2. PARTNER UPDATE



Distribution activities of FI Kit, Hygiene Kit and PPE in Zawiya: on October 17th, 19th, 20th, 21st, first distributions of FI Kits, Hygiene Kits and PPE took place in 4 different districts of the municipality of Zawiya: Juddaim, Arewie, Khartoum/Bu Ghalasha, Terfas. **113 Hygiene Kits, 113 PPE Kits and 113 FI Kits** have been distributed for the benefit of **330 beneficiaries**.

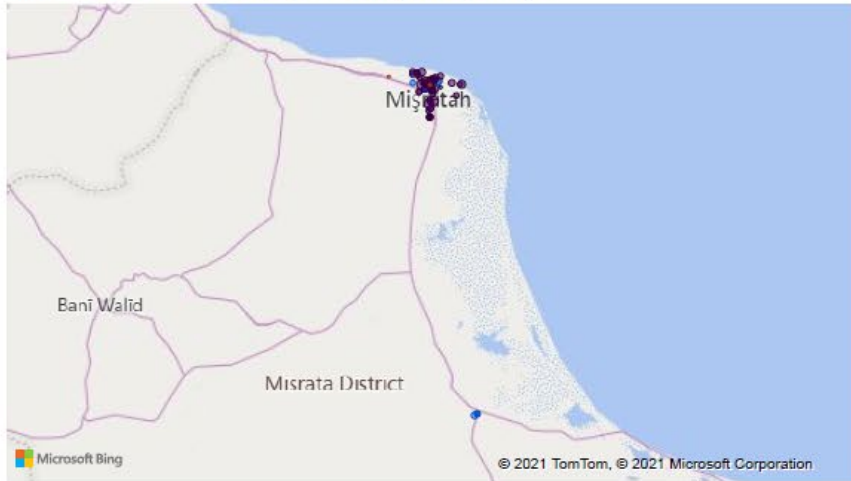

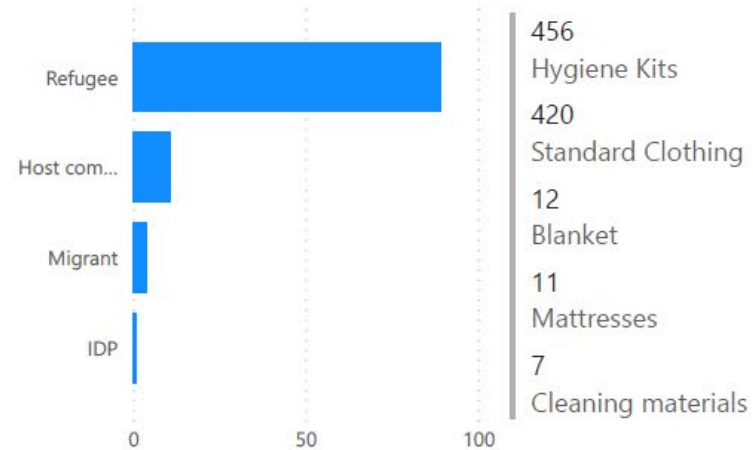
Distribution of Non Food Items

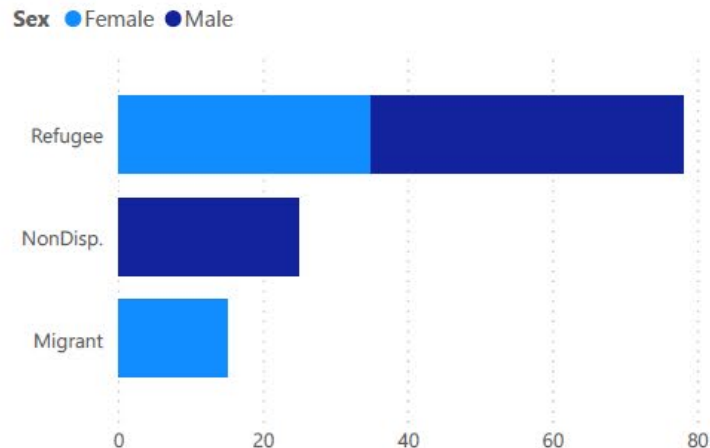

Future Plans:

- Winterization campaign (100 Libyan HH, 200 migrant HH)

Needs flagged:

- MoSA branch in Misrata has requested Cesvi to assist sub branches of MoSA offices that are opening in 12 municipalities.
- Cesvi is not able to provide assistance outside Misrata Urban Areas, has requested MoSA to detail the type of request to be discussed at Area Coordination Group Level



