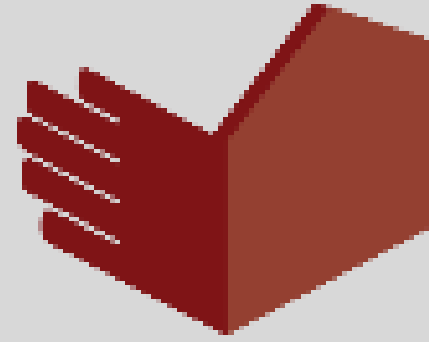

NFI distribution in Misrata - Cesvi Libya August 2021

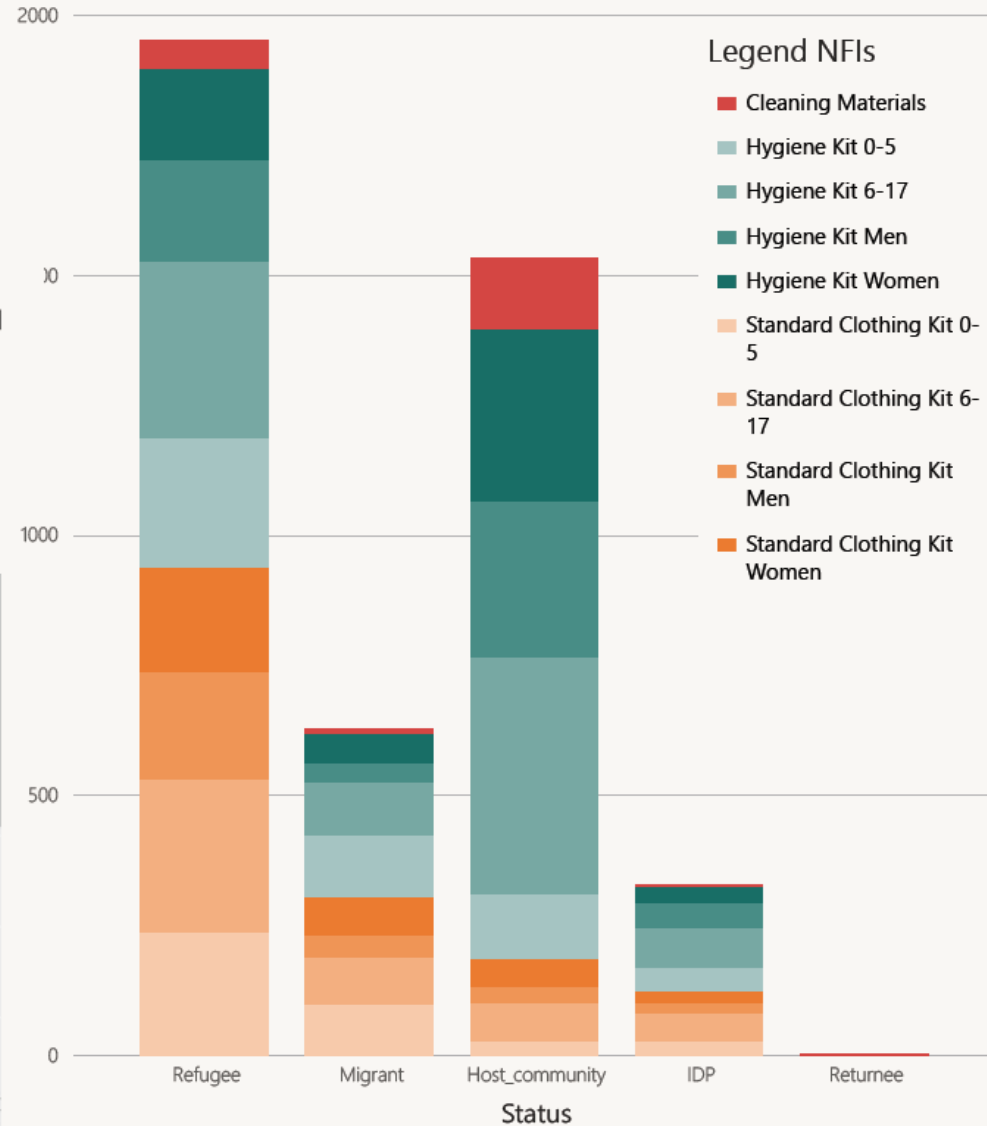

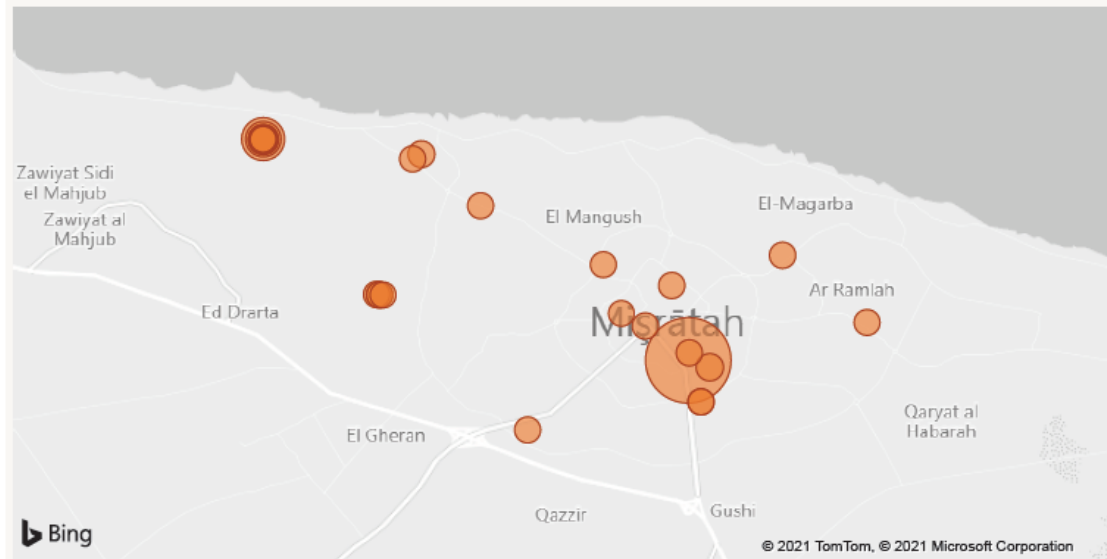

2. PARTNER UPDATE



In the framework of the Regional Development and Protection Programme (RDPP) for North Africa, CEFA is implementing a life assistance Project (24 months) to improve living conditions of migrants, asylum-seekers and refugees (with specific priority to women and children), in urban setting, in Tripoli and Zawiya Municipalities. The action will provide assistance in terms of food security, hygiene and Covid19 prevention kits, access to primary health care, NFIs and minor WASH interventions.

UPDATES

- *Registration of beneficiaries:* the registration process carried out by the Libyan CEFA staff in the targeted areas of Tripoli and Zawiya will be completed within two weeks: the potential beneficiaries are registered in our database after being interviewed using our registration form drawn up on KoboToolBox.
- *Distribution of FI, Hygiene Kits and SNFI:* the suppliers selection process in Tripoli and Zawiya is about to be completed. Once the registration process and the purchase order will be completed, and the distribution list fully drafted, CEFA will start the distribution activities of FI and Hygiene kits and SNFI to the identified beneficiaries. Distribution activities will be carried out on monthly basis, for 18 months. As soon as we start the distribution activities, we will report them on ActivityInfo, ServiceMapping and we will keep updated all the relevant sectors.
- *Referral Pathway:* our project cannot cover all the multi-sector needs we are identifying and assessing on the field; thus, we are working on referral pathways in order to refer cases among our beneficiaries to other humanitarian actors who are active in the same areas but on different sectors and able to provide more specialized services (protection, cash for rent, education and health assistance at secondary level).



2. PARTNER UPDATE

- **Ongoing activities:**
 - **Sidi Alsayah- IDPs site (37HH):**
 - Signed intervention agreement with the site committee (community-based approach)
 - Procurement process is about to complete and preparing for implementation phase (material rehab and S/NFIs based on need)
 - **Identified new IDPs site (Ain Zara IDPs site) referred by Ain Zara municipality**
 - Site population is 19 HH –IDPs families -> 12 HH were reachable and assessed -> only 4 HH out of 12HH are feasible for support and aligned with DRC Shelter criteria. (any possibility to refer sever damage cases to other partners?)
 - **Ain Zara Returnees families:**
 - Total families been targeted at this stage is 22HH
 - 11HH were visited (for technical assessment), while 7HH out of 11HH were feasible for support.
 - 11HH technical visits are on progress.

