# Ukraine Shelter & NFI cluster 2023

- Cluster was established upon GOU request in 2014 following Crimea events & displacement from the East
- In 2019, a protocol was developed to transition responsibilities to Ministry of temporary occupied territories and IDPs (MTOT)
- A cluster exit plan was developed and at the time of the current conflict escalation, the cluster was not resourced.
- The current crisis and re-activation in 2022, called for surge capacity and an ad-hoc approach implied many gaps.

# USC core functions

## 1. Supporting service delivery

- Provide a platform to ensure that service delivery is driven by the agreed strategic priorities
- Develop mechanisms to eliminate duplication of service delivery

## 2. Inform strategic decision-making of humanitarian response

- Needs assessment and response gap analysis
- Analysis to identify and address (emerging) gaps, obstacles, duplication, and cross-cutting issues including age, gender, environment, etc..
- Prioritisation, grounded in response analysis

## 3. Planning and strategy development

- Develop sectoral plans, objectives and indicators that directly support realisation of the HC/HCT strategic priorities
- Apply and adhere to existing standards and guidelines
- Clarify funding requirements, prioritisation and cluster contributions for the HC's overall humanitarian funding considerations (Flash Appeal, CAP, CERF, Emergency Response Fund/Common Humanitarian Fund)

## 4. Advocacy

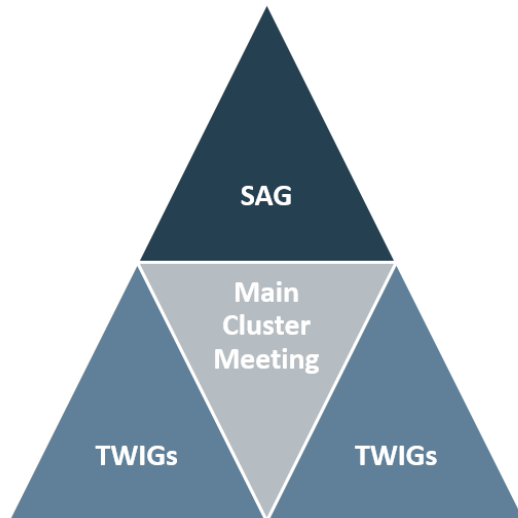
- Identify advocacy concerns to contribute to HC and HCT messaging and action
- Undertake advocacy activities on behalf of cluster participants and the affected population

**5. Monitoring** and reporting the implementation of the cluster strategy and results; recommending corrective action where necessary

**6. Contingency planning/preparedness/capacity building** in situations where there is a high risk of recurring or significant new disaster

