1. Introduction

Deputy Shelter Cluster Coord Officer (Kostyantyn Dmytrenko):

National SNFI Cluster Coordinator (John Wain):

- Final national shelter cluster meeting of 2023 – thanks everyone for all your support – pleasure to have Ministry Reintegration with us again today for a brief update. We have made a very conscious effort to strengthen our collaboration with the Ministries and the local authorities, and this is something we will continue to work hard on in 2024.
- 2023 response dashboard (3.4 m unique beneficiaries reached, with 3.3M target) exceeding – certain activities falling short & we will attempt to address these in year-end review and 2024 plan. Please have a look at our dashboard.
- 2024 HNRP – We've slightly changed our strategic objectives: we've increased our target to PIN=7.9M, Target is 3.9M, Financial ask for 2024 is 604M – So we have a very big year ahead, so we are extremely grateful and looking forward to your continued support and collaboration, hence today we will have a presentation from Behrooz on our HNRP figures. It's very timely as I know many of you are working on the UHF first standard allocation for 2024.
- Winterization continues as priority please ensure your winter figures on the Dashboard are updated – we are under big pressure to regularly update HCT on response status, challenges & gaps – only as good as our partner data. We really have to stay on top of response status, challenges and gaps, it looks like we're doing very good, but our figures are only as good as the numbers that you update and include. **Partners are encouraged to be vigilant with the updating of the winter dashboard.**
- **Winter dashboard – please keep focused on updates, do make sure that the Dashboard is updated, it is extremely important as it is becoming a key reference as we progress on into winter**

- **UHF** – first standard allocation for 2024 – there has been an extension on the deadline due to additional commitments for winter top-ups. **The submission of project proposals is now due to 12th of January**, but we will update today in the meeting and we are extremely grateful for UHF colleagues for joining us this afternoon.
- It's a pleasure to have the Deputy Minister of Ministry of Reintegration Oleksiy Bruslyk with us today.

2. Presentation from the Deputy Minister Oleksiy Bruslyk of Ministry of Reintegration.

Deputy Minister of Ministry of Reintegration (Oleksiy Bruslyk):

- Since we have started working on the emergency response to the needs of the affected population in Ukraine, our relations have grown not only into partnership, but also into friendship and I would like to thank the S/NFI Cluster and its partner organizations for your assistance.
- Since June 2023, the Ministry of Reintegration, together with the S/NFI Cluster in Ukraine and its member organisations, have been cooperating to provide solid fuel to vulnerable population in the autumn-winter period of 2023-2024. The Ministry of Reintegration has identified 9 priority Oblasts that we are addressing directly with the S/NFI Cluster. We are focusing on those areas where people face the most hardships because hostilities are ongoing or have occurred there. These Oblasts include: Dnipropetrovska, Donetsk, Zaporizka, Mykolaivska, Sumska, Kharkivska, Chernihivska, Khersonska and Luhanska Oblasts. I would like to note that over these six months of our joint work we have managed to achieve a lot and our cooperation with the S/NFI Cluster is aimed at coordinating our joint work and ensuring that the people who are in the greatest need receive the assistance. We are aware that the resources of international organizations and our partners are limited, so these resources should be directed to those directions where there is the greatest need for assistance.
- We work with international partners, as well as state and local authorities, and we are able to identify the needs on the ground within each individual hromada and then deliver assistance to the beneficiary. At our request as the Ministry, the following information was provided by the S/NFI Cluster: In 2023, international organizations provided assistance to 70,621K people in 9 Oblasts for a total of \$19,915,122 at the rate of \$282 per person. This includes solid fuel, cash assistance, etc.
- As for the format of our cooperation: in addition to spot checks of needs, we work within the framework of the coordination headquarters chaired by Vice Prime Minister of Ukraine Iryna Vereshchuk. We held a meeting to discuss the provision of solid fuel to residents of Kharkivska and Khersonska Oblasts, and on behalf of Iryna Vereshchuk, I would like to thank our partners. Colleagues, the heating season is ongoing, the war continues and we are forced to respond to the conditions of the armed conflict in a crisis. The aggressor is attacking critical infrastructure facilities, so there may be situations where we will need to respond to the needs that may arise.
- We can also talk about other forms of cooperation in 2023, the priority being the heating season, if you have additional opportunities and resources, if we are talking about areas where there is no hostilities, one of the priority categories of the population affected by the hostilities are IDPs, families of military personnel, people with disabilities, large families who also need our support, especially in providing solid fuel, so if you have additional resources and plans to work with other Oblasts besides the 9 we are talking about, please pay attention to these vulnerable categories of the population. Partners are encouraged to coordinate the work and support to the affected population with solid fuel through the Oblast Administrations. From my previous work experience in the Poltava Oblast Military Administration, the best way to ensure that the resources you have are used appropriately and effectively is to coordinate your work with the Oblast Administration. Please, as our donors and partners are working in the hromadas of the Oblasts, please coordinate your work with the Oblast administrations, we have coordination centers for civilian support, we have coordination bodies at the level of Oblast administrations, specialized deputy heads of Oblast state administrations who are in charge of the winterization period or are in charge of providing assistance to the affected population. We see a situation where territorial hromadas are not always able to properly organize this work on their own. I repeat once again that the resources you have and allocated for assistance within one Oblast are limited, and the Oblast administration knows better where the greatest need is in the Oblast. I am grateful for the work we did in 2023 on the way to preparing for the winterization period, I am grateful for the work we are

