The venue of the workshop will be confirmed later.</p> <p>Based on the survey, it is found that only 10 members responded in the HRP process part and based on the discussion during the workshop a dedicated session will be kept on HRP process.</p>
02	Shelter Activities by Save the Children in Bangladesh	<p>In Bangladesh, Save the Children started its journey in 1970 in response to the devastating cyclone that hit Bhola. Save the Children began by providing children and their families with emergency food supplies and medical assistance. Since then, Save the Children have been actively working across the country with the Government, Civil Society Organizations, business and others to give children the opportunities they deserve to grow up healthy, to learn and to be safe. When a crisis strikes, Save the Children stands beside and support children and last to leave. With approx. 1200 dedicated staff and over 850 volunteers across the country, Save the Children responds to major emergencies, deliver innovative development programmes and ensure children’s voices to build a better future.</p> <p>Save the Children has been working to build Multipurpose Disaster Shelter Support (MPDS) project in Cox’s Bazar & Bandarban Hill District, under the project Save the Children is constructing 11 MPDS (total 25, 14 by CARE) along with capacity building training for DMCs/ SMC. Plantation, House repairing & Cash For Work adjacent to MPDS.</p> <p>In the Shelter Cluster meeting, Mr. Q. E. 03	<p>AOB</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Evacuation Shelter Mapping exercise - Pre-positioning of Shelter and NFI for 2024 	<p>Evacuation Shelter Mapping exercise: BDRCS, IFRC, IOM, Caritas, CRS, Displacement Management Cluster and Shelter Cluster are jointly assessing the evacuation shelter centers across Bangladesh and Department of Disaster Management (DDM) under the Ministry of Disaster Management and Relief (MoDMR) is leading the process.</p> <p>All necessary information has been collecting through the assessment and will be shared through a Dashboard in DDM website.</p> <p>Pre-positioning of Shelter and NFI for 2024: The Shelter Cluster Bangladesh compiled the prepositioning of shelter and Non Food Items (NFIs) for 2024. Based on the report approximate 30,000 families can be possible to cover.</p>

There should be a comprehensive baseline demographic survey done which aims at identifying individuals requiring assistance. For example, this can encompass metrics such as the number of individuals in coastal regions necessitating emergency aid, the number of homeless populations, and those encountering challenges pertaining to health, sanitation, shelter, education, and livelihood.'