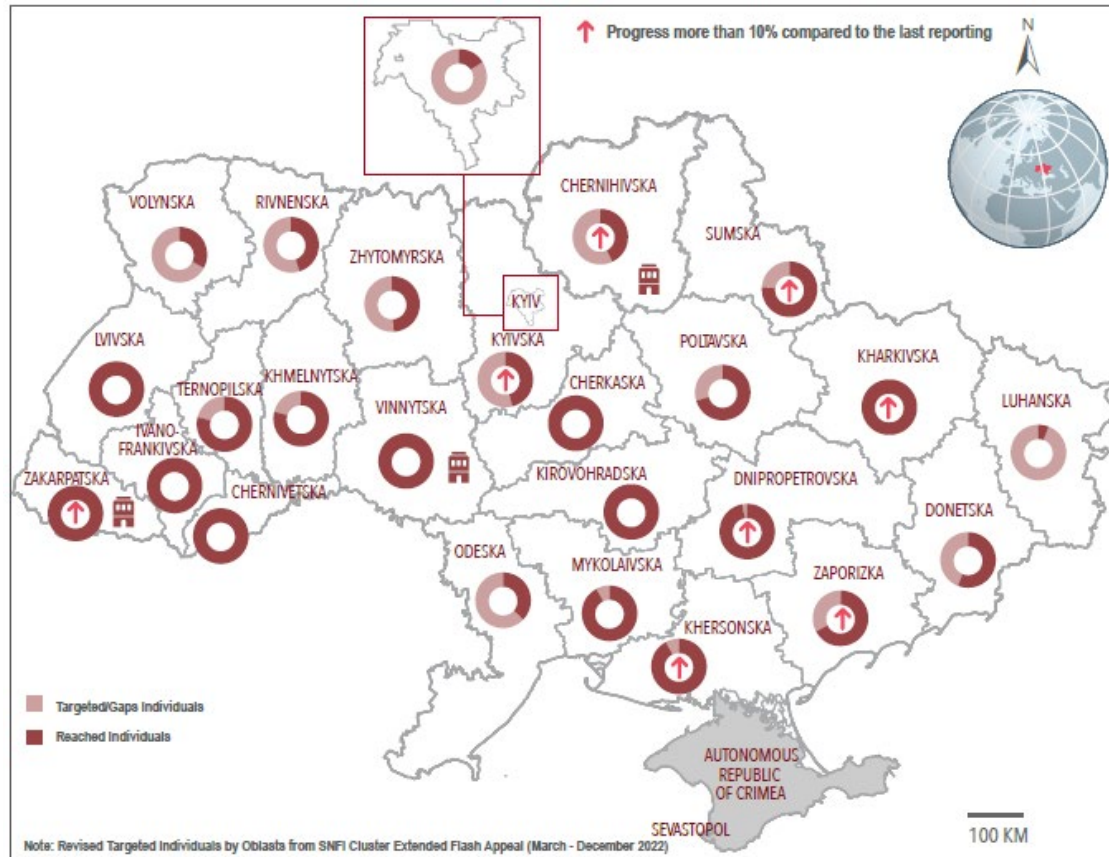
## Ideal Country Cluster structure

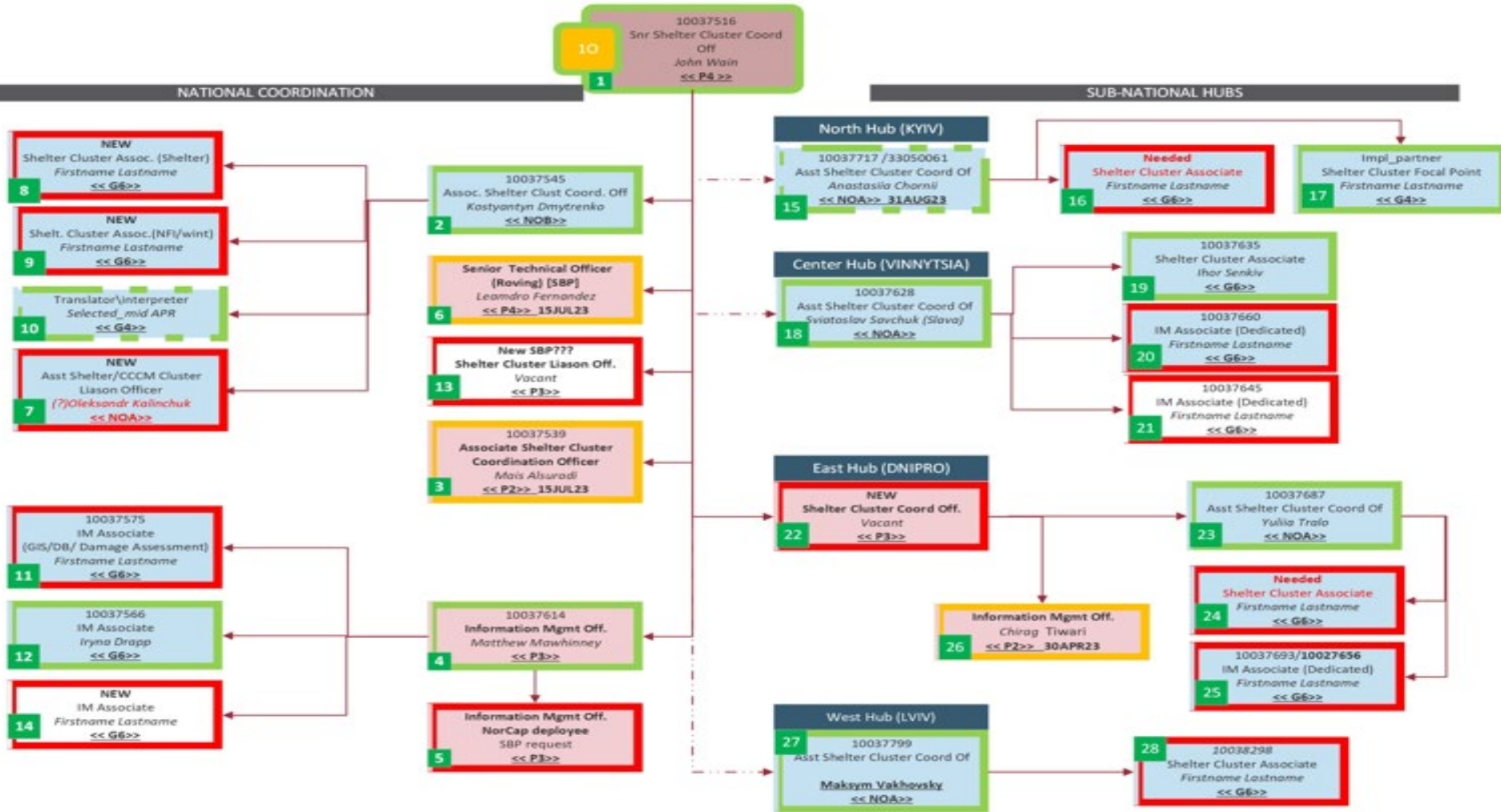

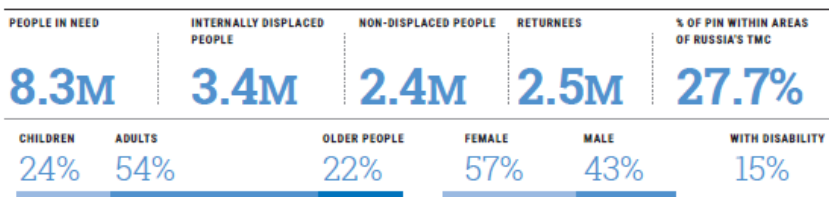

# HNO 2023 – Shelter and NFI

- **IDPs:** rental support, winterization HH items, winter clothing, heating appliances, solid fuel and support for stay in collective sites.
- **Non-displaced:** emergency shelter kits in newly retaken areas, in kind winterization HH items, bomb shelter emergency supplies, heating appliances, solid fuel, house repair and insulation.
- **Returnees:** rental support, support for temporary stays in transitional housing, housing repair work (light and medium), heating appliances and fuel for heating.