doing now and I hope that the plans we have will be implemented. We, as the Ministry of Reintegration, are open to cooperation and encourage you to continue to support the affected population, without your support, it will be extremely difficult for us as a state, local governments, local authorities and the affected population to get through this period.

3. UHF update

UHF Deputy Fund Manager (Madoka Koide):

- **UHF** In the GMS, this allocation is now named 2024 First Standard Allocation (formerly 2023 Second Standard Allocation). Thematic priorities and the eligible partners that can submit direct project proposal to the allocation remain the same. We have about \$60M allocated for the allocation under three thematic priorities and which we will go over in and there is a list of 134 eligible partners.
- **Allocation Thematic Priorities:**
 - Last-mile delivery of critical humanitarian assistance to hard-to-reach areas closest to the frontline (30 km) and Russian border (20 km).
 - Multi-sectoral and critical single-sector assistance in the raions of high intersectoral needs in the Eastern, Southern and Northern Oblasts.
 - Coordinated multi-sectoral assistance to support vulnerable IDPs in prioritized collective sites.
- **Allocation parameters:**
 - Geographic and sectoral targeting informed by MSNA, field consultations and 2024 HNRP targets.
 - Prioritized activities of 2024 HNRP.
 - Priority will be given to the meaningful multi-sector interventions or critical single-sector project proposals.
 - Partners should refer to Annex 3 (cluster priorities matrix) of the Allocation Strategy for the detailed information on multi-sector and single-sector priorities under this allocation and consult relevant Cluster/Cash WG Coordinators about prioritized HNRP activities within these priorities.
 - Cross-cutting priorities should be incorporated into project proposal design.
- As for the cross- cutting priorities and we are prioritizing continually through UHF local partnerships localization. Submissions from national and local partners, eligible partners, as well as those from international partners that incorporate meaningful local partnerships will be prioritized also protection mainstreaming (including GBV), disability inclusion, gender and age inclusion, AAP and PSEA accountability and prevention of sexual exploitation and abuse as well as coordinated multi-purpose cash and sectoral cash based assistance are all cross- cutting priorities that will be looked into during the proposal review and vetting processes. We conducted a partner training last week going over these cross-cutting priorities and how partners should incorporate them in the proposals in detail, these include: the protection mainstreaming (including GBV), disability inclusion, gender and age inclusion. The training recording and materials have been distributed among the partners, we are happy to redistribute them through the Shelter Cluster if any partners missed the training and want to follow up through the recording.
- **Meaningful localization. The UHF promotes the following good practices in local partnerships:**
 - Tailored and well-timed capacity-building support to local partners;
 - Provision of duty of care package to local partners including first aid and security training, mental and psychosocial support (MHPSS), personal protective equipment during operations in high-risk areas, and life and accident insurance;
 - Fair sharing of budget and PSC with local partners based on their operational coverage;
 - Sufficient sub-grant duration to allow local partners' organizational continuity and development (six months or longer is recommended);

