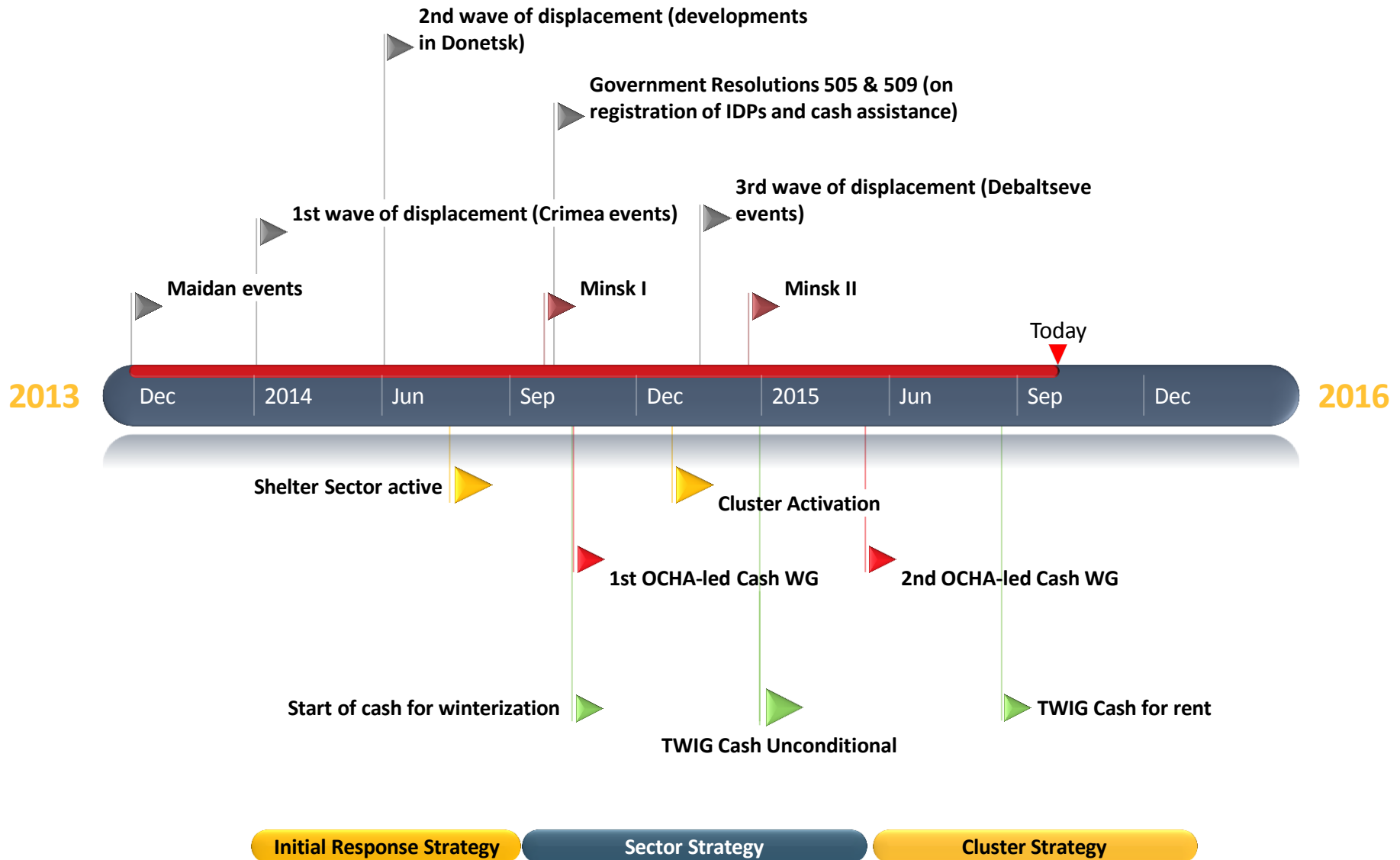

# Ukraine crisis in a glance

- Ministry of Social Policy of Ukraine (MoSP) reports **1.5 mil IDPs registered** (79% in the East)
- Est. **37%** (429,000 out of 1,158,961) of **officially registered IDP population in the East is stable** (excluding “commuters”) – based on triangulation of MoSP data and REACH assessment findings (varies by region from 60% in Dnipropetrovsk to 25-35% in Donetsk)
- **Main issues** as reported to phone hotlines: Housing, Documentation, Health

# Timeline in a Glance: Protracted crisis over last 22 months



# Shelter Cluster Strategy 1/2

- **Overarching objective:** to provide adequate shelter (SPHERE standards etc.) to vulnerable population
- Monetization, monetization, monetization ....  
Wherever is possible !
- **IDP crisis** – Govt. has primary responsibility, unlike refugee context where humanitarians' responsibility to cover unmet needs is predominant

# Shelter Cluster Strategy 2/2

- **Pairing cash assistance** in a country with developed existing social welfare system
  - Challenge in mapping social welfare system to find ‘niche’ / identify unmet population group or need
  - Even Govt. is providing unconditional cash assistance
- Developing a **phased sustainable strategy**:
  - 2014-15 well funded
  - 2016 probable funding decrease → need for more focused and targeted interventions e.g. Cash for Rent

# Importance of Cash assistance for Ukrainian crisis

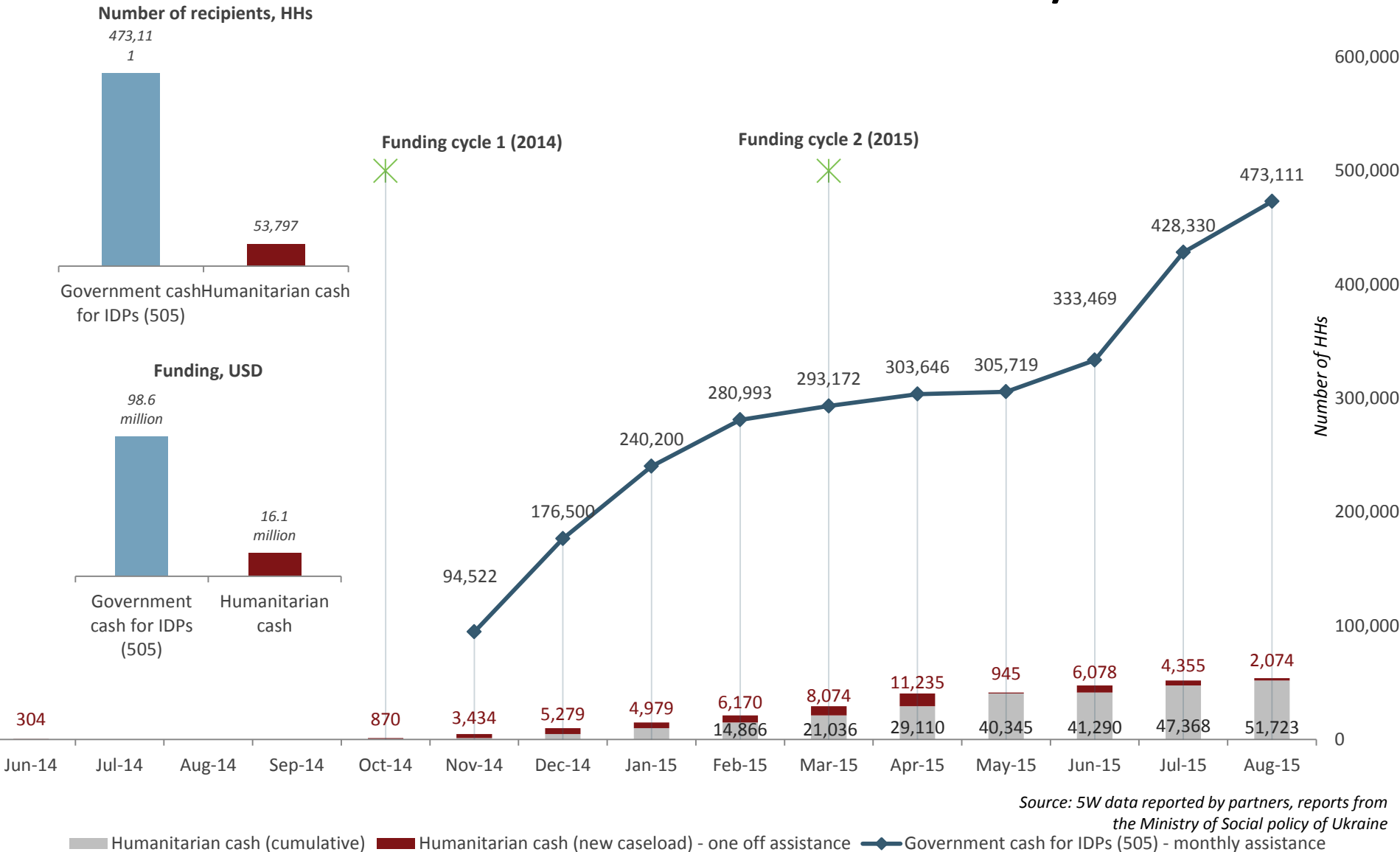
## 2014 FUNDING CYCLE

- Cash is **28.6%** of total Shelter Cluster budget – est. 4.5mil USD
- Nearly 30,000 persons received one-off humanitarian cash
- Govt. of Ukraine (“505”)
  - Monthly assistance
  - Nearly 10 mil USD (last 2 months of 2014)
  - 176,500 IDP recipients

## 2015 CYCLE – (to September)

- Cash is **41.8%** of total Shelter Cluster budget – est. nearly 16.5mil USD
- Almost 130,000 persons covered by one-off humanitarian cash
- Govt. of Ukraine (“505”)
  - Monthly assistance
  - Over 96 mil USD (to Aug. 2015)
  - 473,111 IDP recipients

