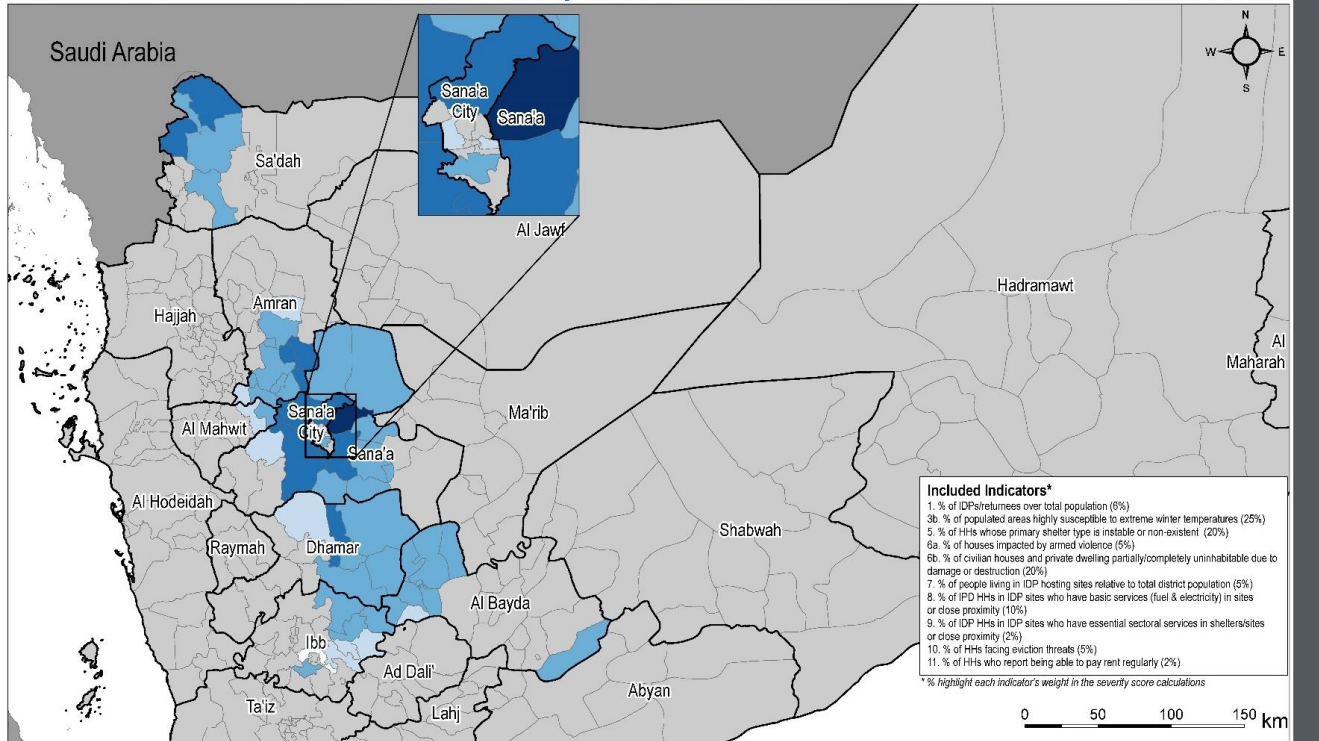

Beneficiary selection criteria should be considered as follow with priority to locations exposed to extreme winter temperatures (nights below 10° C):

- IDPs who are in need of weatherproofing or personal insulation support, particularly those living in:
 - a) hosting sites
 - b) hosting arrangement
 - c) rented accommodation
 - d) mountainous areas at high altitudes
 - e) affected by flash flooding and not responded to their needs
 - f) at risk of forced eviction or being forced to relocate and in urgent need the winterization assistance to protect them from harsh weather temperatures during the winter months.
- Returnees living in a damaged shelter/house.
- Host communities who are economically poor and living in a sub-standard shelter situation.

Winterization Recommendations



- Included Indicators***
1. % of IDPs/returnees over total population (5%)
 - 3b. % of populated areas highly susceptible to extreme winter temperatures (25%)
 5. % of HHs whose primary shelter type is instable or non-existent (20%)
 - 6a. % of houses impacted by armed violence (5%)
 - 6b. % of civilian houses and private dwelling partially/completely uninhabitable due to damage or destruction (20%)
 7. % of people living in IDP hosting sites relative to total district population (5%)
 8. % of IDP HHs in IDP sites who have basic services (fuel & electricity) in sites or close proximity (10%)
 9. % of IDP HHs in IDP sites who have essential sectoral services in shelters/sites or close proximity (2%)
 10. % of HHs facing eviction threats (5%)
 11. % of HHs who report being able to pay rent regularly (2%)

This map highlights the severity of 2020 Shelter Needs for those Yemeni districts that are susceptible to extreme winter temperatures (nights below 10°C). Findings are based on 10 indicators, which were informed by a secondary data review and expert discussions.

Updates/Challenges :

The ongoing conflict and flooding resulted in more than 14000 families' displaced movement between Jan to Oct. According to main information resources.

Main challenges are as follow:

1. Continuous displacement movement almost in daily basis.
2. Lack of warehousing capacity.
3. Lack of sufficient emergency stocks of NFIs and ESKs.
4. Lack of Partners capacity on the verification of needs.

Immediate priorities:

- Urgent preposition of emergency stock in Marib or nearby locations.
- Scale up the support of the Shelter Cluster team to Partners in order to build their capacity on how to conduct needs assessments, verifications and distributions.
- Ensure a timely rapid response to emergency situations taking into consideration response to special cases.