- Innovations promoting strategic and effective localization; and
 - Making funding to local partners as direct as possible (no sub-sub-granting).
- **Operational priorities and eligibility**
 - Proposals should be submitted through the Grant Management System (GMS) at <https://cbpf.unocha.org> by **Friday, 12 January 18:00 Kyiv time (extended from the previously set 5 January deadline)**.
 - Organizations submitting projects **must consult** with relevant **Cluster/Working Group Coordinators** during proposal preparation for technical advice Note: some clusters have set optional review deadlines (e.g. SNFI Cluster) and developed additional sectoral guidance for the allocation.
 - Each eligible partner may submit **only one project proposal**, which may include one or more of the thematic priorities.
 - Only current **UHF-eligible partners can apply** for direct funding. However, it is possible for non-eligible partners to participate as a **sub-partner** in projects led by eligible partners.
 - Partners with their Due Diligence (DD) page unapproved **will not be able to see the open allocation in OneGMS**.
 - Projects encompassing **well-integrated and complementary programming (multi-sectoral or single sector)** will be **prioritized**.
 - Project logframe should feature **standard cluster indicators** to the extent possible, one or more **AAP and PSEA** indicators, as well as **localization and disability indicators** as relevant.
 - Projects **with high-cost effectiveness and aligning to the UHF budget guidelines** will be prioritized. Partners are encouraged to participate in the UHF budget guidance sessions planned on 21 December.
 - Under this allocation, all projects should complete implementation within **12 months**.
 - **UHF absorption capacity caps: Partners implementing concurrent UHF grants should be guided by the recommended caps for the maximum running UHF grants (including sub-grants)**. Proposals from partners exceeding these caps should include due justification and confirmation of the partner capacity to absorb additional funding through this allocation and complete the implementation of all running UHF projects in a timely manner.

- **Main winterization achievements**
- I would like to remind that you can find our Dashboards on the Shelter Cluster website among the key winterization activities that were provided to individuals, we can highlight the distribution of NFIs, winter clothes, heating appliances fuel in cash and in-kind fuel modalities.
- As a Cluster we are targeting 1.5M individuals through various winter activities, and as of now, we reached 753k individuals through Winterization (48 % of targeted population) mainly from provision of NFIs, winter clothes, winter heating, support for winter energy needs); In the Shelter Sector we are targeting 104k individuals, and as of now, we have reached 5k individuals (28 % of targeted population, mainly from provision of rental support, insulation of substandard housing, refurbishment of CSs).
- By modalities, we have reached 87% of targeted population by cash (mainly from support of winter heating, refurbishment of Collective Sites, support of winter energy needs), & 17 % by in-kind (mainly from provision of NFIs, winter clothes, winter heating, support for winter energy needs).

National SNFI Cluster Coordinator (John Wain):

- **Deadline for SNFI 5W numbers is the 10th January.**
- 2023 end-of-year reporting format will be similar to mid-year report (web-page). Translation into Ukrainian will be shared as soon as possible.
- We want to have a balance between numbers & narrative, we will be taking Hub by Hub.

6. 2024 HNRP review

Shelter Cluster Co-chair (Behrooz Taleb):

- The information that I'm sharing can be found on our Shelter Cluster website already for your convenience. We have gone through an extensive process of calculating our targets and financial ask for our methodology this year was based on JIAF2.0 and shelter severity classification. The highest number of financial ask is in Kharkivska, Mykolaivska, Dnipropetrovska, Sumska, Donetska, Odeska, Zaporizka, Khersonska Oblasts.
- 80% of target population resides in the East cresent, this is due to higher severity that we have detected during our process of HNRP.
- 57% of the financial request goes to Kharkivska, Mykolaivska and Dnipropetrovska, Donetska and Sumska Oblasts.
- 95% of the targeted population is over Severity Level 3.
- Highest finance ask for activity is Humanitarian L&M Repairs followed by Winter Energy, NFI for HHs, Rental Support, Winter Cash for Utilities, NFI for Winter.
- 45% of the total budget goes for winterization activities (CO2).
- ~21% of the financial request is for Humanitarian Light & Medium repairs.
- ~18% of the target population needs standard NFIs.
- This year we have 3 Cluster Objectives:
 - Cluster Objective #1 Provide life-saving shelter and Non-food items (NFI) support to conflict-affected IDPs, Returnees, and Non-Displaced People including Emergency Shelter support (ESK), NFI for HHs, Emergency Construction Material, Host Families Support (Prykhyvstok).
 - Cluster Objective #2 Deliver emergency shelter and NFI assistance mitigating the impacts of harsh winter weather for IDPs, returnees, and non-displaced people, while minimizing environmental impact including Winter Heating Appliances, Winter Energy, Winter Cash for utilities, NFI for Winter, Winter Clothing, Insulation of substandard houses, Provision of Sustainable Energy.
 - Cluster Objective #3 Ensure adequate housing solutions for IDPs, Returnees, and Non-Displaced People and fostering linkages to longer-term response including Humanitarian repair (Light and Medium), Humanitarian Repair of Common Spaces (Multistory), Humanitarian Repair of social facilities, Refurbishment of CSs, Transitional shelter, Rental Support, Heavy repairs, Provision of White Appliances.
- Total financial ask for HNRP 2024 is \$604M And we are looking into responding to a target population of 3.9M people.