# Coordination structures related to Cash

## 3 Clusters with Cash activities

- Protection, FSL, Shelter/NFI
- Reporting duties in HRP
- Cash modality is in line with respective Cluster strategies
- All host agencies have Last Resort duties : predictability
- TWiG for timely preparation of recommendations (criteria, conditional/unconditional)

## Cash Working Group

- No clear Cluster/Agency responsible
- Reporting of multifunctional cash – stand alone or within respective cluster?
- Risk to prepare strategy duplicating Clusters' strategies
- How Last Resort duties will fit into Cluster system ?
- Tendency to maintain the WG without time limit

# Main challenge in term of coordination for Cash

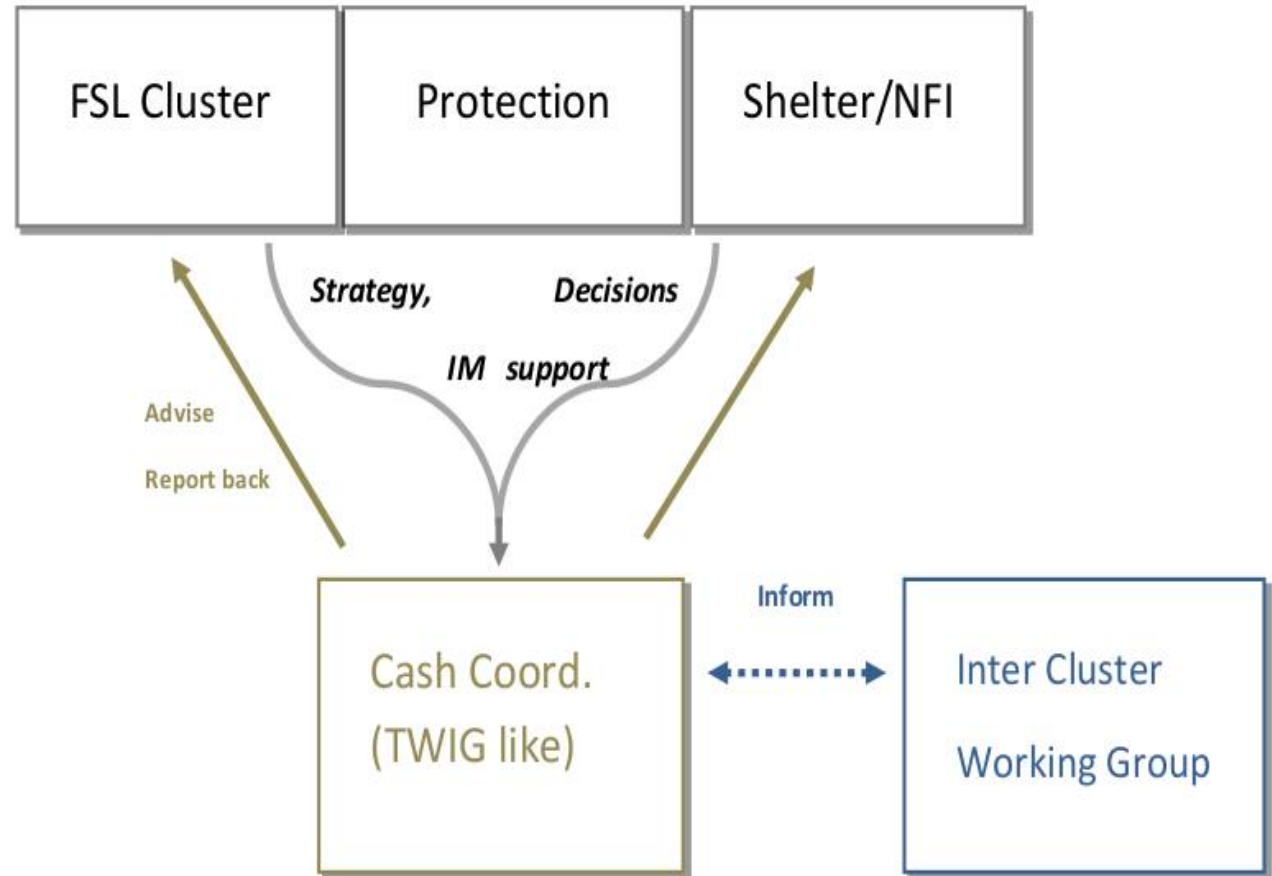
- Multifunctional, multi-sectorial, unconditional Cash assistance usually the source of challenge
- Without independent field monitoring, how **Post Distribution Monitoring** is not turning into only in a satisfaction survey
- In IDP situation in Ukraine with significant government assistance, how we guarantee that programming **increasing financial resilience** of IDPs is not sold as **lifesaving assistance** ?

# 'Itemization' necessity in middle income country

- Need for involvement of relevant Clusters as to when multifunctional cash modality is appropriate & calculation of recommended amount
- Use of itemisation needs consensus especially in IDP middle-income country:
  - Cost implication of cash vs. bulk-procured VAT-exempt in-kind goods needs consideration
  - Govt assistance already uses itemization for minimum monthly allowance

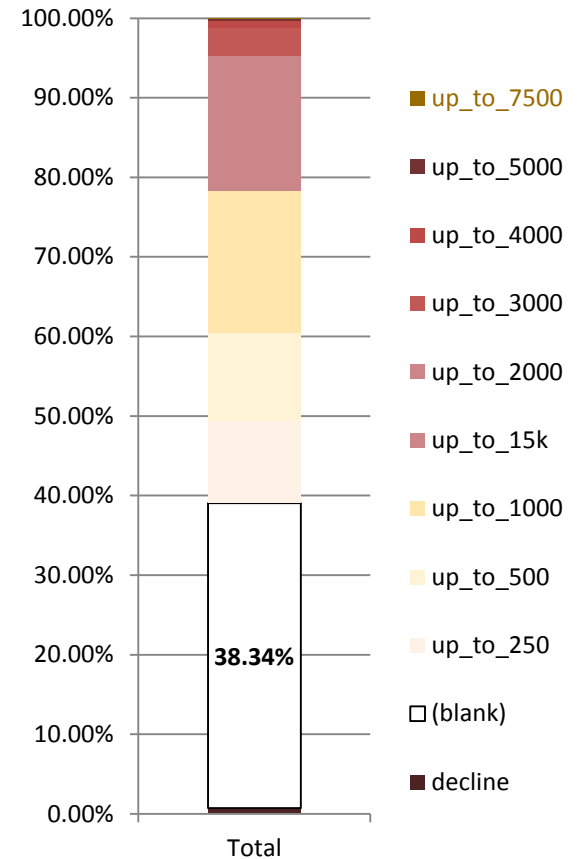

- Cash Technical Working Group informs ICG





# Beneficiaries Profile

- Broad range of category for Population of Concern (targeting and criteria problem).
- Some IDP's and beneficiaries category similar to lower & poorest regular citizens.
- 5 to 12 % are not registering (depending regions)
- 61% are paying rent, 40 % with a significant amount .



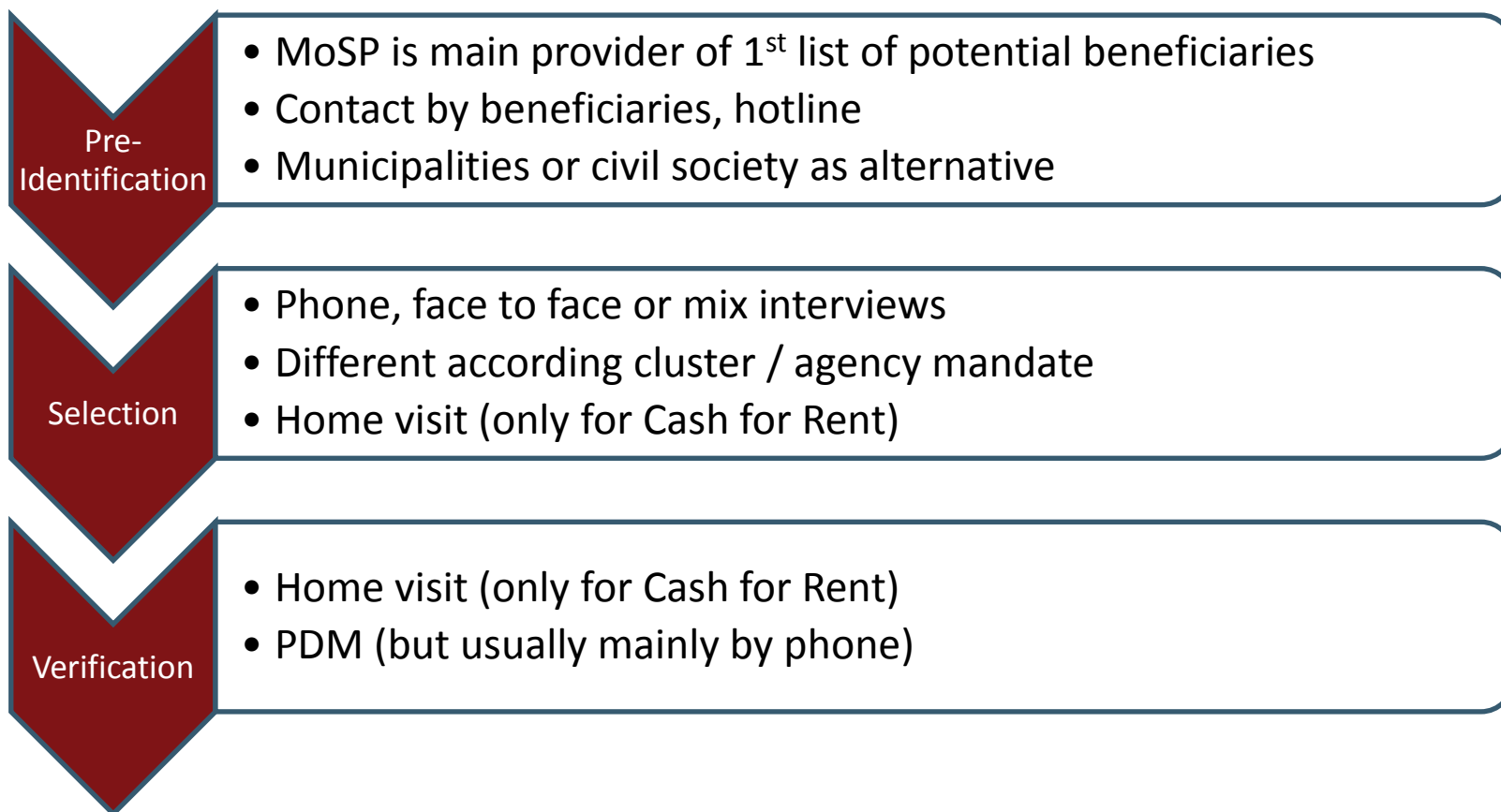

- No Cluster activated

- Defined strategy to tackle a protracted situation (transitional).
- Multiple source of assistance including Gove. in IDP situation.
- Need for fine-tune analysis
- Cluster activated

