

## Displacement updates in North-West Syria

Approximately 68,100 individuals were displaced from greater Idleb and Aleppo to IDP sites, and communities in North Idleb while some families crossed to Aleppo Governorate. Most affected villages that were affected along the frontlines include, Jabal al-Zawiya, Sarmin, Bennis, Ariha, Daret, Azza and Jisr al-Shugur.

Notable departures include 18,000 individuals from Ariha a further 14,250 from Daret Azza and 8,000 from Sarmin sub-districts.

KIs reported 56,691 arrivals in 162 communities. These arrivals encompass 11,995 IND in Dana, 10,098 IND in Afrin, and 7,877 in Maaret Tamsrin sub-districts.

Out of the total 56,691 DPs arrivals 21,342 were to existing IDP sites and new reception centers in Idleb and Aleppo. 2,742 of the IDPs are sheltered in 12 previously established Reception Centers that were reopened, or extensions of existing centers initiated earlier in the year due to the earthquake. 5,130 of the IDPs were reported in Four newly established sites in Afrin.

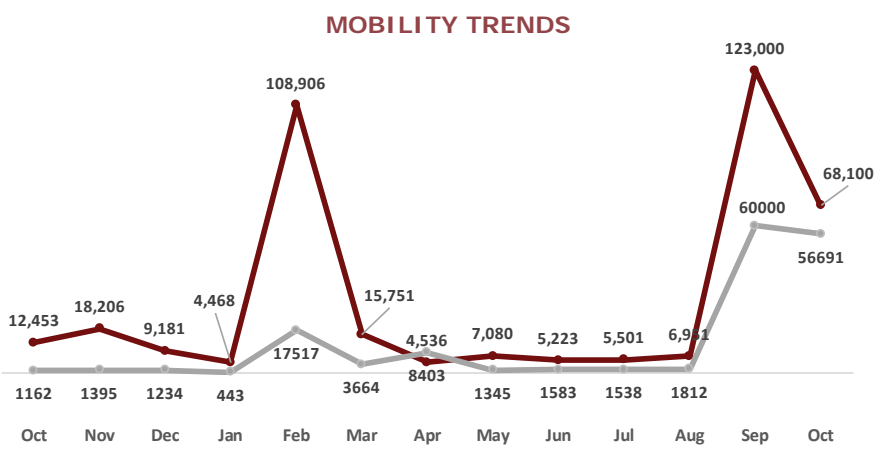

## Monthly response

Shelter/NFI Cluster members are actively responding to the needs of both newly displaced persons and protracted IDPs in North-West Syria.

In October 2023, NFI assistance was provided to over **83,620** individuals in the form of NFI kits, kitchen sets and cash.

Additionally, the shelter needs of over **46,061** individuals were met in October. with activities that included infrastructure improvements in IDP sites, dignified shelters, emergency shelter provision, and rehabilitation of damaged or unfinished shelters.



Graph: Number of displacements and returnees movements in NWS, as reported by the CCCM Cluster.