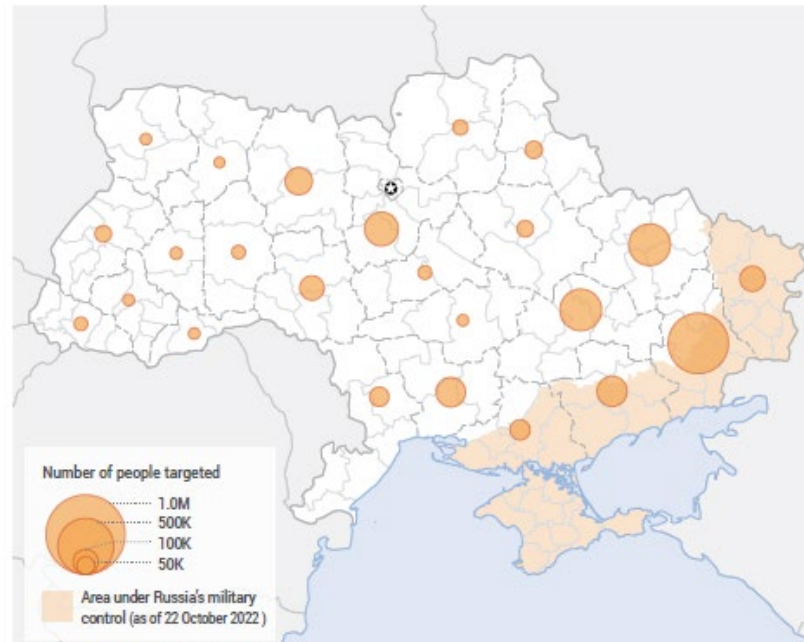

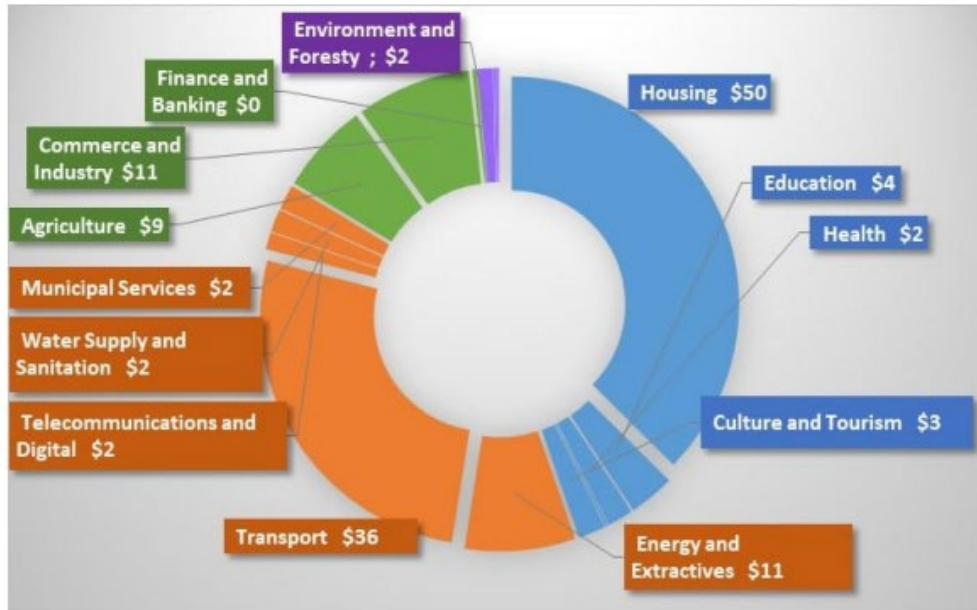
# Activity Matrix

Activity	Definition
Emergency Shelter kit	Distribution of kits that include essential selected construction material for self-help temporary house repairs. Kits are to be distributed in the immediate aftermath of conflict-related damages to houses and public buildings (schools, medical facilities, basic services) and in all cases in which access or safety issues do not allow durable repairs. The complete kit includes: Tarpaulin, Battens, Laths, Transparent film, OSB, Nails, Mounting foam). Distribution of incomplete kits that cover only partially the needs are not recommended and have to be signalled in the notes of the SW template.
Temporary shelter	Provision and installation of modular temporary houses to host families in their own plot until repairs are completed. The installation of temporary houses in parks or public space, or grouped as collective center is not recommended by the Cluster as temporary shelter solution
Light repairs	Repair of houses and apartments with minor non-structural conflict-related damages (roof, windows, etc. See SOPs). All interventions are expected to cover the basic needs of the house, as per the SOPs. Partial interventions that leave basic needs uncovered are not acceptable.
Medium repairs	Repair of houses and apartments with minor non-structural conflict-related damages (roof, windows, etc. See SOPs). All interventions are expected to cover the basic needs of the house, as per the SOPs. Partial interventions that leave basic needs uncovered
Heavy repairs	Repair of houses with structural conflict-related damages (roof structure, structural walls, etc. See SOPs). All interventions are expected to cover the basic needs of the house, as per the SOPs. Partial interventions that leave basic needs uncovered are not acceptable.
Reconstructions	Reconstruction of non-repairable houses (as per the "core house" principle; see SOPs)
Insulation of substandard houses (non-conflict-damaged)	Interventions aimed at improving the thermal envelope efficiency of houses and apartments (ceiling insulation, energy-efficient windows and doors). This activity refers to houses in substandard conditions, but not damaged by conflict-related activities. In case of interventions that provide both (a) the repair of conflict-related damages and (b) the improvement of the insulation capacity, report under Light & Medium or Heavy repairs.
Refurbishment of CCs	Construction interventions aimed at improving the quality of buildings hosting IDPs. Target are all types of collective sites: transit (TCs), reception (RCs) and collective (CCs) centres. Priority should be given to interventions aimed at improving conditions in existing centres with high occupancy (>70%). The term "refurbishment" actually covers a wide range of construction-related interventions, from very light repairs (basic maintenance of already functioning