# Results of 1<sup>st</sup> & 2<sup>nd</sup> Post Distribution Monitoring

- Regional factors, disparity and difficulty to get a harmonized rate(s) through multifunctional approach. Further different GoU social welfare system makes difficult to consider what is covered and what is not on operational manner.
- Limit of PDM with organizations sharing what they want: true capture of reality shall be done through independent monitoring & visits, especially to inform completion and indicators coverage (ex: adequate shelter, K Calorie etc.).

# Kobo for 3W tool

## Pros

- works offline;
- has skip-logic and advantageous location cascading;
- works on all devices (app for Android or browser for anything else);
- online form used for weekly updates (or real time monitoring);
- platform can be easily replicated in other countries;
- platform is more widely used for assessments.

## Cons

- form is not good for capturing large amounts of data, so partners use Excel for bulk updates;
- Additional burden to develop systems to merge reports from kobo and Excel based submissions;
- monthly reporting cycle not frequent enough for operational coordination;
- Requires manual copy-paste if master database is in Excel or API development.

# Collective Centers Monitoring

- Kobo form to submit data;
- Entries transferred into Google Sheet;
- Real-time visual reports;
- Currently in development: area focal points for ongoing follow up

# Google Group for Cluster

- Google Group for all national announcements:
  - Mailing list;
  - Platform for discussion.
- Institutional memory for the Cluster;
- Storage of documents and links, esp. drafts (not to overload cluster page at [sheltercluster.org](http://sheltercluster.org) with drafts).

# Google Group for Cluster

## Pros

- Emails to all subscribed, settings for updates (immediate, daily/weekly digest etc);
- Storage of all sent correspondence (invitations, draft documents, links);
- Search option.

## Cons

- No availability of several separated mailing lists;
- Not always user-friendly interface;
- Emails may be recognized as spam (common problem for many platforms).

