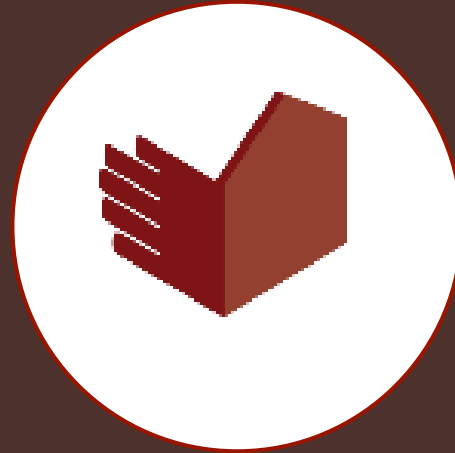

Abu Salim Key Factors

Abu Salim was selected in part due to the following key factors

1. High immediate and long-term needs – nexus-type interventions perceived as relevant
2. Significant information gaps, particularly related to areas damaged by conflict
 1. Most KIs said they would prefer the ABA to take place in Abu Salim
3. Larger (current/anticipated) presence of international actors,
4. Perception that municipal government is especially collaborative
5. REACH team has access and presence

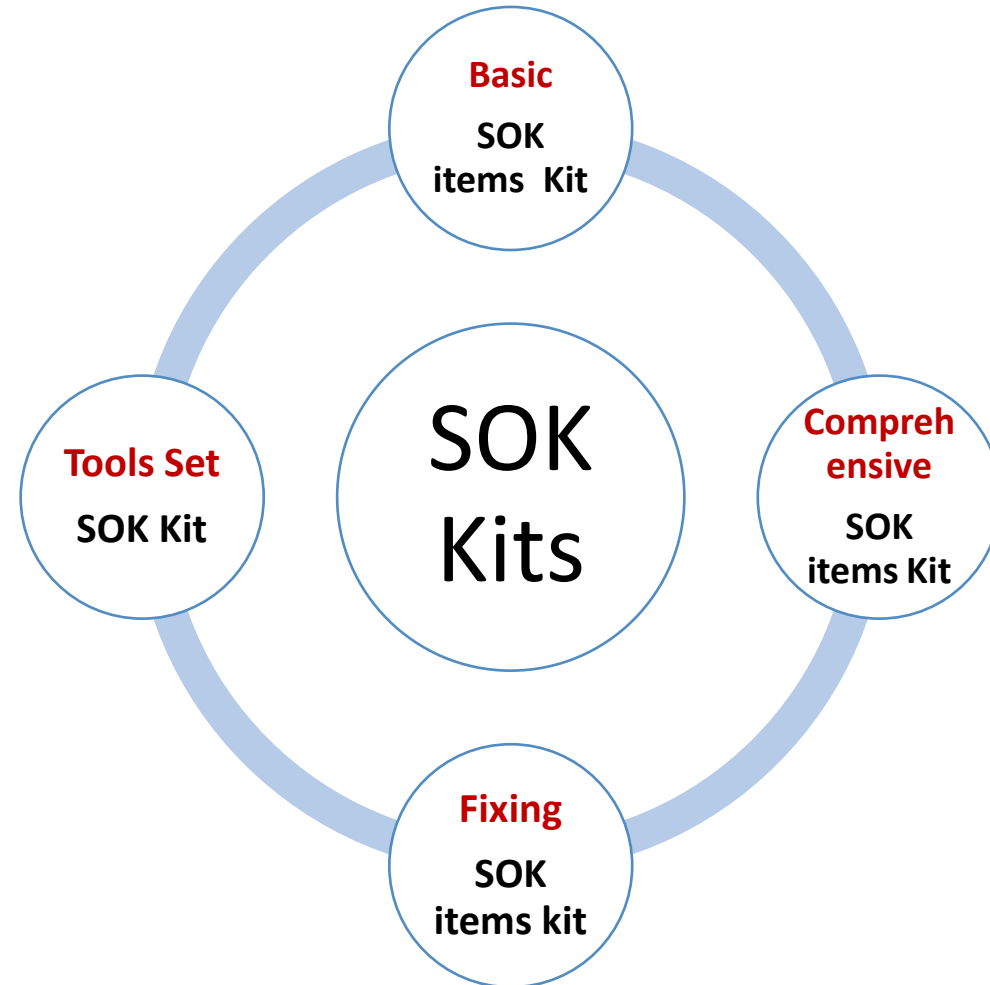
IDP & Returnee package covering Nov-Dec 2020

