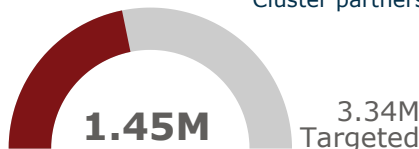

Mid-Year Achievement Report – Shelter Cluster Ukraine (January 2023 to June 2023)

The Shelter Cluster Ukraine is pleased to present its mid-year achievement report for the first half of 2023, covering the period from January to June. Despite the significant challenges posed by the ongoing countrywide airstrikes and the devastating explosion of the Nova Kakhovka dam, the Shelter Cluster partners have made notable progress in providing critical assistance to those affected by the war.

During this period, the Shelter Cluster has successfully facilitated shelter, non-food items and cash assistance to over 1.45 million war affected individuals across the country. Cluster Partners worked tirelessly to ensure that vulnerable populations, including women, children, and the elderly, received adequate assistance to protect them and prepare them for recovery and maintain a degree of relief amidst the Russian full invasion. Shelter Cluster is strengthening its collaboration with the Ministry for Communities, Territories and Infrastructure Development and the Ministry of Reintegration of Temporarily Occupied Territories through a dedicated focal point. Dedicated INGO co chairs from PIN and DRC are established at National Level in Kyiv and sub-national level in Dnipro.

Due to strategic Russian air attacks toward energy infrastructure during the first half of the year, there have been power outages and disruptions in energy grids across the country, which added complexity to humanitarian efforts. However, the Shelter Cluster, in collaboration with other clusters, has taken a more stable approach compared to the year 2022, with a focus on light and medium repairs. This approach aims to support the affected population in their return to their areas of origin by providing improved access to essential shelter and NFI needs. The ongoing conflict continues to disrupt civilian life and exacerbate humanitarian needs. As we move forward into the second half of 2023, the Shelter Cluster reaffirms its commitment to supporting the affected population in Ukraine and seeks continued cooperation with all stakeholders to ensure the delivery of vital services and shelter, NFI and cash assistance to those in need.

North Hub

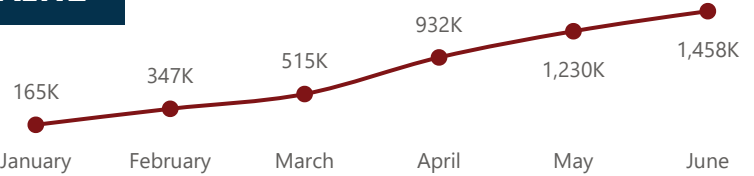
1. The North region covers 3 oblasts. As Chernihivska and Sumska oblasts are close to the border with Russian Federation, the key activities there are divided between emergency shelter kits for 3 hromadas in Chernihivska and 15 hromadas on Sumska oblast; Light and Medium repairs for all oblasts and NFI support.
2. Since January the coordination of Light and Medium repairs, Shelter Information Damage Assessment & Response platform (SIDAR) was rolled out in close coordination with local authorities. Today the SIDAR database is regularly updated with information on damaged residential buildings, assessments, and partner response.
3. The Cluster continues to organize regular Hub and Regional meetings online and offline inviting the representatives of Regional Administrations and local authorities to participate and highlight key priorities.