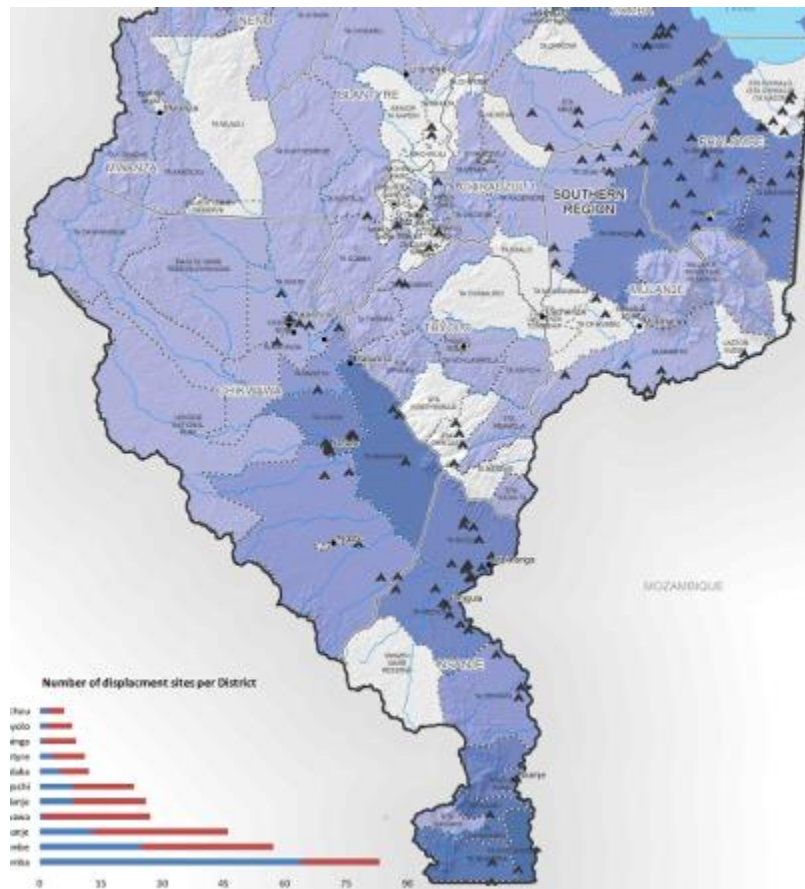

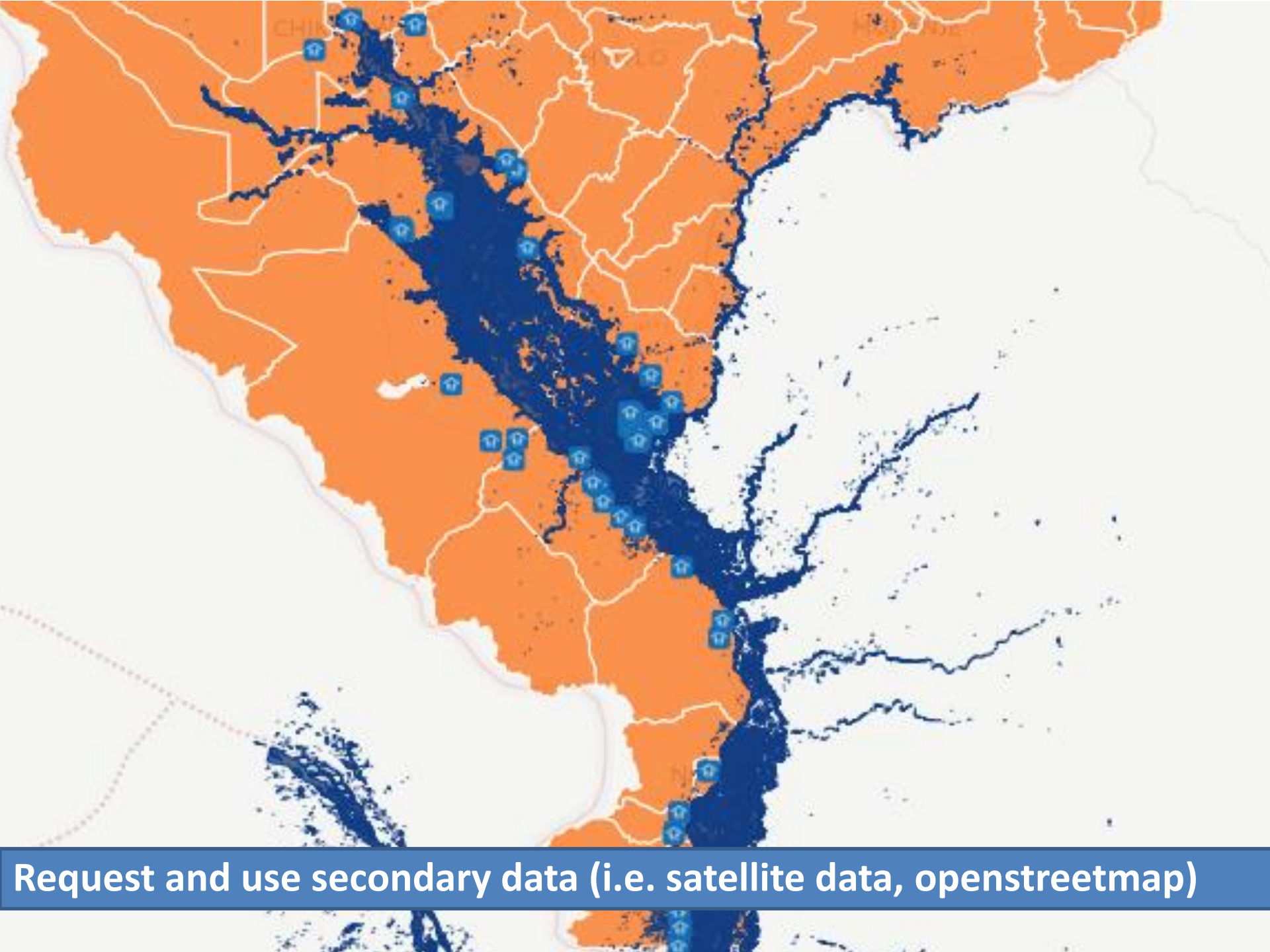

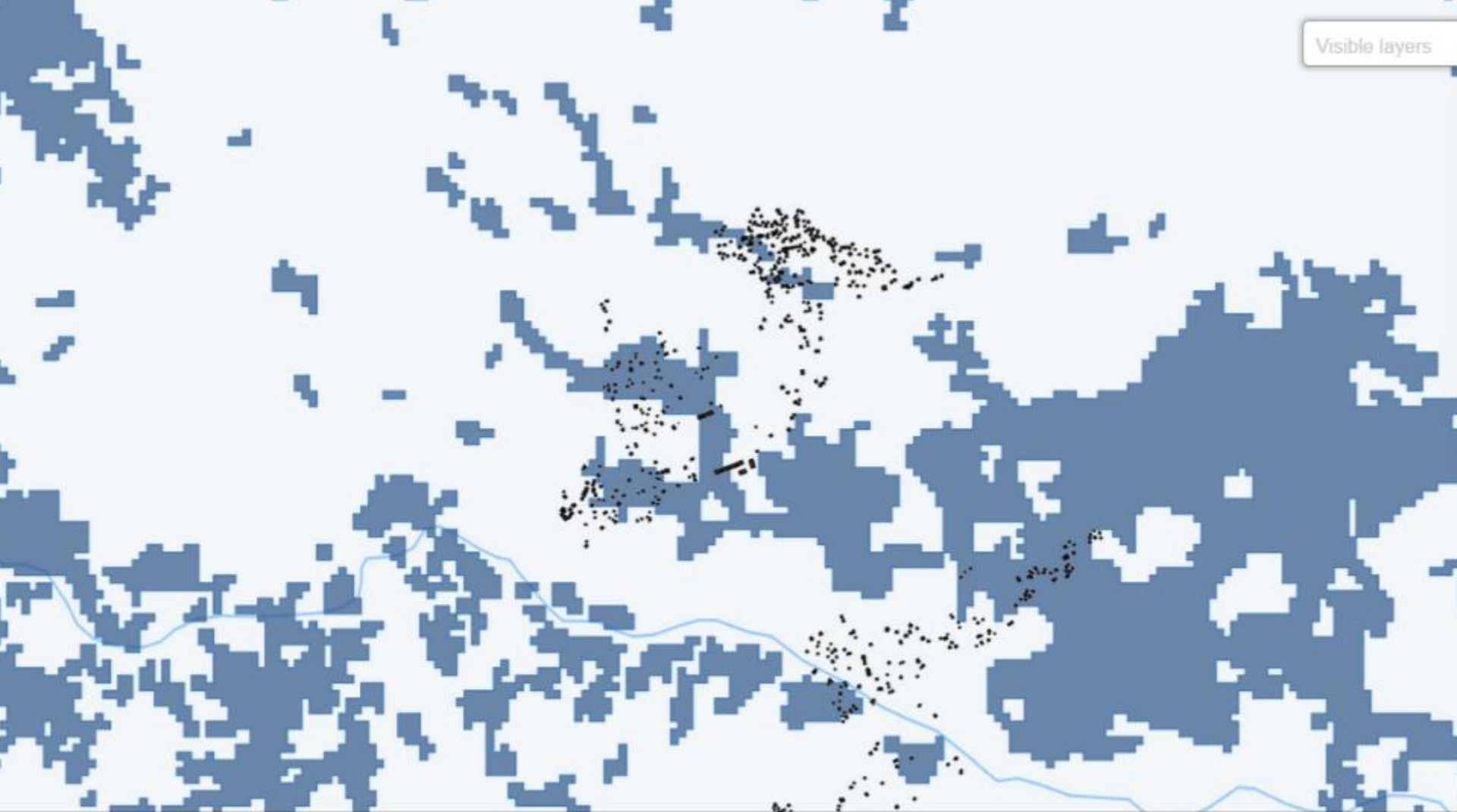

# Assessing the Level of Damage

- Inputs from three sources were used to triangulate the damage to houses and extent of damage.



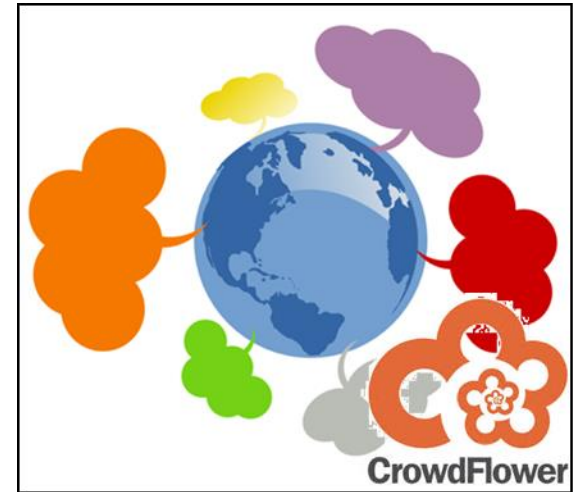
## Household Survey

- HH were asked, “Is your house damaged?”
- “Need rebuild or repair?”
- “Major or minor repair?”



## Community Survey

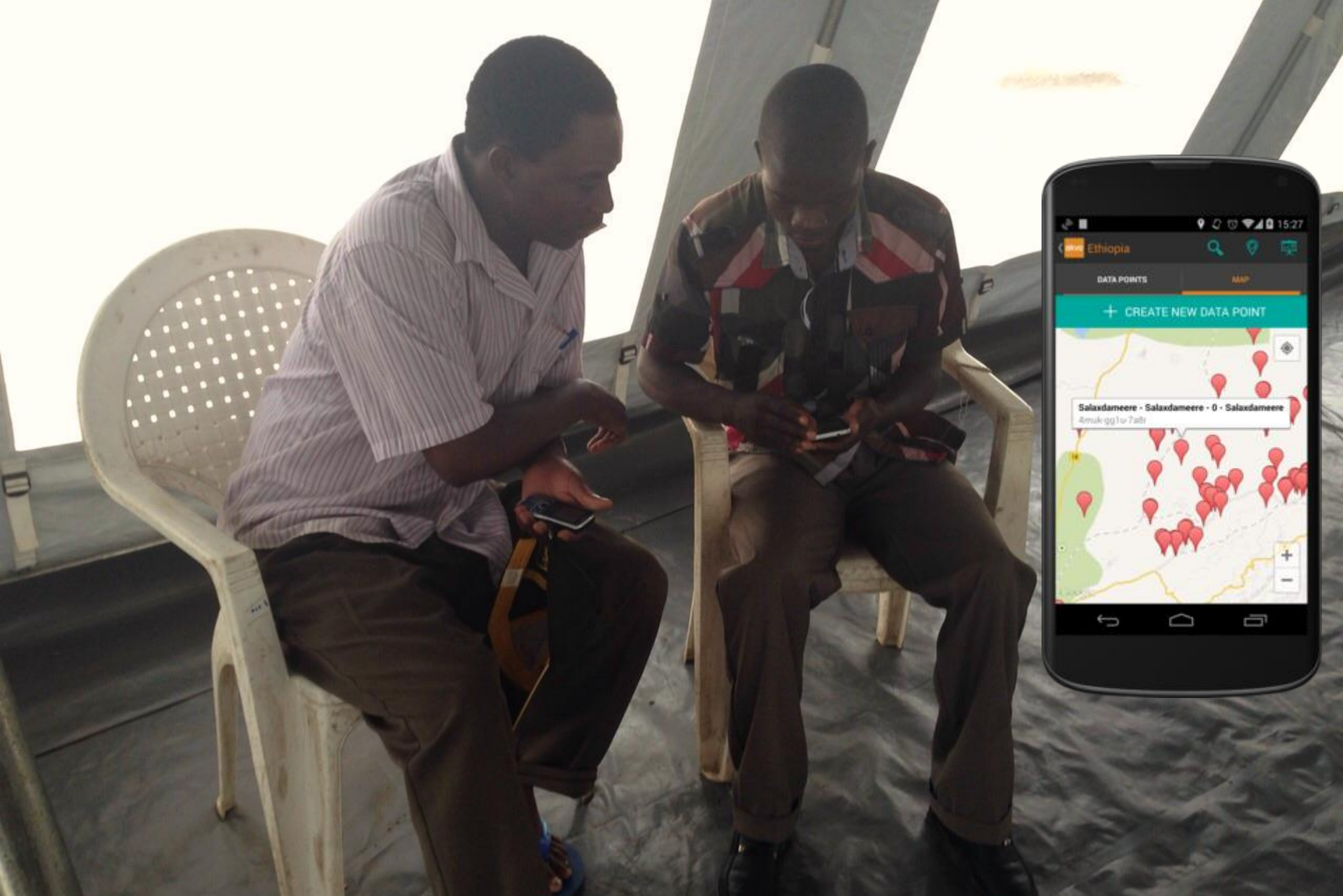
- Village Heads were asked, “% of houses with no damage?”
- “% houses that need rebuild”
- “% houses that need repair”



