

1. Introduction

The website is updated to make it more user-friendly so that the most updated material is easily available. New sub-categories were added for the: dashboard, documents, discussion, events and factsheet. Additionally, the section useful links were added on the left-hand side of the website.

TWiG meetings are called for and take place when required and when inputs on technical aspects are needed or to find suggestions to move ahead and advise other partners on these aspects such as recommendations on winterization, collective sites or medium and light repairs.

A new TWiG will be established with a focus on non-government-controlled areas (NGCA) as the working modalities, access and capacity are very different from other areas of the country and for this reason, there is a need to guide what is possible in terms of provision of humanitarian support.

2. Partners update: UNDP presentation on asbestos

Mr C. Kelly, the disaster and Environment Advisor, WWF US, presented information on Asbestos as a naturally used fibrous mineral with extraordinary tensile strength, poor heat conduction, relative resistance to chemical attack and widely used material for insulation in buildings and heating systems, and as an ingredient in numerous products, such as roofing shingles and water supply lines, etc.

Mr C. Kelly highlighted the problematic side of asbestos such as:


- ▶ Carcinogenic to humans; can lead to other health issues
- ▶ Inhalation of asbestos is the principal route of exposure, but skin contact is also a concern
- ▶ Most, but not all, health impacts become apparent after decades
- ▶ The threat is most acute when asbestos is released into the air, most often when asbestos-containing materials are damaged.

It was mentioned that Ukraine has been a major consumer of asbestos and it is found that 60% of roofs in Ukraine may have used an asbestos-reinforced slate. Asbestos is released into the environment when buildings are damaged, during debris removal and repairs. The asbestos risk is

pervasive across most humanitarian efforts – any action which involves repairs or upgrading buildings or other infrastructure.

As for now, the following steps were done:

- ▶ OCHA-convened Asbestos Working Group has been created.



Asbestos Working Group Support

- Expect to adapt technical information and procedures for use in contracts or agreements
- Awareness materials in development by WHO
- Online training module on technical skills for workers in close contact with asbestos, e. g., debris management, significant building repairs or renovations, etc., in Ukrainian (**pending funding**)

- ▶ Collaboration with UNDP, WHO and others has been set.
- ▶ Advocacy – with ICCG, by WHO and via outreach to Clusters has been initiated.
- ▶ Support to Ukraine Shelter Light and Medium Repairs WG has been provided.

3. ICCG update: HNO/ HRP deadline – activities, costs, targets

Partners were informed about the HRP process for 2023.

The following main points were highlighted:

- HRP 2023 covers 12 months of the whole year.
- HRP target for SNFI Cluster for 2023 (12 months) is 3.4 million, approx. the financial envelope will be around 500 million USD.
- Main activities: emergency shelter kits, NFI kits, support for CSs, light and medium repairs in conflict-related areas and planned activities for newly accessible areas.

SAG endorsed the HRP targets and budget. During the next SAG meeting Activity Matrix in the terms of type, description and priorities of the activities will be finalized.

Upcoming SAG meetings:

- to finalize the HRP Activity Matrix - October 28, 2022
- to endorse the analysis part of HRP – November 3, 2022

4. SNFI Cluster progress dashboard, operational presence map

With regard to the operational presence map and operational response. The following main points were highlighted:

- 1,866,095 individuals have been assisted (50% of the total target beneficiaries for 2022);
- The main progress for the winterization activities was reported in rental support, NFI and solid fuel distributions.

Response update_25 Oct 2022

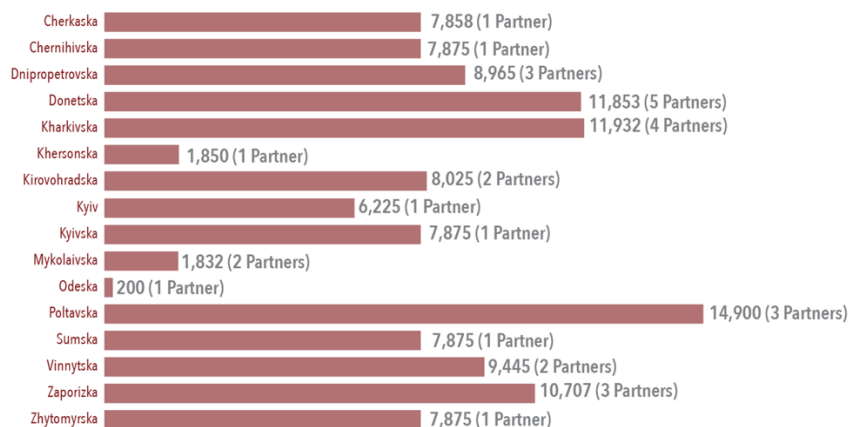


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The highest number of households targeted by solid fuel distribution was in Poltavaska, Donetsk and Kharkivska Oblasts;