On **4 March**, the United Nations Support Mission in Libya (UNSMIL) announced the deployment of a **small advance team to Libya**. “The advance team will help advance UN planning, in close consultation with the 5+5 Joint Military Commission, and provide the foundation for scalable United Nations support to the Libyan-led and Libyan-owned **Ceasefire Monitoring Mechanism (LCMM)**.”

On **5 March**, the Media Office of **Libya’s prime minister-designate Abdul Hamid Dbeibah** submitted a **vision" for an interim government** in accordance with the roadmap of the political agreement, the government outline which requires at least 30 per cent of top government posts to be filled by women and young candidates. On **8 March** the **House of Representatives (HoR)** held a special session in Sirt for the **confidence granting session to Dbeibah’s new unity government**. On Monday **Dbeibah swore to lead the war-torn country's transition to elections in December**. His government includes two deputy prime ministers, 26 ministers and six ministers of state, with the key foreign affairs and justice portfolios handed to women, a first in Libya

On **5 March**, the 444th Brigade of the Tripoli Military Region announced raids on six human smuggler sites in Bani Waleed (south east of Tripoli), resulting in the **liberation of 70 migrants** and the arrest of suspects of various nationalities.

On **15 March** the Security Directorate in Libya's southern city of **Kufra** said it had Liberated **47 illegal immigrants who were detained by human traffickers** in a secret prison on the outskirts of the city. It added that the hostages had included "46 Sudanese nationals and an Ethiopian.

On **4 March**, the Investigation Department of the Attorney General's Office confirmed the **arrest of two ISIS members in Tripoli**.

On **14 March** the Forces of Libya’s eastern military arrested a **suspected senior local Islamic State fighter, Mohammed Miloudon** , in a southwestern town known to be a militant hideout. He was once an IS leader in the coastal city of Sirte, and was allegedly involved in several attacks in the country’s so-called oil crescent.

As of **7 March**, a total of **3,170 refugees and migrants** have been registered as **rescued/intercepted** at sea by the Libyan Coast Guard (LCG) and disembarked in Libya.

As of **2 March**, there are **4,311 asylum-seekers and migrants in detention centres** across Libya, UNHCR and its partner, IOM and IRC continue to provide NFI, HKs on regular basis and when there are new arrivals.

On **3 March** the **Directorate for Combating Illegal Migration DCIM** has put in place a **mechanism for the distribution of assistance** by delivering any scheduled quantity to the Procurement Department at DCIM, then **DCIM will distribute** it to migrants inside the Gathering and return centers according to the target numbers.

The rate of **Coronavirus (COVID-19)** cases continues to grow rapidly in Libya. During the last week, more than 3,600 new Coronavirus cases were recorded.