Center Hub

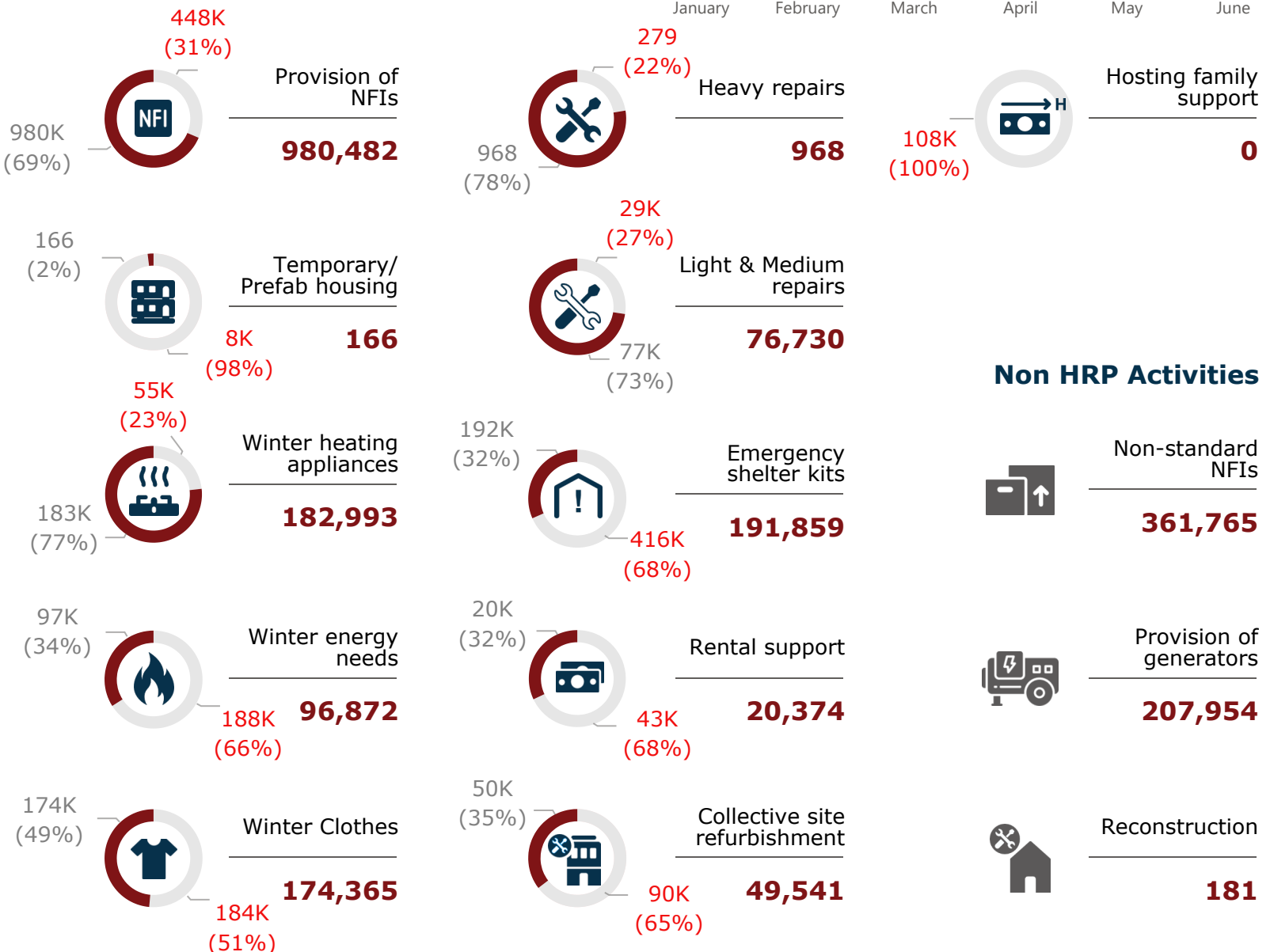
1. Central region covering 7 oblasts, becomes more and more affected by shelling. Drone and missile attacks intensified in 2023 targeting critical infrastructure and civilian objects. Increased presence of the military warehouses and divisions in the central region along with presence of functioning military airports makes central region one that suffers from air attacks. While state response was centered primarily around repairs of energy facilities, they depleted both -- budgets and emergency stock of materials leaving needs in repairs of civilian houses uncovered.
2. The cluster continues to advocate for resources – stock of emergency shelter items to be placed in the central region (Khmelnyskyi, Vinnytsia, Zhytomyr, and Cherkasy). The provision of emergency shelter response becomes even more life-saving activity in 2023 than it was a year ago.
3. The cluster continues to capitalize and build upon excellent relationships with oblast authorities. They play an active role in the coordination actively sharing the information and by co-chairing the meetings in Vinnytsia and Cherkasy oblasts.
4. Local NGOs become more and more involved in the SNFI cluster coordination in the central region. Sessions were conducted with local NGOs to capacitate them through provision of training on the SNFI humanitarian coordination structure. As a result, two local NGOs became UHF partners and implement SNFI activities in the region with the given funds from the recent UHF allocations.

