2. PARTNER UPDATE



During the reporting period, 65 persons received assistance at Ganfouda, and Al Bayda detention centers in the East by LIBAID.in the West, 128 refugees and asylum seekers received assistance at the Serrja office or the CDC; by IRC or direct implementation.

A total of 176 NFIs and 54 male/female HKs were distributed.





1. Shelter rehab for HHs level in Tripoli and Benghazi:
 - a. Targets are 50 housing units in each location.
 - b. vulnerability assessments are completed in Benghazi - BoQs and SoWs will be developed in May. Technical package will be shared with UNHCR for their approval.
2. Community infrastructures in Tripoli and Benghazi:
 - a. Targets are 1 infrastructure project in each location.
 - b. Ongoing discussions with UNHCR to identify and select the best option of infrastructure projects in both locations, this should be done by the end of next week.



1. Rehabilitation of 295 housing units in Abu Salim completed.
2. Vulnerability assessments are ongoing for HHs level rehab in Tripoli and Benghazi, targets are 128 in Benghazi and 78 units in Tripoli.
3. Shelter rehab for HHs level in Tawergha with a total of 245 housing units: vulnerability assessments are ongoing, developing BoQs and SoWs will start in May.







2. PARTNER UPDATE

IRC UPDATES

The total number of individuals reached with NFIs assistance during April 2022 is 584 and the total number of distributed items is 2470

- **LRC Shelter:** for the Libyan Red Crescent shelter, the team reached 14 clients and distributed a total of 35 items.
(Kitchen set 1, Clothing Box 3, Diapers 7, FHK 8, Cleaning materials 14, MHK 2)
- **WGSS Sites:** at the WGSS Sites, the WPE team reached 30 clients and distributed a total of 132 items.
(Kitchen set 5, Diapers 12, FHK 5, MHK 4, Baby kit 2, Dignity kit 12, Mattress 18, Electrical Heaters 5, Gloves 18, Lamps 15, Track suit 9, Boots 9, Blankets 18)
- **Urban Distributions:** for the Urban the NFIs team reached 294 clients and distributed a total of 2053 items.
(Kitchen set 5, Diapers 12, FHK 5, MHK 4, Baby kit 2, Soap bar 12, Mattress 18, Lamps 5, Unicef box 18, Track suit 9, Slippers 9, Blankets 18)
- **RAS:** for the rescue at sea, the protection team reached 144 survivors and distributed a total of 144 blankets and refreshments.
- **CP:** for the Child Protection activites, the CP team reached 91 clients and distributed a total of 91 PSS Kit.
- **CDC:** at the Community Day Center, the NFIs team reached 11 clients and distributed a total of 15 items and it is classified as follows:
(Diapers 6, FHK 5, MHK 4)



2. PARTNER UPDATE

During April 2022 – IOM helped provide assistance to a total number of **2278 Migrants**.



Main Assistance Provided was **Disembarkation Points and Detention Centers**

West – 1682 Migrants – Tripoli city (Ain Zara DC – Tarik Al-Sekka DC – Tarik Al-Matar DC)

East – 55 Migrants – Benghazi and Tobruk cities (Ganfuda DC – Tobruk DC)

Migrants at Disembarkation Points – 541 Migrants – Tripoli / Alzawiya city (Misfat Azzawiya DP – Abu Setta DP)

Type of assistance provided include: Mattresses – Blankets – HKs – Clothing Kits – Snacks and Water.

2. PARTNER UPDATE

- **Planned /Completed activities:**
 - **Soug Alahad IDPs site (51 HH):**
 - **Shelter Materials** Distribution Completed.
 - **AbuSalim Municipality – Supporting Returnees families (36HH)**
 - Coordination took place with NRC, and assessment phase for the first patch completed. Distribution of **Shelter materials** is envisaged to be **by Med-May 2022**
 - Aiming to consider additional 10 HH from AbuSalim returnees affected population for **Shelter materials** by **end of May2022.**
 - **Migrants – Sudanese population at Alkirmia area (Altougar site) - (142 Individuals)**
 - **Core NFIs assistance:** Distribution activities completed.
 - **Migrants – Sudanese population at Alkirmia area (Alsfar site) - (147 Individuals)**
 - **Core NFIs assistance:** Assessment phase completed; distribution activity is envisaged to be end of May 2022.
 - **Monitoring activities** took place for the beneficiaries received their shelter materials to identify the progress, provide any technical advises and any challenges related.



2. PARTNER UPDATE

1. Distribution activities of FI Kit, Hygiene Kit and PPE in Zawiya: on April 10th, 11th and 12th, the sixth monthly distributions of Hygiene, PPE, FI and SNFI kits took place in 4 different districts of the Municipality of Zawiya: **Juddaim, Arewie, Khartoum/Bu Ghalasha and Terfas.** **99 Hygiene Kits, 99 PPE Kits and 204 FI Kits** have been distributed to **76 HHs** for the benefit of up to **266 beneficiaries** among migrants, refugees and asylum seekers in urban settings.



HUMANITARIAN SHELTER COORDINATION (MASTER LEVEL SHORT COURSE)

First phase: Tutored distance learning: This will take place during a period of five weeks from **22nd August to 25th September, 2022** and participants will study through the online [Red Cross Red Crescent e-learning platform](#). This first phase deals with most of the theoretical basis of the course.

Second phase: A 6-day face-to-face workshop from **31st October to 5 November, 2022**. The face-to-face workshop is based on a scenario that simulates the deployment to and coordination of an evolving emergency.

Closing date 17th July, 2022 – course fee \$2,000 + costs of living in Geneva for the face-to-face