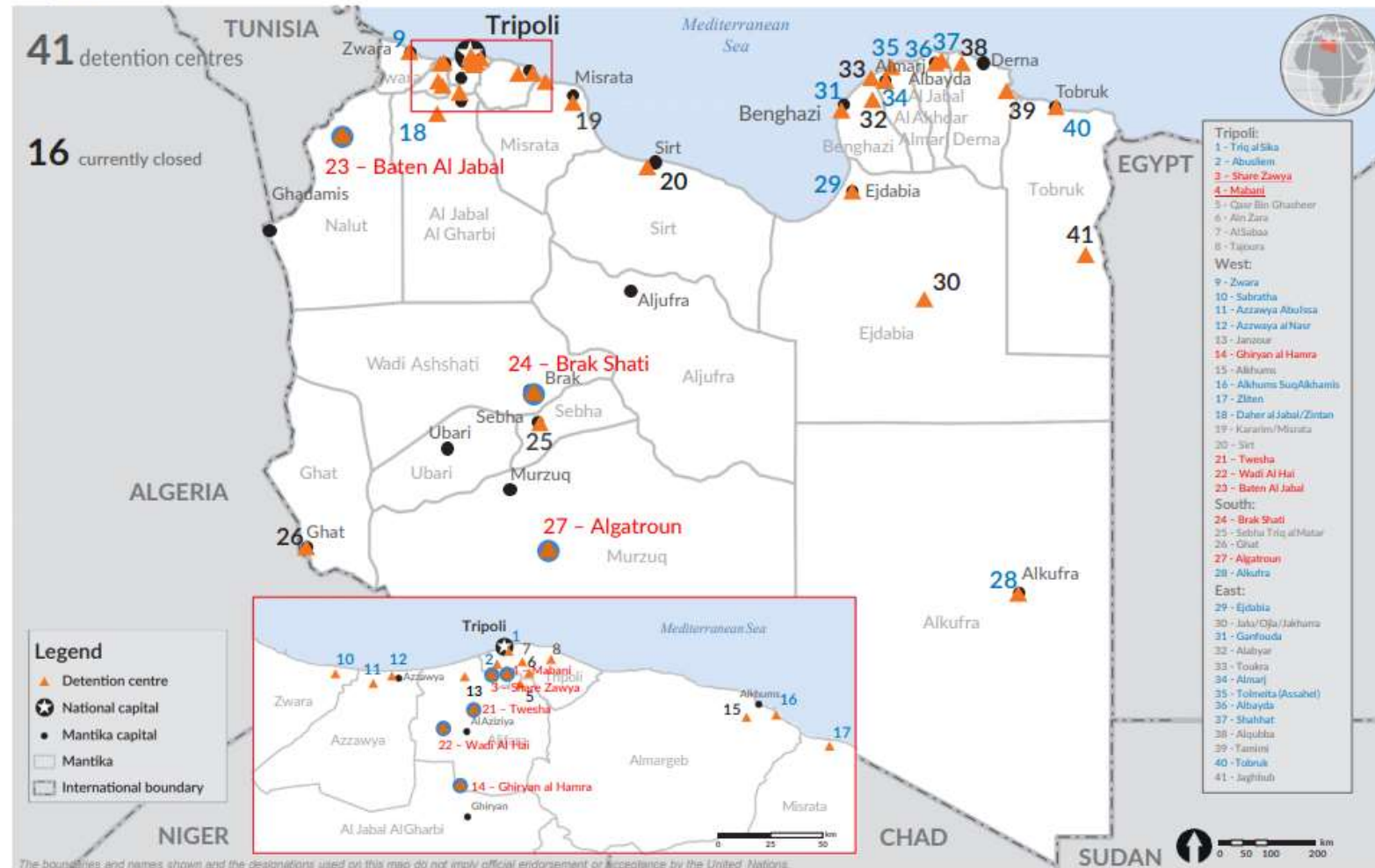
As of **14 March**, the National Centre for Disease Control (NCDC) has recorded a total of **146,080 cases of COVID-19 in Libya**, out of whom **10,981 are active cases, 132,697 recovered and 2,402 deaths**. On **27 February**, the Head of the Scientific Advisory Committee for Combating Coronavirus said that a total of **12 million doses of coronavirus vaccine** would be delivered to Libya by the end of March. On **1 March**, the CDC announced the launching of the **COVID-19 vaccine online registration service**. Registration is now open for Libyans over the age of 18, while no statement has been made regarding providing vaccines to foreigners in Libya.

