- **As for Capacity building workshops**, which are a follow-up to our mid-year Retreat, we had two workshops last week and it's great to see wide participation in those workshops from both partners and authorities, the Capacity building workshops are on-going and SNFI team is travelling to Dnipro this evening and tomorrow and Friday, we will conduct the final two workshops to provide capacity building support to authorities and partners in the Eastern region.

Shelter) and respective activities – 2024 Activity Matrix is being developed**
- **Winter dashboard – please keep focused on updates, do make sure that the Dashboard is updated, it is extremely important as it is becoming a key reference as we progress on into winter**

Main winterization achievements

- I would like to remind that you can find our Dashboards on the Shelter Cluster website among the key winterization activities that were provided to individuals, we can highlight the distribution of NFIs, winter clothes, heating appliances fuel in cash and in-kind fuel modalities.
- As a Cluster we are targeting 1.6M Individuals through various winter activities, and as of now, we reached 329k individuals through Winterization (18 %). In particular, we are targeting 1.5M individuals by provision of NFIs, and as of now we have reached 327k individuals (21 % of targeting criteria, mainly from provision of NFIs, winter clothes, winter heating, support for winter energy needs); In the Shelter Sector we are targeting 104k individuals, and as of now, we have reached 1127 individuals (5 % of targeted population, mainly from provision of generators).
- By modalities, we have reached 19% of targeting criteria by cash (mainly from support of winter heating, refurbishment of Collective Sites, support of winter energy needs), & 17 % by in-kind (mainly from provision of NFIs, winter clothes, winter heating, support for winter energy needs). Overall financial requirements for Winterization re 372M, as for now we only have 30% of funding covered.

3. 2023 Response Monitoring update – SIDAR updates

Information Management Associate (Oksana Myhaleha):

Main Achievements:

- As for the Shelter NFI Cluster 2024 Response Planning, we reached more than 2M unique beneficiaries by all activities (64 % of targeting criteria), mainly from provision of NFIs, winter heating, winter clothes, light & medium repairs, emergency shelter support, heavy repairs etc.
- The achievements for NFIs are 1.7M of unique beneficiaries reached (74 % of targeting criteria); By Shelter activities, we reached 4.4k of beneficiaries (43 % of targeting criteria).

- **We collect the data twice per month, so please report in the Activity info for us to update our Dashboards in time.**

Information Management Officer (Matthew Mawhinney):

- From my side, which links in with what John was saying earlier about the importance of regularly reporting on winterization, but also keep in mind that as we're coming to end of 2023, please pay careful attention to what you've already reported. We will be producing an end-of-year report in the same format as the mid-year report that we produced so pay attention to what is in the dashboard in terms of what you previously reported and make sure to finalize your numbers for the year end in December.
- Another point on Response Monitoring just as an FYI, we are currently working on the structure of the database for Response Monitoring for 2024. There have been some discussions at the ICCG and the general view is that we will try and harmonize better the response monitoring form of all Clusters. IMWG will take the Shelter and NFI structure as the standard and propose that to other Clusters. So, there

shouldn't be too much change. So that's just for your information that we're working on that, and then hopefully early in January, we'll be able to roll out reporting instructions training sessions on the new database for 2024 Response Monitoring.

Information Management Associate (Iryna Drapp)

SIDAR updates:

- We have 84 organizations now using SIDAR and 203 users. Assessment reports have also increased and now there are more than 23 202 assessment reports, 56 113 damaged residential units and 31 861 Assistance – Repairs and Emergency Shelter Kits;
- As it was previously mentioned, the block Measures taken – according to 57 State questions is mandatory from December on, unfortunately currently we only have 755 questions filled in. Please be aware that these questions are mandatory to fill in and we ask you to provide all the information regarding the response.
- In the nearest weeks we are going to start with Managers training and you will receive further information through emails.

4. Technical Coordination Updates

Senior Technical Coordinator (Leandro Jesus Fernandez Jardon):

- **The composition of the Emergency Shelter Kit was reviewed** together with the members of Task force, yesterday a proposal of the new composition was shared among the members and as soon as we receive their feedback, we will publish the final composition before the next meeting of the Shelter Cluster, if possible. No big changes are expected.
- **Regarding Durable Solutions TWiG** led by CARITAS Ukraine, CARITAS is finalizing the mapping of Durable Solutions and actors across Ukraine, Shelter Cluster and UNHCR have been working this week in the document that links SC Objective 3 with Durable Solutions it was shared among the members of the Technical Working Group for their inputs. So we expect to have some results maybe at the end of the year. The main objective of this TWiG:
 - Present a position paper;
 - Mapping of durable solutions initiatives in Ukraine;
 - Linking SC Objective with 3 durable solutions.
- **PDMs:** partners are encouraged to share their PDM results. Contact SC if you have suggestions on what is the best way to analyze and compare results from different partners. It would be very useful for us to have a review session at the beginning of 2024 to share the main findings and best practice, we will keep you updated.
- **UHF Second Standard Allocation: Submission of project proposals is due 5th of January.**