## Crowdsourcing

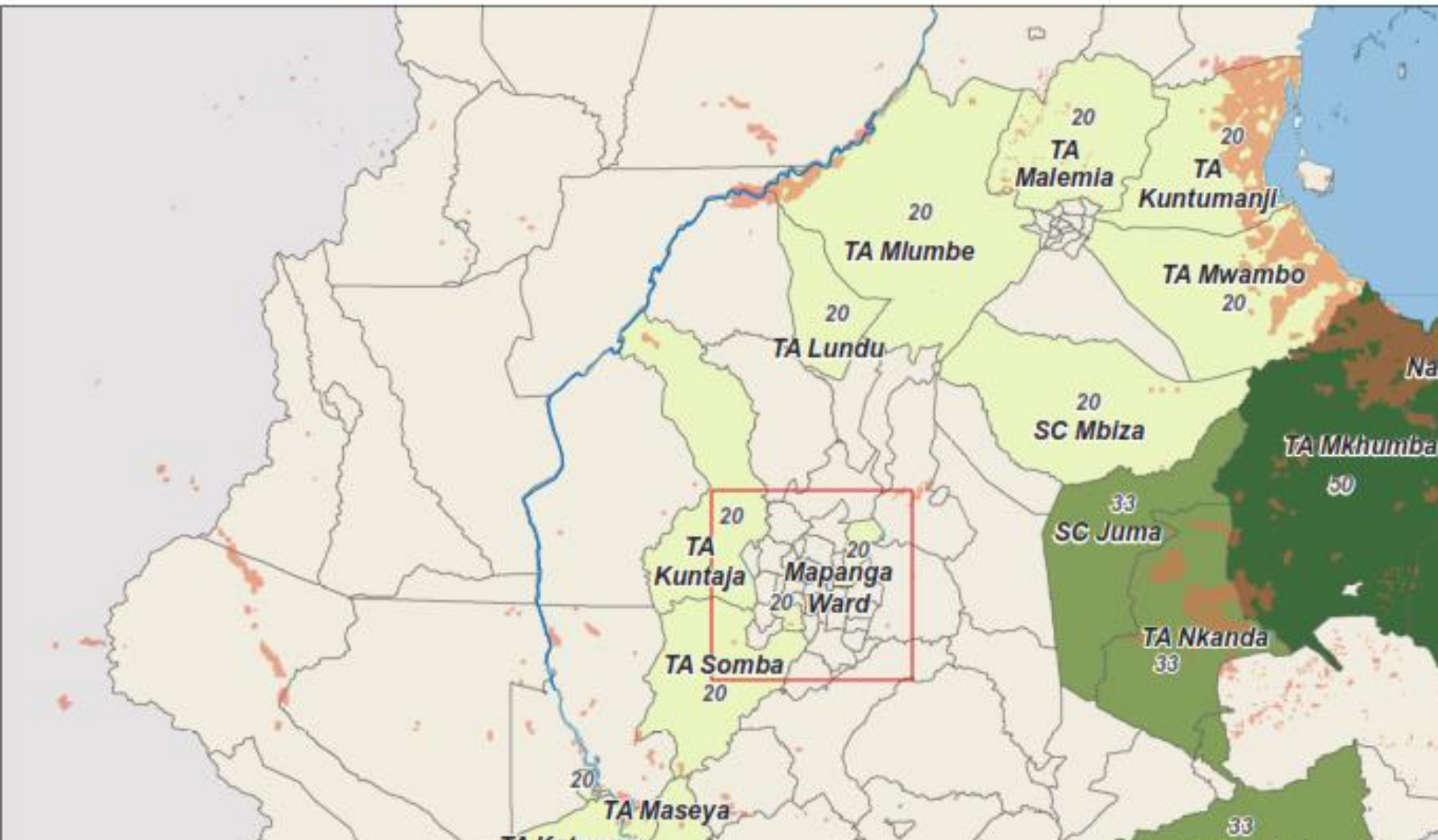
- Experts (e.g. architects, builders, engineers) were asked to classify the **photos** taken of damaged houses. Were asked to classify if house: has to be rebuilt, can be repaired, or has no visible damage.

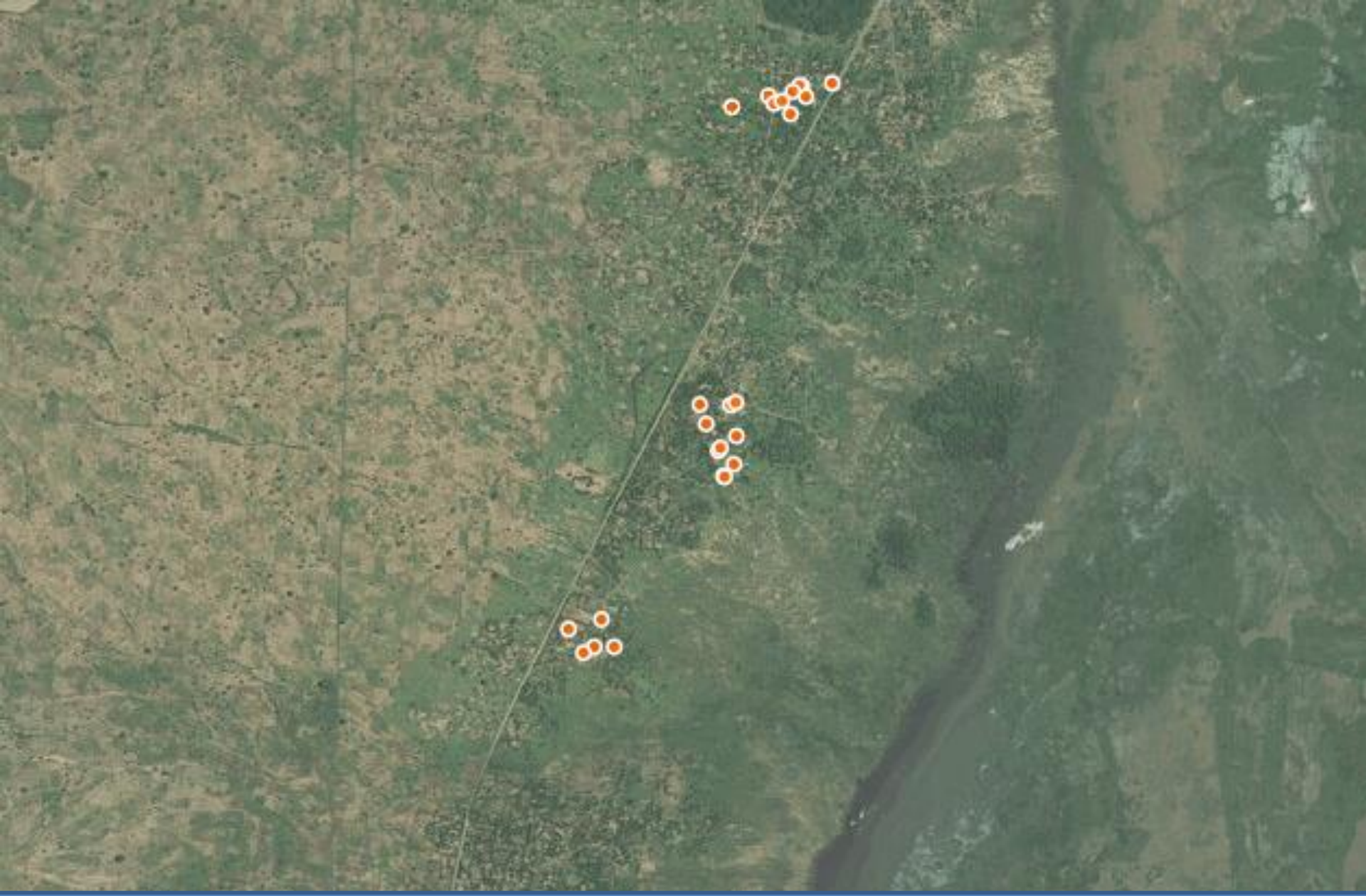

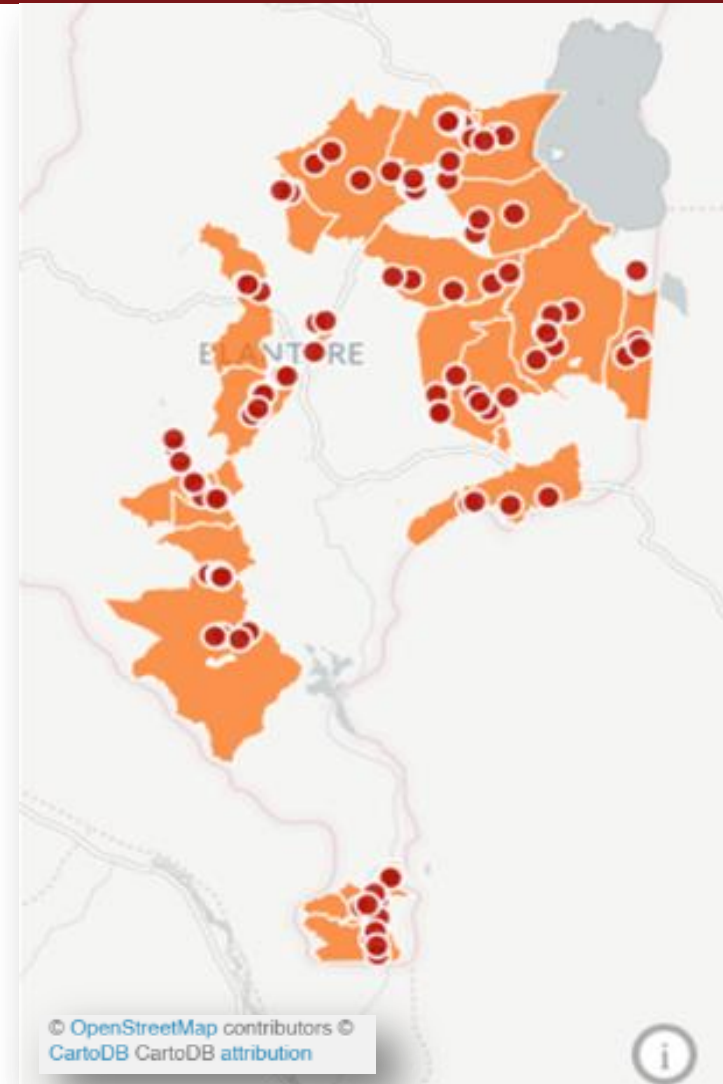


# Assessment Coverage

- 925 HH visited
- 7 prioritized districts
- 33 TAs (25 used in analysis)
- Supplemented with 112 community surveys
- 6 days, 20 enumerators, 4 team leads, 2 project managers, 2 IM

## IMPORTANT NOTE:

- HH assessment collected data from HH who are dwelling in a house. By design there is bias towards non-displaced households.
- IOM's DTM assessment to complement this assessment and provide details on those displaced in camps. Initial results expected week of March 2<sup>nd</sup>.