- **Ongoing activities:**
 - **Mix migrants Sites:**
 - (3) sites in **Soug Aljoma** been considered for support (rehab + S/NFIs). Technical assessment is on progress. Site populations as follows : S1=65 IND, S2=13 IND, while S3= still on progress. Referred by IRC.
 - **Gargarsh** site (41 IND) been assessed, however, next step to start to reach out the landlord to sign intervention agreement and possibility to contribute to expand the site's sewage septic tank.

4. PARTNER UPDATE

Projects charged to UNHCR:

1. Two project already kicked off and in progress as following:
 - Rehabilitation and upgrade of 2 infrastructure projects in SIDI Faraj and Garyounis camps (percentage of completion 90%)
 - Rehabilitation of 30 shelter units in Alhlies Camp (Percentage of completion 45%)
2. Rehabilitation of 41 houses at Al Sabrie; Tender evaluation is ongoing, expected starting date is mid next week
3. Rehabilitation of 24 house at Al Sabrie: Request for Quotations have been sent as a result of not receiving good offers when launching the tender, tender evaluation and contractor's selection will be done next week and expected starting date is the week after.
4. Rehabilitation and upgrade of 3 infrastructure projects in Tripoli (rain water lifting stations), tender evaluation and contractors' selection will be completed by mid of next week.

Projects charged to other donors:

1. Rehabilitation and upgrade of two health centers in Al Hadba and Mashroe Zerae- Tripoli; Tender evaluation and contractor's selection is completed, expected starting date is Sunday next week.
2. Rehabilitation of housing units - Benghazi: Registration and vulnerability assessment for HHs in Gaminess and Benina is completed, technical assessment is completed, and the tender was advertise online and closed on 2/9/2021, the evaluation phase for the quotation in progress.
3. Rehabilitation of housing units – Tripoli: working on registering potential beneficiaries through community focal points and local councils, vulnerability assessments on going for HHs identified, technical assessments are ongoing in parallel.



2. PARTNER UPDATE



- During June, UNHCR managed to reach 1,166 HH totaling 15,312 individuals, mainly refugees, asylum seekers, and IDP's.
- 3,542 individuals, among them 269 females, have been reached at a detention center in the detention centers (Ganfoud, Almabani, AinZara, Abusalim, and Sikka dc).
- In the urban context, UNHCR provided HKs to 774 Tawerghan IDP HH residing in urban areas in Benghazi. Additionally, UNHCR, through IRC, managed to reach 317 HH with 2019 individuals at the CDC and in different urban sites in Tripoli through the home visits or various Primary Health Care Centers in Tripoli.
- 2,293 NFIs, 3,107 HKs, and 2,310 hand soap have been distributed at the CDC, DCs, and IDP urban settings during the month.

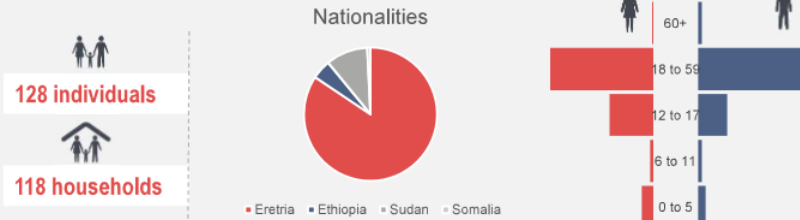

CONTEXT

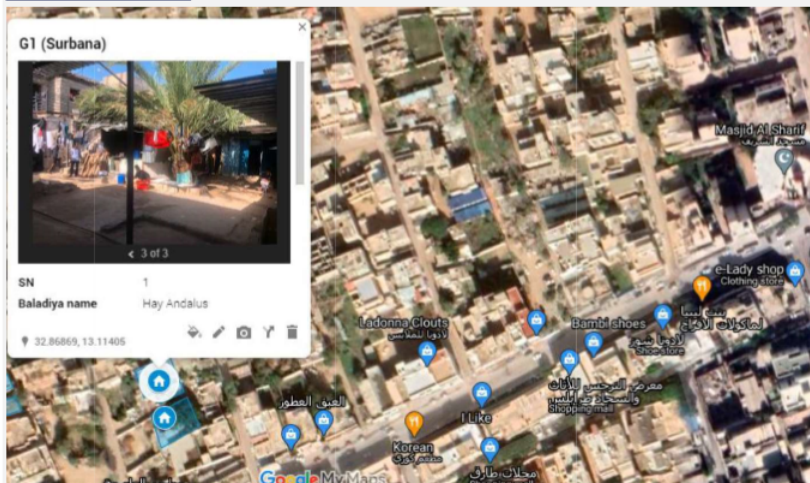
Surbana site is a private owned shelter located in Hay Andalous municipality, in Gargaresh neighborhood. The site population is mainly from Eritrea and thus the Eritrean association with its base in US was paying the rent until January 2020. Due to funding gaps, they could not cover the rent and population was at risk of eviction, until DRC started covering the rent for the shelter. Its extension owned by the same landowner started operating in May 2020.