4. PARTNER UPDATE

DRC

Shelter rehabilitations – SDC Target of 864 individuals. Ongoing activities:

- **Ain Zara Returnees families:** Total assessed 44 HH (households), while 37 HH selected. Implementation phase/Distribution activities started on the 2nd week of November 2021.
- **Sidi Alsayah - IDPs site (37HH):** Implementation phase/Distribution activities scheduled to start on the 3rd week of November 2021.
- **Ain Zara IDPs site – Aljdida (14 HH):** referred by Ain Zara municipality. During the military operation the landowner allowed IDPs to use its land, now he wants to have the property back. DRC Shelter tried to assess their old properties to allow return to their houses. Until now DRC assessed 12 HH that were reachable though phone calls. The majority of these families cannot be assisted through DRC Shelter rehabilitations because 1) some were reportedly homeless before moving to Aljdida so they have no house to repair, 2) some of the properties are too damaged to support. Therefore, within this group, only 2 houses can be repaired by DRC.
- **Soug Alahad IDPs site (60 HH):** DRC Safety Clearance process completed, next step to coordinate with Tarhuna Municipality for the accessing/coordination purpose. SNFI response to be confirmed once assessment is completed.



4. PARTNER UPDATE

On hold Shelter rehabilitation activities – Mix migrant sites:

DRC

- **Gergaresh** site (41 IND) was assessed. Signature of agreement with landowner was pending, before 1st Oct events.
- **(3) sites in Soug Aljoma** considered for support (rehab + NFIs). Technical assessment completed. Site populations as follows : S1=65 IND, S2=13 IND, S3= 33 IND. DRC trying to re-establish communication with landlord
- **Alkrimia site** (previously supported by other DRC departments). Mainly single mothers and Children. DRC considering this location for support, depending on review of context analysis.

NFI distributions - SDC Target of 866 individuals.

- A portion of the target is being identified among the sites supported by Shelter rehabilitation: Sidi Sayyah, Soug Alahad IDP sites, some of the Ain Zara returnee families. Potentially, Soug al Joumaa and Alkrimia migrant sites.
- Coordination ongoing with UNHCR and OCHA to potentially cover a small portion of Murzuq IDPs.

NRC- Shelter updates



Projects with partnership of UNHCR:

1. Rehabilitation and upgrade of 2 infrastructure projects in Sidi Faraj and Garyounis camps, Benghazi – all works are completed.
2. Rehabilitation of 30 shelter units in Al Hilles camp, Benghazi – all works are completed.
3. Rehabilitation and upgrade of 65 sub-standard and damaged housing units in Al Sabrie , Benghazi– work is ongoing and expected completion date is 3rd week of November
4. Rehabilitation and upgrade of 3 infrastructure projects in Abu Salim, Tripoli, work is ongoing and expected completion date is mid of November.
5. Rehabilitation and upgrade of 17 housing units in Benina, project is ongoing and expected completion date is end of November.

Projects charged to other donors:

1. Rehabilitation and upgrade of two health centers in Al Hadba and Mashroe Zerae- Tripoli; work is completed.
2. Rehabilitation and upgrade of 55 sub-standard and damaged housing units in Gymmenis and Benina: work is ongoing and expected completion date is mid of December
3. Rehabilitation of housing units – Tripoli: first batch of 60 houses are completed, contractor's selection, implementation work has been started, expected completion is end of November
4. Rehabilitation and upgrade of 2 infrastructure projects in Tripoli and Benghazi; all technical documents are completed, tender evaluations are finalized and the implementation works have been started, expected completion date for both is 1st week of December

Context & Needs

- Increased numbers of returnees Returns

Planned Response

- Rehabilitation of 60-70 houses
- Works will focus at meeting minimum standards (protection from weather, safety, security and access to water and sanitation)
- Works will be implemented through providing conditional cash grants

- Working with local council to identify potential beneficiaries
- Vulnerability assessments
- Technical assessments
- Developing technical documents (BoQ's and specs) and scope of works
- Provision of 1st instalment
- Technical support and supervision of works
- Provision of the 2nd instalment
- Monitoring and evaluation

IOM SNFI ASSISTANCE: OCTOBER 2021 UPDATE



- The total number of individuals reached with NFIs assistance during October 2021 is 3,013 among them 2868 are migrants and the rest which is 145 are IDPs
- The Mantikas covered in this month are TRIPOLI where we distributed NFIs in Aburashada DC, Tarik Alsekka DC, and Sharaa alzwaya DC and BENGHAZI specifically Ganfuda DC
- The Assistance provided where generally Hygiene kits, mattresses, winter blankets, Clothing Kits

