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2. Cash Voucher Fairs

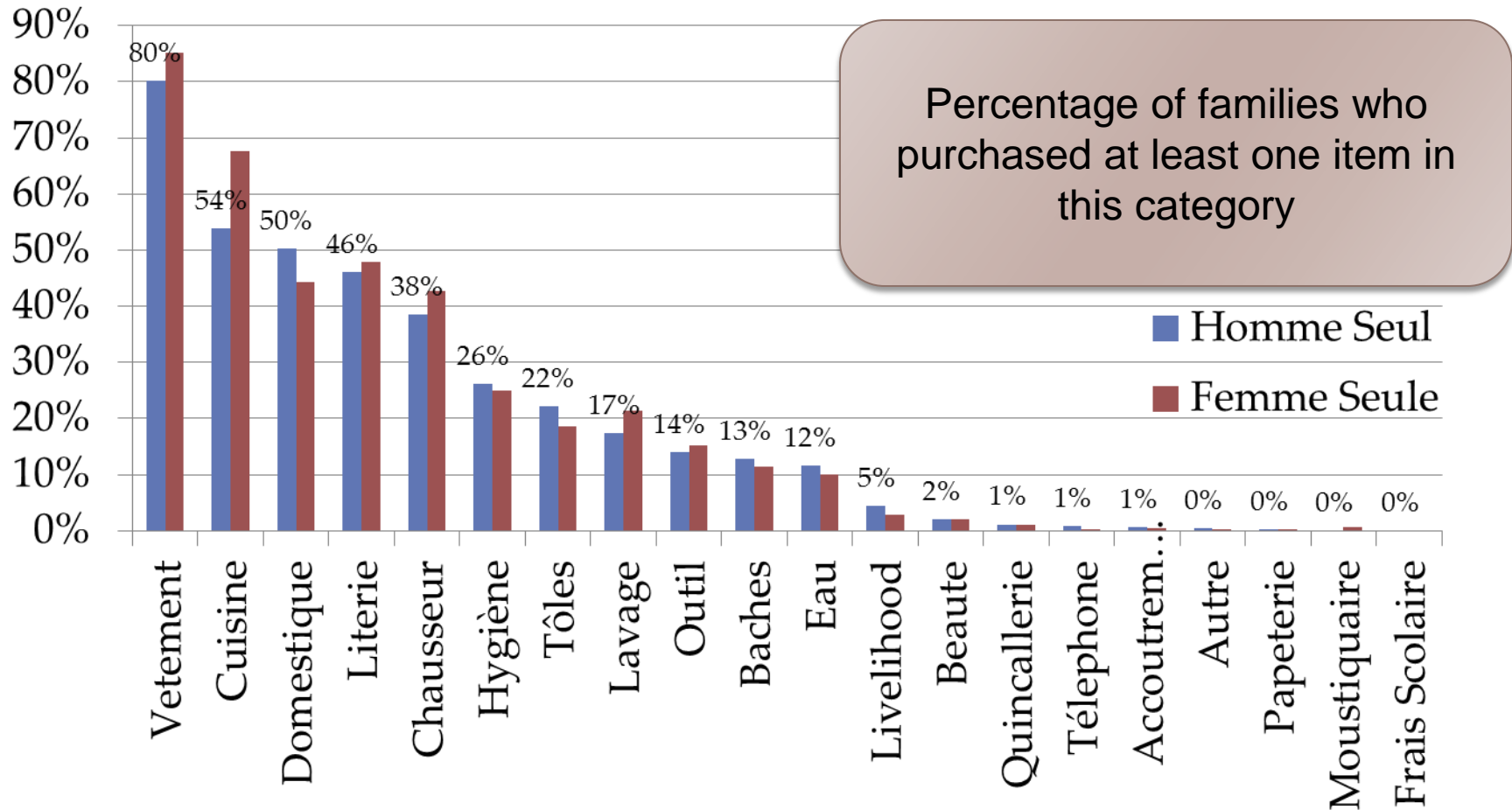
- ✓ Pilots in 2008
- ✓ Scaling up in 2009-2011
- ✓ Promotion through the Cluster
- ✓ Through June 2016 over 350,000 households (over 1.8 million people) assisted via voucher fairs
- ✓ Over \$52 million – injected into local markets
- ✓ Since 2014, over 60% of all NFI assistance delivered through voucher fairs; in 2016 – over 80%



2. *Cash Voucher Fairs*

- ✓ Sharing Good Practices – Thematic Technical Workshops
 - Selecting vendors
 - Setting price platforms
 - Mitigating fraud
 - Promoting locally made NFI
- ✓ All NFI actors with voucher fairs in their ‘tool box’ – UN, ICRC, INGOs, National NGOs
- ✓ Cash Working Group
- ✓ Close linkages with food security actors
 - Joint fairs
 - minimum expenditure baskets (MEB)
- ✓ Continued studies/learning – e.g. shelter materials ; purchasing pattern analysis
- ✓ A-Z ‘How To’ Guide book on NFI voucher fairs

Purchasing Patterns by Representative of the Household



Aside from a slightly greater propensity to purchase clothes and kitchen items, the type of items purchased by men and women were similar.