**Architects judge the damage of houses (online)**




- This house has to be rebuilt
- This house can be repaired
- This house has no (visible) damage

**Use crowdsourcing to have experts contribute to analyzing data**



# Level of Damage

- % HH with damaged houses consistent between HH & Community Assessments
- HH indicated high % of houses that need complete rebuild; community survey & photos review indicated more repairs necessary and lesser rebuild.

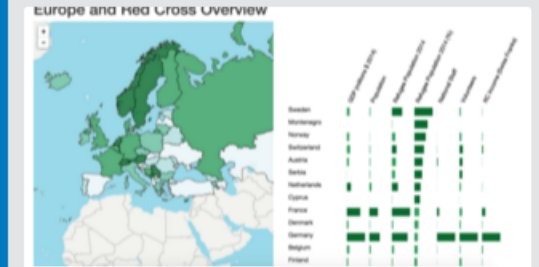

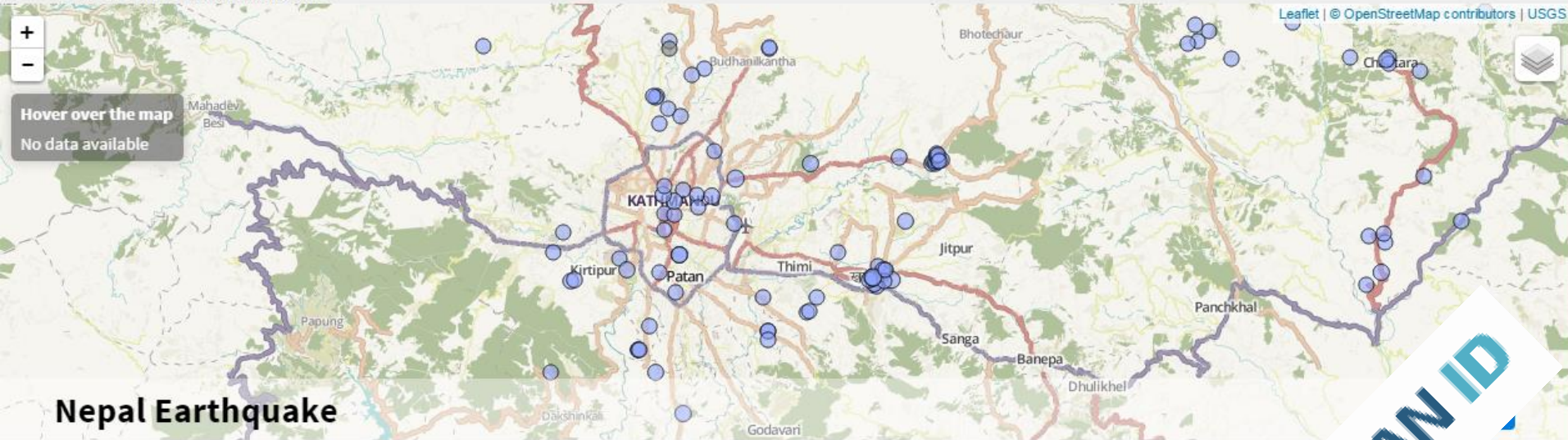

## Terms of Reference for the Shelter/CCCM/NFIs Cluster in Yemen

### I. Background

This background information is updated, taking into consideration the new emerging situation in the country. The Shelter/CCCM/NFIs Cluster (hereinafter the Cluster) has been in existence since 2009. Currently the situation in Yemen has changed dramatically. The entire country was affected by the civil war. Unlike in the past, the magnitude of the conflict in Yemen was not limited to certain Governorates and the south was particularly affected, although the northern region around Sa'ada was again greatly impacted. Following weeks of political and security instability in Yemen and armed clashes between armed groups and governmental forces in the south/Aden, a military coalition launched an airstrike campaign against Houthi and former President Ali Abdullah Saleh military forces on 26 March 2015. The declared objective was to roll back the Houthi rebel forces, reinstate the 'legitimate government' of President Hadi and establishing 'peace, security and stability for the Yemeni people'. Since then, 20 out of the country 22 governorates were affected by airstrikes and/or armed conflicts. The current escalation in violence adds further strain on poor services and weak infrastructure and exacerbates the already precarious humanitarian situation. Recent violence has also had an impact on civilian infrastructure, with homes, hospitals, education, local markets and essential assets in several locations being damaged or destroyed.

The Shelter/CCCM/NFIs Cluster is a forum for all actors to discuss and agree on issues related to shelter and NFIs. It is supported by a Coordinator, Senior Cluster Coordination Support and an Information Manager which assist the cluster members in developing necessary shelter/NFI actions in Yemen. A Technical Working Group (TWG), comprising the key 11 cluster actors, exists to ensure effective provision of shelter and NFIs to IDPs and other affected populations in need. The TWG guides the larger Shelter/CCCM/NFIs Cluster membership with policy decisions, strategic direction, coordination mechanisms and other technical topics. In spite of the current emergency, the Shelter/CCCM/NFIs Cluster envisions that its life-saving assistance will continue in 2015. This represents a priority and mainly includes the distribution of essential Non-Food Items, emergency shelters (Emergency Shelter Kits/Tents), as well as cash assistance for rental subsidies in urban and semi-urban settings for vulnerable IDPs and other conflict-affected populations. The Cluster will thus focus on the most vulnerable IDPs residing in collective centres, settlements, open air, informal settlements, rented houses and with hosting families and other affected populations. All the above comes in addition to the engagement on minimum coordination of services in the spontaneous settlements and collective centres. The work of the cluster members is guided by the principles of neutrality, impartiality, independence and the humanitarian principle of do not harm.

### II. Objective

The key objective of the Shelter/CCCM/NFIs Cluster is to enhance the coordination and effectiveness of provision of emergency shelter/NFIs assistance. Specifically the cluster will be responsible to facilitate and guide the following actions:

- a. **Planning and Strategy development:** The cluster will provide guidance through the Strategic Operating Framework to enhance accountability and effectiveness of the interventions. Drawing from lessons learned and evidence based actions, the cluster response plan will be updated/revised through a consultative approach, according to the changing context in the country and will feed into the wider response strategies. The following tasks will ensure effective and guided action:
  - Promote the use of existing standards, policies and guidelines (e.g., SPHERE, Good Enough Guide).
  - Standardize tools/guidance notes for better planning and implementation of cluster responses.

# TWG TOR

## Terms of Reference for the Technical Working Group For the Shelter/CCCM/NFIs Cluster in Yemen

### I. Background

The Shelter/CCCM/NFIs Cluster in Yemen has agreed to establish the Technical Working Group (TWG) in 2011. This working group aimed to provide standardized cost effective designs and packages/kits to ensure coordinated approach respecting humanitarian standards.

### II. Objectives:

- The key objective of the TWG is to develop and produce the Cluster Technical Standards for NFIs and Shelter assistance in Yemen. This will include (but not limited to):
  1. Composition and designation of NFIs packages.
  2. Composition of emergency shelter packages and modalities of assistance.
  3. Modalities and best practices on cash for shelter and voucher assistance.
  4. Recommend and codename designs for transitional and durable shelter solutions.
  5. Review building materials specification, use, availability, quality and affordability.
  6. Ensure that Age, Gender and Diversity aspects are contemplated in shelter designs and NFI packages.
  7. Agree and recommend incorporation of local cultural preferences.
  8. Foresee standards that promote opportunities for local capacity building.
  9. Promote the use of alternative energy solutions and ensure Environmental sustainability.
  10. Ensure that humanitarian principles and standards are included in the Cluster Technical Standards (CTS).
  11. Develop and recommend technical standards for natural disasters prone areas.
- The TWG should provide technical support to agencies involved in shelter assistance, with the aim to increase the quality of emergency & transitional shelters designs, NFIs kits composition and items specifications.
- It also acts as a platform for discussion and peer review of shelter design models, technical details, including but not limited to engineering designs, BoQs, training and materials, and shelter models.
- The TWG should lead lessons learned exercises, development of shelter and NFIs intervention case studies and ensure constant incorporation of best practices to CTS.
- The TWG provides technical advice to the Shelter/CCCM/NFIs Cluster on possible shelter and NFIs interventions in particular situations, including but not limited to the framework of the Yemen Humanitarian Pool Fund (YHPF) and partners projects to respond to SRPs/HRPs/CERF.
- The TWG should ensure (through the Cluster Lead) that CTS, shelter designs and NFIs approved packages of the Cluster Partners Organizations (CPOs) are available online in the cluster dedicated webpage. The TWG should continue encourage CPOs the use of the available reference library, lessons learned and best practices while planning new shelter and/or NFIs interventions.
- The TWG should decide (vote) on the allocation of the Chairperson and Deputy Chairperson positions. These positions should rotate every 6 months. As this will be decided by vote, it's possible that CPOs would continue chair responsibilities through consecutive periods.

### III. Organization and Composition

The organization of the TWG is foreseen as having a Chairperson, a Deputy Chairperson and Group Members. The TWG roles should be agreed/voted by CPOs among those organizations volunteering for the tasks. The process should be consultative ensuring the maximum participation of active CPOs.