IOM SNFI Assistance : OCTOBER 2021 MRRM/Outreach UPDATE



- The total number of individuals reached with NFIs assistance during October 2021 is 2990 among them 969 are minors, 881 are women, and 1140 are men.
- The locations covered during this month are Tripoli, Baniwaleed, Janzur, Ghat, Azzwaya, and Tajura
- The number of assistance provided by MRRM in this month is about 2685 where generally Hygiene kits, mattresses, winter blankets, Clothing Kits

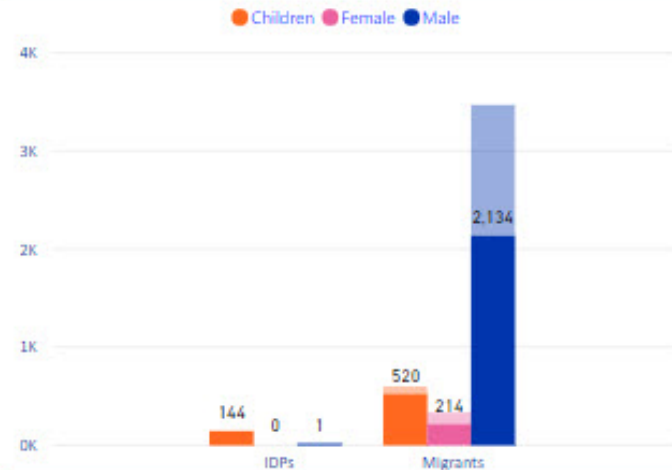

2. PARTNER UPDATE



UNHCR with LIBAID managed to distribute winter items to more than 1,705 HH (7,588 individuals) on the winterization plan, including electrical heaters, solar lamps, winter clothing and winter boots, HKs, and gloves, socks, and regular CRIs. (Southern and Western regions are under review process + exploring access and security situation).

UNHCR with IRC manages to provide emergency NFIs response to 1,887 persons at Ain Zara dc, Abu-Rhada dc, and Sahra-Zawia dc. HKs, mattresses, blankets, rubber slippers, and children's diapers were provided.

UNHCR with LIBIAD provided emergency support CRIs and winter items to the families in Um Hefeen near Derna responding to the floods.

