For a while Swansea Reserves played at Skewen dog track, a venue which I often passed but never visited so again an aerial photo was worth buying. The only other non-League ground I was aware of was Tonyrefail Welfare, which I saw a number of times from the other side of the valley during visits to the town. I was able to see matches there more recently and visited a further couple of times to take ground photos. Sadly, I never visited Somerton Park with a camera, only as a spectator.

A move back to London in 1980 sparked my interest in non-League football as I found Selhurst Park much less enjoyable than the Vetch. With grounds like Dulwich Hamlet's Champion Hill and Bromley's Hayes Lane I lost interest in League football. I began taking photos of grounds as Tony Williams expanded from his Directory to include books covering grounds, and I started to send in action photos for his new monthly magazine.

1995 was a pivotal year as I turned 40 and also had the idea of publishing my own small book detailing the

grounds to be found in Kent. I also started working for the WJEC, the exam board in Wales. through my job teaching Design & Technology. The National Curriculum meant that every student had to take D&T

at GCSE and the pressure on exam boards to expand their teams to cover every school was enormous. I was most fortunate to be appointed as a Moderator which involved me visiting schools to match their marking to the WJEC standard. That first year I was working in and around Aberdare and spent a couple of evenings visiting grounds such as Tonyrefail Welfare, Ferndale and Blaenrhondda. Over the years I was sent all over Wales and England so the vast majority of the grounds included in this book were visited courtesy of the WJEC.

The work for the exam board was always in late May. usually the week after the FA Cup Final, so there was little opportunity to watch games. I did see two games over the years, a Cup Final at Ffostrasol and a Play-Off final in Cardiff. I forget why, but I was driving my 1973 VW Beetle one year and my 1972 campervan the other. It was too good a chance not to pose them both outside the Vetch. The resulting images now seem so far back in time, with barbed wire and broken bottles on top of the bleak walls outside the North Bank.

Through the book there are a number of grounds where matches are in progress, watched by crowds way above those that usually attend. These games were part of GroundhopUK's Welsh Groundhops, with multiple games played each day over a long weekend, grouped to give just a short drive between grounds. I usually went with my late friend Dave West whose advice to anyone taking ground photos was to get them of the ground empty or full. He always felt just an odd one or two people in an otherwise empty ground spoilt the shots. My preference has always been, whenever possible, to visit a ground when empty.
