

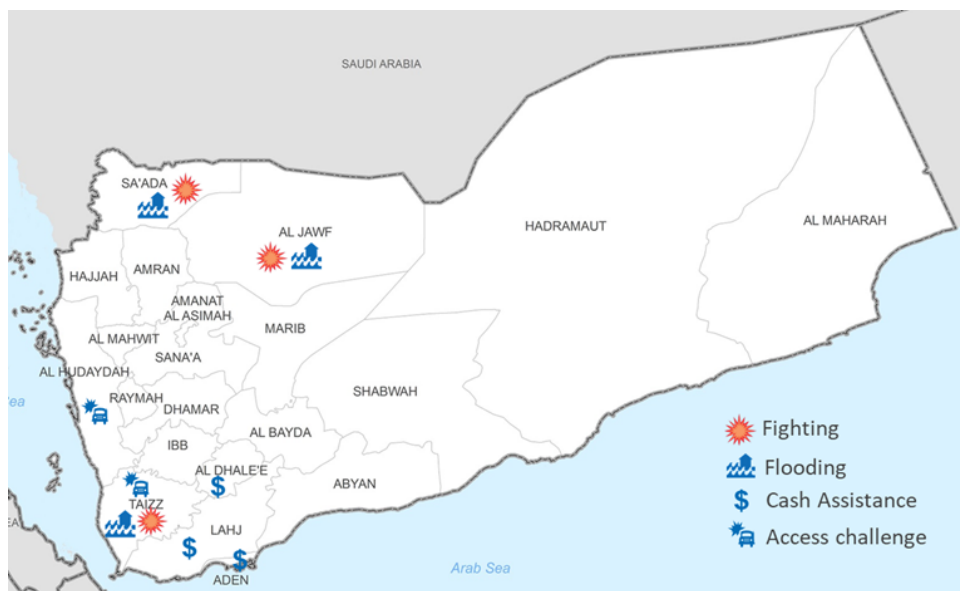
How far we've come - Updates on YHRP 2017 Cluster Indicators

The situation continues to deteriorate both for the families in displacement as well as for our Partners struggling to provide much needed assistance. Our Partners carried out critical work that touched the lives of 81,355 families this year.

Recent emergency displacements due to flooding and conflict were reported mainly in Taizz, Hajjah, Al Jawf, and Sa'ada Governorates to which the Sub National Clusters organized emergency responses in coordination with the local authorities.

This meant that in As Safra, Al Dhaher, Razih, Sahar, Sa'adah, Kitaf wa Al Boqe'e and Majz districts in Saada Governorate 3,380 families on the move were assisted with emergency shelters and NFIs providing critical shelter assistance at a critical time to assure protection from violence and the elements.

During July and August, about 3,000 families in Aden, Lahj, and Al Dhale'e Governorates were provided with cash assistance to pay their rent and rehabilitate their damaged homes providing a base for them to restart their lives. Challenges with access in AlHudaydah and Taizz continue to be faced by NGOs for conducting rapid assessments and delivering assistance.



In August the Cluster achieved YHRP (Yemen Humanitarian Response Plan) targets as in the table below.

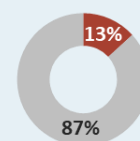

Using Technology to support Sub National Clusters

As part of its overall strategy to forge closer ties and provide hands on support to Sub National Cluster Coordinators and Partners, the first Shelter/NFI/CCCM Cluster meeting with a video link to Aden was held on the 20 August 2017.

Several issues of common concern were discussed including the upcoming HNO/HRP 2018 process and how Partners in Aden can influence the process and reflect their needs and priorities.

The results of CCMP (Cluster Coordination Performance Monitoring) in which 25 Partners, National and Subnational cluster coordinators shared their opinions, recommendations and concerns with the coord-

nation of the Cluster over the past 6 months was discussed and a date defined for a strategizing workshop.

IDP Hosting Site (CCCM) Baseline Assessment – HCT- Donor Update

The Cluster made a presentation to the HCT (Humanitarian Country Team) in Yemen and Donors (ECHO, DFID, Dutch Embassy) through video link on 14 August 2017 on the progress of the IDP Hosting Site (CCCM) baseline assessment.

The ongoing multi sectoral baseline assessment in collective centres and spontaneous sites in the first four Governorates (Amran, Amanat Al Asimah, Marib and Dhamar) elicits comprehensive sectoral information on the status of gaps and needs of IDPs. IDPs living in IDP hosting sites are among the most vulnerable and this information will enable Partners to target protection and assistance in an integrated and coordinated manner.

Expanding Coordination and leadership in the Hubs

As part of the Shelter/NFI/CCCM strategy to decentralise and provide more field level support, the results of the CEI (Call for Expression of Interest) launched in June to lead the Sub National Cluster in Ibb Hub was shared with Partners.

ACTED, an International NGO with decades of experience in the sector, and HFY (Humanitarian Forum Yemen) a National NGO with vast local coordination and Shelter experience were jointly selected to lead the Sub National Cluster. With this collaboration the Sub National Cluster

Finding Appropriate Shelter Solutions - TWiGs



The Shelter/NFI/CCCM Cluster, in a bid to improve its repertoire of shelter solutions, set up a TWiG (Technical Working Group) to improve the EESK (Enhance Emergency shelter Kit) on 3 August 2017. The improvements included the introduction of metal pegs and additional timber to make it more robust and withstand the vagaries of weather and the introduction of partitions to enhance protection and privacy. EESKs are distributed as a first response to displaced persons fleeing war and violence.

In order to operationalize the rental subsidy guidelines developed by the Cluster earlier this year, a CASH for Shelter TWiG was initiated to

develop operational tools including a Lease Agreement, a harmonized assessment questionnaire, vulnerability scoring, BOQ for shelter rehabilitation, a post distribution monitoring form and a rent payment receipt form. The tools will be presented to the Cluster on the 10th of September for feedback and Partner endorsement.