## Yemen Shelter/CCCM/NFIs Cluster Strategy for 2015

### I. Background: Shelter/CCCM/NFIs Cluster

The Shelter/CCCM/NFIs Cluster (hereafter the Cluster) has been in existence since 2009. It is based in Sana'a and has a field Sub-national Cluster in Al-Hodeidah with regular meetings in addition to the presence of remote Sub-national Clusters coordination mechanisms in Aden and Amran. The Cluster has 84 members countrywide who participate in Cluster meetings, including 39 recent new members. Over the past 7 months, 16 members conducted needs assessments exercises and delivered emergency shelter assistance and/or Non-Food Items (NFIs) in 13 Governorates of Yemen. Shelter/CCCM/NFIs Cluster has a database<sup>1</sup> of 916 collective centres and settlements hosting IDPs in 18 Governorates (729 collective centres, 187 settlements). Out of those 916 collective centres and settlements, the Cluster has information on the number of IDPs in 457 collective centres (12,107 IDP households, 75,063 individuals) and 182 spontaneous settlements (6,446 IDP households, 43,469 individuals) which were reported by Cluster partners, a map is available in Annex I. At the national level, the Cluster is led by UNHCR and co-chaired by IOM in Sana'a and by NRC in Aden.

This Strategy draws on Cluster documents and assessments for the analysis of the humanitarian situation. Determination of the targeted population, governorates with most humanitarian needs and Cluster activities, objectives and costing (*Revised Yemen Humanitarian Response Plan 2015*) were defined by Cluster members in meetings and consultations held over the course of May and June 2015 bearing in mind the current challenging situation in Yemen, capacity of Cluster partners to implement the planned activities, access and other constraints. The financial cost was based on information gathered by cluster members on current prices in local or international markets taking into consideration the operational/running costs, cash transfer fees and the increase in fuel prices that led to a rise in transport cost.

In June 2015, Cluster members participated in updating the Shelter/CCCM/NFIs portion of the Revised Yemen Humanitarian Response Plan (YHRP) 2015 as well as this strategy document and they calculated the overall budgetary requirements for the Cluster for 2015 to be USD 159,424,080. More details on the budget and activities are available on page 9.

The Cluster Strategy, while updated every year, is a living document that will be updated as dictated by the evolving situation, needs thereof and constant review of the situation. The Cluster members reviewed and agreed to adopt the Strategy in August 2015.

This Strategy identifies the key issues and humanitarian needs in the areas of shelter, Non-Food Items (NFIs) as well as Camp Coordination and Camp Management (CCCM) for internally displaced people and other conflict-affected populations in Yemen. It outlines the main activities and a required budget for 2015. Furthermore, it helps to identify the approaches and methodologies that the cluster members will be taking in meeting the needs on the ground.

# Policy on tents distributions



Endorsed in June 18, 2015

## Revision of the policy on tents distribution

### I. Background:

On 26 March 2015, coalition forces began launch of an airstrikes against Al-Houthis and former President Ali Abdullah Salih military forces installations to halt their advance across the country. Since then, 20 out of the country 22 governorates were affected by airstrikes or armed conflicts. The current escalation in violence adds further strain on poor services and weak infrastructure and exacerbates the already precarious humanitarian situation. Recent violence has also had an impact on civilian infrastructure, with homes, hospitals, education, local markets and essential infrastructure in several locations damaged or destroyed. Over one million people have been internally displaced, in addition to the some 330,000 IDPs who were already in a protracted internal displacement situation.

Inter-agency assessments indicated shelter as a critical and priority need among newly internally displaced persons in urban and rural areas. One of the most common types of emergency shelters used in Yemen is tents.

### II. Current situation:

Currently, the situation in Yemen has changed dramatically with the entire of the country affected by the civil war particularly in the south unlike in the past where the magnitude of the conflict in Yemen was limited to certain Governorates.

IDP households have sought shelter with relatives and friends, although this traditional hospitality is becoming exhausted and stretched, as almost every household has been affected by the overall economic and security crisis. Others with financial means have rented houses in safer areas. However, the availability of houses for rent is limited and becoming increasingly costly. Due to high demand and inadequate housing units for rental, prices of flats rentals have almost tripled in some cities making vulnerable families unable to find affordable and safe accommodation. As their financial resources diminish, these families are becoming more vulnerable and are forced to move from rented accommodation to seek shelter in unfinished or partially destroyed infrastructure. This situation has exhausted savings of the Yemeni population in general and IDPs in particular making it extremely difficult to meet their day-to-day expenses.

In some instances, the public buildings which are currently accommodating IDPs are hosting families beyond the capacity. The movement of thousands of families from Sa'ada to Amran and with less degree from Sana'a has further stretched the capacity of the town to host additional families. Hundreds of households have taken shelter in public buildings such as schools, hospitals, and in Aden also in hotels. Yet, there are many IDPs especially in less developed and rural areas remain without such options and as a result those families are living in undignified conditions under trees, caves and unconstructed buildings exposing women, girls, boys and old persons to protection risks. The reports from Sa'ada, Hajjah, AlHudaydah, Sana'a and other areas indicate that several families have had to resort to sewage pipes in Sana'a<sup>1</sup>, caves in Marib and under trees or in the open as in the case of AlHudaydah, Hajjah, Abyan and other affected governorates having IDPs living in similar conditions.

In addition, the rainy season has started in some locations imposing additional hardships and presenting new challenges e.g. the floods in Amran and AlJawf.

### Overview

In 2015, the situation in Yemen changed dramatically with a humanitarian crisis resulting from the armed conflict on-going since late March. As of 17 September, a total of 5,039 deaths and 25,653 injuries have been recorded, with at least 2,112 civilians killed (including refugees and aid workers).

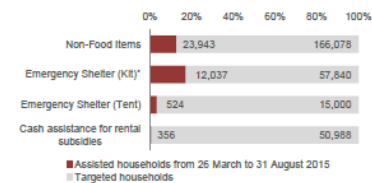
Over 150 days into the conflict, the security situation continues to deteriorate with airstrikes targeting multiple locations and intensifying in Sana'a over the past month. Ground fighting continues in the central and southwest governorates and at the border with Saudi Arabia. The escalation in violence adds further strain on inadequate services and weak infrastructure and exacerbates the already precarious humanitarian situation. Access constraints to many areas as well as restrictions and delays in imports continue to cause food and fuel scarcity, forcing health and water facilities to shut down and increasing malnutrition rates.

While some IDP households have sought shelter with relatives and friends, this traditional hospitality appears to be stretched and on the verge of exhaustion. Almost every household has been affected by the overall economic and security crisis. Others with better financial means have rented houses in safer areas. However, the availability of houses for rent is limited and becomes increasingly costly. Due to high demand, low supply and inadequate housing units for rental, prices of monthly flat rentals have almost tripled in some locations, i.e. from USD 70 to 150. This was observed since September 2014, with a continued increase since March 2015, making vulnerable families unable to find affordable and safe accommodation. As their financial resources further diminish, these families are becoming increasingly vulnerable and are forced to transfer from rented accommodations to shelter in unfinished, abandoned or partially destroyed infrastructures. This situation has exhausted savings of the Yemeni population in general and IDPs in particular making it extremely difficult to meet their day-to-day expenses.

### Challenges

- Political instability, insecurity and limited access to people of concern in conflict areas, which hinder service delivery in some locations in a timely manner.
- Interference of parties to the conflict in the humanitarian work leading in some instances to the delay/suspension of humanitarian activities.
- The shortage of fuel supply and commodities has led to an increase in commodity prices, including lifesaving materials, as well as the cost of transportation.

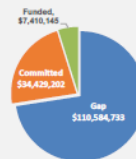

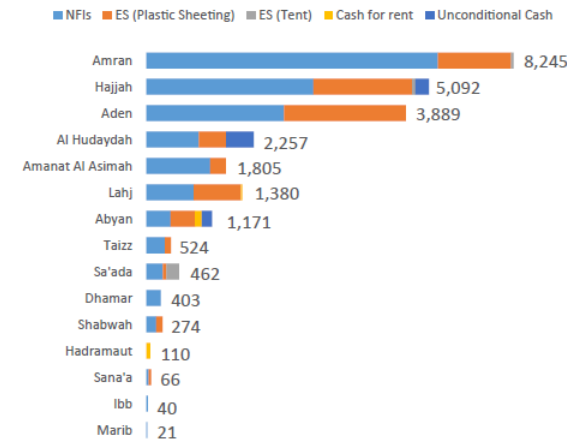

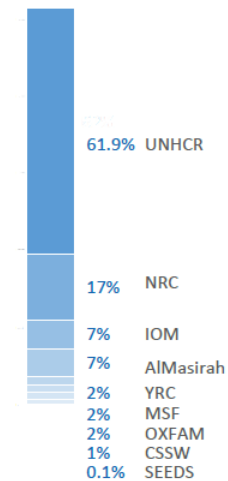

## Households reached per governorate

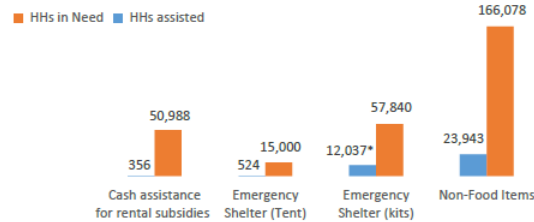

## Percentage of partners interventions

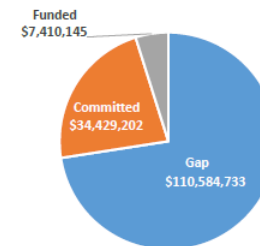


## YHRP needs vs. achievements

Yemen: Shelter/CCCM/NFI Cluster Humanitarian Presence (as of 21 Sep. 2015)