SECTOR OVERVIEW

SECTOR	Component	Outputs
SMC	Community Governance	G1, maintains a community set up with unofficial leadership structures. There are 2 individuals who present themselves as community leaders, with one of them living in the site while the other one recently seems to have moved to an individual accommodation. The later is being contracted by DRC as CPV. These individuals can speak Arabic and thus are the link with Humanitarian community. The community seems united. The male population have weekly meetings chaired by the community leaders. No female representation at this stage. The community cooks in one kitchen (rotation basis) and food being distributed to each room, showing a communal set up within the community. Occasionally, concerns have been raised by the community that community leaders are not always exclusive. Ad hoc reports for power abused have been received.
EDUCATION	Children enrolled to schools	No children are enrolled to school. Among the community residents there was an individual who previously was a teacher and had expressed interest to run a school for adults in the site, but did not due to the lack of space. The individual is not present in the site at the moment.
FSL	People have access to food	When site was identified the population had serious malnutrition issues as well as individuals with critical medical conditions appeared (i.e TB, mobility issues etc). DRC's first intervention were provision of fresh and dry food, while a vouchers systems with local vendors was developed that allowed residents to have access to bread in daily basis. The medical conditions of the individuals who have been also referred by DRC to health providers have been improved and individuals manage to get ad hoc jobs as casual labours that can cover some of their basic needs. However, food remains a priority for the residents, especially after livelihoods being affected during covid 19 pandemic
HEALTH	Health facility in walking distance (30 min walk)	IOM mobile team is visiting the site every Monday and Thursday and follow up with medical and MHPSS cases. Cases being referred to IOM and IRC supported clinics in Tripoli, where services are free. Residents occasionally raised concerns that medication often is not free and due to lack of cash often they cannot purchase medication.
NUTRITION	SAM cases observed	During 2019 most of the population in G1 was suffering from malnutrition. Due to the medical condition of the residents (i.e TB, mobility issues etc) population was unable to work so to purchase food. After DRC's regular food interventions in the site, the population seems in much better condition and no SAM cases can be observed recently.
PROTECTION	Vulnerabilities	Unaccompanied /separated children - No Female single headed HHs – 5HH Elderlies without caregiver - No People with disabilities – No People with medical conditions – 6ind
SHELTER/NFI		- Average space per apartment: 20-25 m2 per room DRC improved the roof of the main building, added ramp in the stairways, added a sharing area and improved the electrical system - NFIs: Bedding kits, kitchen sets, mattresses, winter clothes provided by DRC. Blankets provided by UNHCR. - Fire prevention: DRC distributed fire extinguisher for the kitchen area - Rent: 5.500LYD (for both buildings)
WASH		- Access to water: DRC provided 2 water tanks (main building) with 3 taps and there is 1 tap with running water in the extension - Access to latrines: DRC installed 3 portable latrines (2M-1F) and 3 were already in place (total 6 in Main building) 2 available latrines in the extension. - NFIs: DRC distributed group hygiene kits and Handwashing kits in May 2021 and diapers and female hygiene kits in February 2021.