centres), to the repurposing of buildings with different uses or the completion of unfinished buildings (see also SOPs). When reporting this activity, the main disaggregation will be between accommodation (sleeping spaces) "Improved" and "Created". If the difference is not clear, seek the Shelter Cluster team's advice before reporting. All interventions are expected to cover the basic needs of the centres, starting with the "thermal envelope". Partial interventions that leave basic needs uncovered are not acceptable.
NFI kit #1 - CCs	Distribution of Shelter Cluster NFI kits #1 (essential items to improve or create sleeping places in T/R/CCs). The complete kit includes: Folding beds, Mattresses, Blankets, Bed linen sets, Pillows, Towel sets, Power bank, lamps. Distribution of incomplete kits that cover only partially the needs are not recommended and have to be signalled in the notes of the SW template.
NFI kit #2 - HH items	Distribution of Shelter Cluster NFI kits #2 (essential items that displaced, non-displaced and returnee families may have lost because of the conflict or not taken with them in displacement). The complete kit includes: Reinforced Bags, Bed linen sets, Blankets, Towel sets, Kitchen sets, Jerry cans (optional), Buckets. Distribution of incomplete kits that cover only partially the needs are not recommended and have to be signalled in the notes of the SW template.
NFI kit #3 - Bomb shelters	Distribution of Shelter Cluster NFI kits #3 (essential items meant to mitigate the discomfort of non-displaced and returnee families forced to spend long time in basements and bomb shelters). The complete kit includes: Ground mats, Sleeping bags, Blankets, Pillows, Jerry cans, Power bank lamps. Distribution of incomplete kits that cover only partially the needs are not recommended and have to be signalled in the notes of the SW template.
Winterisation NFI Other non-kit items	Distribution of winterisation non-food items, with the exception of (a) clothing, (b) heating appliances and (c) solid fuel, which are separated activities, with separated reporting lines. The list of items that fall under this reporting line include: Mattresses, Sleeping bags, High thermal blankets; and Quilts, Rescue blanket rolls, Thermal Bags, Portable stoves + dry fuel (or candles). Items in the list are not to be considered (procured, distributed and reported) as a kit (see Winterisation recommendations 2022-23). Some items in this list - like mattresses and blankets - are included also in the Shelter Cluster standard NFI kits. When these items are distributed as part of a complete standard kit, report the activity under the reporting lines dedicated to standard NFI kits #1, #2 or #3; when these items are distributed separately, report the activity under "Winterisation NFI (other non-kit items)". The Shelter Cluster promotes the distribution of complete kits, as a more efficient way to harmonise assistance and prevent partial coverage of needs.