7. Sub-National level cluster coordination highlights

- Western Region

Assistant Shelter Cluster Coordination Officer (Maksym Vakhovskyi):

- Thanks to all the partners for all their great work in the Western Hub, there were 31 partners, implementing 11 activities in the Hub. There were 3 directions of activities:
 - NFI
 - Shelter
 - Rental Support
- We've assisted more than 400K unique beneficiaries; over 25K beneficiaries benefited from repair works, especially Refurbishments in the CSs; Over 190K beneficiaries received NFI support of different kinds, including some Winterization items and Rental Support among the most prominent.
- Even though the news for 2024 is our plans signaled about significant reduction of activities in the West Hub, we still continue with our efforts.

- Central Region

Shelter Associate (Ihor Senkiv):

- The Central Hub of the Cluster has delivered assistance to more than 682K beneficiaries in Vinnytska, Zhytomyrska, Chernivetska, Khmelnytska, Odeska, Cherkaska and Mykolaivska Oblasts. The assistance was provided in the form of NFI kits, winter clothing etc. We continue to provide assistance in preparation for the winterization period. The local authorities have taken into account the experience of the last winter in planning for 2024, and will focus on the most relevant issues, namely winter clothing, solid fuel, and winter NFI kits. As of December, in terms of winterization, more than 18K people were provided with winter clothing, 2,500 people with winter NFI kits, and more than 100K people with solid fuel since the beginning of the year. This year, more than 2,700 households in Mykolaivska Oblast alone have been provided with solid fuel and cash assistance for the purchase of solid fuel. In 2023, the partners of the Central Hub directed the main flow of aid to the South - Odeska and Mykolaivska Oblasts, which were most affected. Mykolaivska Oblast was also the most severely affected Oblast in the aftermath of the Kakhovka dam explosion.
- In total, about 15 offline and 20 online meetings were held to discuss the problems and needs of the Oblasts.
- Thanks to the SIDAR platform, it will be possible to coordinate the work of partners performing repair works very successfully.

- Eastern Region

Shelter Cluster Coordination Officer (Renee Wynveen):

- Last week, the East S/NFI cluster participated in GCM meetings for Kharkivska, Donetska and Dnipropetrovska Oblasts.
- Meetings with Kharkiv Oblast authorities on winter fuel coordination and R2P on winterization activities were done also while in Kharkiv Oblast
- Tomorrow we are planning another round of winterisation coordination for Donetska Oblast - the invitation has been sent out.
- The Shelter Cluster team is providing support and feedback to partners on UHF with the extension of the deadline- east team will review any draft proposals of partners if shared by 29th of December
- Shelter Cluster partners coordinated response of light and medium repairs and of emergency shelter to newly shelled housing in Khersonska and Kharkivska Oblasts.
- **Brief update about Winterization Planning:** Winterization planning in Oblasts\gromadas on the LoC, there are 4 prioritized Oblasts: Khersonska, Zaporizka, Donetska and Kharkivska. In **Khersonska Oblast** there are 18 hromadas and all of them are considered to be a priority. The list of needs by hromadas as well as the gaps will be shared.

- **SIDAR updates:** there will be capacity building trainings for SIDAR in 2024, various partners are still working to integrate their updates into SIDAR. As of now, we have the following information:

- Northern Region

Assistant Shelter Cluster Coordination Officer (Anastasiia Chornii):

- There will be a Sub-national SNFI Cluster Meeting online on the 21st of December where we will discuss coordination, gaps, partner's presence, and involvement in Shelter Cluster.
- Key activities are NFI in terms of solid fuel and L&M Repairs. There are a lot of hromadas in Chernihivska and Sumska Oblasts that are close to the border, 21 hromadas in total that are under active shelling, that's why local authorities' aim is to cover the needs of vulnerable population, those needs are distribution of solid fuel.

- **Deadline for updates: New Year.**

- **Chernihivska Oblast:**

NFI solid fuel priority is 4 hromadas: 2766 HHs out of 11016 HHs are covered by partners (ICRC, IOM, PIN, DRC, Medair, NRC, UNHCR); 4515 (566) completed.

Other hromadas: 26722 HHs out of 37115 HHs are covered by partners; 21507 (1051) completed (ACTED, Medair, ZOA, NRC, IOM, R2P, UNHCR).

L&M Repairs:

1883 houses are damaged and in need.

- **Sumska Oblast:**

NFI solid fuel: priority is 17 hromadas: 6489 out of 31044 HHs are covered by partners. 4158 completed (Rokada, IOM, PIN, UNHCR, R2P);

Other hromadas: 36579 out of 38583 HHs are covered by partners. 32749 completed (Medair, GER3, ACTED, PIN, UNHCR).

L&M Repairs:

Deadline for updates: New Year.

5W – overview of reporting in 2023 was sent December 15, 2023.
