2. PARTNER UPDATE



- During Sep, UNHCR managed to reach **916** HH totaling **3,908** individuals, out of which **2,277** were refugees and asylum seekers and **1,938** IDP's.
- In detention centers, UNHCR managed to target 102 individuals with NFIs at Almabni, Tolmita, and SharaZawia DCs.
- In IDP camps, UNHCR provided HKs to 1938 IDP individuals residing in Fallah1 and Bani Wlaid IDP camps which hots Tawerhan IDPs.
- UNHCR, through IRC, managed to reach 536 HH with 1,089 individuals at the CDC.



2. PARTNER UPDATE



UNHCR working through the partnership agreement with NRC work in 2021 on the following shelter rehab projects:

- 2 infrastructure upgrade at Garounis & Sidi Farag – Benghazi IDPs Camps, **the work has been completed**
- 30 shelter units in Alhlies Camp – in Benghazi, **the work has been completed.**
- Rehab of 65 house units in Alsabrie the works has been started, and the time line to complete the work 5 weeks.
- Infrastructure works in Tripoli, **The work has been started.**

2. PARTNER UPDATE

NRC- Shelter updates

Projects charged to UNHCR:

1. Rehabilitation and upgrade of 2 infrastructure projects in Sidi Faraj and Garyounis camps, Benghazi – all works are completed.
2. Rehabilitation of 30 shelter units in Al Hilles camp, Benghazi – all works are completed.
3. Rehabilitation and upgrade of 65 sub-standard and damaged housing units in Al Sabrie , Benghazi– work is ongoing and expected completion date is mid of November.
4. Rehabilitation and upgrade of 3 infrastructure projects in Abu Salim, Tripoli, work is ongoing and expected completion date is mid of November.

Projects charged to other donors:

1. Rehabilitation and upgrade of two health centers in Al Hadba and Mashroe Zerae- Tripoli; work is ongoing and expected completion date is end of October.
2. Rehabilitation and upgrade of 70 sub-standard and damaged housing units in Gymmenis and Benina: technical documents are finalized, contractor's selection and start of implementation will be next week.
3. Rehabilitation of housing units – Tripoli: first batch of 60 houses are completed, contractor's selection and start of implementation will be next week.
4. Rehabilitation and upgrade of 2 infrastructure projects in Tripoli and Benghazi; all technical documents are completed, tender evaluation will be finalized next week and the start of implementation will start the week after

2. PARTNER UPDATE

- New IDP site identified for shelter rehab intervention: Soug Alahad – IDPs site - 67 families, (Tarhuna - south Tripoli). Safety clearance process ongoing.
- Experienced some procurement related delays for the completion of the SNFI Framework Agreement. Response in previously identified Sidi Alsayaih IDP site + Ain Zara returnees houses should start in two weeks time after finalizing our FWA process and receiving materials
- Assessed interventions in 2 migrant sites (Gergaresh and Soug Al Joumaa) on hold as a result of the recent arrests/demolitions.

In the framework of the Regional Development and Protection Programme (RDPP) for North Africa, CEFA is implementing a life assistance Project (24 months) to improve living conditions of migrants, asylum-seekers and refugees (with specific priority to women and children), in urban setting, in Tripoli and Zawiya Municipalities. The action will provide assistance in terms of food security, hygiene and Covid19 prevention kits, access to primary health care, NFIs and minor WASH interventions.

Updates

- *Distribution activities of FI Kit, Hygiene Kit and PPE in Zawiya:* next week, on October 17th, 19th, 20th, 21st, first distributions of FI Kits, Hygiene Kits and PPE will take place in 4 different districts of the municipality of Zawiya. The distributions will target 363 registered beneficiaries per month. Next month, also distribution of the NFIs kits will be carried. FI, Hygiene and PPE kits will be distributed to beneficiaries once a month, while NFIs kits will be distributed only once.

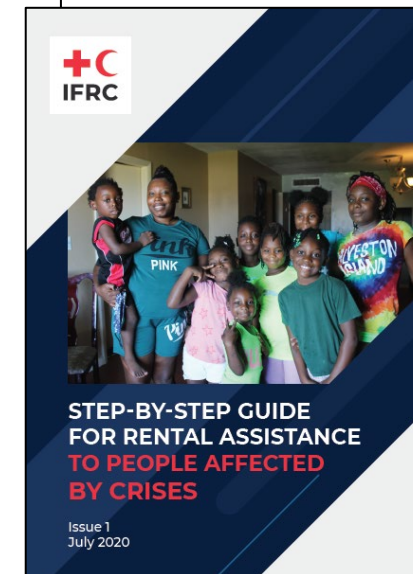

3. RENTAL MARKET INTERVENTIONS – ‘true’ CfR

| Type of response components | Descriptions and examples |

Information | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Supporting affected population to find adequate accommodation to rent Supporting affected population in understanding the rental market, rental requirements, and practices Supporting owners and service providers to understand renting best practice Inform and involve hosting community about the rental assistance programme through community mobilisation Consult with communication experts to develop information to meet the needs of the target population, considering format, visual, written, audio, dissemination approach, etc. |

3. RENTAL MARKET INTERVENTIONS

Rental support for Refugees, Asylum Seekers and Migrant Populations:

- Risks for both the recipients and the partners
- Cash is still most valid, of all options – no quick fix
- MPCA vs. CfR – get terminology right
- fix this, low-cost social housing– we need political coverage
- As a sector we have straight-forward responses, we know what to do – but we currently cannot!
