, mainly in the southern and south-eastern parts of the country.

The 2018 HDRP presented prioritized plans in water and sanitation (WaSH), agriculture, relief food, nutrition, health, education, protection and shelter and non-food items in the affected areas. Out of the \$1.6 billion sought for the 2018 response, \$1.036 billion is required for relief food, \$198.3 million for nutrition, \$99 million for WaSH needs, and \$94.9 million for shelter and other material assistance for the

displaced.

The HDRP has been presented around a three-pillared framework primarily highlighting immediate humanitarian plans and requirements, along with actions that will enable the current and future response, and reduce humanitarian requirements over the course of 2018 and for years to come. It lays out a vision and ambition to take a more 'disaster risk management approach' to the somewhat predictable humanitarian challenges we continue to face.

The shift to planning through a three pillared model is outlined below:

- 1) Prevention and mitigation measures;
- 2) Preparedness and response; and,
- 3) National system strengthening and recovery.

The SNFI Cluster reiterated the need for SNFI partners to move beyond immediate ES/NFI response activities and increase shelter activities and submissions for funding under Pillar I and Pillar III in order to engage in prevention and mitigation measures as well as shelter recovery activities as outlined in the HDRP.

4. Presentation DTM Round 9 Analysis for the SNFI Cluster

A presentation was made on the Clusters DTM Round 9 Shelter Analysis as follows: (PPT attached)

- DTM Round 9 identified a total of 283,217 HH, among them are 127,920 HH in Somali and 126,920 HH in Oromia. Conflict with 197,336 HH and drought with 74,607 were reported as the primary displacement drivers. Most of the recorded population was displaced during 2017 with 621 sites out of a total of 916 opened in 2017. Since December 2017, a total of 71 sites have been closed, the largest number ever recorded.
- An analysis focusing on the ES/NFI needs identified the following three factors perpetuating conflict displacement: lack of food, no livelihood and house damaged. Further clarification was requested on whether lack of security was not one of them. As for drought displacement, the main important factors are lack of food, no livelihood and no accessibility.
- Around 65 per cent of the conflict affected HH got their home destroyed, 54 per cent of the drought affected HH. Somali was the most affected region with 91,916 HH.
- Around 50 per cent of the recorded population is accommodated in sub-standard in temporary shelters. 13,919 HH are in open space, no shelter, most of them being along the Oromia-Somali conflict border. A further 12,178 HH are in collective centers.
- A total of 625 sites out of 916 are reported to be in need of emergency shelter kits. It is important to highlight the fact that the composition of the emergency kits as per DTM (plastic sheet and rope) is in line with the cluster guidelines. A much lower number of sites require bedding (130) and kitchen sets (115).
- CGI roofing, ropes and poles/sticks are the most required items to improve the shelters, regardless of the displacement driver. While the most demanded item for conflict sites is CGI roofing, the drought sites need more ropes for improvement

5. Regional and Zonal Coordination for the SNFI Cluster

A presentation was made on the Regional Coordination Structure of the SNFI Cluster.

There are 3 active Regional Clusters as follows;

- Somali Region & DPPB since 2015 – coordinated by IOM - FP Halima Dahir /Drew Kutschenreuter
- Afar & DPFSPCO - activated since October - coordinated by IOM - FP Sifan Adamu
- Gambella & DPFSA – activated since May - coordinated by IOM - FP Tadesse Dame

and 4 regional coordination structures;

- Amhara - ERCS - Shambel Wale
- SNNPR - IRC - Dengia Hailu
- Oromia - IOM - FP Dawit Urgessa (temporal appointment)
- Tigray - ERCS - Berhanu Mekonnen

The SNFI Cluster also has 19 Zonal FPs that were appointed in 2017. A request was made to partners to review the Zonal FP document and confirm the appointment of relevant staff to support the role of Zonal FP. A request was also made to ensure commitment and responsibilities when offering to take up this role and to request partners to support where there exist gaps. The Cluster Presence FP map was reviewed and will be modified as per new updates received by partners.

- CRS indicated an interest in supporting with coordination in DireDawa through HCS
- COOPI mentioned interest in supporting with coordination. Location TBC
- NRC indicated an interest in opening an office in Negele and supporting with coordination in this location

- Partners indicated that 3862 families have already started to be relocated in the 11 towns around Addis making targeting for NFIs quite challenging. SNFI Cluster requested to support with information to partners on which sites the 86,000 individuals will be moving from. Partners indicated the challenge when the DPPB or woreda leaders also indicated no knowledge on relocation plans.