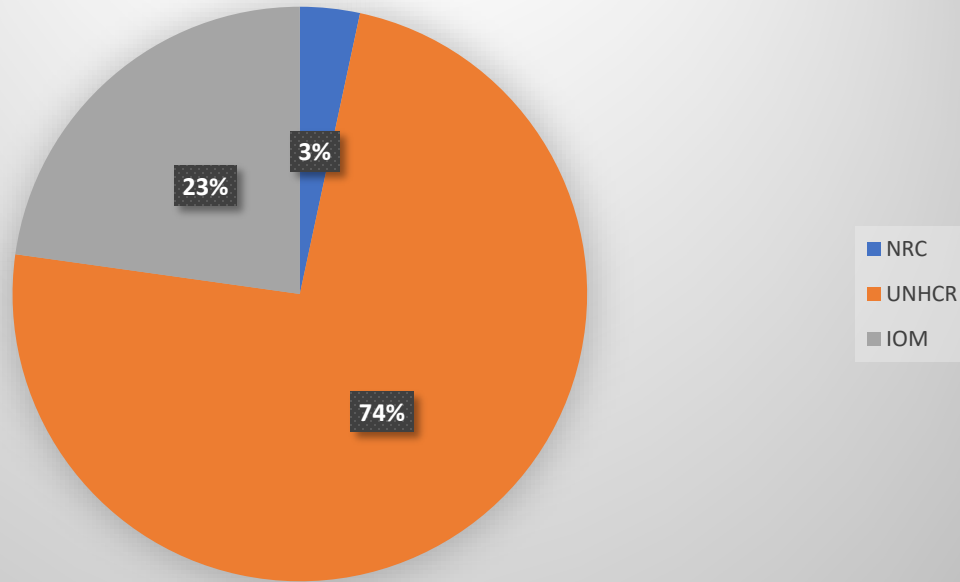

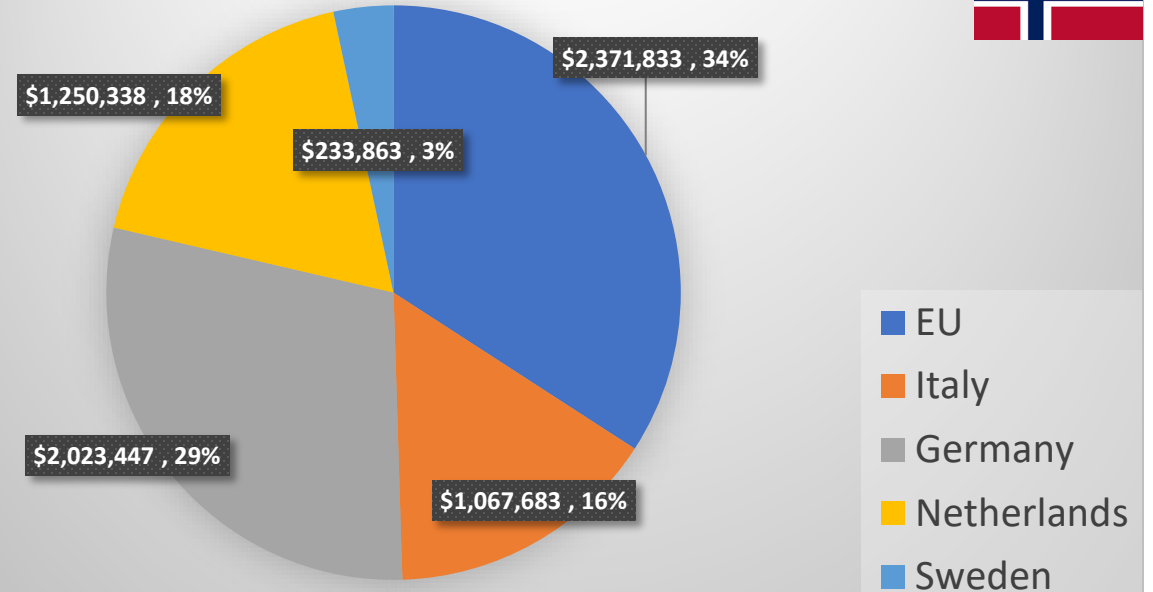

CONTEXT

Surbana site is a private owned shelter located in Hay Andalus municipality, in Gargaresh neighborhood. The site population is mainly from Eritrea and thus the Eritrean association with its base in US was paying the rent until January 2020. Due to funding gaps, they could not cover the rent and population was at risk of eviction, until DRC started covering the rent for the shelter. Its extension owned by the same landowner started operating in May 2020.



SECTOR	Component	Outputs
SMC	Community Governance	G1 maintains a community set up with unofficial leadership structures. There are 2 individuals who present themselves as community leaders, with one of them living in the site while the other one recently seems to have moved to an individual accommodation. The later is being contracted by DRC as CPV. These individuals can speak Arabic and thus are the link with humanitarian community. The community seems united. The male population have weekly meetings chaired by the community leaders. No female representation at this stage. The community cooks in one kitchen (rotation basis) and food being distributed to each room, showing a communal set up within the community. Occasionally, concerns have been raised by the community that community leaders are not always exclusive. Ad hoc reports for power abused have been received.
EDUCATION	Children enrolled to schools	No children are enrolled to school. Among the community residents there was an individual who previously was a teacher and had expressed interest to run a school for adults in the site, but did not due to the lack of space. The individual is not present in the site at the moment.
FSL	People have access to food	When site was identified the population had serious malnutrition issues as well as individuals with critical medical conditions appeared (i.e TB, mobility issues etc). DRC's first intervention were provision of fresh and dry food, while a vouchers systems with local vendors was developed that allowed residents to have access to bread in daily basis. The medical conditions of the individuals who have been also referred by DRC to health providers have been improved and individuals manage to get ad hoc jobs as casual labours that can cover some of their basic needs. However, food remains a priority for the residents, especially after livelihoods being affected during covid 19 pandemic.
HEALTH	Health facility in walking distance (30 min walk)	IOM mobile team is visiting the site every Monday and Thursday and follow up with medical and MHPSS cases. Cases being referred to IOM and IRC supported clinics in Tripoli, where services are free. Residents occasionally raised concerns that medication often is not free and due to lack of cash often they cannot purchase medication.
NUTRITION	SAM cases observed	During 2019 most of the population in G1 was suffering from malnutrition. Due to the medical condition of the residents (i.e TB, mobility issues etc) population was unable to work so to purchase food. After DRC's regular food interventions in the site, the population seems in much better condition and no SAM cases can be observed recently.
PROTECTION	Vulnerabilities	Unaccompanied/separated children - No Female single headed HHs - 5HH Elderlies without caregiver - No People with disabilities - No People with medical conditions - 6ind
SHELTER/IFI		- Average space per apartment DRC improved the roof of the main building, added ramp in the stairways, added a sharing area and improved the electrical system - NFIs Bedding kits, kitchen sets, mattresses, winter clothes provided by DRC. Blankets provided by UNHCR. - Fire prevention DRC distributed fire extinguisher for the kitchen area - Rent 5.500LYD (for both buildings)
WASH		- Access to water DRC provided 2 water tanks (main building) with 3 taps and there is 1 tap with running water in the extension - Access to latrines DRC installed 3 portable latrines (2M-1F) and 3 were already in place (total 6 in Main building) 2 available latrines in the extension. - NFIs DRC distributed group hygiene kits and Handwashing kits in May 2021 and diapers and female hygiene kits in February 2021.