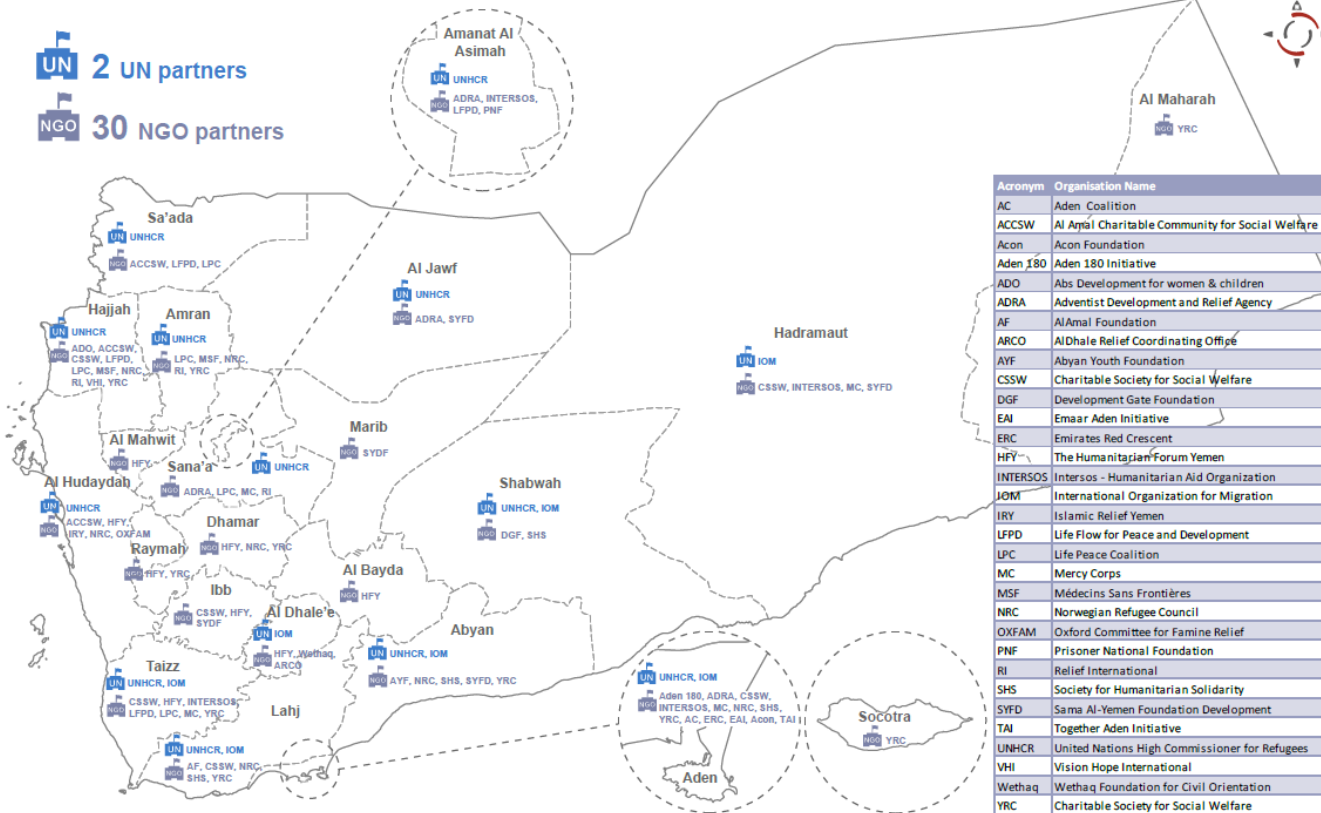

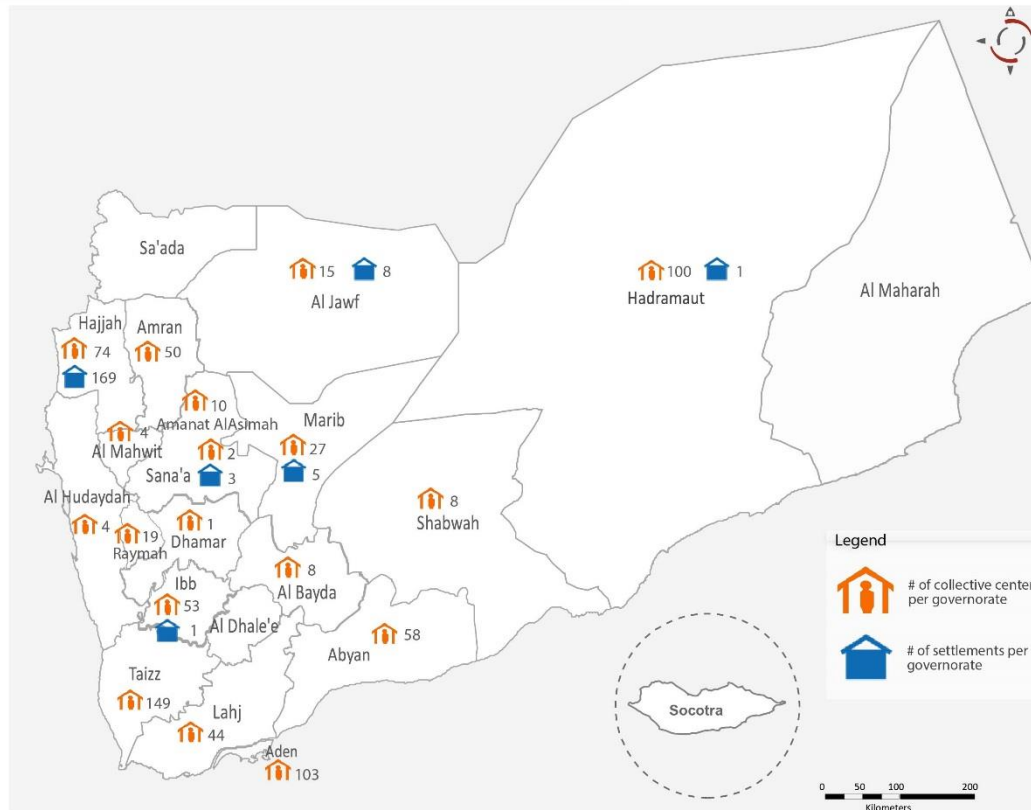

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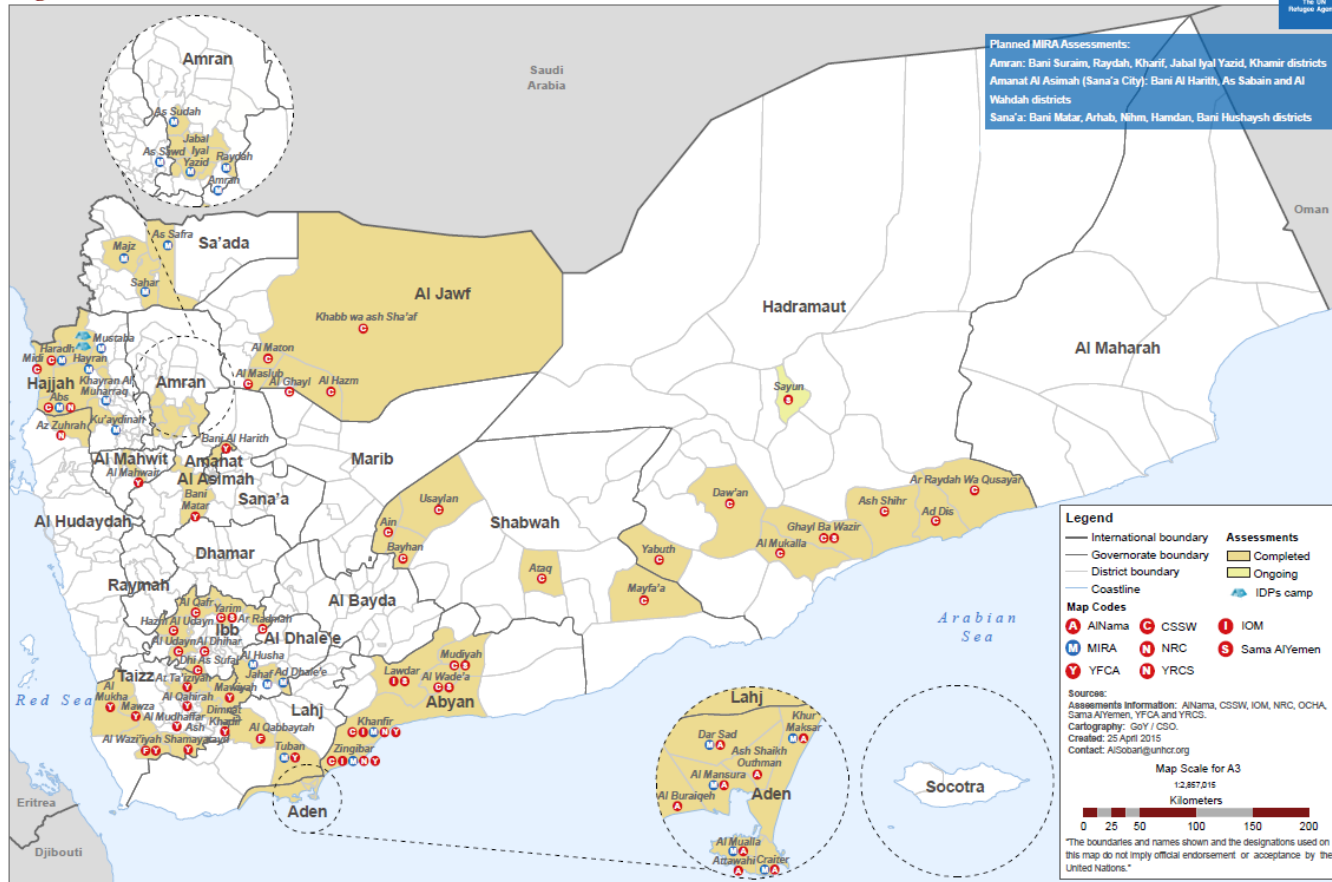