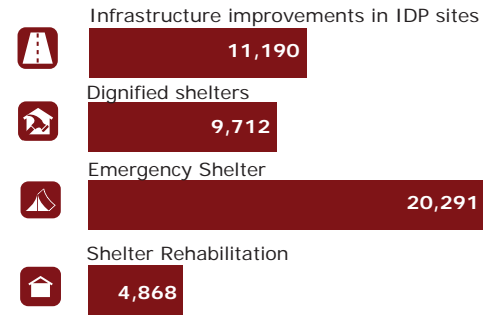

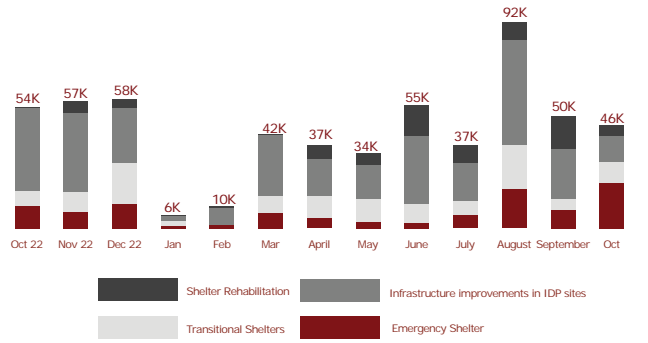

### People reached by shelter activity per month



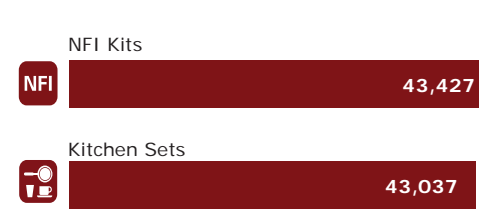

**83,620** People reached in October

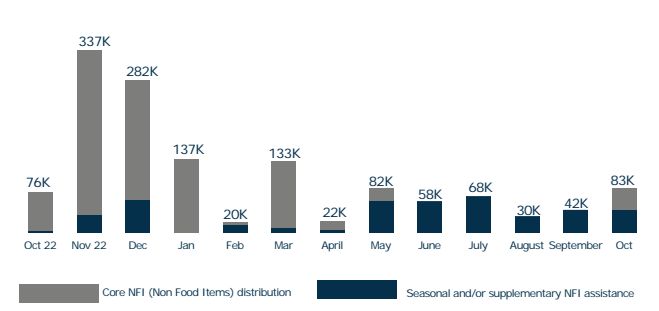
Approximately 672K individuals have been reached with NFI assistance (including both core and seasonal NFIs) since January 2023.

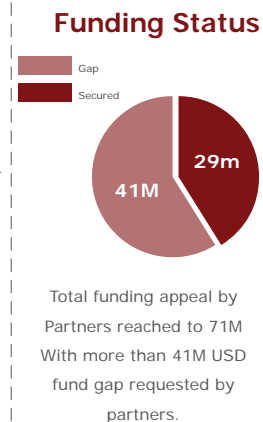
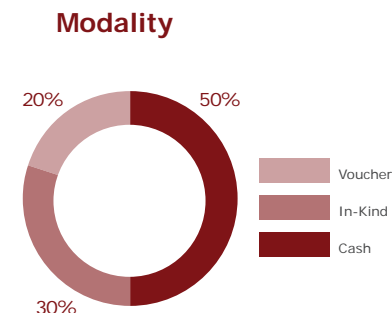
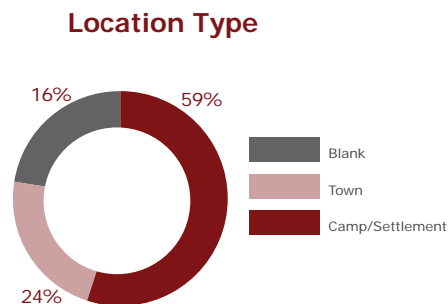

## SCHF 1<sup>st</sup> Standard Allocation 2023

The humanitarian response should primarily focus on: -

- Providing support for multisectoral lifesaving winterization assistance before the season begins.
- Mitigating protection-related risks for the increased number of people experiencing violence and exploitation.
- Implementing short-term flexible approaches, such as cash and voucher assistance, to meet people's basic needs.

The SNFI Cluster has been allocated \$4.6 million, however, the total amount of submitted proposals is \$10,929,304.

A total of 17 proposals have been received, consisting of 4 single cluster submissions and 13 inter-cluster submissions. These include 7 INGOs, 1 UN agency, 1 IO, and 8 LNGOs.

The main activities involve providing cash for winter and flood mitigation measures.

**The next steps** include the Cluster Review Committee (CRC) reviewing, discussing, and scoring the proposals.

## Workshops and Capacity Building Updates

In October, the Shelter/NFI Cluster conducted three workshops with support from UNHCR and Global Shelter Cluster.

### Rural Nexus Environmental Assessment Training (NEAT +) - 24<sup>th</sup> Oct 2023

The Rural NEAT+ training workshop was organized to train cluster members on the use of the Rural NEAT+ screening tool, with the objective of identifying possible environmental issues in project proposals and shelter activities. The workshop was supported by the Global Shelter Cluster.



### Information Management Workshop - 26<sup>th</sup> Oct

The workshop aimed to raise awareness of information management concepts, identify challenges and opportunities, develop an information management strategy, and improve information management products and reporting tools. The outcomes of the workshop included the development of a comprehensive information management strategy and improved workflows and analysis.

### Shelter Rehabilitation After Action Review Workshop Agenda - 31<sup>st</sup> Oct

The objective of this workshop was to review various shelter rehabilitation projects, share best practices and lessons learned, and identify major challenges and obstacles faced by members.

The outcomes of the workshop also specified areas for improvement in the Shelter rehabilitation projects in NWS.