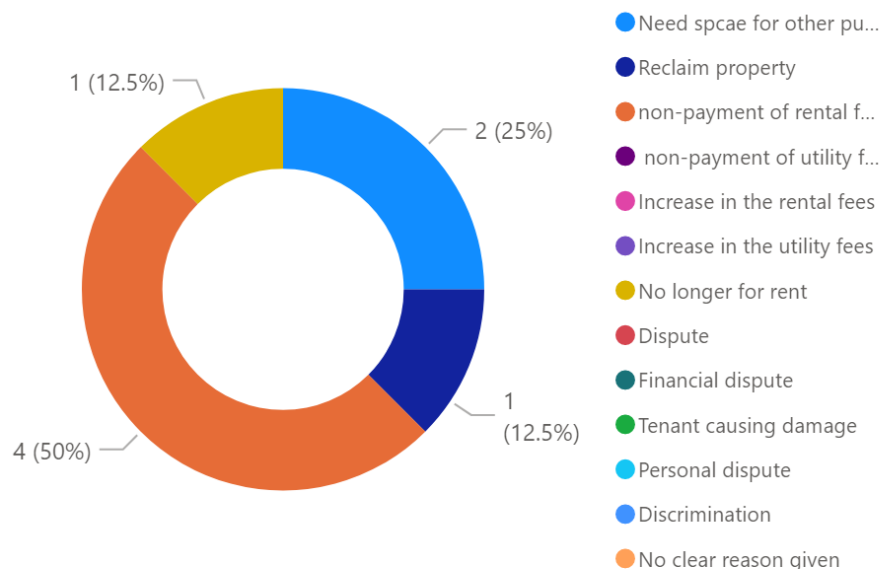


Eviction Reason

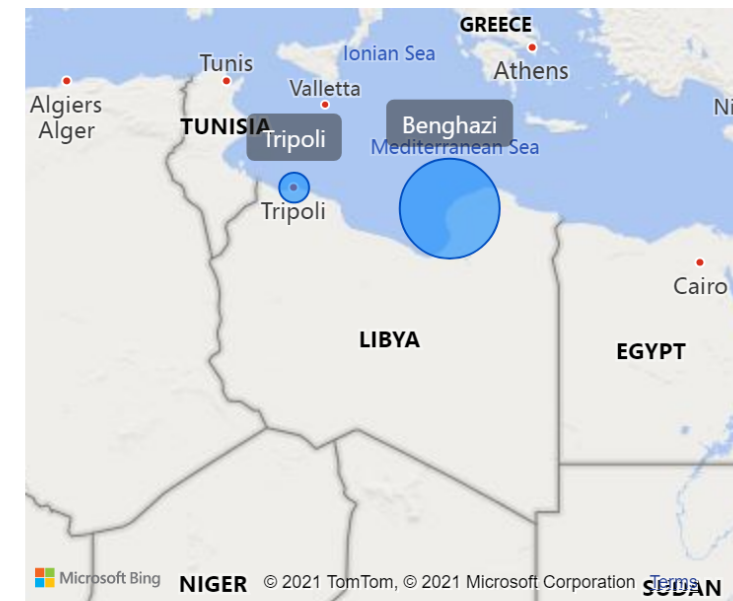

The ET allows partners to report evictions (at HH or settlement level) to enable an appropriate response to be initiated and to track trends for advocacy.