5. Sub-national level cluster coordination highlights

- Western Region

Assistant Shelter Cluster Coordination Officer (Maksym Vakhovskyi):

- Oblast authorities in the whole Oblast have finalized and published official lists of Collective Sites. Based on that authorities shared multisectoral needs in these CSs. Partners plan to spend their remaining budgets to contribute to upgrading these CSs to minimum standards. At the same time, it's also essential for partners to wait until the amended version of the Resolution is published because they say that according to the amended version of the Resolution, Oblast authorities will have up to a year of time to upgrade Collective Sites to minimum standards. So this can have influence in partner's programming - that's what we hear.
- In Lvivska oblast Partners proceed with their winterization activities taking into account requests come from Coordination Center for support to civilian population of Lvivska ODA who presented needs in winterization NFIs.
- Deduplication of Cash for Rent activities is a topic for working discussions in the Hub.
- Several partners notified Cluster that they close their presentations in West Hub and will concentrate their efforts in the Eastern crescent.
- At the same time Partners who plan to continue their activities in 2024 currently work on their approaches and modalities, which include comprehensive multisectoral support of CSs, targeted SNFI assistance to the most vulnerable categories.

- Eastern Region

Assistant Shelter Cluster Coordination Officer (Yuliia Tralo):

- **Brief update about Winterization Planning:** Winterization planning in oblasts\gromadas on the LoC, there are 4 prioritized Oblasts: Khersonska, Zaporizka, Donetsk and Kharkivska. In **Khersonska Oblast** there are 18 hromadas and all of them are considered to be a priority. For now it's more than eighteen and half a thousands of households in need to be assisted and in accordance with our winterization plan more than this number is going to be assisted, but at the same time, almost one thousand of households are still in need of assistance. I would like to explain this difference - because on the very initial stage, Khersonska Oblast administration delivered the needs of about 14,5K HHs and we divided with partners all hromadas and activities and additional capacity that could be divided between households with another type of vulnerabilities which have been identified by Oblast administration, for example, persons who lost their houses because of damages, but at the same time after increasing of needs, we still have some gaps and that is why this is additional new-met gaps which are expected to be covered by partners. In **Zaporizka Oblast** the situation is quite similar, 8 hromadas which are located close to the line of contact are prioritized with more than 5K HHs, it is expected that all of these HHs will be assisted with solid fuel. In other hromadas there is a gap of about 1K HHs that are in need of assistance. In **Donetska Oblast** critically vulnerable persons as well as vulnerable persons. are expected to be covered, but additional needs are still expected to be covered by additional capacity of partners. In **Kharkivska Oblast** the situation is worse: 56 hromadas in total, 21 hromadas are prioritized due to being close to the line of contact and close to the border, prioritized hromadas are expected to be covered completely, but in general, within all Oblast the gap is about 6k HHs that are left uncovered. I would like to add very important comment that in this table, the capacity of ICRC is also included.
- **Kharkivska Oblast:**
 - Planned: 91906 HHs
 - Newly outstanding unmet needs: 17995 HHs
- **Donetska Oblast:**
 - Planned: 44052 HHs

- Newly outstanding unmet needs: 3857 HHs
- **Zaporizka Oblast:**
 - Planned: 58218 HHs
 - Newly outstanding unmet needs: 3078 HHs
- **Khersonska Oblast:**
 - Planned: 56166 HHs
 - Newly outstanding unmet needs: 2958 HHs
- **If partners still have some plans and additional capacity, please address Cluster, check the available hromadas and needs and please review all planning tables and confirm your intention with Cluster.**

Sub-national Shelter Cluster Co-Chair for the East (Jakielski Lukasz):

- The meeting with Vice Prime Minister – Minister for Reintegration Iryna Vereshchuk to discuss winterization measures for Khersonska and Kharkivska Oblasts was postponed and will take place online next Monday (27.11.2023). All those who have registered should receive a notification.
- Plan for Donetsk Oblast is approved, the expected coverage is up to 95%, no amendments are expected, partners who have additional capacity please check the needs which are not covered and contact the Cluster. As for Khersonska Oblast: there is still a gap of 1500 HHs mostly due to additional requests from Oblast administration we received 2 weeks ago. Uncovered needs are also in the planning table, the most vulnerable hromada with limited access – Berislavska hromada has the biggest gap and is a priority– more than 1000 HHs. Zaporizka Oblast: final plan is not approved yet, but all the Cluster partners managed to make substantial progress over the last 1.5 months, as of now we have up to 90% coverage of critical needs and about 75% coverage of general needs. As for Kharkivska Oblast: Oblast administration has revised the needs, new planning table with amended needs is already accessible, please check your information and your inputs and make sure everything is correct.
- We've been very busy throughout November having a series of meetings that were related to the Winterization, we had meetings dedicated to Khersonska, Kharkivska, Zaporizka Oblasts. We are aware that you constantly receive new funding, particularly for the winter that's why we're trying to adjust our assistance and then coordination efforts to integrate your new funding and then your new assistance. Please do reach out to us whenever you have new planning that is confirmed.
- The coordination efforts are still very important, particularly at the hromada levels. We, unfortunately, face a bit of duplication so far on winterization.