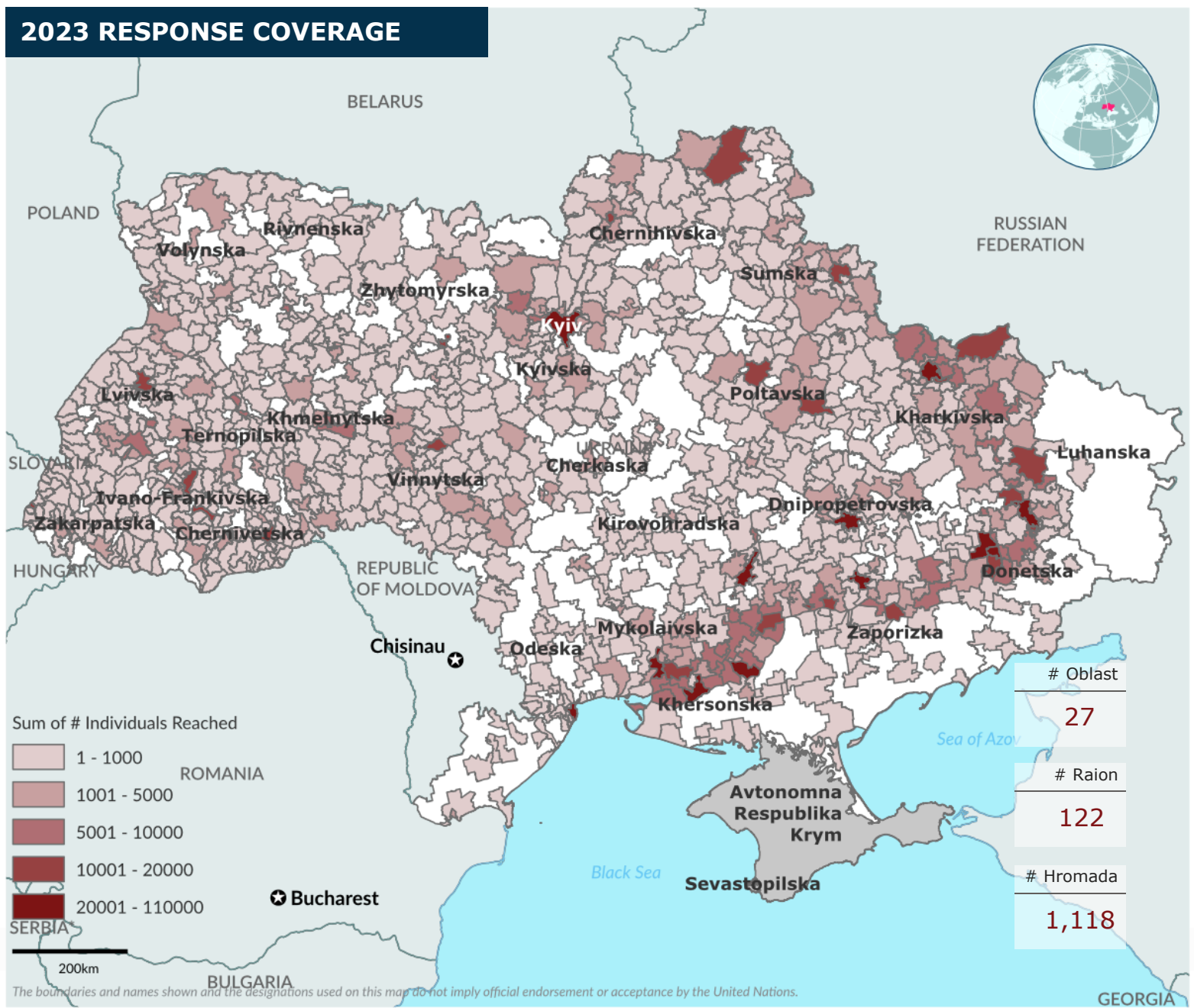
East Hub

1. East hub covers 8 oblasts. Kirovogradska and Poltavaska are mainly oriented towards humanitarian assistance to IDPs including distribution of NFI kits, rental support and refurbishment of Collective Sites. The majority of Dnipropetrovska and Kharkivska are accessible to humanitarian Partners while Zaporizka, Khersonska and Donetska are partially occupied and are impacted by constant hostilities. The main priorities here are emergency shelter kits, NFI kits, winterization activities. Luhansk oblast is inaccessible for the majority of shelter-related activities.
2. Since January the Cluster has focused on improved coordination of Light and Medium repairs. Preparatory work and extensive consultations with local authorities were held to prepare for the roll out of SIDAR from July onward. The Cluster has also promoted the use of the NFI Common Pipeline to enable smaller local organisations to quickly respond to needs in the East.
3. Some 15 Partners established their presence in the first half of the year bringing the total number of Cluster partners operating in the East up to 64. The predominant increase in response in the East was in Kharkiv oblast following the liberation of previously occupied territory.