Total Targeted Individuals by Oblast: 125,309 (16 Oblasts)



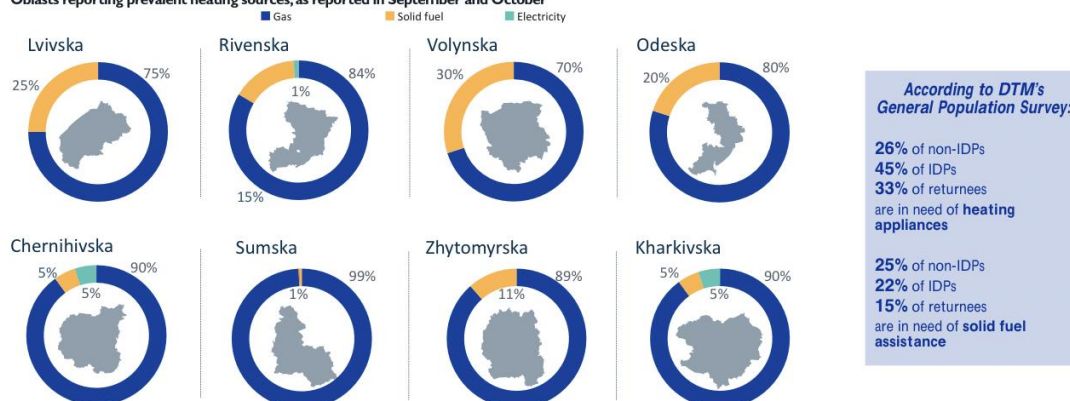

Coordinating Humanitarian Shelter

The following factsheet was created by the Ukraine Displacement Tracking Matrix (DTM) team in support of ongoing humanitarian operations, to identify current heating systems and the estimated cost of solid fuel items. Data was sourced from key informants operating in official capacities within local and regional public services with expert knowledge related to heating mechanisms.

Heating estimates are available in 8 out of 21 oblasts, home to an estimated 12 million persons, plus 972,131 registered internally displaced persons (IDPs).¹ Concurrently, the DTM team surveyed local markets between September 15- October 5, 2022. Prices on 5 essential solid fuel types are sourced from 3 markets, or vendors, and the report shows the lowest and highest prices per ton, or cubic meter, for each fuel type. The findings of that price monitoring are available on pages 2 and 3 and are organized by oblast.

5. Sub-national level cluster coordination highlights

- East newly accessible areas

The main points have been highlighted:

- Kharkiv – HOPC missions were conducted to distribute basic emergency response material and pave the way for SNFI actors to come and start their operations.
- Collective Sites database is still a primary focus for local Authorities and requests from Partners.
- Distribution of NFIs and basic construction materials are planned by various partners.
- Coordination tools for LR and MR are developed by partners.
- Kherson – the main assistance goes for now through HOPC and regular partners. Mainly to distribute NFIs.
- Winterization support (NFI, Solid Fuel, heating appliances) is needed there.

- Central region general update

The main points have been mentioned:

- Visits and meetings with oblast authorities in Zhytomyr, Khmelnytskyi are planned
- Data collection is ongoing from Khmelnytskyi authorities – relocated institutions (geriatric psychoneurological boarding schools and centers) are in the process
- Upcoming discussion on the rehabilitation of damaged houses in Zhytomyr oblast is in development

- Western region general update

The main points have been highlighted:

- Coordination Meetings in Zakarpatska and Ivano-Frankivska oblast are planned
- A meeting with Zakarpatska authorities to provide the necessary documentation for partners willing to participate in the oblast **Cash for Hosting Families** program is in process.
- Ivano-Frankivska oblast authorities are supported in coordination efforts to disseminate the needs for generators for centers hosting the most vulnerable.

Northern region general update