- Northern Region

SC North Coordinator (Anastasiia Chornii):

- Capacity building workshop took place last week, thanks to partners and local authorities for participation. Additionally, last week we had a regional Sub-national meeting with partners for Kyivska Oblast.
- There will be a Regional SNFI Cluster offline meeting in Sumy on the 12th of December where we will discuss coordination, gaps, partner's presence, and involvement in Shelter Cluster as well as a Sub-National SNFI Cluster online meeting on the 14th of December.
- Key activities are NFI in terms of solid fuel and L&M Repairs. There are a lot of hromadas in Chernihivska and Sumska Oblasts that are close to the border, 21 hromadas in total that are under active shelling, that's why local authorities' aim is to cover the needs of vulnerable population, those needs are distribution of solid fuel.
- **Deadline for updates: Friday, the 8th of December.**
 - **Chernihivska Oblast:**

NFI solid fuel priority is 4 hromadas: 2766 HHs out of 11016 HHs are covered by partners (ICRC, IOM, PIN, DRC, Medair, NRC, UNHCR); 207 completed.

Other hromadas: 6294 HHs out of 37115 HHs are covered by partners; 1051 completed (ACTED, Medair, ZOA, NRC, IOM, R2P, UNHCR).

L&M Repairs:
1883 houses are damaged and in need.

NFI solid fuel : priority is 17 hromadas: 2766 out of 45056 HHs are covered by partners. 331 completed (Rokada, IOM, PIN, UNHCR, R2P);

Other hromadas: 4811 out of 78575 HHs are covered by partners. 849 completed (Medair, GER3, ACTED, PIN, UNHCR).

6. Building Blocks (BB) presentation

Supporting the implementation of Building Blocks in Ukraine (Monika Bernard), Global Project Manager for Building Blocks (Jessica Stanford), Coordinators or intermediaries between Building Blocks global team and Ukraine operation (Maurizio Blasilli, Ahmad Omar)

- **Collaborating on BB: Community Agreement**
For the coordination to happen, the organizations need to agree on one currency. So, Building Blocks system for the moment is configurated in Ukraine to support coordination of assistance using Ukrainian Hryvnias (UAH), which is the local currency in which most distribution happen; Deduplication ONLY within each category; Organizations choose deduplication option or opt for assistance without deduplication; Loading of historical data for this winter; First come, first served; Successful import is an obligation to assist; Removal of unsuccessful assistance.
- **Ukraine Shelter Cluster BB Users: Pre-Requisites Checklist:**
 - Common Unique Identifier/Beneficiary Tax ID
 - Organizations with active winterization programs approved by Shelter Cluster
 - Completed and signed user management form(s)
 - User encryption set up & onboarding training.
- **Access to Building Blocks (BB):** once all those community agreements and rules and also all the per requisite are in place, we will grant access to the system to each organization. Usually, we recommend two to three users to have access to the system each user will have its unique account and will access the system through a web platform. Through this web platform. Each organization will be able to import the tentative assistance file and, in a return, receive an Excel report with the duplication results, I will not go into the details on system functionalities and to deep dive on how it works from technical standpoint, this can be part of a separate meeting or, or the trainings, this is.

- Next meeting is last for 2023, please come f2f if possible – we will commence discussion on 2023 end-of-year report & achievements.
- **Victoria Murtagh from DRC** has mentioned that in relation to the asbestos disposal the contractors are starting to raise the prices of building repairs and renovations because of the presence of asbestos and the rules and regulations that are being implemented by the government for the safe disposal of asbestos. However, at this point, in time there are very limited sites where these materials can be safely disposed of. So, it would be good to start a TWiG on this issue. **Senior Technical Coordinator Leandro Jesus Fernandez Jardon** has stated that the Shelter Cluster has already started to contact partners in this regard, it is a very good initiative to have a TWiG, please also be aware that there is an environmental Working Group lead by UNDP for environmental issues that probably, there are some overlapping in the thematic, but it's important for us to have our own vision of what, how to deal with this problem. **National SNFI Cluster Coordinator John Wain** has also highlighted the importance to touch base with UNDP since they had multiple meetings with authorities previously and it's important to make sure we are connected and aligned with the existing environmental Working Group.
- **Rubiya from IOM regarding IOM Common Pipeline:** IOM has sent one email to all the existing Common Pipeline partners with a survey to fill in by the end of this week, it will enable us to extend the MOUs for the next year. At the same time, **if there are any new or potential partners who would like to access the Common Pipeline supplies from IOM in 2024, feel free to contact us at IOM.**