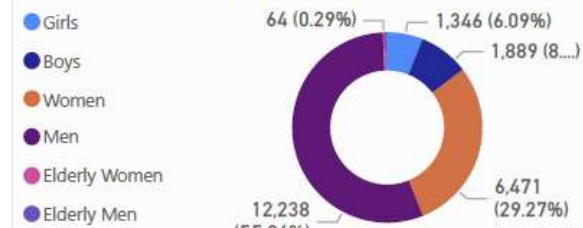

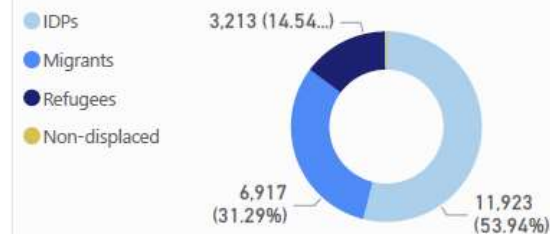

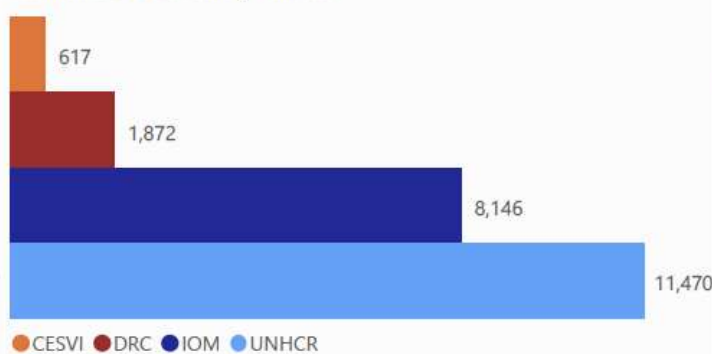


Individuals reached by population group

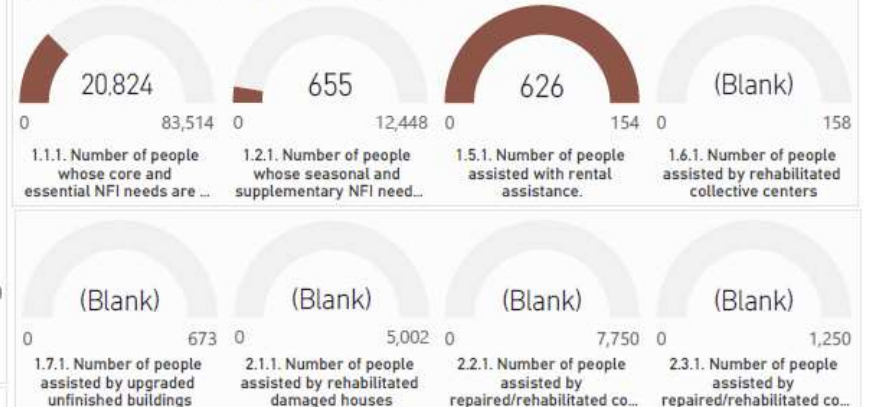

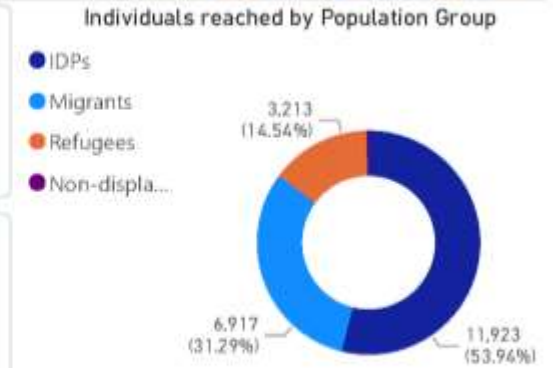

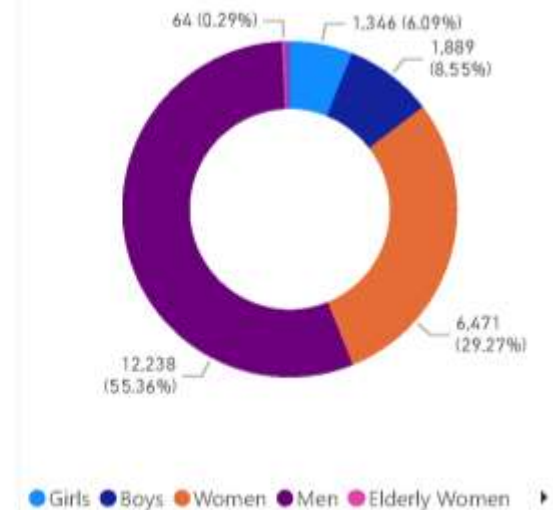

- The 90 HHs of migrant and Libyan women married to foreign nationals displaced from Murzuq to Sebha, Wadi Etba, Ubari, and Taragen

UNICEF, UNFPA in partnership with IMC planned to intervene

Appeal for handover rental assistance in Gergaresh

- DRC has been providing assistance since Dec.2019 –
- The rental assistance for 156 individuals will end in March
- Target groups are mainly Asylum seekers
- Rental is bases on site not on room (4500 LYD/month)
- Major needs: Shelter and food assistance
- Searching for partner to handover

Key message on critical protection concerns by PS – endorsed by HCT

- Returns of displaced Tawerghans and the role the international community and local NGOs could play in the process of supporting durable solutions.
- Eviction is a growing protection concern. the most urgent current case concerns the occupants of the Tarik Almatar buildings (also known as Kikla apartments) along airport road in Tripoli, who were threatened with an eviction on March 1st 2021.