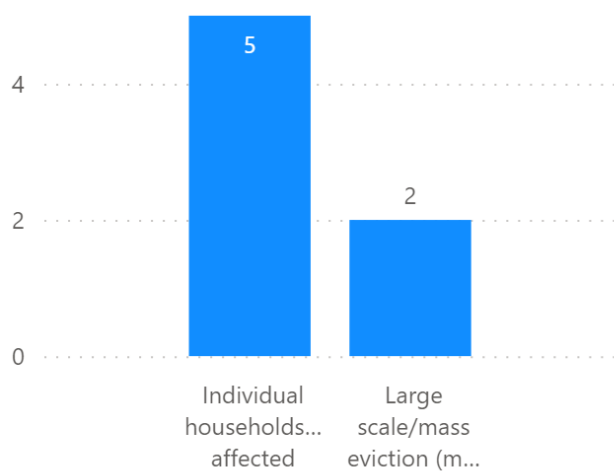

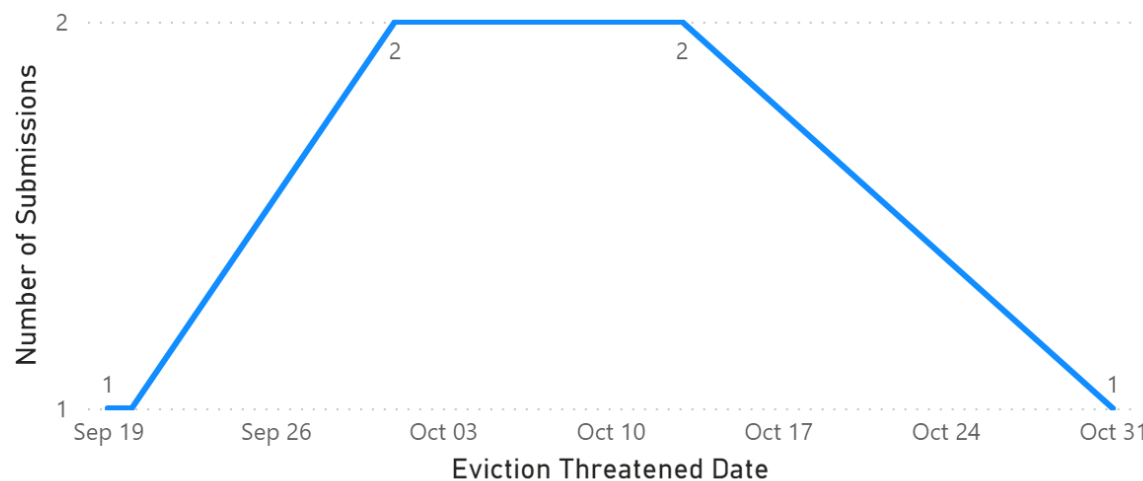
Eviction Location



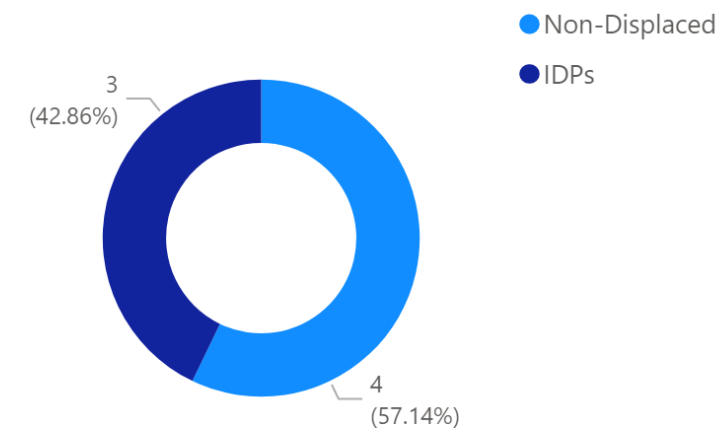
Scale of the eviction

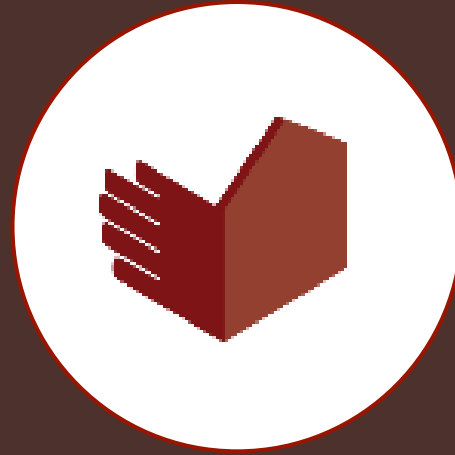