Success Story

Khamees Abdullah a 45 years old disable head of a family forced to flee from Madhgal in order to save his family and children and settled in Batha Aleel, hoping that the situation would stabilize and secure



Top 3 News/Challenges

1. YDN has successfully completed the verification process for the rental subsidy program in Jiblah, Mudhakarrah, and Al Udayn districts, and the transfer process is expected to begin today.
2. YFCA has started transporting the emergency shelter (ESKs) and NFIs to its warehouses in Al Dhale'e governorate. It is expected that the distribution process will start during October for the most vulnerable IDPs in the districts of Damt, Juban, and Al Dhale'e.
3. There are 1,161 families facing eviction threats in 7 different districts, and shelter partners do not have the capacity to respond to these threats. Currently, UNHCR is responding to eviction threats through emergency rental subsidies program, ESKs, and NFIs. In September, UNHCR responded to 102 families forcibly evicted in 5 different directorates

Main Needs

1. There is an urgent need to include new five districts in the winterization assistance, with a total of 3,000 families.
2. Increasing the temperature from 10 degrees Celsius to 13 degrees Celsius in the shelter cluster recommendations for winterization assistant to suit the needs of the IDPs coming from high-temperature governorates such as Al-Hodeidah

The war forced Mr. Abdullah Mahmoud Salem, his four children, and his wife to flee from Taiz to live in a shelter of less than 4 square meters and a height of one meter. With the passage of the war, there was nothing left for me that I did not sell, or someone I did not borrow from, my situation was better a year ago, but the shelter that I collected from various pieces did not bear the bad weather and deteriorated with time

In cooperation with the CCCM partner (IOM) and the SCMCHA representative in Jiblah who provided them with another place, the UNHCR implementing partner TYF was able to respond with ESKs and NFIs in less than 48 hours.

Updates/Challenges :

1. Delays in getting movement clearances
2. Partners limited resources related to NFIs
3. PDMs are not conducted directly after the distribution, reports are shared long time after distribution. PDMs should be considered more.
4. Movement restrictions for personnel and goods have been faced by partners in Al Bayda causing gap in response to affected population needs
5. The delay on signing the sub-agreement by SCMCHA for some projects resulted in a delay in response to the affected population.

Immediate priorities:

1. Considering providing some items of the ESKs as only some items get damaged a way faster than other items .
2. More harmonization in terms of number of items included in each kit based on number of family members.

Top 3 News/Challenges

1. Aden Hub is still having a major challenge to cover Shelter gaps in Aden hub and WC and Turbah Sub-Hub due to very limited number of partners who have the capacity (stock and resources).
2. Transitional Shelter distribution in the WC and Lahj may encounter HLP issue which may lead to suspension of setting up transitional shelters.
3. Some partners including UNHCR are in a hurry to start distribution of winterization support while National Cluster recommendations for winterization is not yet received.
4. There is great pressure on the part of those returning to their homes, which has led to the eviction of the displaced from the homes to which the original residents have returned.

Needs

1. Urgent needs to respond thousands of IDPs families affected by conflict/natural disaster with Shelter/NFIs kits in Aden hub, WC, Turbah and Marib.
2. There are 500 HHs of IDPs who are threatened with leaving the returnees' homes and need rental subsidies in Taiz.
3. There is a need for a winterization kits for IDPs in the cold districts in Taiz, exceeding 5,000 families living in IDP sites or in semi-destroyed homes.

Top 3 News/Challenges

1. Lack of information and assessment for Musatba district that affected by flood within Hajjah.
2. Limited Shelter and NFI stocks for partners resulted huge gaps in the response to thousands of flood affected families within the hub.
3. Huge needs for IDPs in hosting sites to upgrade ESKs or TS solutions in Abs district.

Main Need

1. Replenish the NFI/Shelter stocks to allow the response to at least 6,000 flood-affected families.
2. Prioritize transitional shelter solutions for IDPs who have settled in the areas for more than one year especially IDPs in hosting sites in Abs.
3. Advocacy with all cluster partners to access Mustaba to conduct needs assessment.

Non-Food Items: **12,610**

Emergency shelter kits: **8,766**

Cash for rental subsidy: **3,821**

Total Assistance Provided: 25,197

Success story:

Merely war forced Neama and hers 4 children to leave their home and run for their lives after experiencing fear and disappointment. Neama and her family displaced to Kuidinah distric to live in small shelter named Aosha which has completely damaged by two wave of flood. Also Neama is suffering from several illnesses such as atrophy and psychological issues. In coordination with shelter cluster, NFDHR by support of Contingency stock has targeted family by NFIs and ESKs to help them to protect themselves and live in safe place with dignity and privacy.



Updates/Challenges :

- Limited funded partners.
- Limited resources available do not allow meeting the huge needs for NFIs, emergency shelter, rental subsidies, and shelter maintenance.
- More capacity building programs are needed to improve the quality and effectiveness of response

Immediate priorities:

- Increase number of emergency stock .
- Shelter rehabilitation is highly recommended to the returnees HHs.

Non-Food Items: 5,776

Emergency shelter kits: **1,174**

Transitional Shelter: **429**

Cash for rental subsidy: **3,223**

Shelter Maintenance Activities: **100**

Total Assistance Provided: 10,702

Ghaleb displaced from Hajja governorate to Amran governorate, but could not afford the rent amount; therefore, he re-displaced to Al-Marashi district in Al-Jawf Gov.