The Eviction Task Force is a joint initiative of PS and SNFI, it has been established in January and it's time bound till March. The aim is developing an Eviction Prevention and Response SOP for Libya and related information management and advocacy products. The ETF also aims to develop a guidance note on transitional policy for durable solutions with focus on sustainability and integration.

The members are Protection and Shelter/NFI partners with expertise on HLP, durable solutions, legal aid, and UNDP and UNHABITAT representatives, recognizing the relevance of the development actors.

The Strategic Advisory Group has been established in June 2020 and will be in charge for 1 year. The SAG guides the sector, in a consultative and collaborative manner, with strategic directions, policy decisions and coordination mechanisms.

The Technical Working Group has been established in June 2020, with the specific task to develop guidelines on shelter solutions for migrants, refugees and asylum seekers, however it was decided to develop guidelines for the standardization and harmonization of the Non-Food Items Kits, considering the urgent request on this regard.

Access Monitoring and Reporting Framework (AMRF) Guidance Note

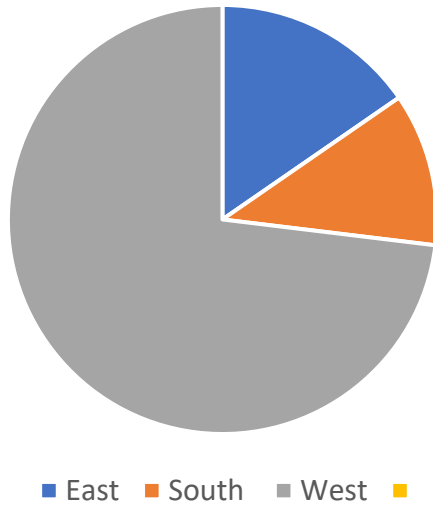
Reporting Guidelines:

Information will be collected from humanitarian partners (UN agencies, INGOs and NNGOs) on a monthly basis. The AMRF reporting template will be used to solicit the required information through the following steps:

- 1) OCHA Access Unit to send out a reminder to partners on the first day of each month asking for their inputs on access constraints they encountered in the previous month in the AMRF reporting template.
- 2) Humanitarian partners to provide inputs by CoB 5th of each month.
- 3) If a humanitarian partner does not provide feedback by the deadline, OCHA will use the information reported in the previous month for the same partner and will continue to do so in following reporting periods until the partner either adjusts the information to reflect the situation at hand or reports that the constraint(s) no longer exist(s). OCHA will then make changes accordingly.
- 4) OCHA to consolidate the information and share the information on constraints impacting humanitarian sectors with the sector coordinators by CoB 7th of each month (e.g., constraints impacting Shelter/NFI activities will be shared only with the Shelter/NFI Sector Coordinator, etc.).
- 5) OCHA to analyse information and produce main advocacy and information products for humanitarian access; Thematic Access Snapshots to be produced every month, Access inputs in the Humanitarian Bulletin which is produced every month, Access Snapshots to be produced every two months and Access Reports which will be produced on a quarterly basis.



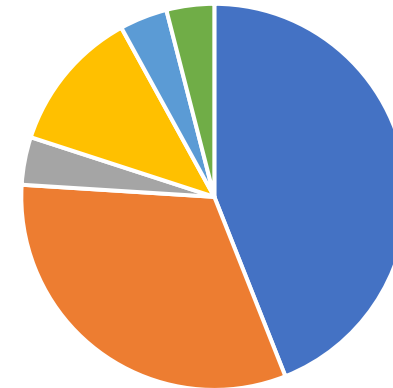

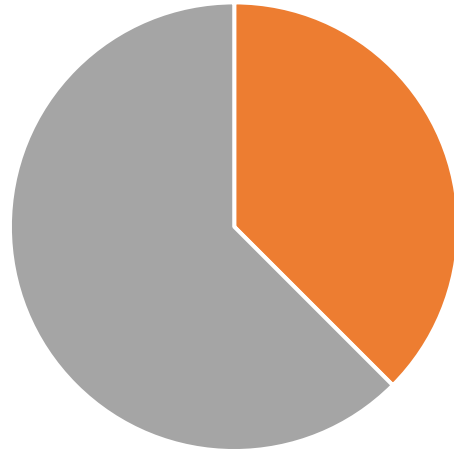

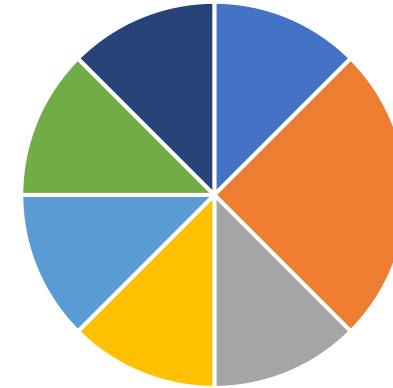

- **3%** of calls received by the CFM team were related to the shelter and NFIs sector, of which **44%** of cases were from female.
- **91%** of all beneficiaries were from the **west** region, the other **9%** were from the **east** region, and **none** from the **south** region for this reporting period.
- **66%** were from **refugees**, **19%** were from **non-displaced**, **15%** from **IDPs**.
- **44%** of this sector called **requesting information** on how to **register** in the program, and **47%** of the beneficiaries were contacted by the CFM operators for **follow-up**, while only **9%** of the beneficiary had **negative feedback** on the lack of response.

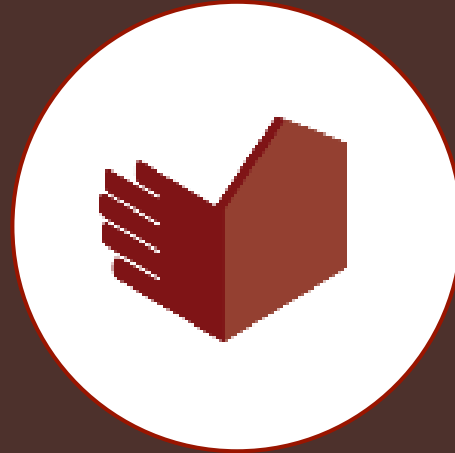