West Hub

1. West hub covers 6 oblasts. While a significant amount of attention and financing is redirected to other parts of the country which are closer to the front line, partners who continue working in the west emphasize that this region is often the place where the most vulnerable choose to stay.
2. Western regions are chosen by many partners as the area to pilot projects on social housing, which is not only highly appreciated by the local authorities, but also gains experience and generates best practices for future development interventions.
3. While less frequent than in the North and the East, there have been significant attacks in oblasts in the West to which partners have responded with life-saving assistance and needed repairs to housing.

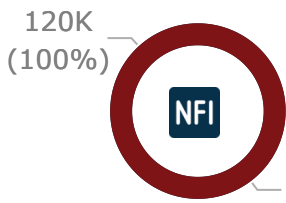


Distribution of firewood in collective centers in Lvivska Oblast / CORE

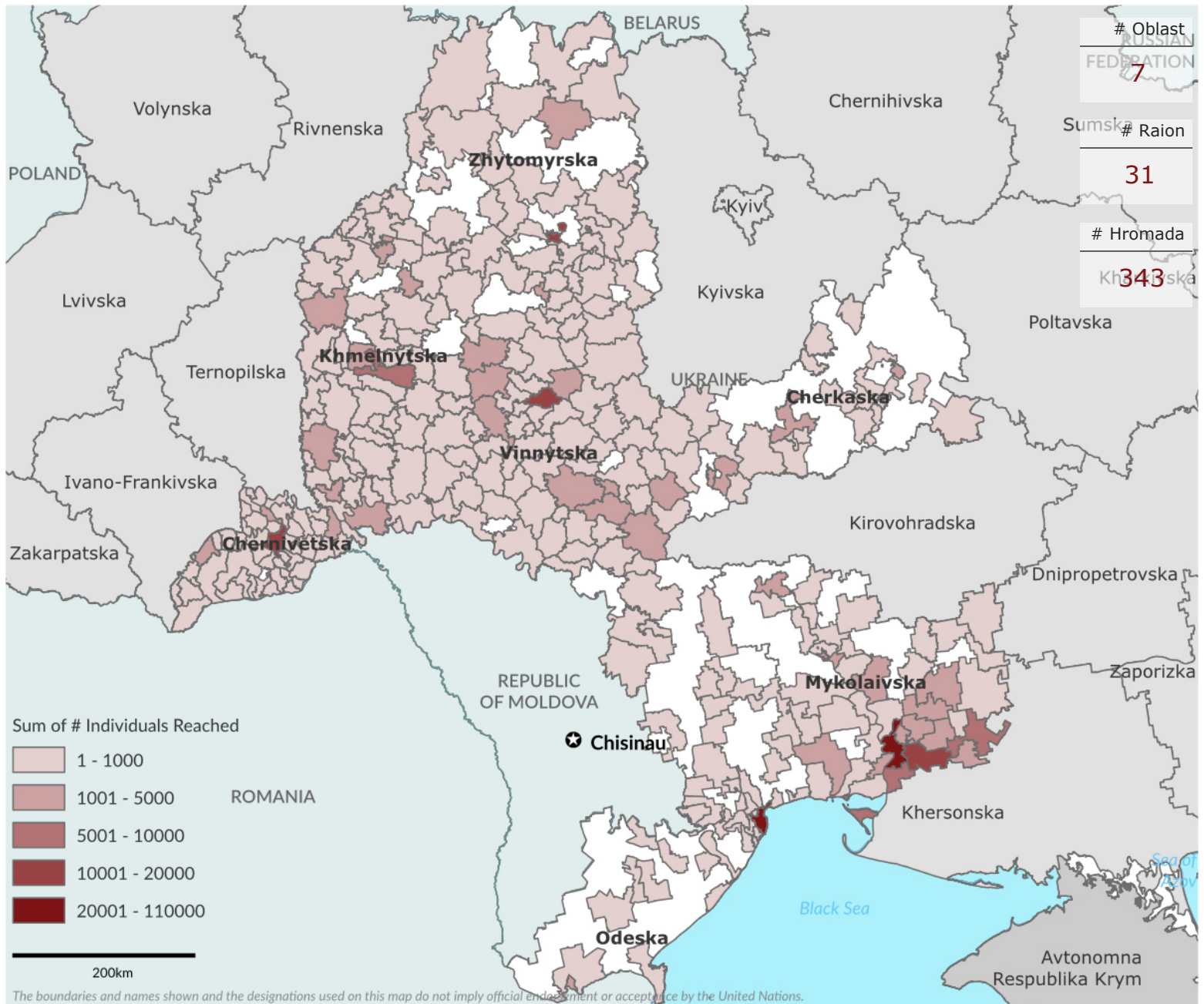

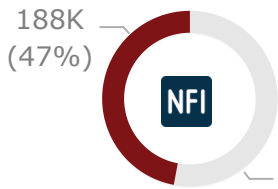
IOM distribution of NFIs in Odesa

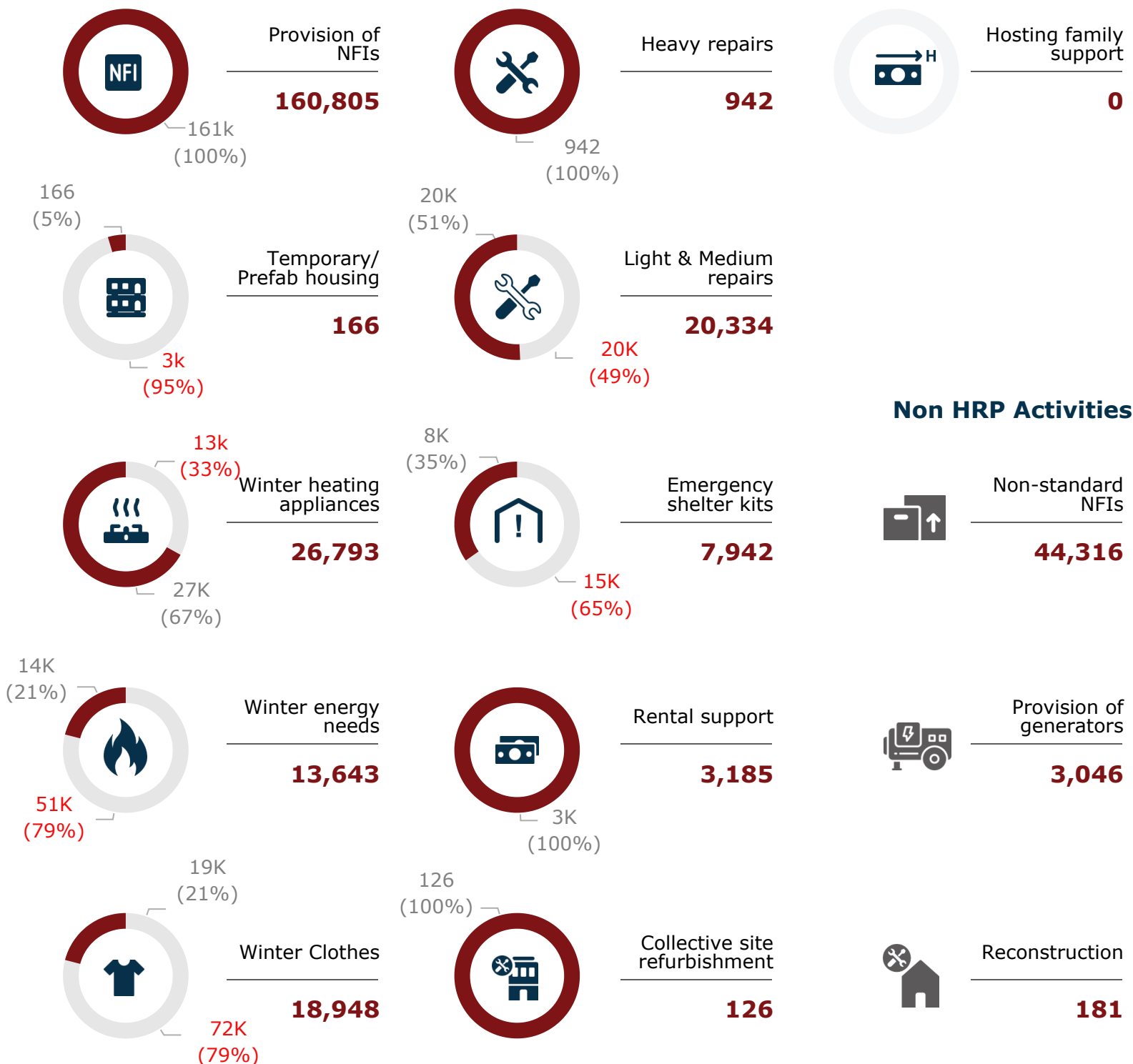