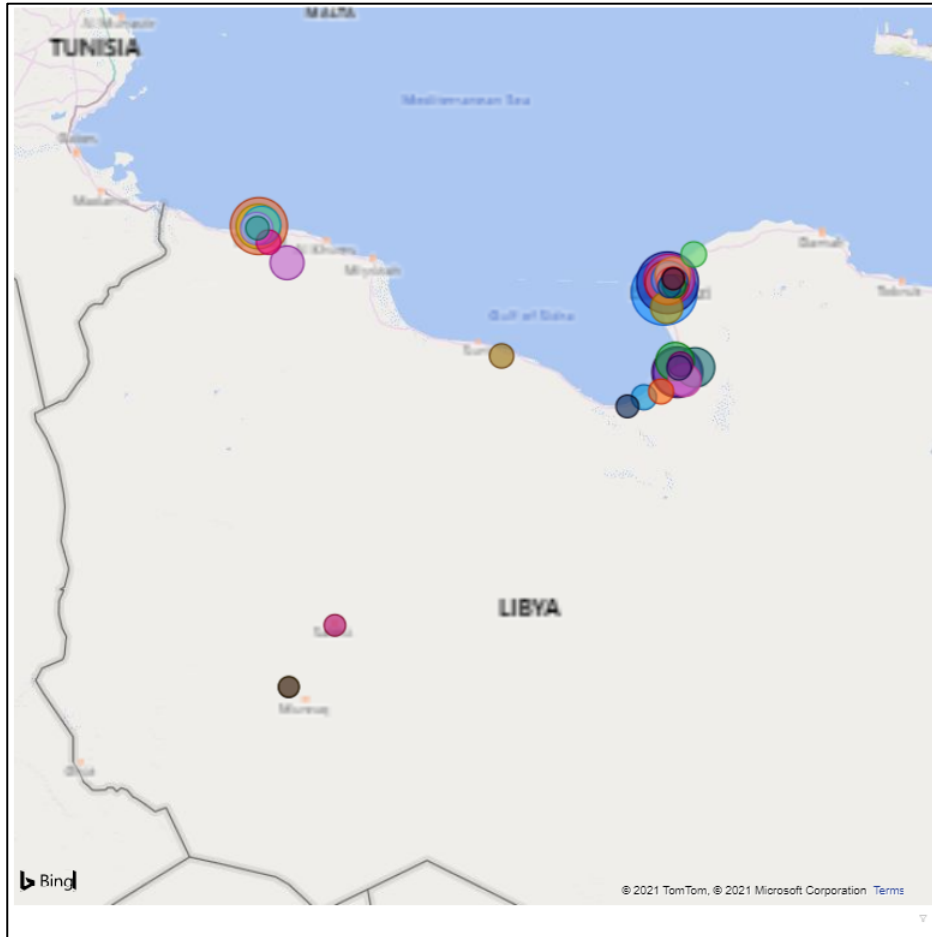

Mapping of Informal IDP Sites

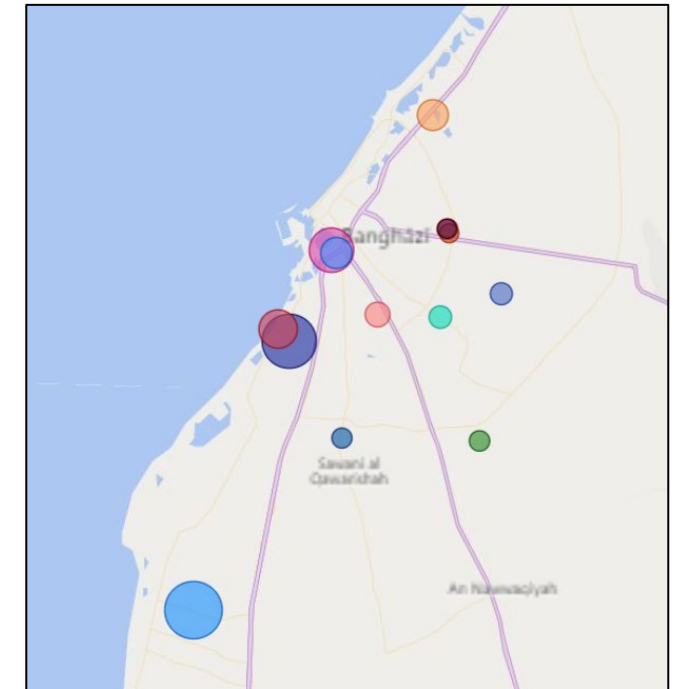

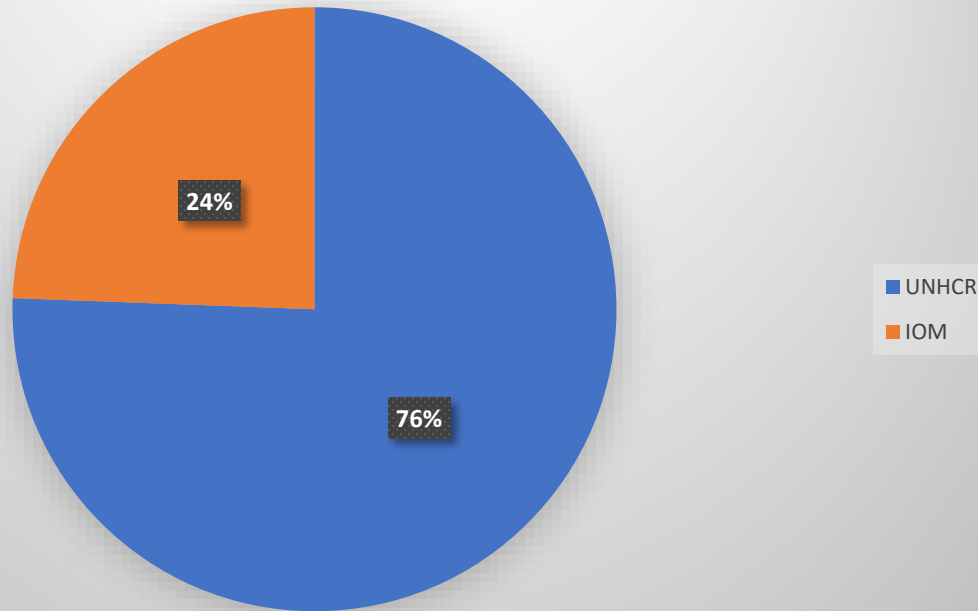

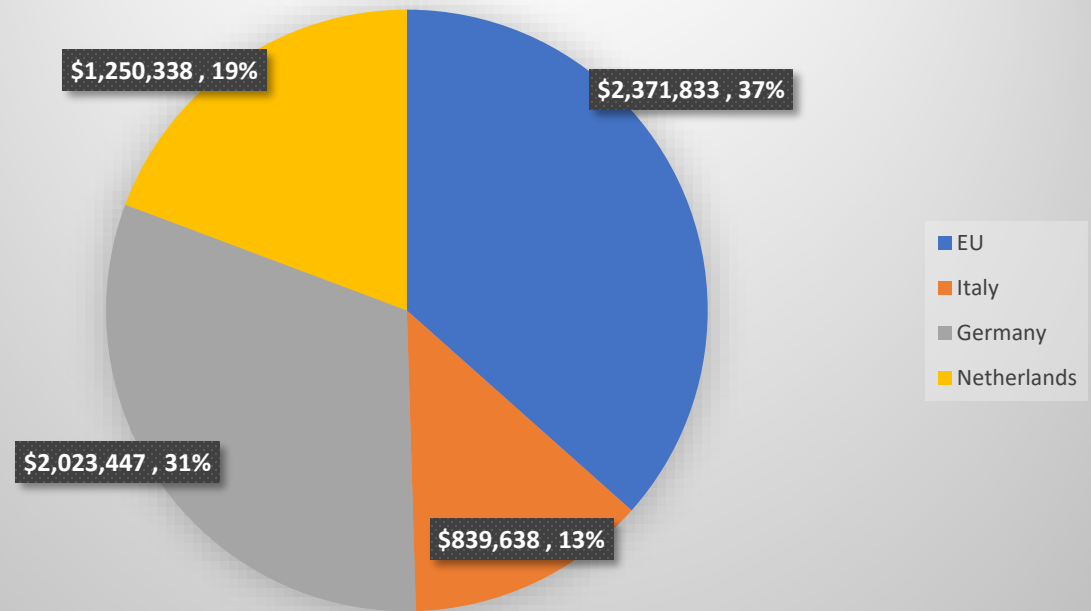

- **“The process of incorporating protection principles and promoting meaningful access, safety and dignity in humanitarian aid.”**

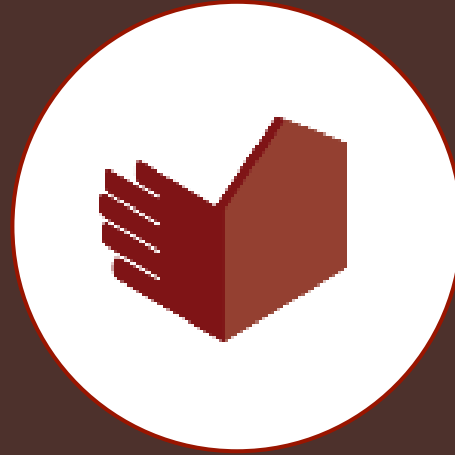