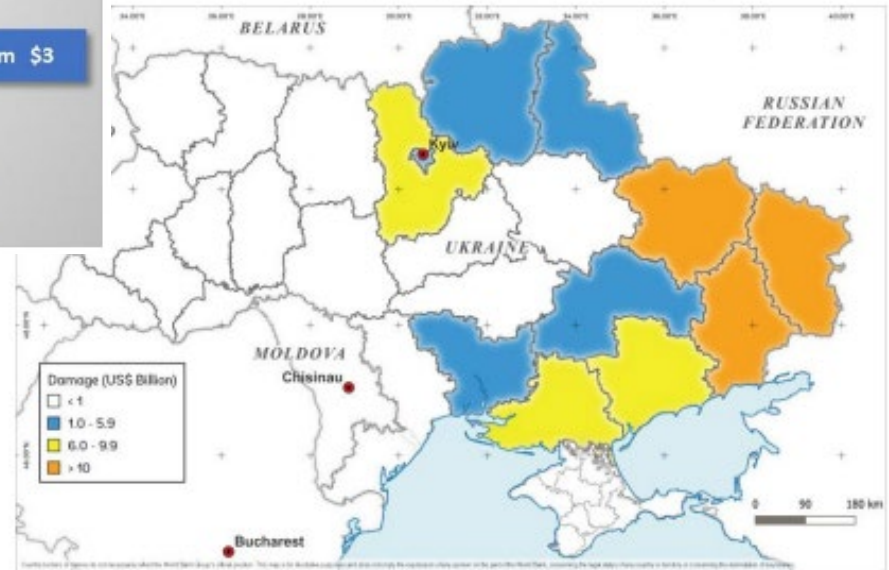
Activity	Definition
Winterisation NFI - Clothing	Distribution of warm clothes and thermal underwear. The list of recommended items include: Winter jackets, Winter boots, Thick socks, Woolen hats, Woolen scarves, Thermal underwear. Items in the list are not to be considered (procured, distributed and reported) as a kit (see Winterisation recommendations 2022-23). At the same time, the Shelter/NFI Cluster does not encourage partners to provide partial assistance to families' needs.
Winterisation NFI - Heating appliances	Distribution of kits to heat rooms in homes and in T/R/CCs. Kits include heating appliances (electric or solid fuel heaters and stoves) and all necessary complementary items (like cables, fuses, exhaust pipes, etc.).
Winterisation NFI - Solid fuel	Distribution of coal, firewood, briquettes and pellets for home solid fuel heaters. Quantities per type of fuel (recommended/minimum): Coal=4/2tons; Firewood=8/4m3; Briquettes=2,25/4,5tons; Pellets=6/3tons.
Provision of Non-standard NFIs	Provision of Non-standard NFIs to individuals. Items to ensure minimal living conditions and prevent people leaving their houses due to lack of basic furniture
Provision of Non-standard NFIs for CCs	Provision of Non-standard NFIs to individuals (collective centres). Items to ensure adequate living conditions in CC
Winterisation cash for utilities	Provision of grants to help vulnerable families pay the increased utility bills during winter months.
Rental support	Provision of grants to help vulnerable displaced families pay for the rent of their apartment or house or move from collective centres or find better accommodation. Reference for this activity are the Cash for Rent SOPs.
Host families support (Przychyistok)	Provision of grants to help vulnerable host families cover the additional costs related to hosting a displaced family in their house, or encourage families to become hosts. This activity is regulated by the Ministry of Development of Communities and Territories, under the state programme Przychyistok.
Provision of Generators	Provision of generators for communal services provision points, including Inevitability Points

- Develop standard tools, reporting IM products, strategies, get core functions operating – SAG, CCPM, TWiG's, fact sheets,
- Sub-National roles and tasks
- Contingency plans, reports, multi-year strategy, capacity building strategy, work plan
- Transition to durable housing moving at quite a pace – lots of shelter experts
- Balancing workload OCHA, UNHCR, standard USC tasks – reduce meetings
- Not enough involvement of local NGO/CSOs - localization
- Advocacy as regards role of the cluster, new actors, lead agency
- Bring everyone together
- Effective integration (Tri-cluster, WASH, livelihoods....)
